From Mardi Gras to Mothering Sunday

March this year sees the beginning of Lent on the 5th with Ash Wednesday. It is preceded by Shrove Tuesday. The word 'Shrove' comes from the old English verb 'to shrive' which means to obtain absolution of sins by confession and penance. This was the practice before the start of Lent, hence the name 'Shrove Tuesday which precedes Ash Wednesday. In some parts of the world it is known as Mardi Gras (Fat Tuesday) and is a time for carnivals and celebrations before the austerities of Lent. The British equivalent term is more muted as 'Pancake Day' when we cook and toss delicious pancakes before eating them! We shall of course have a pancake party as usual in the Vicarage.

Thereafter, it's into what are supposed to be the rigours of Lent, fasting prayer and penitence. However, whether that would be good for us or not, these days Lent is much like any other time of year. Nevertheless, it would be a great pity to lose the opportunity to be reflective during the run up to Easter, after all the biblical narrative leads us inexorably towards the passion and trial of Jesus and eventually onto Easter and the resurrection. That is why it is customary in churches typically to have Lent course of one kind or another.

Over the years we've 'done' Lent in pretty well every way possible, guest speakers, Archbishop's Courses, study groups and so on. This year we've decided that it is what Lent leads up to that is important and we have invited a varied series of speakers to preach at the 10am parish Communion about what Easter means to them. After the service and over coffee the speaker will be available for a question and answer session in the same way that the 'On Message' Group meets every second Sunday of the month. Details of this year's programme are in this edition of the March Magazine and online on our website.

It is important for us to take Lent seriously. Nevertheless, it's not all introspective; after all there's the great folk festival of mid-lent which we know as Mothering Sunday on the 30^{th} March and Easter day itself is on Sunday 20^{th} April, which is the great celebration is the Church's calendar.

On Tuesday 11th February the Vicar went to the Muslim College for London in Creffield Road. He gave a lecture on the Church of England and Anglicanism to a group of M.A. students as part of their work on learning about other faiths.

Growing concern for Christians in Nigeria

A church leader in Nigeria has decried the "systematic slaughtering" of Christians in Northern Nigeria, comparing it to the Rwandan genocide. Archbishop Magnus Atilade said it had become imperative to call the world's attention to the growing threat to the life and property of the country's Christians. Speaking as both president of the Christian Welfare Initiative (CWI) and chairman of the Christian Association of Nigeria (CAN), South-West zone, the Archbishop said: "The brutality, cruelty and inhuman manner in which Nigerian Christians are being systematically and consistently slaughtered by individuals claiming to be adherents of the Islamic faith has reached an alarming proportion that we are compelled to speak out." In the last month, dozens of Christians have been killed in attacks by Muslims in Northern and Middle Belt Nigeria. On 6 January, at least 30 were murdered by suspected Muslim Fulani herdsmen in Shonong village, Plateau State. Hundreds of attackers armed with guns and machetes stormed the village, killing mostly children, women and the elderly. They also torched more than 40 homes, and slaughtered a large number of domestic animals. Survivors of the attack told Morning Star News that soldiers stationed in the village to protect residents joined in the shooting as Christians ran for their lives.

Crisis in Syria

This month sees the 3rd anniversary of the start of the crisis in Syria. The recent international peace conference in Geneva marked the first direct talks between both sides in the conflict. UN Secretary-General, Ban Ki-moon, had said it would be "unforgivable not to seize this opportunity" to end a conflict that has left more than 100,000 people dead and driven 9.5 million from their homes. Christian Aid urges: 'A broader engagement that goes beyond the main political actors to include local people committed to non-violence including women, faith leaders, and representatives of refugees and internally displaced populations will be an essential part of creating a lasting peace. Our experience of working in conflict situations informs our view that peace building is a process that includes critical steps, including building trust between communities, providing protection for minorities, establishing transitional justice mechanisms and rule of law as well as disarming paramilitary groups.

Closing the climate gap

Many concerns are being sounded about the warming of the global climate system, which poses an urgent threat to society. Experts say that there is a wide gap between countries' pledges to cut emissions and the reductions needed to limit warming to between 1.5 and 2.0 degrees C, but who has the power to close that gap?

This is a spiritual challenge. How do we live in ways that protect the environment on which we depend? Major developing nations like Brazil, China and India point to historical emissions by industrialised countries, saying that these should bear the brunt of emission cuts and of financial provision for poorer nations. The European Union and USA want all countries to make commitments.

