Easter is a time that reminds us of Hope! We all need hope to be able to face the future. This time la st year we were not able to have Easter services in church and for many that was a great loss,

way.

That is what those first disciples learnt. Of course, they were fearful, and many of them certainly learnt what it meant to take up their cross and follow Christ. But they had each other, and they had their hope in Christ. My hope is that I bring this joy with me in all I do,the hope and joy of the risen Lord. We won't be better golfers, but hopefully we will be better Christians!

OUR SCHOOL

The Bubbles have landed.

The gates are open again to a full compliment of happy little faces and to the obvious relief of parents and grandparents. Things are slowly getting back to Normal (number 2) with class bubbles and minimal contact – but it's better than the Normal (number 3) that has existed since Christmas. One day we'll get back to Normal (number 1). One day.....

Following on from the Parish Council's decision to declare a climate emergency I am pleased to say that Ninfield School (with the help of our friends at County) are leading the way. We have managed to secure Government funding to help reduce our carbon footprint. This will include a new boiler to get rid of the current oil guzzling monster, LED lighting, additional loft and wall insulation, replacement of old windows and doors and the provision of battery storage facilities to enable us to move to solar power if/when more finance is available. This all adds up to an estimated 43% carbon reduction as well as a very welcome reduction in the school's annual energy bill. This project will also give us a chance to get the children involved by showing them some real life examples of what can be done to look after our environment.

Meanwhile on the education front our remote learning provision seems to have kept everyone going, even parents have been learning new (or long forgotten) skills. So it has not been too difficult to slip back into classroom learning and face to face lessons. It's as if they had never been away.

Manchester Road Development

The application by the developer to change some of the conditions placed on them by Wealden District Council has been decided.

They asked to be allowed to make changes to some of the aspects within the site itself and this was allowed.

The condition for all of the safety works and alterations to Manchester Road to be completed before any building works took place, was not allowed to be changed. Rather than do these works first, they wanted to do them part way through the build, meaning all of us would be sharing the roadway with all the huge lorries and construction workers vehicles. Now, although still having to share that space, in places we should have some pavement and crossing points.

When are they starting? Really don't know, but would think probably, sadly quite soon, one small mercy, it has been quiet over there while we have all been at home with lockdown, if you don't count the works at Moons Hill or Bircholt!

You will have all noticed the road works on the A269 near Lower Street. This work is to extend the 30MPH speed limit towards Bexhill, create a ghost lane to turn right into the Ingrams development. These works were required by Wealden District Council as part of the planning approval and then agreed between East Sussex County Council and the developer. They are expected to take about four months. The original planning permission was agreed back in 2015 and Wealden District Council with the developer having to fulfil conditions before they were allowed to start the building process. Wealden have now discharged all the conditions (ie agreed the plans submitted by the developer) which means they can start work.

We have been working on a project to identify verges in the village that we can nurture to allow native wild flowers to grow. We are hoping to be able to start the process required this year. What does this mean? The verges are managed by our grounds maintenance company to encourage native wildflowers to grow which in turn encourages more wildlife. These verges will be marked with a wooden flower to highlight that they are a wildflower verge. HOOE HISTORY SOCIETY (April 2021)

As we begin to anticipate something like a return to normal life again the government "road map" continues to prevent gatherings inside until at least the middle of June. We remain bound by this directive, as does Hooe Parish Council with regard to the opening of the hall. Our meetings, government guidelines and the availability of the village hall.

DID YOU KNOW... this month I am again grateful to Maureen Newport and her late husband, John, who had found this poem which had been written at the time of the restoration of St. Oswald's church and bells in 1889. Cuthbert Routh was our vicar at that time. John Edmund Brand was a churchwarden and lived with his wife, Louisa, at Grove Farm next door to the church. My best guess is that the initials in the poem (HCR and LB) may refer to these people, although I cannot fathom the "H" in front of CR!

"He liveth best who loveth best All things both great and small.

Restoration of Hooe Church Tower

A little Bird was flying home across the stormy sea,
Flying towards our Sussex coast, as tired as bird could be,
With keen unerring instinct, how it flew, and flew, and flew,
Till with drooping wing it perched at last,
On the old Church Tower at Hooe!

See! all is changed! the Tower itself is there, but not the same, The ruined stones replaced by new, see! see! the glittering vane! The little Bird is seeking now for where it's nest should be, "Tweet! Tweet! 'tis there! oh Builder kind! My home left still for me!"

Head 'neath its wing, too tired to sing, the wee bird sank to sleep,
And the Tower seemed full of shadowy forms, and voices low and sweet!
And then I knew the Bells were home! come Ringers good and true,
Restored! Recast! and hanging there, dressed in their metal new,
Oh Bells! One, Two, Three, Four, and Five, how much have ye to tell!
Since first ye were hung in the good old Tower!
Which guarded ye so well!

(Bells in Concert)

We are old! very old! Four hundred years or more,
We recall the time when Spaniards proud threatened fair England's shore,
When England's Queen defied them all, and her good men and true
Drove the cowards home o'er the wild sea's foam,
Helped by the men of Hooe!

