FROM THE MINISTER

Advent, as you well know, is a time of waiting. The word advent is derived from the Latin *adventus*, which means arrival or coming to.

What are we waiting for to arrive? We may want to say Christmas, but it would be more precise to say we wait for Christ's coming. I read somewhere that there are three aspects to Advent;

1. we prepare ourselves to remember and celebrate the first coming of Christ into this world
2. we prepare ourselves to welcome Christ into our lives (perhaps afresh) and into this world in the here and now
3. we look forward to Christ's coming again in glory at the end of the age to make all things new.

If I'm honest, I often don't get much further than the first meaning of Advent; and my time and attention is mostly spent getting ready for Christmas rather than Christ's coming in the here and now, or His coming again in the future.

And yet if we don't get past 1. then it all becomes a wasted spiritual opportunity for deepening our faith and hope. And Advent and Christmas as a season in the church year becomes rather shallow and sentimental, lacking an existential edge.

I think what makes 2. and 3. so challenging for me, is that it's much harder to pin down what I'm meant to do; making space to welcome Christ into my life in the here and now is not exactly a passive thing, but it does require an attitude of waiting and expectancy. The Bible says: 'wait for the Lord!', 'be still', 'see I am doing a new thing'. It's hard to remain open and expectant towards the future when you don't know what is going to happen and how God will show up. It's frustrating when you are not in control of timelines or the shape of the future.

This is very much true for me personally just now as I apply for vacancies, wait to see if I've got through to a next phase, wait for more vacancies to appear and so on. Last year I didn't know if it was going to be my last Christmas with you at St

Machar's Ranfurly Church. This year I do know that it will be, yet I don't know where I will be next year.

In a sense you as congregation are in a similar boat; you know things will be different next year, but you don't know how exactly. It is unsettling. I think it is ok to acknowledge the mixed feelings this brings for us. The challenge is in all this to remain both faithful and expectant for Christ to come into our lives – personally but also as a congregation. Jesus was born not in Joseph and Mary's hometown of Nazareth, but while they were on the move. The circumstances were far from ideal and not what any expectant couple would want to plan for. But Christ came nonetheless and God protected them in all their wanderings.

I hope this month you will find encouragement and hope amidst the mixed feelings and uncertainty that you may feel. Christ is Emmanuel: God-with-us, in all times and seasons. Prepare and wait for His coming .

UPDATE ON THE PROPOSED UNION OF FREELAND & ST MACHAR'S RANFURLY CHURCH

This article has been produced by the two Session Clerks to keep both congregations updated with the latest information as we move towards a union. It includes some background information, some recent developments, a timeline for the next three months and some detail on the congregational votes which will take place in around three months' time.

The Background

In 2021 the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland decided to take radical action in response to falling numbers of ministers, a decline in membership and a drop in income. Presbyteries were required to produce, and to implement, a five year mission plan, which entailed a major readjustment with a reduction in the number of charges, and the creation of some team ministries where deemed appropriate, to ensure congregations were better equipped to share the Good News of Jesus Christ and to serve their communities going forward.

For us in Bridge of Weir, Clyde Presbytery decided that the two Bridge of Weir churches should unite as one charge. At the time neither of our churches was particularly enthusiastic to embrace this but there was nevertheless some recognition in both churches that the coming years would prove challenging, and this has indeed been borne out, such that the Kirk Sessions of both churches are now agreed upon union. It was also unrealistic to imagine that Bridge of Weir could remain untouched in such an extensive national readjustment exercise.

Our Vision

Whilst the process of union undoubtedly brings its challenges on a more

positive note it also brings fresh opportunities for service and friendship, and a chance to reappraise how we can best serve our Lord together in the Church and in the wider community. In our recent discussions our elders have highlighted the following vision aspirations-

A church at the centre of the community, both geographically and metaphorically

· A church that is both welcoming to all, and outward looking

· A church where there is a strong emphasis on building relationships, both within and outwith the church, particularly with families and children

· A church with a strong emphasis on worship, service, witness and unity

· A caring church, caring for both members and abroad in the community

· A church rooted in God's Word

The Basis of Union

In recent months a union steering group, comprising representative elders from both Kirk Sessions, has been working through the Basis of Union and then liaising with the Kirk Sessions over this. The Basis of Union is a formal document which the Church of Scotland requires both Kirk Sessions and the Presbytery to agree upon prior to union. It contains ten clauses covering a range of topics, some of which are relatively straightforward e.g. parish boundaries.

