Dear Friends,

As I write to you this month the days are gradually getting longer bringing, I hope, signs of brighter times ahead. It means also that we are now well into the season of Lent where we reflect on Jesus' time in the wilderness and our own journey there of change and transformation. Jesus in his teaching uses the image of a seed to help us understand that journey of change and transformation, and it seems rather apt as the bulbs continue to emerge around us.

Seeds Need a Rich Environment to grow otherwise they sprout, but quickly die.

Seeds require a rich, healthy environment in which to grow, and this applies to the environment in which we grow too. We need comfort and security, challenge and inspiration, learning and service otherwise our growth is reduced or worse halted. We can create an environment for our spiritual growth in Lent through prayer, study, worship, fellowship, and service.

Seeds Can't Be Rushed. Seeds require the amount of time to grow that they need. In God's plan, the time things take is the right time. We, however, get impatient. There is pressure on us to rush through everything. We live in an 'instant' age. Seeds teach us that we need to learn to wait, to develop patience and that Lent is a process of seed-like growth. Patience in the Lenten wilderness is the key factor.

All Seeds Grow at Different Rates. Plant a packet of seeds, and some sprout immediately and grow steadily. Late sprouters can often become early bloomers.

Growth is rarely even, and nothing we do will change this. Where seeds are concerned, we are comfortable with different rates of development. The seed teaches us that to grow in faith in different ways at different times is the only true normal.

Change Happens in Stages. A plant grows through distinct stages which measure its well-being at any given time. Our spiritual development progresses through stages as well. Belief and inquiry deepen to devotion and discipleship.

Learning and following can evolve into teaching and leading. Growth within the community of faith matures to a life of service in the world. We will walk through the wilderness moving through stages of faith development as we grow from seed to sapling to fruit-bearing tree.

Seeds Contain the Past and the Future. Each seed is the result of previous generations and contains within it all the genetic code for the future. Seeds are filled with the information that yields transformation. Each generation builds upon the last and lays the foundation for the next generation. The

Word of God is the information we contain that holds the power to transform us. Lent is a time when we can give ourselves space for this to happen.

Seeds Have a Purpose Greater Than Themselves. Growth is not the purpose of a seed, but a means to an end. Unless seeds give rise to new seeds, they fail to fulfil their purpose. Transformation never happens for its own sake. Change happens to lead us to a new place. Growth occurs that we might not only know more, but that we might do more. Seeds are judged on the fruit that they bear.

We should never content ourselves with growing in our knowledge and love of God. Growth that fails to lead to a change in behaviour is not healthy. We grow for a reason, and that reason is something much larger than any individual's needs.

So enjoy your Lenten journey this year - and remember the seed - so that you can arrive at Easter Day changed and transformed through an encounter with God.

News from St Mary's

It has been a very traumatic period for St Marys. When we arrived for the Christmas Day service there was no heat. On checking it transpired that the Watchman device which tells us how much oil we have in the tank had failed and the tank was empty. We ordered some oil but at this time of the year demand was so great that this didn't arrive until 14th January. We obtained some electric heaters to give some warmth and went ahead with the service on 1st January.

But as is usual disaster follows disaster and just as we were finishing the service the power failed.

The power was alright in the vestry but the link to the main body of the church had gone. My friendly electrician Derek had a look at it and it transpired that fuse had gone. Unfortunately, because the system is very old, Derek had great difficulty in getting a replacement, eventually finding one in a small DIY shop. He got the electrics going but we then had to wait for the heating engineer to come to bleed the system to get the heating going again. I am pleased to report that the engineer came on 2 nd February, got the heating going and also mended the two radiators that weren't working efficiently. So we are now fully functional again and hope very much that nothing further goes wrong.

These setbacks have delayed the organ repairs which should now take place in the next week or so.

News from St Oswald's

The following items were either discussed or reported on at the recent PCC meeting:

Bells The plaque commemorating the legacy has been ordered, is now finished and awaits collection from London.

A large iron cauldron from the churchyard has been donated to the Hooe Parish Council as a planter with the request/suggestion that it be placed somewhere at the church end of the village - for example on the grass triangle at the top of Church Lane.

Reverend Paul and Eileen Frostick are celebrating their Golden Wedding with renewal of vows at a Joint Service with Ninfield in St. Oswald's on Sunday 23rd July 2023.

A resume of monthly expenditure by and for the church has been placed in each pew to give people the opportunity to donate if they wish. The list has been printed on the back of existing cards showing a line drawing of St. Oswald's.

It was decided to work towards producing paddles" listing a few historical facts about the architecture and artefacts in the church for visitors. This is an ongoing project.

