

Christmas Letter

Dear all,

The last year has been unprecedented in the history of St Martin's and in the history of the church. And now we are headed into our Advent and Christmas season. Included in this issue are the list of services and young peoples' provision over the Christmas time.

With all the darkness and confusion, I am reminded of the story of two travellers walking along a narrow path in a forest, when night-time swiftly came upon them. In a matter of minutes, the path became invisible and the terror of darkness lurked everywhere. To make matters worse a violent storm broke out with terrifying flashes of lightening, torrential rain and loud peals of thunder which shook the ground.

One traveller looked at the storm as an awful calamity, with every flash of lightening, he looked at the sky and cursed, strayed from the path and got lost. The second traveller looked on the storm as a blessing in disguise. He noticed that each flash of lightening lit up the path ahead little by little and taking one step at a time succeeded in staying on the path and made his way out of the forest.

The thunderstorm was the same for both travellers but for one it was a stumbling block for the other a stepping-stone. Sometimes that is the way life is, that there is just enough light to be able to take the next step. So, when the light shines in this present darkness - what do we see? When faith lifts us up, can we see maybe a little bit of comfort and joy? These words comfort and joy hold together the hope that Christmas may bring a little joy and celebration after a difficult year. We are mindful of those who have lost loved ones or livelihoods, or who are potentially still not able to be together with family. The hope of a vaccine and easing of lockdown rules over Christmas lights up our path just a little.

Maybe that's the best we can do this Christmas to be grateful for the blessings we have. The message and traditions of Christmas can bring us some comfort and maybe our hearts will find some joy, always mindful of those less fortunate than ourselves. We are blessed with caring people at St Martin's who give generously of their money and time and care for others in the community.

Thank you for all your support over this difficult period and I pray for a light to shine in the darkness this Christmas, bringing a little comfort and joy.

Church of England Advent & Christmas 2020



This Christmas the Church will need, in the words of St Paul in Romans 12.15, to 'Rejoice with those who rejoice; weep with those who weep'. We will aim to celebrate where we can together in one place – but also embrace a wider community that wants to join in the celebration but may not be physically able – or emotionally ready – to do so. We hope that Comfort and Joy will enable us to build a campaign that both enables us to reconnect with the rich and joyous traditions of the past and to offer God's consoling love in the present.

Weekly reflections will be published on social media, and will also be available by email and app with accompanying prayer activities for children and families. The Nine Lessons and Carols for Christmas mirror the structure of a traditional carol service, exploring both Biblical texts and the words of much-loved Christmas carols. Christmas at a Distance

Christmas is usually the time to gather with our loved ones, eating and gifting together. This year will likely look a little different. Though at the time of writing we'll be able to join three households for Christmas, many people will be anxious about the prospect, particularly where they or their loved ones are particularly vulnerable to Covid-19.

For those of us trying to figure out what Christmas will look like this year, here are some ideas which might help to capture some of the usual Christmas spirit.

Video call your loved ones – perhaps the most obvious option. Consider setting up an online film night or coffee morning, or checking in with friends and family you haven't spoken with in a while.

Decorate with lights and wreaths. For anyone walking past, seeing the twinkle of Christmas lights or the familiar shape of a Christmas tree can help to lift their spirits and make us all feel connected in our celebrations.

Go for a walk yourself! Taking a local walk to see everyone else's decorations is a lovely way to spend an evening, and the familiar lights may even lift your mood. We all have that one house in our area that goes all out every year, which is a joy to look at.

Decorate a gingerbread house – or even bake one! We've bought a kit to make it easier. It's a great activity to do within your household, and makes for a delicious treat once you've taken those photos for Instagram. **Get in touch with your neighbours**. For many people this year, difficulties with travelling and health will mean a Christmas Day on their own. You might like to ask your neighbours if they'd like you to pop round to their front gate during the Christmas season for a chat.

Build a festive fort. If you're feeling adventurous, get the tent out and fill it with blankets and cushions! If it looks a bit chilly out there, you can still build a blanket fort in your front room. It's an easy way to make your environment feel a little different without going anywhere. Make sure you take cookies.

Game night. Listen. Sometimes you just need to pull yourself away from the glow of the screen and move some cards or dice around, fuelling ongoing rivalries around who's better at recognising patterns or who knows the rules properly. If you've got three or more people in your household, the options are endless! For anyone restricted to two players, we can recommend Arboretum, Odin's Ravens, Trash Pandas, Bananagrams and Boggle.


Dates for the diary

1st December: World AIDS Day raises awareness about HIV and expresses global solidarity with people living with HIV.

3rd December: The International Day of Disabled Persons aims to promotes an understanding of disability issues and mobilise support for the dignity, rights and wellbeing of people with disability.

6th St **December:** On Nicholas' Day, children traditionally wake up to small presents from St Nicholas in their shoes. In manv households, this is the beginning of the Christmas season.

10th December: Human Rights Day commemorates the adoption of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights on 10th December 1948.



15th December: International Tea Day is celebrated largely in tea-producing countries, and draws attention to the needs of tea trade workers and calls for Fair Trade practices.

19th December: On this day in 1783 William Pitt the Younger becomes the youngest ever Prime Minister at just 24 years old.

21st December: National Robin Day raises awareness for the need to take care of small birds and other wildlife to help them through the winter.

24th December: Christmas Eve.

25th December: Christmas Day! Widely celebrated, Christmas Day celebrates the birth of Jesus Christ. Gifts are exchanged, feasts are eaten, trees are covered in lights and toys. Traditionally the time leading up to Christmas Day involves nativity plays, carol services and commitments to reflection and acts of service for Christians.



26th December: Boxing Day. Historically, servants and tradespeople were given a "Christmas box" gift from their employers and customers.

31st December: New Year's Eve, or Hogmanay, typically involves gift-giving and visiting friends and neighbours. There are customs and superstitions around the moment of New Year's, which take note of your activities at the stroke of midnight as well as the first person to step over the threshold.