One clause covers the name of the united charge. After a process that included consultation with the congregations the name of "Bridge of Weir Parish

Church of Scotland" was agreed.

Two of the clauses covering major items were actually decided at Presbytery level in its Presbytery Mission Plan. The church building chosen as the place of worship for the united charge was the Freeland building. There was to be one minister for the united charge and due to the unrestricted tenure of Rev Gray and the reviewable tenure of Rev Marshall, the Basis of Union proposes that Rev Gray shall be the minister of the united charge. (The reasoning underlying these decisions can be discussed at the congregational meetings noted below).

On 11th November the Kirk Sessions both approved the steering group's draft Basis of Union. This has subsequently been approved by the relevant departments of the central Church of Scotland and been passed back to Clyde Presbytery for approval there, and we trust this will not be withheld.

Timeline for the Next Three Months

In January we will issue the final approved Basis of Union and a background information Question & Answer document for perusal by the congregations. Also in January we will hold two congregational meetings-on Sunday 19th and on Thursday 23rd-where members of the steering group will be available to discuss the proposed union and answer questions.

If members and adherents have any questions they would like answered it would be helpful, where possible, if these could be submitted to the Session Clerks in advance of the

January congregational meetings.

We hope to be in a position to hold the congregational votes on Sunday 23rd February. We require the assistance of Presbytery personnel for the votes. We will confirm the vote date well in advance.

Please note only members or recognised adherents who appear on the congregational rolls will be permitted to vote. If you worship regularly at one of the churches but are unsure of your status please speak to your Minister or Session Clerk by early January to make sure you do not miss out on voting.

The Congregational Votes

All members and adherents will be entitled to vote in person on the designated day.

In Freeland Church there will be one vote along the lines of :-

"Do you agree to Freeland Church entering a Union with St Machar's Ranfurly Church to become the Bridge of Weir Parish Church of Scotland?" Yes or No

In St Machar's Ranfurly Church there will be two votes along the lines of:-

"Do you agree to St Machar's Ranfurly Church entering a Union with Freeland Church to become the Bridge of Weir Parish Church of Scotland?" Yes or No

"Do you agree to accept Rev Kenneth Gray as the minister for the Bridge of Weir Parish Church?" Yes or No

THE UNION - TIME TO VOTE

The vote will be conducted by Presbytery officials at the close of the morning worship services on the designated day. Please note only those physically attending the church that day will be able to vote. There will be no postal or proxy voting (this is Church law). A simple majority will determine the outcome.

If the votes are all positive then further preparations will continue for the formal Union which would take place on 1st October 2025 (or earlier if Rev Hanneke

Marshall has accepted a calling elsewhere before then). The funds and assets of the two churches will be merged. The church building of St Machar's Ranfurly would be sold or otherwise disposed of (timescale not entirely clear yet), and the manse of St Machar's Ranfurly would be sold, let or otherwise disposed of. The proceeds of any property sales would remain locally.

If however one or more of the votes is negative Presbytery would then be remitted with the task of

deciding the way ahead. In the first instance a team from Presbytery would come down and visit the relevant congregation/ congregations to assess matters further before any definitive decisions are undertaken. Members may wish to enquire further about the potential consequences of a "No" majority vote at the congregational information meetings.

In recent months the union steering group, comprising elders and the ministers from both churches, and the

Kirk Sessions have been working well together to progress the union. We recommend to both congregations a positive vote in each instance to secure the healthiest outcome for both current congregations and, most importantly, for the prospective united church.

