Revving Up...

Oⁿ 28 May the Church will be celebrating the 'Birthday of the Church'. We will read about the events of Pentecost in Acts when over 2,000 years ago the disciples received Jesus' promised gift of God's Holy Spirit. The disciples were hiding themselves away, afraid of the future, afraid of persecution, not knowing what direction to go in next. Without Jesus leading them they didn't think they could continue with his work but, as promised they received the Gift of The Holy Spirit. No longer are they hidden. This dramatic event revealed them as Disciples of Jesus and the Spirit gave them the ability to speak in other languages so that everyone there could understand what they were saaying. WOW!

For many Christians Pentecost represents the Birth of the Church and it is certainly something to celebrate.

I invite us all to use this month of May to get ready for the Church's Birthday Party! As I am sure you know, if we want to have a successful party we need to prepare well and one of the first thing to do is to send out invitations. There is no good having a party without guests! Who are we going to invite?

If we are following Jesus' example then everybody is to be invited! Therefore our invitations need to make sense in both the written and spoken word. They need to be In a language that children, young people, the elderly and all our neighbours outside of the church can understand. Because if we are not careful enough to choose assessable (understandable) language we might just as well speak in an unknown foreign language which can alienate people and prevents anyone from hearing the Word and receiving the invitation.

This is one of the Church's biggest challenges and it's our challenge too. We need to ask ourselves how we can become more open, welcoming and inclusive in our attitudes towards others, perhaps many very unlike ourselves. We need to ask ourselves this question, otherwise our words will become like 'Hot Air' which just evaporates. We then can become like



deflated balloons, lifeless and empty of any joy! But all is not lost because a deflated balloon also offers the opportunity to be filled and an expectation of the joy it can bring to a party.

At Pentecost the disciples were filled with the Holy Spirit and those around them could hear and see that they were followers of Christ. They saw this through their joyful words and actions and many around them were attracted to what they said and did and became followers themselves. People today are still attracted to faith in God's Love but only if we share it first.

As today's disciples, we too can be filled with the Holy Spirit and share those gifts with others. Everyone of us has different gifts and talents which are to be equally valued. We too can share God's love and joy to those around us when sharing our unique gifts. When we use our individual gifts of the Holy Spirit, be it being a good listener, a good friend, offering Hospitality, making things, being good at accounts, playing music and singing, teaching and the list go on. As we use our gifts for the glory of God we are revealing God's gifts of the Holy Spirit of Love, Joy and Peace. WOW, what an amazing gift to share! Why wouldn't we want to share this exciting Good News!

Of course there is another very special party to be celebrated earlier in May. On 7 May we celebrate King Charles III's Coronation. Our churches throughout the Benefice will be holding special Sunday services and will also be joining in with village parties throughout the Benefice. 

Conditions of tower visits:

Adverse weather conditions could result in the tower visits being cancelled. It is a hard climb up the spiral staircase, and the upper steps are fairly worn. Climbers must wear shoes with a good grip (e.g. trainers) and not be suffering from a medical condition which would make the climb inadvisable. 

Our Birthday Supper on 17 March, pre-ordered at *The Ship*, Dymchurch, was well attended and delicious as usual. My rib-eye steak was excellent.

On Tuesday 11 April – Monday being a Bank Holiday – Andrew Ashton spoke to us on Absinthe and Art. This green drink, black liquorice-flavoured with wormwood

(artemisia absinthium), green anise and florence fennel. has a strength up to 74% ABV and originated in Switzerland as an elixir. But it is better known for its popularity in 19th and early 20th century France, particularly among Parisian artists and writers whose romantic associations with the drink still linger in popular culture.

We learned of the paraphernalia: the special glass shape, the perforated

spoons to hold the sugar cubes while water is added to turn the drink opaque and that it was thought to produce madness and hallucinations, hence The Green Fairy often pictured with the absinthe drinker.

In the 1840s it was given to French troops as a malaria preventive, and the troops brought home their taste for it. Absinthe became so popular in bars, bistros, cafés and cabarets by the 1860s that the hour of 5pm was called *l'heure verte* ('the green hour'). By the 1880s, mass production had caused the price to drop sharply, and the French were drinking 36 million litres per year compared with 5 billion of wine.

