

Valediction: Rev'd Alec Griffiths

The Rev'd Alec Griffiths, our old friend and former assistant priest at St Martin's, died in Largs, Scotland on 24th August after a long struggle with declining health.

Born in 1942 and educated at St Chad's College, Durham University, Alec served his curacies at St Ninian's, Pollokshields, and St John's, Greenock, 1968-72 before going to Holy Cross, Glasgow as Rector 1972-79. Afterwards he moved south to be amongst the Sassenachs to become vicar of St Phillip's Birchencliffe in Huddersfield. Later he moved again to become Chaplain to Kingston Hospital in Kingston upon Thames. He came to us in 2004 as assistant curate and SSM at our then sister church of All Saints, Ealing Common.

Always the Scot, Alec moved back to Scotland to retire and live in Largs in 2010. Having celebrated his 40th anniversary of priesthood with us in a fabulous service, he marked the 50th golden jubilee anniversary of his ordination in 2016 in St Columba's, Largs where he had assisted as a priest until ill health finally slowed him down. A number of us went to that wonderful and moving occasion. Alec was by then in a wheelchair but as he had been Bishop John Taylor's (Bishop of Glasgow and Galway) first curate, there were many priests, lots of people and two bishops including Bishop John attending the celebration.

Latterly, when his health deteriorated, he moved to Moorburn Manor Nursing Home in Largs where he still, working 'till the end, was able to narrate the Annual Nativity Play!



When Alec came to us to live in St Martin's Cottage he still verv much missed his beloved wife Elizabeth, who had died the previous year but he settled into parish life here with enthusiasm. His two children often visited him and stayed with him. In those days Alec could be found treading the boards at the annual pantomime, in it must be said seriously overstretched black tights, as one of the dastardly villains. almost Alec's legendary parish pilgrimages took us out, singing all the way, in

the coach to a suitable cathedral where holiness was combined with good shopping, coffee and cakes. He was an inexhaustible fund of anecdotes and seemed to know pretty well every important person both in the Church of England and the Episcopal Church of Scotland. Thanks to him and his many connections we got some really good speakers for our Lent courses.

In many ways those were golden days, it was a joy to work with colleagues like Alec. He was a wise and experienced counsel and people really loved him. Latterly, he couldn't stand for long periods so his sermons (always fascinating and informed) were delivered seated to a seriously attentive, even enrapt, audience.

I got great praise from Alec when I changed my car and the new car's seats were about a foot higher than the earlier sportier model. Shoehorning Alec into the vehicle to ferry him from church to church was always a challenge; but on arrival his ministry continued seated over coffee (and lots of cake) as people came to him to receive genuine deep wisdom and much humour.



Before I conclude this valediction, I must also recall the annual Burns Night Suppers with special Scottish cheese, which had been anticipated literally all year as it had been ordered 'straight from the cow'!

There are many who will still remember this God's faithful servant. He goes now to his rest, reunited with his wife and no doubt still presiding at coffee!

May he rest in peace and rise in glory.

Yuki Johnson

Following training as a Licensed Lay Minister (LLM) and obtaining a Certificate of Higher Education in Theology, Ministry and Mission at Queen's Foundation Birmingham, Yuki Johnson was welcomed to ministry in the Diocese of Worcester on 19 September. The photo shows Yuki with the Revd Dr John Inge, Bishop of Worcester, in Worcester Cathedral. Yuki will be admitted and licensed by the Diocese of London on 7 October - a link to watch the live stream of this service will be made available nearer the time.



Yuki became a commissioned lay minister for worship in Japanese in November 2011, and leads the Japanese Anglican Church (UK) that meets in St Martin. Following recommendation for LLM training, she

completed this training nearer her home in the Diocese of Worcester.

"The training has been really brilliant and will definitely help me in my ministry," said Yuki. "I feel like I've got a much greater biblical knowledge and can see things from different points of view. It has given me more confidence in my preaching and lots of creative ideas for bible study – I'm looking forward to putting them into practice!"

Yuki helped to start the monthly Japanese services at St Martin's Church. She now leads services, runs bible study and compiles the community newsletter. She also helped to start a monthly community café in the church, which sees 60 attendees and gives more isolated local people a chance to speak the language.

Dates for the diary

Black History Month: Celebrated annually in October in the UK since 1987 when it was organised by activist Akyaaba Addai-Sebo, this month aims to celebrate the achievements and contributions of black people, as well as educate everyone on black history. For more information and events, check out the official website: www.blackhistorymonth.org.uk.

Breast Cancer Awareness Month: A month-long campaign to encourage people to visit the doctor for a check-up, especially if you experience a breast lump, painful breast or armpit, or discharge from the nipple. Early detection saves lives.

1st **October:** National Poetry Day, founded in 1994, encourages all to enjoy, discover and share poetry. This year's theme is Vision.

4th October: World Animal Day is celebrated on St Francis of Assisi's feast day and raises awareness worldwide for animal rights and welfare.

5th October: World Teachers' Day is celebrated worldwide after the UNESCO Recommendation, to centre and honour educators internationally.

6th October: National Badger Day celebrates just how magnificent and important one of our oldest native species is to the British countryside and its people.

10th October: World Mental Health Day is a day of raising awareness of mental health issues, driven by the Mental Health Foundation.

11th October: National Coming Out Day supports queer and LGBT+ people to "come out of the closet" – and reminds us to support those of the community who can't do so safely due to laws, social expectations, or unsupportive families.

30th **October:** British Summer Time ends – don't forget to put your clocks back one hour!