The repairs to the exterior stonework on south and west sides of the church are now complete following delays in the autumn due to wet weather holding up work of stonemason. The work was commissioned and overseen by Inspecting Architect, James Ford and carried out by Parker and Sons. Faculties from the Diocese of Chichester are being submitted for (1) Improved lighting in the church and (2) Toilet/tea station extension through north wall (this will also require Planning Permission from Wealden)

The church congregation are aiming to collect 40 items for the Bexhill Foodbank during the 40 days of Lent. All contributions of tinned or dried food are more than welcome and can be left in the church in the white wire basket. The church is open everyday.

It was decided that there was not enough man/woman power to offer the pancake lunch on Shrove Tuesday this year due to sickness and holidays.

NINFIELD VILLAGE SOCIETY

Recent extreme rainfall has made our visits to Church Wood very challenging with trickling streams turned into torrents and previous footpaths becoming streams ! Church Pond was spilling over because the weir had been blocked by leaves and twigs carried on the storm, but fortunately the overflow channel created previously kept over- topping to a minimum. Some footpaths have been badly eroded, including the footpath leading from Church Path to the Wood exposing the hardcore installed several years ago. It is apparent that the paths we were able to cover with road planings have survived the best and so our Society would like to enquire whether anyone knows of excess road planings or small graded hardcore which could be donated to enable us to repair the paths and, to an extent, future proof the the Wood ?

In the meantime, our main thrust when rainfall has permitted has been an audit of the fence surrounding the wood and repairs as needed. We have replaced 25 to 30 chestnut palings with some purchased and some recycled from fallen trees. This work is our immediate priority but if there is a possibility of some hardcore then please let us know and we shall collect if required. HOOE HISTORY SOCIETY

Our meeting this month will feature Evan Jones giving a talk on the Natural History of Pevensey Levels. This area of outstanding natural beauty has played an integral part of life in Hooe and Ninfield since the days of the Norman invasion and beyond. Initially a tidal inlet, it has a wide variety of wildlife that may be the equal of anywhere in Britain and I look forward to hearing more about it from Evan. We meet on Thursday 16th March at 7.30 p.m. in St Oswald's Church. Refreshments will be available, as usual, after the talk.

DID YOU KNOW... At our January meeting the speaker, Jonathon Austin, briefly spoke about Sussex brickyards and suggested a book to me – Brickmaking in Sussex by M. Beswick – as I knew there had been one in Hooe. The book contains a wealth of information, some of which forms the following text.

It actually records four sites in Hooe although one of them may be outside the parish boundary. This was a brick kiln shown on the Eastern side of the present day Whydown Road which was shown on a map of 1757 and listed as Upper Kiln Field in the Tithe award of 1839. Map reference TQ 701 104.

The second is listed as North of the Ninfield Road at Hooe Common and is on the site of what used to be Brickyard Farm. It was possibly in operation in 1757 when a kiln was marked in the corner of what was then Lime Kiln Field. A brick kiln was included in the lease of 1815 and the name had changed to Brick Kiln Field in 1839. The brickworks was shown on the map of 1873 but it was disused by 1899. William Rich was the tenant in 1839, Levi Lemmon (of Ninfield) advertised as a brick and tile maker here from 1855 to 1862. Jesse Message was a brickmaker here in 1871 (census) followed by Jesse Honeysett in 1881. The 1891 census records William Catt as a brick maker's labourer living near the Common and the Cornford family living at Brickyard, The Common. John James Newport made reference to this site with sketches and a write up in his book Records of Hooe in the 1930's. It was probably the most significant brick yard in the village. Map reference TQ 694 108.

Our third is listed as brickyard on Kiln Lane although it is the field opposite Kiln Lane at its junction with Green Lane. John Blackman advertised for a tile maker in 1792. He and S. Blackman were tenants of land which included Kiln Field in 1839 and a brick maker called Joseph Foster was living in "Late Blackmans" in the 1851 census. It is not clear when brick making ceased here, but there is no further mention of brick or tile makers in this area in subsequent census reports. Map reference TQ 679 090.

The fourth and last brick kiln to be identified is described as North-West of Holmes Farm. There is little detail other than it was marked on a map of 1810 as Brick Kiln Field and there is also a Marl Pit Field close by. It may have been part of Holmes Farm or possibly that of its neighbour, Longdown Farm. Map reference TQ 699 099.

My view on these brick and tile making yards is that they probably existed to serve the local community rather than exporting the product further afield. It is not clear what quantity and quality of clay was available at each of these sites. Certainly, there are no substantial quarry works at any of them and as the local demand waned and presumably the larger Bexhill site went into production, these local initiatives became obsolete. 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
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NINFIELD FLOWER GROUP

Doesn't time fly?

An enthusiastic but small group of Hooe Residents has been organising community events since 2018! Our very first coffee morning, held in February 2018, was so well received we have continued ever since – apart from the period of lockdown.