FROM THE ORGAN LOFT



Over the summer our organ packed in. It did so in spectacular fashion, short circuiting and it is just by a stroke of luck it didn't go up in flames. With the backing of the Kirk Session, and thanks to a very generous anonymous donor we were able to get a replacement procured and installed in time for the autumn term. It took a little while for me to get the volume sorted out. When sitting at the console it sounds very quiet regardless of which stops are used, however, in different parts of the church it sounds quite different. I think I've got it right now! It's a charming little instrument, one which I'm enjoying playing and one which I hope will enhance and enrich our worship for some time to come. With the Christmas Tree Festival looming, I've been able to arrange for seven different organists to come

to the church and play it alongside other musicians and choirs. It'll be interesting to get their feedback and I hope they enjoy playing it. I am actually looking forward to hearing it played by others. In terms of Choir repertoire most decisions have been made about what we are singing up until Watchnight, and I've started to mull over some tunes I'll play at our Christmas Tree Festival and one down in Langbank. I'm sure I've waffled before about the origins of some Christmas tunes. I wonder if you know what connects: Good King Wenceslas, Of the Father's heart begotten, Unto us a boy is born, and, Up! Good Christen folk and listen? The music for each of these carols/hymns is from a book called the Piaie Cantiones from 1582. The Piaie Cantiones is a collection of 74 Latin school and church songs of Finnish origin but first printed in Sweden. A student named Theodoricus Petri made this collection as

he was worried that these important songs were going to be lost at some point in history and needed to be preserved. The songs collected in the anthology are not all Christmas related, and some of aforementioned carols we associate with these seasonal tunes aren't, originally at least, anything to do with Christmas. For example, Of the Father's heart begotten is a communion text, Good King Wenceslas is a text celebrating the joys of spring and fresh flowers, Up! Good Christen folk feels more like a sermon with the first part telling us how good it is to worship God, singing psalms and all brothers are to live according to the monastic code! Verse two tells us not to be like Judas Iscariot but instead lead Godly lives. The Piaie Cantiones whilst popular in Finland and Sweden took a while to reach the UK and it is generally believed that in

1853 a G. J. R. Gordon, Her Majesty's Envoy and Minister at Stockholm, gave a rare and possibly unique copy of the 1582 edition of Piaie Cantiones to the Rev. John Mason Neale. We know Neale as the hymnwriter for many familiar hymns including Christ is made the sure foundation, Good Christians all rejoice, and Of the Father's heart begotten. Two of these melodies coming from the Piaie Cantiones. Indeed, he also wrote the text of Good King Wenceslas! it makes you wonder if Neale hadn't received this gift would we be singing some of our favourite Christmas hymns today and would many of these melodies be familiar to us today. If you want to hear some of the music from the Piaie Cantiones sung in the original texts Andrew Lawrence King has recorded a CD with Finnish musicians called Piaie Cantiones available from all good record stores and music streaming services. Well worth dipping into. Ian Munro

CHURCHES OF THE WORLD

Kallunge Kyrka'' Visby, Gotland, Sweeden



Built in the 12th/13th century it has a Byzantine influence in Swedish art which is shown by the richly decorated walls and ceiling with medieval frescoes and reliefs which although now are quite light and difficult to see are still well preserved .

There is a beautiful baptismal font and the organ is quite unusual.



The church gives its name to the Kallunge codex which is a 1622 collection of choral music.

As always, we attended the annual Remembrance Sunday service here in St Machar's Ranfurly.

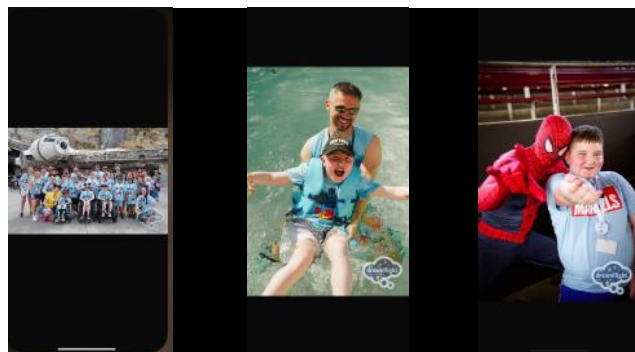