We recall the time 1649 when our good church was spoiled,
When robbers profane her beauty did stain, leaving her poor and wild,
We recall the dread year, when with hearts full of fear,
The Earthquake Storm drew near our shore,
And men fasted and wept, as the awfulness crept
And threatened our Homes and our Shore!

We rejoice to believe we are now on the eve of a far happier time!
When that good heart and true who our Tower did renew,
Will rejoice when she hears Hooe Bells chime,
May she hear them one day when the soft breezes play,
In her garden so fair by the sea!
Chiming clear in sweet sounds, reaching forth to her grounds,
And thanking her as best may we.
For there's nought so divine as spending one's time
In gladdening the hearts of God's own,
So with tongues all aglow we are just chiming now,
"May God bless dear H. C. R's Home"!

EDUCATION IN NINFIELD

We are all proud of our Ninfield School, but it wasn't the first school to be in Ninfield....

Back in the 1750's there were these references..

Pledge for £7 Date:30 Jan 1756. ESRO reference: PAR 430/31/9/1 Description: Ann Sheather of Ninfield, widow, school-dame, to John Lavender of Ninfield, yeoman. Household goods listed in schedule possession granted by the delivery of a spring to draw corks.

(Quite why a school would need to draw corks (from a bottle, not with a pencil) is unclear at this remove in time, perhaps the children drove her to drink!)

Witnesses: James Russell, Elizabeth Apps. Also endorsed: receipts for interest, Mar 1757 - May 1761; receipt by JL from James Russell for goods bought from Dame [Ann] Sheather, Dec 1761; agreement with the churchwardens and overseers to take £3 3s, Mar 1764; receipt for £1 1s paid by Mr Wickham, Apr 1764; receipt for the balance, Mar 1766. Creator(s) Parish of Ninfield.

Bond. Date:10 Apr 1759. ESRO reference: SAS/B 32 Description: By Ann Sheather of Ninfield, widow, and John Sheather (son?) of the same place, carpenter, to John Ellis of Ashburnham, miller, in £220, for performance of covenants in a mortgage of even date between the same parties, wherein the said Ann is described as one of the daughters of John Friend, late of Ninfield, carpenter, deceased. Signatures of Ann and Thomas Sheather (husband, dying between the start and conclusion of the agreement, or another son?) and seals. Witnesses:- Nicholas Gilbert the younger, Charles Chane. Creator(s) Budgen, Revd Walter, 1862-1952.

and the family were in the area over 100 years earlier...

Conveyance (bargain and sale) for £260. Date:12 Apr 1636 ESRO reference: AMS 3542 Description: Richard Easton of Bexhill, yeoman, and his mortgagee Henry Sheather otherwise Stace of Battle, yeoman, to John Wenham of Moor Hall in Ninfield, gent, and his son John Wenham

For Marshland called Charnefolde (16a) in Hooe (to the North: lane from Sewers Bridge to Lord Dacre's land; to the E: land of John Threele, gent; to the S: land of Lord Dacre, land called Bakynsmersh; to the W: common watercourse), occupied by Thomas Sheather otherwise Stace.

Proviso that John Wenham the elder is to pay 5s 0d for the poor to the churchwardens of Ninfield. Recites: mortgage for £100 from Richard Easton to Henry Sheather, 9 Oct 1633. Witnesses: George Wenham, John Newington, William Berricke. Endorsed: receipt for 5s 0d; John Yeldinge and Walter May, churchwardens of Ninfield, to JW; Witnesses: John Fuller, George Wenham, Andrew Waters; 4 Jun 1645. nor was that the only link to teaching at that time...

Agreement to appoint Thomas Colbran of Ninfield as schoolmaster in the free charity school of Sedlescombe. Date:1755. ESRO reference: PAR 481/25/1/1 Creator(s) Parish of Sedlescombe.

and who knew of Mrs Packham's involvement in the purchase of "School Field" (which presumably is the Rec?)

Draft conveyance of School Field (4a 1r 35p) in Ninfield, Thomas Allnutt [Brassey] Earl Brassey to Naomi Packham of New House Farm, Ninfield, widow. Date:1918. ESRO reference: SHE 7/3/18 Creator(s) Sheppard and Son, Battle, solicitors.

In 1911 the Packham family from Hellingly were at Ingrams Farm.

Or soft as vernal odours sail

Lift not Ambition's restless cry, Nor heed Hope's mild attractive call; Eager they lift the wretch on high, And then precipitate his fall. And why should Discontent annoy The Village Curate's humble state? Still must his Happiness destroy All idle wishes to be great.

Be good: and calm each day shall glide, Calm shall night's starry curtain fall, Each modest wish shall be supplied, Nor fears, nor doubts, they breast appall.

The April Shower, Rev. John Sharpe Ninfield, Sussex Curate of Ninfield. 1794. On yonder copse the humid bow Imprints its heaven painted dyes; While, at the sun's warm, radiant glow, The rainy cloud retiring flies.

Fresh from the renovating stream
Of Nature's mild, benignant shower,
The fields with gayer verdure gleam,
And brighter blows the woodland flower;

Lost in the transitory rain, Obscure awhile and dim their state; Till comes light's vivid ray again, Again they smile with Joy elate.

