Christmas already?

Christmas seems to have been going on a long time this year. Apart from the usual cut-price cards in the shops from about August, a certain local Coffee Shop has been playing Christmas music from Bonfire night! Apparently the scheme of canned music runs more or less thus: about one in five tunes during early November, expanding to one in three and then by December one in two before one in one in the last two weeks. Thereafter Christmas it tails off in a rather more rapid sequence.

I don't know why I should sound surprised? The commercial world is all too conscious that Christmastide conjures up a 'feel good' factor amongst customers – and why not, it is after all a great festival of rejoicing as once again we (as Christians) remember the Nativity of our Lord, who we believe is the Saviour of the world.

The problem for today's followers of Jesus is however, how to make that good news accessible to an increasingly international and secular society, especially where we live. Yet, the latest figures from the Church of England's 'Statistics for Mission' show a mixed picture some continuing gentle decline, some bright spots of growth such as here in London, too few younger members and too much financial burden, yet an extraordinarily generous giving level by some.

All that being said on balance the Church is in good heart and here at St Martin's as ever we are trying to look outwards to a wider audience. We are addressing this with our community links and our new educational programme under the banner of St Martin's Foundation. Modern Christians must be fully knowledgeable about their faith in order to witness to Christ in their day-to-day lives.

We are also looking wider still not least with our outward giving programme to a number of charities and good causes. In the New Year also I am hoping that we can reach out to our new Anglican friends in what is now beleaguered Guinea in West Africa where they have been hit hard by the ghastly outbreak of Ebola, one of the cruellest diseases. Simple condemnation is not however enough we must all learn more about what is driving young people to take up militant causes. She will be based at her home in Canada but will work at the Anglican Communion Office for some days each month. We wish her well with this new undertaking.

Welcome Packs for the Women's Refuge

When women and their children arrive at the refuge, they have often left home in a hurry and the staff find that many of them lack the usual essentials for personal hygiene.

They have asked us to assemble some welcome packs which can be placed in the newcomers' rooms. They have suggested that we include the following (enough for 1 mother and 1 child):

2 towels
Body wash
Toothpaste - 1 tube for the mother and another for a child
Toothbrush - 1 for mother and 1 for a child
Roll-on deodorant
Shampoo
Hand cream
Body moisturiser
Tissues
Baby wipes
Sanitary towels (1 packet)

They are also grateful for nappies, spare pants for mothers and children. It seems that they often get donations of toys and clothes but essential toiletries and towels are overlooked.

I think this is a request that we can respond to and I hope that in due course we shall be able to make a steady supply of packs to welcome new women to the refuge. I hope that we will be able to include a card from our Junior Church.



George William Davis 12th December 1925 – 15th October 2014



I've known for a long time that this day would come, but as George once said to me that he wanted me to conduct his funeral, I must admit to feeling unusually nervous, I really do want to get it right. I have after all the responsibility of following Clive in giving this address on behalf of a man who I have always profoundly admired. George also once said to me round about the time that the family moved from Lexden Road out to Ruislip to assure me I think, that quote 'we are committed and we will continue to serve God in St Martin's regardless of how far we have to travel'. That, of course, was and remained true right up until the

Sunday before George passed on, when although not well, he was still at St Martin's keeping an eye on things in the role which I think he that he had acquired by dint of age, example and loyalty - as father of the church. In this respect this is the end of an era but as we prepare to embark, as George would want, on a new one, what a wonderful example of faith and commitment we have as a model for our lives.

So I am relieved that George has left me with a script transferred from notes by Claire and Clive that I share with you now in more or less his own words:

George was born on 12^{th} December 1925 in Marylebone. During his early years he spent most of his childhood in St Nicholas' & St Martin's Hospital at Pyrford in Surrey, the hospital was run by the Waifs and Strays Society (now the Childrens' Society). By coincidence this Parish donated £30 a year during the 1930s for Pyrford Hospital while George was there. This is something that George only found out some 8 years ago when reading Mary Sorensen's History of St Martin's. Pyrford Hospital Chapel was where George, aged 10, started Serving at the Altar under The Rev'd Father Bailey, a real priest of the old Anglo-Catholic style – that's why George was such a good server.

When George was 15, he started work as a packer for Trix Electrical

Company, a firm in the West End of London, which we believe in 1940 was making radios.

