Dear Friends,

I'm writing this well before we have reached Ascension Day – or as someone put it 'the day Jesus started working from home'!

It seems a long time ago since Easter this year, due to the lockdown, but again, it's helped me to appreciate how it was for the first followers of Jesus, filled with uncertainty among signs of hope – for them, meeting the risen Lord Jesus, but still not sure of the future. And for Christians that remains the present reality too.

We're still not sure when church buildings will fully reopen for public worship with no limits for weddings or funerals – and when they do, things will be very different to how they were before. Broadcast services will remain, I think, although perhaps not weekly as it takes a lot of time to put them together. Mind you I have learnt a lot about technology in the past 12 months! It is important that those unwilling or unable to attend church can still be fed spiritually, and while lacking the closeness of fellowship with others, the same Risen, Ascended Jesus will meet with us whether we are in church, or in our homes.

Because that's what the Ascension is all about. Jesus really did start working from home. But unlike us this meant he was no longer limited by what makes us and him human. Before he ascends back to his father in heaven, he gave to his troubled friends several promises. The first was that they would receive another helper, another friend – The Holy Spirit – one who is like Jesus, but whose presence would reassure them as they listened to his voice in prayer and followed his words. Second, he promised eternal hope. I am relieved to say that as I write, our communities have not been overwhelmed by funerals, although our hearts go out to any who have lost loved ones recently. I am particularly mindful of those who have not been able to say their final goodbye's to those they love with the 'proper' funeral!

Jesus promised to prepare a place for us in his Father's house – what an amazing image of eternal life. A place where we will be known and will know both God and our loved ones. This crisis has caused many of us to re-evaluate our lives, and for some this has meant regaining faith and trusting in a loving God, one who is close to us even

when we at the moment have to be separate from others.

Jesus completed his work on earth, returned to his Father, and now, each and every day, gives hope to troubled hearts. We now enter the Sundays after Trinity when we concentrate upon the teachings of Jesus and that teaching reminds us that Jesus is there for you so hang on to that, and remember I am also here for you – practically and spiritually – don't hesitate to call me.

At this time of year, we remember Barnabas, a good man, full of the Holy Spirit and faith, who encouraged people to stay true to you – and others to trust you for the first time.


Lord, we have gone through difficult days. The pandemic has taught us that we are not in control. We don't know what each new day might bring.

NINFIELD SURGERY

As you may have seen in the local press, we are continuing to do only the second Covid-19 vaccinations locally and will in contact with our patients to book these at the local hub. All other vaccinations after this will be done at the larger vaccination sites and can be booked either online or by phoning 119.

The proposed merger with Sea Road and Pebsham Surgeries is still proceeding and we will let our patients know when there is further news.

If any of our patients are in need of medical advice, please contact the surgery on 01424 892569 at either 8am or 2pm Monday to Friday. We will be happy to book you in for a telephone conversation with a GP, who will arrange a time for you to come to the surgery if needed. Our nursing and health care team are here and are available to book as normal. We would still ask patients to not come to the surgery if they are experiencing Covid-19 symptoms and we continue to only have a maximum of 4 patients in the waiting room at any one time.

In reality however, we are continuing to work in class bubbles with staggered start, finish and lunch times. So life is still operating in semi-lockdown mode. But hopefully not for much longer. After all if we are soon going to be able to fly to Spain for our holidays, then surely I will be able to get my cup of tea and piece of cake in a crowded staff room.

The children are coping admirably, there have been a few more tears this term but given what is going on in the outside world that doesn't surprise me. It's Year 6 that I feel sorry for, they are going to miss out on the joys of SATs week, as the tests have been cancelled again this year. "**The Neighbourhood Development Plan** questionnaire generated a good response from residents with 350 people completing their forms. Preliminary analysis shows there was a general consensus against more large estates being built here in Ninfield over the next 20 years. Most people (around 68%) were in favour of individual houses or small developments of up to 10 houses (although around 18% wanted no further development). The biggest housing issue identified was the cost of buying a home here.

People said they wanted Ninfield to remain rural, tranquil, safe and friendly and there was general agreement that our countryside and woodlands should be protected.

Other than housing, people wanted to see more small shops (especially a bakery), small office/commercial units, a community orchard and specific areas for nature conservation.

The analysis will go into more depth over the next few weeks and will add to our evidence base for the NDP. "

HOOE HISTORY SOCIETY (June 2021)

We are continuing to observe Covid restrictions and follow government guidelines, although I am sure there are many of our followers looking forward to the day when we can meet again safely. Unfortunately, there are differing views as to what constitutes “safe” these days, so we will continue to hedge our bets as to when our first meeting will be. Speakers are provisionally arranged for later this year, but subject to confirmation nearer the time.