Over the years our enthusiasm hasn't waned. Our involvement has grown, our energy increased, as has the amount of money we have raised for charity. Our initial aim was to support the scheme for a proposed, much needed replacement Hooe village hall. As charities offering grants almost always expect the amount of their grant to be 'matched' by the applicants own funds our aim was to create a sizeable pot of money which would increase the chances of attracting significant grants, thus providing a great new community centre for the village without significant cost to residents. We thought this a very simple but highly effective way of providing a hall for everyone to enjoy.

Things do not stay the same

Unfortunately, in early 2022 certain events meant that our original plans were no longer viable. In February 2022 as the situation had changed, we needed to reconsider how any funds raised would be allocated. We agreed that proceeds should be donated to general good causes, but particularly those which would enhance the lives of Hooe residents, encourage further community involvement and, as requested by some residents, respond to urgent national and international appeals.

Thus Hooe Village Community Group was formed, registered, insured, bank account opened and we were ready to go!

This first year has been busy. Not only have we continued with our coffee mornings, with our ever popular Community Library and jigsaw exchange, we also ran a very successful Open Gardens weekend and provided the refreshments for the Hooe Motor Show and a huge Bric a Brac stall in August and a Village Lottery. Our annual litter pick held in the Spring, when we were assisted by 20 plus volunteers was successful resulting in 24 sacks of rubbish collected from the parish. We were also delighted to be able to help at St Oswald's Church Garden Party in July.

Here is a brief outline of our finances during our first year. More details on request.

NINFIELD FLOWER GROUP

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THAT DARN FOX

I once watched a well known TV presenter, usually championing environmental matters, talking passionately on preserving foxes. He did this whilst stationed on his lawn. There was no evidence of any vegetable food production or animal husbandry. In his case then foxes were not a problem.

This is not usually the case for folks who produce free range poultry! I couldn't count the number of fox attacks that have been told to me. So there is a rift between two groups of people, the fox protectors are in the vast majority; the other group, the minority, are where you get your free range eggs from. That also goes for free range chicken, turkey etc. So what to Make of this.

I am of mixed opinion, which may seem odd for a chap who spent so much of his time in and around game keeping. This is only my point of view, there are many others just as valid.

It is incredibly hard to keep foxes away from chickens, or other fowl, if you allow them free range. When I built release pens in the woods for the introduction of pheasant poults, the wire was eight feet high and at its base was a single strand of electric fence wire. The bottom of the wire was dug in the ground and folded out. This was a massive task as the pens could be over one acre in size. Way beyond a good financial decision for small scale egg production. The problem being the foxes strike during day light hours. Shutting your birds in at night solves a fox strike at night, and if your poultry shed is not fox proof, you built it wrong. I also have an opinion on why foxes nowadays attack during daylight, now there is a thing.

When I was a boy I spent any hour not at school on the local farms, and I never saw a fox. They were nocturnal which is why so many farms had chickens scratching around unmolested. Is there anyone now who has never seen a fox, I doubt there are many. The difference, I believe, is that foxes now have learnt to live and prosper in an urban environment. Here they are used to man's ways and have to a great extent lost their fear. They only really effect the folk that either keep a few chickens or pet rabbits. So why would the town dweller not want foxes protected, they watch and feed them.

With over five thousand game bird running around I had to control the fox numbers. But the number I killed could be divided in two, those I hunted and those I put down because they were victims of cars and had crawled to the woods.

So what prompted this story, well I have seen here a fox with its back legs broken, I suspect a car for this and the other week two foxes were watching the sheep next to the Church. For the wounded fox I wish I still had my guns because its end was going to be grim and for the two foxes by the Church I'm glad I no longer have any guns. I am a defensive player and now I have

nothing to defend, so I enjoy watching a proper country fox as much as anybody else.

It does not really matter if you eat meat or not. The above environmentalist also wants wood pigeons, crows and magpies protected. I can not envisage growing peas or vegetables without shooting pigeons. Small scale you can cover your crop, on my old shoot the farmer grow a massive acreage on contract to the pea growing club. We are not talking of the odd pigeon pecking away, their numbers are counted in Lincolnshire by the thousand. We now live in a time where you can say what you believe and not have to consider how it will compromise other people and stifle any dissenting voices.

We are pleased to say that after the January break the market was back in full swing in February, so if you are in need of meat, veg, eggs, cake break, preserves or that little birthday or thank you gift, pop along and, say hello, enjoy a cuppa with a toasted sandwich, bacon roll or slice of cake and enjoy a little retail therapy!

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Until that dreadful time, slow down your dog's life to match his needs. Walk slowly beside him and talk to him to encourage him still play ball, even just rolling it along the ground, he still needs some fun, don't make him sit or stand for long, as it may be painful, he may need the vet's help. Avoid hot pavements as they can burn a dog's pads.