At 18 he was called up for National Service and was posted to serve in the Royal Army Service Corps. During his service and because of his health George was medically downgraded to C2, which meant he was fit to serve only in this country. Nevertheless, he finished his Army Service as an NCO in charge of the petrol depot on Horsenden Hill. Later he would joke that Hitler could have slowed the British advance just by bombing the Horsenden Hill depot!

During this time George met Dorothy perhaps the most significant encounter of his life. On demob he worked for a small firm of signwriters. In those days film credits were painted on glass before being combined with the film. It was these film credits painted on glass that George worked on – notably some of the Anna Neagle-Michael Wilding films – for example I checked out the famous 'Spring in Park Lane 1947 & The Courtneys of Curzon Street 1948'.

In 1950, George (now 24) married Dorothy at St Mary's Church, Ealing and on their marriage Dorothy's father made George promise that they would not start a family until Dorothy was 21. Dorothy was 18 at the time but like all promises he made, George kept it. They moved to Twyford Avenue, backing on to what was then North Thames Gas Board's Sports Ground. Soon after their marriage George's ill health meant that he was advised to work in the open air – consequently he started work in the Sports Field as a Groundsman. Where with hard work, long hours and evening studying he raised through the ranks to become Head Groundsman. By the time he retired at the age of 65 George was in charge of all the British Gas Sports Grounds in the North Thames Area.

George, with Dorothy was a very keen Speedway fan. Wearing the scarves and carrying the rattles in their team colours, George and Dorothy would go to watch the Wembley Lions in all weathers. Then in the winter it was Ice Hockey where they supported both the Wembley Monarchs and the Wembley Lions. (1947 Dorothy ice-skated on Ealing Common, George no skater himself watched from the straw bales that were put around.)

In 1953 Clive arrived followed by Claire in 1958. Family life was very important to George. George and Dorothy spent many happy years in Twyford Avenue bringing up Clive and Claire. Both Clive and Claire

were baptised in St Martin's. And so started a very long association with this church. The family grew up. Claire married Luke in 1981 and George became a very proud grandfather when first Matthew (in 1985), then Emily (in 1990) came along.

On moving to Ruislip, George and the family continued to support St Martin's. George was very proud to have celebrated his Golden Wedding Anniversary in 2000 with Dorothy before her sad passing in 2001.

By the time he had become too frail to serve any more, he had been serving for nearly 80 years. While at St Martin's, in his caring hands George trained many young servers, some of whom are here today. He was always very proud of them. George was also involved with the 'Guild of Servers In The Sanctuary' – of which he was a life member. He was a Fellow of the Institute of Groundsmanship and was still an active member until recently. For many years you could see George in the Advisors' Tent at the Chelsea Flower Show, ready to advise the public on which grasses were best for hardwearing or ornamental lawns. The Institute awarded him Life Membership in recognition of the work he had done for them.

The children write over the last few months George gradually become weaker. He had lived a long and full life but now George is re-united with his beloved Dorothy. We will all remember George by his love, devotion and dedication to his family and his church life.

I think George has actually been very modest in summing up his own life but there are some extra things that have to be said and I speak on behalf of many when I remember the longstanding friendship care and support that he was able to give to me and by example to others as well. He was one of those people who just needed to be there for things to be all right. As a consequence our two reading are also just right. St Paul's great First Epistle to the Corinthians the thirteenth chapter can hardly be better explained theologically than by reference to George himself. If we are struggling as it were to see through the proverbial glass darkly we need only to think of the confidence George had in Christ's power to gather all things up and make all things well. His beloved Dorothy could in that context never be far away but simply waiting for him. Faith, hope and love a trinity of aspirational virtues were in turn exemplified in George. So the second lesson again from St Paul in his Letter to the Philippians chapter 4 is also entirely

appropriate: 'Rejoice in the Lord always and again I say rejoice!' for as also quoted on the front of the service sheet the words from the great Indian Nobel Prize winner Rabindranath Tagore 'death is not the extinguishing of the flame but the blowing out of a candle because dawn has come'.

Consequently, this occasion must inevitably although sad, because we've lost a great friend and mentor, also be a time for joyful commemoration - 'whatever you've learned or received or heard from me, or seen in me – put it into practice'. St Paul is speaking of himself but for us the words echo our thoughts of George whose memory and influence are his precious legacy passed on in trust for our lives and if then we take what he was to heart then the God of peace will indeed be with us, as he was with his loyal and faithful servant George William Davis. May he rest in peace – and rise in glory.