DID YOU KNOW... in November 1756 a powerful earthquake took place in the Atlantic off the coast of Lisbon, Portugal. It is estimated to have had a magnitude of at least 8.4 and caused widespread destruction from the effects of the earthquake as well as the fires and tsunami that followed. It was estimated that over 30,000 people died in Portugal alone but the effects were felt and seen much further afield – the shocks were felt all over Europe as far as Finland, as well as North Africa and the Caribbean. A three metre (ten foot) tsunami hit the coast of Cornwall so it is reasonable to assume that Hooe also felt the effects of this event quite strongly. John James Newport indicated in a talk that he gave that the disturbance of the sea led to the choking up of its haven, preventing the sea from coming in across the marsh. The Pilbeam family, when excavating on the marsh to create a small waterway, uncovered a number of old, fallen, buried trees all pointing in a similar direction, which indicates that they may have been brought down by a force of nature such as a tsunami.

Which brings me to the main part of my text. A man called Nathanael Torriano who had been a draper, sea clerk and physician before becoming a minister of religion, gave a sermon in both Hooe and Ninfield on Friday 6th February 1756 (a national day of fasting) as curate of both parishes. It was such a powerful sermon that it was published by desire of the parishioners and the original manuscript is now housed in the British Museum. It has been reproduced in book form, the text of which covers 48 pages. It is said that his congregation on that evening must have been more sleepy than usual, for at one point he said: "Do not prostitute this house of prayer by changing it into a dormitory." But it was hardly surprising given the length of his sermon!

Torriano was certainly a man of great vision and knowledge. He told his congregation of the devastation that had taken place – “... a most terrible earthquake, that destroyed many Cities and People, and extended very far, great and terrible Lightnings went before it, then great and unusual Storms of Wind; then a great and sudden Noise, as if a mighty rushing Wind, the Sea wrought, the Waves swelled, the Billows roared, the Earth shook, Buildings trembled, some burst asunder and others were first lifted up and then fell down and horrible Noise was heard.... Thus tremendous is this Display of God’s almighty Power...“. It was a powerful description of the events that had taken place and caused such destruction and death in that far away land.

He compared an earthquake with other devastating events such as war, rough seas, fire, famine and disease, pointing out that its effects had far greater impact than any of them. It could demolish fortifications and safe havens for ships, people could escape a house fire, but an earthquake would “follow them into the fields and streets”. It would destroy houses and people in a way that no plague has ever done and it does not recognise the difference between rich and poor – it treats them all the same, “...sweeping all away in a moment”.



He then went on to suggest that this kind of event could happen anywhere - that God had chosen Lisbon this time, but it could so easily have been our community, not them, who had felt the mighty shock. If the less severe effects of the earthquake were indeed seen here it would certainly have substantiated the message of his sermon, as the text did briefly refer to events that had happened locally – “... can we hear the Water rumbling as if it were with Fear, and the Rains almost deluging our levels, thereby threatening your

Beasts with Death and yourselves, with Famine...”

Nathanael Torriano painted a picture of desolation and despair hundreds of miles away that could just have easily have taken place here. He urged his congregation not only to turn to God and repent, but also to contribute generously to the charitable donations that were already being made across the country. His would have been a large congregation, far bigger than we see today, and he was clearly an imposing speaker. It surely had a great effect on these people at the time because they asked for it to be published and today it remains a text of great spiritual importance... and its roots were here, in the parishes of Hooe and Ninfield.

The cupboards and loft have been emptied of the items stored there, some in the loft appear to have been there since the WW2! There was scenery and props from when NATs regularly put on shows and an assortment of chairs and other items, some of which have gone to auction. The sheds have been moved and the preparation work for Our Big Build has started!

You will have seen the thermometer at the hall entrance, this shows the total build cost to be £250,000, with £50,000 needed for the internal works. The plea for donations through Crowdfunder and from locals sending in their cheques has so far raised £6,500.00 as of 17th May when we went to print.



The next meeting of the Parish Council will be on Monday 21st June at 7.00pm when we will be meeting in the hall for the first time for over a year. Of course this is subject to no change in the Covid regulations. We look forward to seeing you all again in person.

Consultation – Proposed new village hall

The Council has not been idle this past year. Much work has been carried out fine tuning plans for the new village hall. After discussions with residents, hearing their views and ideas, hours of work debating the subject the Council has arrived at a plan which, we believe, will serve the parish well for year to come. However, a planning application will not be submitted to Wealden until everyone in the village has had the opportunity to see what is proposed and to make final comments.

