Rector's Reflections on the Euro final and the "Freedom Day".

It is almost the end of July. What a month we have had; from the European Championship Final in Football to the weather on Wednesday, where we had hail, rain, and sun all in a matter of a few minutes. We like to be in control of things that we are involved in, and we feel safer when we have got plans for the future. But then we are always reminded of the truth that we never are in full control of things, and we cannot predict what is around the corner.

God knows this. He understands this. So, when he was looking for a way to get his message to us that he loves us more than we can ever imagine, that we are his children and he is our Father, he decided to come down to this earth as one of us and build relationships with us. He could have produced a manual or plan for our salvation, a checklist, or to-do list that we should follow and that would have been the most perfect plan that ever existed. But that was not the way of God. His way was simply to walk with us as a fellow human being, going through the same frustrations, pains, and challenges of our lives. This ultimately cost his very life when he was nailed on that cross. God knew all this and yet it was the way he chose so we could know who he is, who we are, and how much he loves us, and how precious we are to him no matter what others might say about us.

I think there have been a lot of mixed emotions in the last few weeks. The excitement of the Euro final and the bitterness afterwards. The expectation and hype for the so called, "Freedom Day" and the confusion and frustration that followed. Things didn't go as planned, or as we hoped. And yet we found something much more important than a plan or even a success.

I was very struck by all the encouraging messages for those young footballers who were abused online after the Euro final. Every time I pass the church, I am stunned and humbled by the ribbons of prayers that are tied to the churchyard railings. Hundreds and hundreds of ribbons are tied to the railings of our churchyard. Each of them represents a prayer of a person: a mum, a dad, a grandparent, a child, a son, a daughter, or a family. It has been five weeks since we introduced this Ribbons of Prayer project, thanks to Susie's fantastic idea. We now have 840 ribbons tied to the railings and we think it will easily reach beyond 1,000 when we conclude this project on the seventh week.

I remember the day when Susie and I together put the posters up for this project and tied the ribbons to the railings. We started with just two ribbons. I wonder if this was what the disciples experienced when a boy came up with just 2 fishes and 5 loaves of bread and they had thousands of people who were hungry. They brought them to Jesus to bless. then they started sharing them with each other in thankfulness and in faith until they realized that everyone was satisfied and there was some more left.

Friends, we may never have full control of outcomes. Plans may disappoint us. But if we could still remain faithful and thankful, if we could still share what we have got with each other in kindness and love, then we will gain something that is imperishable, and more precious than anything success, or a victory, can ever bring. There are many teams that have won the Euro title. We don't actually remember all of them, or how many times they have won. But the way people of this country encouraged and blessed their young men when they were down will be remembered for a very long time, with its strong and profound message for the generations to come that we chose to love and care for each other, regardless of the outcome of our plan. Our small actions of kindness and faith do matter. Those actions may seem small, and may have an effect on only one person, but to God, that means the world. Because he was more than willing to give up his life for that one person, for you and for me.

Draft of plan for moving forward after 19 July

As announced last Sunday, we have drafted a plan for us to move forward following the PM's announcement regarding the relaxations of the social distancing measures. Leading up to the discussion for this plan with the leaders of the church, I had informal conversations with various members of the community, not just the church. I quickly realised that it is a matter where so many different views coexist from one end of the spectrum to the other. Some were very keen on moving as fast as we can, and some were very cautious. We have prayed and reflected very hard and tried to discern together how God wants us to act in these uncertain times. There was no easy solution. But one thing became very clear to us, which is, that more important than the speed or the pace that we will be moving at, is that we want to move together. If we could stay united, looking out for each other, supporting, and praying for each other, that will be the true witness to the mission of Christ for this world.

There is no doubt that we will overcome this virus. The question is, who will we have become

through this crisis? We want to be more prayerful, more trusting, more faithful, and more united when this is all over. When we look back over this time, we hope that we can say, we may not have got everything right because things were so uncertain, but at least we kept supporting each other and loving each other. Wouldn't that be one of the greatest stories that we could ever pass on to our next generation? So, this draft plan is developed bearing in mind that we want to move forward together. For some, this will mean that it may not feel like we are moving fast enough or slow enough. This will also mean that we will need to be flexible as the situation will continue to change. So, we will continue to review this plan with you. Because at the end of the day, the plan is here to help us to make our church more welcoming and more missional in these challenging times.

Context Government Advice & Church of England Guidance

We note the Health Secretary's statement in the House of Commons this afternoon and the Prime Minister's press conference this evening confirming plans to move towards the next stage of the Government's roadmap on July 19 while urging caution in response to rising cases of Covid-19 propelled by the Delta variant.

Stepped removal of actions

Stage 1 (from 1 Aug up to 4 weeks)* depending on the situation

- 1. If there was less than 24 hours gap then sanitising to be practiced.
- 2. Limit of numbers increased to 60
- 3. Congregation singing permitted with masks
- 4. Weekly Choir Practice to be reintroduced
- 5. Choir number increased to 10

- 6. Temperature no longer checked on entry
- 7. Masks still advised to be worn.

Stage 2 (from 29th August)

- 8. Limit of numbers increased to 75
- 9. Enhanced ventilation still to be practiced
- 10. Booking no longer required*
- 11. Sanitising still to be practiced
- 12. Monthly weekday service may resume
- 13. Quiet congregation singing permitted without masks
- 14. Social distancing of 1 metre* (marks on the pews to be introduced)
- 15. No restriction on choir numbers*
- 16. Tower room to be offered for pre-school children and parents
- 17. Choir vestry to be offered for Junior Church

18. One way system to be removed (but the orderly manner of entry and exit to be maintained)

Stage 3 (to be reviewed mid- September)

- 19. No restrictions on congregational numbers
- 20. Celebration at high altar
- 21. No limit to congregation numbers
- 22. Reintroduce servers
- 23. Family services reintroduced
- 24. Weekly weekday services reintroduced
- 25. Congregation singing encouraged without masks *
- 26. Choir in vestry robe and procession
- 27. Congregation can socialise in church & coffee served

Stage 4

- 28. Cup reintroduced at communion for those who wish to receive*
- 29. Administers of the Sacrament reintroduced
- 30. Congregation to be assured to share peace with physical contact if they wish
- *as permitted by Government regulations

News from Food bank

The food bank run jointly by St Alban's Church and Broadmead Community Church has continued throughout the Covid pandemic. Obviously, the procedures had to change in line with restrictions and it has only been possible to see those attending in the car park instead of in the church.

We hope to be able to resume the 'drop-in' in the next few weeks and be able to invite everyone into the church for the usual coffee and chat mornings. The number of people attending does vary but in recent weeks we have been supplying food and toiletry packages for around 40 people each week. This is only possible due to the very generous donations received, not least from members of the congregation at Abington.

Many people bring their donations to our house but if it is more convenient there is a box in the Sidesman's Corner in the Church, labelled for donations. This box is emptied regularly. The last 18 months have been very difficult for very many people. We have certainly seen an increase in the numbers attending the food bank and we assume this will continue for some time to come.

Please continue to pray for all who find it necessary to attend food banks and thank you all for your constant support and donations.

New Upgrade with AV/Streaming System

The new system is great but not without issues, partly because we are still learning how to operate the new system. I am aware of some of the issues, such as: the sound for the online congregation is too quiet; the gap between the sound and image; the echo; and the size of the font for the screens in the chancel. I will look into these issues with our team. I think most of them can be solved by ourselves, but it will just take some time as the system is very different from what we are used to. We will need to do several trial runs, checking each issue stage by stage. I am assured that Hilltop Audio who installed the system will be able to help us if we need professional help.