Thus when young Love, with frolick wild, Affirm'd his empire in my breast, Glad was my heart when Susan smil'd, Joy's sunny beams their warmth imprest;

But, by caprice the fair one taught with causeless anger often frown'd Then with despair the view was fraught, And Sorrow stalk'd the landscape round.

Reason at length, with friendly ray Dispell'd the misty vapour drear, Brought back the splendour of the day, Bid Nature's loveliest charms appear;

Arrayed each hill in cheerful green, While woods their foliage bright renew; With beauties cloath'd each sylvan scene, And flow'rs on every hillock grew.

Taught my disord'd fancy wild, That Nature's self was still the same; But led astray by Love's blind child, I gave her unappropriate blame

To Passion's arts no longer prone, Convinc'd of Reason's mightier pow'r, Experience'd, let me grateful own That Love is but an April show'r

Still it obscures the op'ning morn Of Manhood and deforms his day; Till Reason, child of Light, be born, And drive the vapour far away.

Lo! ere to-morrow's glass be run, Ere Evening's western shades descend, Perchance thy pilgramage is done, Thy weary way-worn toil shall end.

Pray (so the mighty master said) Nor, if 'tis granted thee, repine; Give me today my daily bread, Heaven's joys tomorrow may be thine";.

All being well, non-essential shops will re-open from Monday 12th April. This being the case, we will have a Book Exchange on Friday 16th April from 10.00 – 11.30am.



NINFIELD MEMORIAL HALL

Well, what a remarkable achievement to have passed with out celebration! On Sunday 28th February we had hoped to invite you all to our birthday party, the Charity Commission formerly confirmed the status of the hall in 1921 making the Committee 100 years old. (Yes and some of us feel that old at times too!) A constitution set out the terms by which the hall should operate and these rules still control the committee today. We may not have been able to celebrate in the way we had hoped but celebrate we did, when, a few days later we received a phone call from someone who lives in the village offering us a substantial amount of money towards the big build!!!! Absolutely amazing, and to say we were surprised and highly delighted is an understatement.

So on behalf of the village we say a huge THANK YOU to our benefactor Now we have to decide the best way to proceed and without being able to meet up the committee is having to have very protracted discussions by email, snail mail, phone or zoom meetings to discuss the various options, we have to make these decisions soon so in next month's edition we will hopefully set out our plans.

For those of you who are new to the village, a little history, the hall itself was built about 1862/3 and over that time has seen many changes, initially built and used as a drill hall till after WW1. The villagers then bought it for £150 to be used for the amusement, recreation, instruction and benefits of the inhabitants and residents of Ninfield, and this it has done for the last 100 years.

Over that time it has seen many changes, the addition of the stage, windows (there were none when first built!), A new roof, toilets, kitchen along with various repairs, re decorations and now its biggest change. Extend the building to accommodate a disabled persons toilet, new ladies and gents toilets and a better equipped kitchen plus lots of storage. It will be so much better, far more user friendly.

We've had the structural engineers report, planning permission has been granted, we are all getting excited at the prospect of being able to actually get this project off the ground thanks to this extremely generous donation, although we might not get it all finished immediately, but that's for another day......

Worms Eye View

Today is the 1st of March and I continue to keep to one of my New Year Resolutions. that is to share my thoughts with you early in the month. Of course the weather takes priority in my thoughts, it has been so nice for the past fortnight, really warm on some days, so warm in fact that one local gentleman bet me it would reach 20 degrees by the end of March. Well I did hear that it had reached 18 degrees so I wait to see if I am about to loose 10p!

Obviously, we on the farm appreciate the ground flying out and just hope that the weather will be kind to our ewes (and every one else) as lambing looms up, mid march for us. Actually we have got some naughty girls (or was it the rams), that lambed very early for us, seven of them actually and they did produce eleven nice lambs who are growing very well and enjoying playing in the field by my kitchen window. They are, plus all the birds on my bird table time wasters but lovely with it.

Recently I watched the BBC Country File programme which bought to notice two birds that I have never seen on my bird table or on the surrounding hedges. The first bird was the Ring-necked Parakeet, a very colourful bird. I had no idea there were so many in the wild in this country. They are very outstanding and would outshine my woodpeckers who are regular visitors. Have you seen these parakeets? Apparently there are quite a few in Hampden Park, Eastbourne, not too far away "as the crow flies".

The other bird I am now going to look out for is the Great Grey Strike, who is another winter visitor to our shores. It is quite a small bird but very smart and is a predator whose diet includes small birds, lizards and frogs. Apparently they keep more to scrubland and marshes so as well as counting the farm animals as I walk around in the mornings, I am now also looking out for this smart bird and its untidy nest.

Meanwhile I welcome sparrows, tits, robins, blackbirds, woodpeckers and pheasants regularly to my bird table, but I am aware of an old superstition which says "if bird droppings fall on you it is a sign of misfortune"; hence I don't sit under it, but view it from a safe distance.

Enough, lets all have a happy Easter and look forward to the pandemic easing even more. ₂₅