Very soon each household will be receiving a leaflet reminding us all how to view the plans. At present this is the timetable:

- On **Monday 21st June** at the parish council meeting we will agree the plans ready to go out to consultation.
- As soon as possible following the meeting, plans will be on view on the village notice board and posted on the front window of the hall
- **Consultation Day:** On **Saturday 26th June** the hall will be open from 10.00am – 4.00pm. Plans will be on display and councillors will be on hand to meet up with residents
- The Council will spend the period from 21st June – 12th July receiving, discussing and taking into consideration the comments submitted during the consultation period, and making amendments.
- On **Monday 12th July** at the parish council meeting the final completed plan will be approved and the decision will be taken to submit a planning application to Wealden District Council
- Immediately following the 12th July meeting the planning application will be submitted

This is just the first stage! Once planning approval is received our attention will turn to detail, engaging an architect, preparing tenders etc. We will also be able to step up a gear with our fund raising efforts. The Village Fund Raising/Community Team has done a great job thus far, but once the hall has the benefit of a planning approval it will be possible to apply for a variety of grants to help us along.

A small number of people in the village have achieved a huge amount to get to this point. Whilst I won't name them to thank them individually there is one person who we would like to thank publicly. Peter Cosham, assisted by his wife Jenny, has interpreted our thoughts and ideas and spent hours of his time, free of charge, producing the plans that we are about to share. Without Peter this task would have been so much more difficult. Huge thanks to Peter from us all.

Community Allotment

As you know the Parish Council has allocated one of their allotments as a Community Allotment and this is proving to be very popular. Not only is the plot productive it is becoming a great venue to meet with friends and swap gardening stories. The allotment is for anyone and everyone who live in the parish, there will be a warm welcome to one and all. If

you would like to get involved, learn more, or interested to see what is happening on the Community Allotment just pop along to look or you could call Cllr Gary Durman 893007 who has taken on the responsibilities of allotments for the Parish Council.

Carol and Tracy, who are regulars, have asked that we thank Jeremy Trinder, Cherry Tree Cottage, Hooe, publicly for his generosity and kindness. Jeremy has donated a vast selection of garden tools and equipment to the Community. His thoughtfulness has helped get, and keep the project going – the lack of tools is not a barrier to get involved. So – hearty and grateful thanks Jeremy.

Speeding Traffic and related problems

Worms Eye View

At long last some rain has fallen. It's early May as I write this and it was a pleasure to get wet as I did looking this morning. I do not say this very often, but it was really appreciated today.

Life has been rather strange this year and I do not mean due to the pandemic. It has been late to hear the first Cuckoo and then to see the Swallows, it just shows that one cannot take life for granted.

In June we can look forward to Midsummer Eve and celebrate in two very different ways. The first being, that it is a likely time for ghosts to appear. To be more exact if you happen to be near to an old oak tree just before midnight ghosts will come up from it roots and joining hands will dance around the tree until the cock crows, when the ghosts will disappear down to the trees roots again. Perhaps you will see them as you pass the tree after celebrating Midsummer Eve.

Another way to celebrate and was practiced by young girls many years ago, was to make a Midsummer Man. These were two pieces of Opine (an herbaceous purple flowered plant) known to young girls as Livelong-Love Long, pushed into empty cotton reels which were then taken to bed. One reel was given the name of the young man who was liked and the other the young ladies name. In the morning if the reels had fallen towards each other, all was good, but if they had fallen in opposite directions, then the love would not last! This sounds mad, but I am remembering this for the 1930's, when there was no television, mobile phone or computer games, just paper books and an occasional trip to the cinema in Hailsham, which they would open up on a Saturday morning for us local children. One film I remember well, it made me cry, was Tom Browns School Days.

I will finish on a happier note, which is to remind you that on Sussex Day June 16th. You should make a Sussex Pond Pudding. This consists of 6oz of suet, 6oz raisins, and 6oz of flour and ¼ pint of milk. Mix together then bake in a tin 8ins long, 6ins wide and 6ins deep. Bake for 1 hour. Very tasty.

And just to remind you, 'A swarm of bees in June is worth a silver spoon'

They put the Ark on a new cart and set off down the hill.




The oxen stumbled, and Uzzah thought the Ark might fall off the cart.

David realised that they had not treated God's Ark with respect.




He talked to the Levites, the tribe that God had chosen to be His priests.