The consumption of absinthe was

opposed by social conservatives and prohibitionists, partly due to its association with bohemian culture. From Europe and the Americas, notable absinthe drinkers included Ernest Hemingway, James Joyce, Lewis Carroll, Charles Beaudelare, Paul Verlaine, Arthur Rimbaud, Henri de Toulouse-Lautrec, Amadeo Modigliani, Pablo Picasso, Vincent van Gogh, Oscar

Wilde, Marcel Proust, Aleister Crowley, Erik Satie, Edgar Allan Poe, Lord Byron and Alfred Jarry.

The art nouveau posters advertising the drink are beautiful but the sodden, benumbed, head on hand, despondent drinkers in the paintings less so. Absinthe continued to ravage society until it was banned in the US and most of Europe (not UK) by 1915. However all bans were


repealed by 2011 and modern absinthe (less potent) is now freely available.

Andrea organised a Kino visit for the 18 April and will research Cine Marsh in New Romney for other films.

Race day is getting closer and my training is getting more intense. I am writing this letter as the aches of my longest training ride, 67 miles, are beginning to settle down. It was a lovely ride, including a category 4 hill, to Bredgar Tea Rooms for a sausage roll and a cup of coffee.

New Romney Poetry Society

The Society met on 21 March and our topic was 'The Moon'.

Linda started off with a poem about Robert Burns written in the style of a 16th century Spanish dirge. She also read her own poem, '*Mists of Time*', written in an Arabic Mathnawi style. Linda has found over 1,000 different styles of poems and is slowly working her way through them.

Adrian read 'The Moon is but a Chin of Gold' by Emily Dickinson. This is how the new moon starts off and develops into a full face which shines down on us. He then read a short poem by Kenn Nesbitt about what life would be like for Humpty Dumpty sitting on the moon. It is reproduced here.

Humpty Dumpty sat on the moon falling off walls all afternoon. His shell didn't crack, and he needs no repair.

The gravity's just so much lighter up there.

He also chose another Poem by Kenn Nesbitt, 'The Tale of the Sun and the Moon' which talks about the different lifestyles of the sun and the moon; one is out all day, the other is out all night. This arrangement seems to suit both of them (and us!).

Pat read her own composition called 'The night he went', describing how she had to cross the Marsh in the moonlight in the middle of the night when her father died. She read 'The Moon of other Days' by Rudyard Kipling; written in India and reflecting on his time in London before he went to India.

Jean's poem was 'Moonlit Apples' by John Drinkwater, describing rows of apples that have been laid down for storage in the loft of a house and how the moon shines on them in the night when all are asleep and still. The description is so good you can see the apples bathed in moonlight. Our newest member, Moira, read 'Dream Valley' by William Blake, describing someone walking along a stream and the thoughts and memories it provokes. Daydreams during the day and sadder things at night.

Michael read Thomas Hardy's poem 'The Difference' which talked about a haunt that his heartmate did not frequent and for him it might have been a happier place if she had. He also read 'The Moon' by Robert Louis Stevenson. The first line is 'the moon has a face like the clock in the hall' and again makes contrast between the world of the moon and the world of the sun.

Evelyn cobbled together some old nursery rhymes about the moon and called it 20th July 1969 because on that date 'a man walked on the moon'.

John is an absent member of the group as he no longer lives near New Romney but he always emails a contribution and this month it was a sonnet, written by himself called 'The Moon', and again makes comparison between the sun and the moon.

Finally, Ann read '*Silver*' by Walter de la Mare. This described a scene at night where everything is bathed in the silver light of the moon.

The topic, The Moon, produced a varied selection of poems. I will leave you with the thoughts of Carol Ann Duffy who wrote this as an introduction to an anthology of poems about the moon.

In her introduction to the anthology, Duffy writes: 'the moon has always been, and always will be, the supremely prized image for poets – a mirror to reflect the poetic imagination; language's human smile against death's darkness'.

Dear Father God


"We thank you for mothers around the world and for the care they give their children. I thank you for my own mum,

It's been many years in the making but the RSPB managed to showcase wildlife stories in a way that has never been seen before. Through Wild Isles we'll reach millions of people, helping us to achieve our strategic outcome to reach out to more and more diverse people.

