The Rector Writes

Dear Friends,

In this magazine a year ago this month I reported about the Bishops' report following the Living in Love and Faith process that had been rolled out across the Church of England. The Bishops' Report was then about to go before General Synod for comment.

A year later and we have now received Prayers for Love and Faith (PLF), described by the House of Bishops as a resource to '*make provision for stable, faithful relationships between same-sex couples and for giving thanks for their faithfulness and their fruitfulness in service to God and neighbour.*' Alongside the resource materials there is also a set of guidelines detailing how these prayers are to be used and the process by which parish churches and more particularly parochial clergy can agree to either use them or not.

The PLF resources do not, or at least are not supposed to, provide for a whole, 'stand-alone', service and are intended for use within a church's normal pattern of worship. In addition the guidelines clearly states that '*The Church of England teaches that Holy Matrimony is a lifelong covenant between one man and one woman, blessed by God in creation and pointing to the love between Christ and the Church; a way of life which Christ makes holy.*' For some PLF falls short of what was hoped for whilst for others this is already a step-too-far.

St. Wilfrid's PCC are currently in the process of reviewing the PLF material and considering how we want to respond as a Christian community to the opportunities PLF presents. There is no formal process required for the involvement of the wider congregation but the PCC would be interested in your views so I encourage you to look at the PLF material, it can be found on the Church of England website, just click on the 'Prayer and Worship' tab then 'Worship Texts and Resources'.

This is clearly an emotive and therefore difficult subject to discuss. We want to hold these discussions according to the Pastoral Principles of Acknowledging Prejudice, Speaking into Silence, Addressing Ignorance, Casting Out Fear, Admitting Hypocrisy and Paying Attention to Power. Please pray for your PCC as we seek to listen to God's voice in this discussion.

Ash Wednesday

Ash Wednesday, the first day of Lent, occurs six and a half weeks before Easter (between February 4 and March 11, depending on the date of Easter). Ash Wednesday is a solemn reminder of human mortality and the need for reconciliation with God and marks the beginning of the penitential Lenten season. It is commonly observed with ashes and fasting. Eastern Orthodox churches begin Lent on Clean Monday and therefore do not observe Ash Wednesday.



In the early Christian church, the length of the Lenten celebration varied, but eventually it began 6 weeks (42 days) before Easter. This provided only 36 days of fasting (excluding Sundays). In the 7th century, 4 days were added before the first Sunday in Lent in order to establish 40 fasting days, in imitation of Jesus Christ's fast in the desert.

It was the practice in Rome for penitents and grievous sinners to begin their period of public penance on the first day of Lent in preparation for their restoration to the sacrament of the Eucharist. They were sprinkled with ashes, dressed in sackcloth, and obliged to remain apart until they were reconciled with the Christian community on Maundy Thursday. When these practices fell into disuse (8th–10th century), the beginning of the penitential season of Lent was symbolized by placing ashes on the heads of the entire congregation.



The ashes obtained by burning the palms used on the previous Palm Sunday are applied in the shape of a cross on the forehead of each worshipper on Ash Wednesday. The ashes serve as a memento mori and are often accompanied with some variation of the words, "Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return."

Lenten Compline





Remembering Mallory

This year marks the centenary of the death of Mobberley's most famous son, George Leigh Mallory. George, along with his walking companion Andrew 'Sandy' Irvine, was famously 'lost to human sight' on the 8th June 1924 making an attempt to reach the peak of Mount Everest. St. Wilfrid's has a close connection with the Mallory family as they were, for centuries, the patrons of the parish and a number of the family, including George's father, Herbert, and grandfather, George, were Rectors here and both of them are buried in the graveyard

George's body was found by an expedition specifically put together for the task in 1999. His body was frozen into the surrounding rock and could not be removed without causing enormous damage so instead a cairn was erected over him and a prayer of committal offered.

In this Centenary year there will be a number of events taking place in the early summer. These include events taking place in church. At the moment we have arranged a talk about Mallory by Peter Gillman, the author of the Mallory biography, 'The Wildest Dream'. This will be a ticketed event on **Thursday 23rd May**. On the **Saturday 8th June**, the actual centenary of his death, it is hoped that a commemorative statue to Mallory will be unveiled but also there will be a production of '**Mallory on the Mountain**', a musical by Ollie Mills that was previewed at The Lowry.



I am sure that more events will be announced over the coming months but please put these dates in your diaries, invite some friends to join you, and let us celebrate the life of this extraordinary man.

The Stations of the Cross - an Organ Recital

David Carlston Williams, Director of Music and Organist at St Wilfrid's Church Mobberley, will be performing variations on the 14 Stations of the Cross at 3pm on 17th March 2024.

An accomplished improviser, David will play his own extemporaneous meditations with each station to reflect what is happening to Jesus at the various steps along the Via Dolorosa, the path that He walked on the way to His crucifixion.



David's inspiration for his musical stations comes in part from Marcel Dupré, a 20th century composer and organist whose improvised meditations on the stations in 1931 were based on poems by Frenchman Paul Claudel. Dupré later wrote down his improvised work, and his version of the stations is still performed.

David wants to keep doing things he has never done before. He has never done stations before, and, given this will be Passion Sunday, he thought it would be a great offering to foster the prayers of the stations.

One of the things he loves about improvisation is that it fosters a dialogue between the music and the listener, and because the musician is crafting a composition in real time, specifically for the people listening, it's sort of an intimate dialogue.

For classical musicians to play or sing without notes in front of them is a little like setting out on a car trip without knowing the destination or having a road map as a guide. David won't just wing it, though, when he plays for the stations. He'll go into the afternoon with a plan in mind while also allowing himself the musical freedom to capture the moment and connect with those assembled in the Nave in a prayerful way.



As far as the different stations, you approach each one thinking about the meditation, and that forms what you want to play or convey. For David it's a real way of reflecting on these stations from a purely religious standpoint that he really hasn't done before.

Each station, from the first to the 14th, provides a unique opportunity to relate to Christ on a deeply spiritual level, and David will tailor his selections to each stop that Jesus makes on the road to Calvary.

There are specific things in each station that inspire the music, For example, there are three stations in which Christ falls. For those, he loves to have some kind of connection and some cohesion. Those three stations are united musically, and he'll try to have some cohesion, some kind of musical language that binds things together.


The Magic of the Movies
