Midsummer ... already?

It's hardly believable that it's June again. That's the kind of sentiment that is often described as in this busy world we always seem to be catching up on the month before.

Nevertheless, Midsummer's Day is on Wednesday 24th June. Midsummer isn't as is often thought a celebration of the longest day (which is on Sunday 21st) but it is the Feast of the Birth of St John the Baptist.

John is considered to be the second most important New Testament personage after Jesus himself. Jesus says of him, as recorded in the Gospel of Matthew Chapter 11 verse 11, "Truly I tell you, among those born of women there has not risen anyone greater than John the Baptist; yet whoever is least in the kingdom of heaven is greater than he." That's a pretty daunting verse but it partly explains why we celebrate his birth rather than his death. Those of you with an eye to the calendar will also realize that Midsummer's Day is almost exactly six months from the celebration of the birth of Jesus – Christmas.

Fortunately, even for those of us with congested diaries, that still gives us enough time to prepare. In the meantime we will celebrate with our Midsummer Madness Soirée on Friday 26th June, which will be an opportunity for the entire parish to get together to celebrate. I hope you can come.

Then whilst you've got your diaries open don't forget Sunday 18th October when we have our annual Confirmation Service with the Bishop of Willesden. Importantly at the service, not only will we celebrate the confirmation of our candidates, we will also license the Reverend Brandy Pearson who has been chosen as our next Self Supporting Minister (SSM) to live with her husband Rob (who is also ordained) in our church flat known as St Martin's Cottage.

This will mark an exciting new phase in our ministry and the next stage in our parish life. We must however bring the flat up to full standard. This basically means putting in a new bathroom, kitchen and tiling some of the entrance as well as decoration. We've put out an appeal for funds and had a generous response but we need more and if you can help us with a donation each and every contribution will be welcome.

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

Ealing Deanery Mystery worshippers

What do people experience when they come through our church door?

Rev'd Christopher Ramsay, Area Dean of Ealing says
'We have designed this project to help us look in the mirror and make
ourselves even better at welcoming newcomers to our churches. The
longer one is a member of a church, the harder it is to view it
objectively. I am excited to invite some mystery worshippers to my
church and see what they really experience!'

The visitors will not be judgemental but rather it is a reflective process to help us to grow our churches. The aim is not to comment on style or the tradition of the church, but to focus in on practical issues which we can all address.

Visitors:

- We are recruiting lay members of our churches who are willing to visit another church and write up their experience.
- They will all receive training prior to visiting. Monday June 8th, 8pm St Stephens Ealing.
- The Area Dean's team will make the match between visitors and churches and will also see the report about the visit prior to it being sent to the church.
- The visitors will commit to pray for the church they visit before and after the visit.

Churches:

- Churches will only have a visitor if they ask to join the project.
- Churches who join up will agree a window of 4-6 weeks when the visitor or visitors may turn up unannounced.
- The churches will have the questions the visitor will be addressing prior to arriving so that they can review how they do welcome and use the project to reflect on their current practice both before and after the visit.

Mystery Worshipper Reflection Questions:

- 1. How accessible was the church (disability, signage, entrance)?
- 2. What was the name of the service?
- 3. How full was the building?
- 4. What was the profile (age/gender/ethnicity) of those attending?
- 5. Comment on the welcome you received (and were you given any further help as a visitor)?
- 6. What provision did you notice for children under the age of 11?
- 7. Comment on the comfort of the seating and environment inside the church?
- 8. Comment on the books/papers/projection used during the service?
- 9. How would you describe the music?
- 10. Exactly how long was the sermon?
- 11. What did you take away from the sermon?
- 12. Was there an identifiable place or people where you could pray, or be prayed for?
- 13. Which part of the service was like being in heaven?
- 14. And which part was like being in... er... the other place?
- 15. What happened when you hung around after the service looking lost?
- 16. How would you describe the after service refreshments?
- 17. Were you aware of any process for following you up as a new person to the church?
- 18. Having used the toilet would you use it again? Comment...
- 19. What one thing will you remember about all this in seven days' time?
- 20. Do you think they spotted you as a mystery worshipper?



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The Magna Carta - 800 years on

This month marks the 800th anniversary of the signing of Magna Carta – one of the most famous documents in the world, and one of the most misunderstood.

Meaning 'Great Charter', it was signed at Runnymede, a water meadow probably designated for regular meetings, on the Thames between Windsor and Staines. Described sometimes as 'a failed peace treaty', it was agreed between the vastly unpopular Plantagenet King John (1199-1216) and a coalition of powerful barons who threatened his reign.

Although nearly a third of the text was deleted or substantially rewritten within ten years, and almost all the clauses have now been repealed, its 39^{th} and 40^{th} clauses gave all 'free men' the right to justice and a fair trial.

This and other Magna Carta core principles are echoed in the United States Bill of Rights (1791), described in 1946 by Eleanor Roosevelt as "a Magna Carta for all mankind", and in many other constitutional documents around the world, as well as in the Universal Declaration of Human Rights (1948) and the European Convention on Human Rights (1950).

Magna Carta is 4,000 words long and is now usually divided into 63 clauses, and opinions of it vary. Sir Edward Coke in the 17th century and many others have seen it as enshrining the basic rights of an English subject, and this is how it is normally viewed.

More recently, though, it has been pointed out that Magna Carta's more prominent clauses "offered special legal protection for the Catholic Church and the aristocracy, advocated tax breaks for the wealthiest, freed the City of London from regulatory oversight, promised total freedom of immigration and placed the burden of infrastructure maintenance on local communities instead of government".

In 1904, Edward Jenks published an article entitled "The Myth of Magna Carta", which also undermined traditionally accepted views. In 1930 the document was parodied by Sellar and Yeatman in 1066 and All That: "Magna Charter," they concluded, "was therefore the chief

cause of Democracy in England, and thus a Good Thing for everyone (except the Common People)".

However, for most of us, Magna Carta remains a foundation of English national identity. Lord Denning, the most celebrated English judge of the 20th century, described it in 1956 as "the greatest constitutional document of all times – the foundation of the freedom of the individual against the arbitrary authority of the despot".

Don't drive UNLESS you drink!

If you don't drink enough water while driving, it can be just as dangerous as being over the alcohol drink-drive limit.

It seems that drivers make far more mistakes when they are even mildly dehydrated, compared with when they are well hydrated, according to recent research.

A study found that drivers who drank only 25ml of water an hour more than double the number of mistakes that they make at the wheel, compared to drivers who drink 200ml an hour. In fact, the dehydrated drivers compare well with drivers who have been drinking alcohol.

The study at Loughborough University, published in *Physiology & Behaviour*, found that dehydration can result in impaired mental functioning, changes in mood and reduction in concentration. The errors of those who were dehydrated more than doubled, and ranged from lane drifting, late braking and touching or crossing the rumble strip or lane line.

The researchers also warn that warm weather leads to significant losses of water, and that too many drivers restrict fluids so as to avoid lavatory stops. 68% of all vehicle crashes are due to driver error.

What is on the other side of death?