Following the filming theme, we had the Force News channel film a segment on the Sound Mirrors. This is a channel that produces, broadcasts and streams compelling content to anyone interested in the work of the UK military. Furthermore, we had a photo shoot at the Sound Mirrors for an article that was written for RyeZine about the owner of a popular hot chocolate shop/café in Rye named Knoops who has been inspired by the Mirrors and Dungeness.

March for the reserve team has been all about finishing off the habitat management programme.

We have recovered the southernmost tern raft on Burrowes Pit for repairs and we hope to be able to make some progress on this and plan to re-deploy in a different location before the breeding season for the terns kicks off. We have a new raft coming in early April which we will also be deploying on Burrowes Pit. This is part of a funding pot which is looking at reducing the impacts of avian 'flu by providing more habitat and reducing forced increased densities of breeding populations through lack of available habitat.

Where Rainbows Meet



On our visit to South Africa, John and I managed to visit Mymoena, Kyle and everyone at Where Rainbows Meet in the Vrygrond township in Cape Town.

There has been a lot of progress since my last visit just before the pandemic. The garden is developing, growing vegetables and herbs to be used in the large quantities of food produced to feed local people, both on site and also at other places in the area. During the pandemic, the organisation produced around 9 million meals to feed local people who were struggling to provide for themselves and their families without work.

The garden and other projects help to

rehabilitate those who are unemployed and show the possibility of growing food, even in difficult environments.

Other projects include computer training, sewing and jewellery making, especially bead work. Items produced are sold in an onsite shop and through various contacts.

All of the projects help to build self-esteem within a community where

families struggle with a variety of problems, including sickness, disability, unemployment and addiction.

Computers are also used by children to complete homework as well as for computer training and job applications.

Support is provided for children who are outside the normal school system because of challenging behaviour. Some of the children have never been to school



because they have lacked stable backgrounds and documentation. These children are always in need of help and support and, where possible, they are helped to join the educational system.

When we visited, it was the start of the Easter school holidays and although you could say that there was a holiday atmosphere, it was because there were even more mouths to feed as families brought along their children. The elderly were certainly not neglected and it was clear how vital Where Rainbows Meet is to the community.

During the visit, I was able to give Mymoena a copy of *Rainbow Prayers*, which was dedicated to her

wonderful organisation. It has an information page and details of the website.

Our 'Bagged Lucky Dip' at the Newchurch Church Easter Fayre was a great success, raising a useful sum for our funds.





With 'Forging a Sustainable and Peaceful Common Future' as its theme, Commonwealth Day aims to unite 2.5 billion Commonwealth Citizens in celebration of their shared values and principles, and in pursuit of a common future, centred on sustainability and peace. This was the first Commonwealth Day presided over by His Majesty King Charles III as King and Head of the Commonwealth.

The day also marked the tenth anniversary of the signing of the Commonwealth Charter, which outlines the values and principles that unify the 56 Commonwealth countries, representing one-third of humanity.

The local ceremony took place at St Nicholas, New Romney. Mayor of New Romney Cllr. Paul Thomas and Deputy Lieutenant Geoff Miles – together with other VIP guests – were joined by members of the public for a short ceremony. Students from local schools read poems and spoke movingly of 'What the Commonwealth means to Young People' today.

In her Commonwealth Day Message (read by DL Geoff Miles), the Rt Hon Patricia Scotland KC – the Commonwealth Secretary-General – paid tribute to Her late Majesty The Queen for her seven decades of service and welcomed His Majesty The King for his first Commonwealth Day as the new Head of the Commonwealth. More than 1,000 Commonwealth flags were raised across the globe, in a shared celebration of this amazing family of nations.

After the Commonwealth Affirmation was read by Edwin Seabrook-Smith – Chairman, New Romney RBL – the Commonwealth standard flag was placed on the altar by RBL President Dusty Miller and John Atkins, followed by the Commonwealth Anthem played by the Hythe Town Band, prayers and the National Anthem.

In his closing statement Mayor Paul Thomas thanked the team at St Nicholas Church, Hythe Town Band and Council Officers for organising and supporting the ceremony. A special mention was made for the students of Marsh Academy, St Nicholas School New Romney and Greatstone School.

Raising the Commonwealth Flag symbolises the joining together of members of the Commonwealth community. The ceremony renews publicly, commitment to the Commonwealth, appreciation of its guiding values and the opportunities offered for friendship and cooperation with fellow Commonwealth citizens of all ages around the world.