He will also need more rest and should have a choice of beds and rugs so he can curl up or stretch out. Dogs often like to lie with a raised head such as on a chair arm or cushion. Ensure any children understand that they need to be gentle with him and allow him peace and quiet. Older dogs can become less tolerant especially if arthritic.

He needs to keep mobile but don't overdo this. Even a short walk will stimulate him and show him he is still important. He will need a coat for wet days and don't let him lie on wet grass.

Keep treats in check, putting on weight will only add to his problems. It is usually best to give three or four smaller meals rather than just the normal two. You could ask your vet about adding Fish Oil to a meal as this can help joints and skin conditions.

Lastly always 'pick up' after him. So many dogs are mistreated – we do not want ours to get a bad name.

Hooe & Ninfield Open Group

We met last Friday 10th February in the Methodist Hall and were treated to a very interesting talk about the history of weaving. Ann Wells and her husband Bob arrived dressed in authentic medieval costumes all made in the traditional way by Ann herself. She brought along two spinning wheels, one very old one and one of the more traditional style we would have seen before. She talked us through the process of turning the sheep's fleece into thread that could be used for weaving, showing us all the required equipment. She even had samples of wool, flax and another type of very soft wool which we had to try and guess where it came from. Nobody guessed which wasn't surprising as it was made from nettles. Incredible but you apparently need a field full of nettles to make a very small amount. Bob explained the different parts of his costume and the different fabrics needed. He also brought some ancient wooden games but as we ran out of time, he promised to come back again to show us how to play them.

Our next meeting is on 10th March at 2.00p.m in the Methodist Hall.

Part 3 - RICHARD KING SAMPSON

And it's due to the Ninfield Guardian Board member that we switched from being linked as part of the Hastings Rape, Battle Rural District Council and ultimately Rother. That Guardian Governor was no less a personage than Richard King Sampson. The family appear to have links to one Richard Sampson in Henry VIII's court, (Bishop of Coventry and Lichfield) Born: about 1470 Died: 25 Sep 1554, at Eccleshall, Staffordshire. He had been Bishop of Chichester and subsequently of Coventry and Lichfield. A Richard Sampson was a distiller in Pevensey in 1683, and his mother, Elizabeth from Bexhill, died in 1671. When he died in 1715, he left distiller's shops

at Ninfield and Pevensey, farms and lands at Bexhill, Herstmonceux, and Crowhurst. No doubt the family clung to this prestige, ensuring the Sampson name did not die out with a lack of male direct descendants.

Copy surrender and admission Date: 12 May 1779 ESRO reference: SAM 105

Description: Manor of Crowhurst (a) Thomas Colgate (b) Richard Sampson of Ninfield, gent. Premises as in SAM/104. Admission of (b) on the surrender of (a). Lord John Pelham, Esq. Steward: Joseph Acton, gent Creator(s) Sampson family of Ninfield.

According to the Land Tax assessment for Ninfield (QDE/2/1/E1), Richard was succeeded in 1779 by John Tilden, later called John Tilden Sampson. There was a convention that, if there were no direct male heirs property would be left to other relatives, and if the "family" name had been lost by female marriage, often a clause would be inserted in a Will that inheritance was conditional on adopting the paternal surname. John Tilden's mother therefore was likely to be related to Richard Sampson, and had married a Mr Tilden. John therefore adopted his paternal surname as well as that of his father. John Tilden of Battle, gent., occurs in a deed of 1793 (SAM/63, 64), and Leonora Tilden Sampson of Battle, widow, in one of 1815 (SAM/65, 66).

On his death without issue he was succeeded by his kinsman and godson Richard King, a farmer of Alfriston, then of Willingdon. By 1816 this Richard had been succeeded by his first son, Richard King Sampson, who was living at Hailsham in 1841 (SAM/5). Richard King Sampson is recorded as curate in Hooe from about 1831 until at least mid 1840. He would therefore have known those receiving Poor Relief in Hooe, Ninfield and surrounds. Since at least 1779, the Sampson clan had links with the Pelham family of Crowhurst and had acquired a vast amount of property and land throughout East Sussex. The Pelham family were also the Dukes of Newcastle and also provided 2 Prime Ministers and a cousin, Thomas Pelham, was created Earl of Chichester. The Duke of Newcastle was one of the Trustees of a Turnpike from Broyle Place, near the family seat in Laughton, to Battle, and our Richard King Sampson was also a trustee of that Turnpike, now the A271 and A269, with a Paygate Cottage opposite the Kings Arms here in Ninfield.

So that's how Ninfield (and Hooe) split away from the historical links to Battle and Hastings and began its connection with the Hailsham Poor Law Union, then Hailsham District Council and ultimately in 1974 the creation of Wealden District Council. It was the passing of the Poor Law Union Act in 1834 that changed everything! (To be continued) KR

The Devil came to test him.


