

October and Harvest

We have always held our Harvest Festival in October. This is partly in deference to the poet Keats and his poem 'Ode to Autumn', which ironically he wrote in September 1819 and partly because it takes most of September to recover from

the effects of the summer holidays!

Anyway with Rogationtide in May, when blessings were called on the newly sown crops in the old days the harvest wasn't complete until October. In our own times we have access to fruit, vegetables and produce at all times of the year but we still need to celebrate a harvest thanksgiving.

Harvest is nevertheless entirely dependent on planting and tending the crops and this is a good metaphor for the Christian life. Locally we try to express this outwardly by our support of the Ealing Women's Refuge with goods and items.

Inevitably we get caught up as well with finance, this year is no exception. For example, you have already as a congregation been

extraordinarily generous in helping to finance the new Hall kitchen. This generosity will hopefully continue as later this month we have our annual Gift Day (Sunday 29th October) and as we proceed onto the expenses and outgoings associated with 2018. In this respect Ken Chan our treasurer has written a series of articles in this magazine and during October we will have some essential presentations at the main Parish Communion on the same theme.

Overall, however our primary objection, our reason for existence is to seek a harvest of souls and to proclaim the Good News of Jesus Christ.


1. FROM BRANDY'S COMMONPLACE BOOK

I have been writing a spiritual journal for many years. I use it to think through how I feel, what I think about God and what God might want of me. Somehow, writing it down helps me. I used to include quotations from books that inspired or informed me. However, my journal is very private. I wanted to share these quotes with others and so I started a Commonplace Book for them. I write them in the book by hand, because I find it a prayerful act, a way of slowing myself down to connect more deeply with the words. (Rob will tell you I have neat handwriting!)

I thought for the next few months, I would share some of these quotations with you – in the hope that you might find these words inspiring and help in your own life of prayer and relationship with God.

If you find anything puzzling - Come and talk to me!

I have started with something about reading spiritually. After all, that is what I hope we will all be doing with these words!



This quotation is by Henri Nouwen, who died in 1996, and is one of my favourite spiritual writers. He was a Dutch Catholic priest, professor, writer and theologian. His interests were rooted primarily in psychology, pastoral ministry, spirituality, social justice and community. After nearly two decades of teaching at academic institutions, Nouwen went on to work with

mentally and physically handicapped people at the L'Arche Daybreak community in Richmond Hill, Ontario in Canada.

READING SPIRITUALLY

Reading often means gathering information, acquiring new insight and knowledge, and mastering new fields. It can lead us to degrees, diplomas and certificates.

Spiritual reading however, is different.


It means not simply reading about spiritual things, but also about reading spiritual things in a spiritual way.

That requires a willingness not just to read but to be read, not just to master but to be mastered by words...

As we read spiritually about spiritual things, we open our hearts to God's voice.

We must be willing to put down the book we are reading and just listen to what God is saying to us through its words.

The Vicar's Plum Trees



A Brief Outline of Church Finances - Part 3

Surplus / Deficit

I started this three part series by stating that Church Finances are about income, outgoings and the difference between the two, i.e. surplus or deficit. I hope you've now got a better idea on where St Martin's gets its income from, and what this income is spent on. There is not much that requires further explanation on surplus or deficit per se, so I would like to share my own view of their importance to our Church with you.

Obviously surplus is better than deficit from the treasury management perspective but, for me, there is a deeper meaning for us Christians. If you strip Church Finances down to its most basic parts, the common thread through it all is sacrificial giving. In essence Church Finances is the collection (income through your givings) and redistribution (mostly as Common Fund contribution in outgoings) of funds to sustain the Church, first individually and then collectively. Surpluses strengthen that sustainability, as well as enabling us to do more good work for the glory of God.

I mentioned previously that we are facing financial challenges; as there is a gradual increase in the gap between our committed income and outgoings, which we have to rely on rental income and fundraising events to cover. The significant costs required to complete the substantial upgrade of the Church Hall and Kitchen have inevitably increased the pressure to find additional income if we wish to balance the books.

St Martin's congregation has been consistently generous over the years, and your overwhelming response to the Kitchen SOS campaign is the latest proof, for which the PCC and I are most grateful. We are acutely aware that continuing to ask for more from existing members is not viable, and we are also actively exploring alternative options.

In the midst of this, it's important to remind ourselves the motive to maintain a surplus in our financial position. In Matthew 16 v26, Jesus asked "What good will it be for a man if he gains the whole world yet forfeits his soul?" It's only a means to an end: let God's will, not ours, be done. We must have faith in God that He will lead us by the right path.

A Church Reflecting Life & Times

The building of St Martin's church, commenced in 1905 and completed in 1906, was to serve the new and growing population that was developing

in West London as a result of the extension of the Piccadilly Line in the previous century.

The church was consecrated on St Martin's day, 11th November 1906 by Bishop Arthur Foley Winnington-Ingram, Bishop of London from 1902 to 1938. During the 1930s vestries were added to the building and during the1960s a Hall and church flat were built.

Amongst distinguished members of the clergy, we remember in particular the Rev'd 'Harry' Clement Williams who retired in 1938 and died in 1992 aged 107, being the then oldest living Anglican clergyman in the world!

WHAT Now?