At a recent conference in Warsaw it was decided that all countries should make 'contributions' rather than 'commitments'. Vulnerable countries like the Philippines (still suffering the aftermath of Typhoon Haiyan) want to see a financial mechanism for relief after extreme weather events. Some countries, such as the USA, resist the idea that carbon emitters should be liable for damages.

The conference agreed that funds will be made available but they will come under the heading of support for adaptation to climate change, rather than compensation for damage.

One has to bear in mind that governments do not control greenhouse gas emissions, as much of the power is focussed in fossil fuel companies and financial institutions. We are all perpetrators and potential victims. We must accept the Transition Movement's mantra that "everyone is needed", taking responsibility for both the problem and the solution.

Bishop Christopher Kato from the Diocese of Tohoku, Japan is visiting St Martin's



The Japanese Anglican Church (UK) which we host at St Martin's with our Commissioned Leader Mrs Yuki Johnson is hosting Bishop Christopher Kato from the Diocese of Tohoku this month.

You may remember that Tohoku is the diocese where our friends from Christ Church Sendai (the cathedral) come from and of course it is where there was terrible damage from the earthquake and

tsunami. The map above shows the area highlighted.

Bishop Christopher Kato will be visiting St Martin's on Sunday, 16^{th} March.

On that afternoon, at 3pm, Mr Sonoda will lead the informal session for 30 minutes.

At 3.30pm there will be Evening Prayer, in Japanese, at which Bishop Christopher will preach.

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

What's happening in Japan's tsunami-disaster zone?

It's been three years since the triple disaster hit north-eastern Honshu (an area called Tohoku). What's happened since then? The Tohoku region has a total population of around 9.6 million and over 400,000 people were displaced following the Great Tsunami and Earthquake. Many of these were elderly folk who lost their families and property. Entire communities were devastated by this disaster.

There are still about 290,000 people living in temporary housing, it's expected that this situation will continue for the next couple of years. This housing is tiny, less than 30m² (322ft²), and poorly insulated. Many feel stressed, not just from the above-mentioned losses, but also because their accommodation is much smaller than their previous dwellings.

Most who remain in temporary housing are elderly. Many don't have the funds or land to rebuild their homes. There also has been uncertainty from the government about where people will be allowed to rebuild. The safest option would be to relocate people to safer situations, however that isn't easy in mountainous Japan. Much of the habitable land is right next to the ocean and walled in by mountains. Additionally, many elderly Japanese people, at this stage in their lives, don't want to change location and move away from the people they know.

Many who lived in the flooded area before were farmers and fishermen. Farmers have struggled to return to work because their land was inundated by salty water that changed the soil. Many fishermen lost their boats and gear in the tsunami, the ports they worked out of were also devastated. Those farmers and fishermen around the Fukushima area have additionally faced a market suspicious of radiation contamination. There are so many barriers to rebuilding. The volunteers who stayed the longest in relief work were Christians, the community has noted this. But now that much time has passed since the disaster, few volunteers are left. One of OMF's missionaries reported that this makes locals feel abandoned and alone. One positive thing to come out of this disaster is that Japanese churches worked together in relief work. That unity isn't something that has come naturally in the past, so it is something to be very thankful for.

This disaster has put Tohoku on the map for missions. Previously Tohoku was a much neglected region of Japan in terms of mission work. Now many missions are sending missionaries. The long-term outcome of this influx of missionaries is, of course, not something we know yet. However we can praise God that his name is being proclaimed in this previously neglected rural area of Japan.

OMF International was working in Tohoku prior to the tsunami. One of our missionary couples, who live just outside of Sendai, witnessed the tsunami waves from their house on a high point on the coast. They were isolated, power and water-less for several days after the earthquake. Since then they've continued their church planting work, but also been very involved in relief and outreach work to those affected by the tsunami.

Many OMF missionaries have participated in or taken teams to the area to do relief work over the last three years. OMF was given many funds in the aftermath of the disaster. One way they've used this considerable money was to begin a ministry in the more isolated northern part of the Tohoku coast. This has been more a ministry of "presence" than of church planting or evangelism. One thing they did was establish a café where locals were welcome. It became of point of hope for one community. A place they could gather, could talk and be listened to, or just be.

Many disasters have happened around the world since March 2011. There are needs in this world beyond the means of any one of us to help or fix. It can be overwhelming. However, we can lift these matters up to the Lord in prayer. Please don't forget Japan as the country and some of its people struggle to recover from 2011's disaster.
