***This Sunday, in order to cater for members and friends who can't easily access YouTube, we have two on-line services***

***Rev Calvin Samuel is again leading a [Section Service](#) with Rayleigh and Rochford Methodist Churches, which starts on Zoom at 9:45am then Pam Smith is leading **our own service** solely on Zoom at 11:15am.***

For the [Section Service](#) please join Zoom in the usual way at or just before 9:45am (details below); there will be 15 minutes to get together, then at 10:00am we will transfer to Calvin's YouTube service, which will include a contribution from Pam Smith and a hymn sung by Ros. You can either stay on Zoom and won't have to do anything to access YouTube, but for better audio quality leave Zoom and click on this link <https://youtu.be/8cvhsX8ojNQ>. Please remember to mute yourself at the start of the service if you stay on Zoom.

At the end of the YouTube service we're going to go into Breakout Rooms where we can have a chat (and make a cup of tea?) with friends from the three Churches. Again, you won't have to do anything if you've stayed on Zoom as you will be placed in a room automatically. If you've left Zoom for YouTube you will need to re-join the Zoom meeting using the same link, ID and Passcode (below). The "Rooms" are just small Zoom meetings; the intention is to have two breakout sessions each of 10 minutes, with a change of rooms after the first 10 minutes.

## Rev. Calvin Samuel's Pastoral Letter



This Sunday, 22<sup>nd</sup> November, is Stir up Sunday, the final Sunday of the liturgical year before a new Year begins in Advent. Stir Up Sunday, known also as the Feast of Christ the King, is so called because of the traditional collect, or gathering prayer, used that day in the Church of England and other traditions which begins with the words: Stir up, O Lord.

In Britain, it's also the point at which people often begin to 'stir up' their traditional Christmas Puddings so that they're ready in time for Christmas.

As a child I attended a Roman Catholic Primary School, called Christ the King. They make a big deal of this feast, and so, for example, on Friday of this week, teachers and pupils get an additional day off School to mark the Feast of Christ the King.

The end of a year is a time when we are perhaps inclined to look back at the year past and to look ahead at the year to come.

The past year has been marked, of course, by the global Covid-19 pandemic. The earliest known case of Covid-19 dates back to 1<sup>st</sup> December 2019 which happened to be the 1<sup>st</sup> Sunday of Advent. Back then it seemed to be an Asian problem, remote from our daily lives. Within a few months we were reminded that what happens in one part of the world will have effects globally. It's a reaffirmation that we are one race, the human race, sharing one world. To paraphrase the words of Paul in 1 Corinthians 12.26 what happens to one part of the body affects the whole.

But the end of the year is also a time to look forwards. The pandemic has changed so many aspects of our lives, in ways that were previously unimaginable and some of those changes will continue to be with us. We have adapted and grown and are continuing to find new ways of living out our faith in a world that is changing rapidly.

That is, I think, one of the constants of discipleship, finding new ways of articulating an ancient faith in changing circumstances. The Feast of Christ the King is a declaration of faith, that though the world may change the Kingship of Christ is eternal.

During Advent I'll be leading 4 weekly Reflections via Zoom beginning on Tuesday 1<sup>st</sup> December as we share some of our hopes, dreams and fears for the year to come. I do hope you'll be able to join me.

*Stir up, O Lord,  
the wills of your faithful people,  
that they, bringing forth the fruit of good works,  
may by you be richly rewarded;  
through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen*

Zoom joining details for all these will be sent out nearer the time.





## TOY AND GIFT SERVICE



Whether the Toy and Gift service goes ahead at Church or online this year, we can send gift vouchers to the women's refuge, now working under the title of 'Safe Steps'.

Safe Steps has continued work throughout the pandemic, supporting those affected by domestic abuse. Often over the phone or by video calls. They have seen a 77% increase in calls to their helpline.

This year they are having to adapt how they accept donations for Christmas and supermarket vouchers (for Tesco, Sainsburys or Coop) would be the best way of donating. Vouchers enable the women to purchase the essentials that they need and also gifts for their children this Christmas. ## CHURCH CHRISTMAS TREE
