September Start-Up

There is a Woody Allen quote, based on an old Yiddish proverb, which goes, "If you want to make God laugh tell him your plans" (you can lump it in with 'The best laid plans of mice and men...' and the more militaristic 'No plan survives first contact with the enemy'). Never has this been truer for us than with our planned return to normality in September.

No sooner had we made the decision we discovered that the Wilmslow Half Marathon, cancelled back in the spring, has been rescheduled for the 12th of September, our second Sunday back and what should be our Pet Service at 10.00 a.m.

We are however undaunted, and so on the 12th

September we shall still have 8.30 a.m. and 6.30
p.m. services but will move the 10 a.m. Pet Service and hold it at 3
p.m. in the afternoon.

I do hope you will be able to come and join us for this service which has become firmly established as one our favourite All-Age services each year.

Dear Friends,

Waiting. It is a word we are all very familiar with, particularly over the last year and a half. It is a word we are all familiar with, but is it one we properly understand? The way we tend to use the word these days is to use it passively, as in biding our time like when waiting for a bus. The word wait however comes originally from Old German what, which is related to the word awake, via the French word waitier which meant 'to be watchful', a sense still retained in the phrase 'to lie in wait'.

Waiting is therefore a proactive word; it defines a period of observing and preparedness. Over the last 18 months the PCC has been waiting, looking and preparing for, the end of lockdown. We have invested in new technology in the church building, a process that is still ongoing, allowing us to present material in a much clearer and more flexible way, as well as allowing us to live stream services.

We have also, in this time, bought the property on Town Lane which we are in the process of refurbishing to use as a Parish room for services, Bible studies, Messy Church and meetings, as well as serving refreshments at coffee mornings, parish lunches etc. All of this has been undertaken recognising the positives in waiting and not the negatives.

But there is another word that we can understand in two different ways, and that word is disturbed. The two meanings of the word are well summed up in an old saying about the mission of the Church - the Church is here to comfort the disturbed and disturb the comfortable. There has been a great deal of disturbance over the last year and a half, and it is easy to list the deluge of problems we have had to face and deal with, but it is also true that this disturbance has created lots of opportunities. It takes a deliberate act of will in times of great disturbance to lay the problems aside and instead focus on the opportunities that are being created.

That is where we are at now in our church. We need to, not forget, but set aside the problems, the disappointments, the sadness and instead look at the opportunities that lie before us, especially in the light of the steps we have taken since March last year. We move forward remembering the words in Lamentation 3:22, "The steadfast love of the Lord never ceases, his mercies never come to an end; they are new every morning; great is your faithfulness.

The Clergy Covenant



The Covenant for Clergy Care and Wellbeing was made an Act of Synod at the February 2020 Group of Sessions of the General Synod. The Covenant is the expressed view of the mind of the Church of England on issues relating to clergy care and wellbeing. This is the second major piece of work to come down to the Parishes from General Synod (see the next page also) and it seeks to engage congregation more deeply in the conversation

around this issue. General Synod has produced a range of resources to encourage reflection and discussion. For congregations Synod has approved a paper entitled, 'A Document For Reflection and Action For Local Congregations' the preface of which includes the following words -

We are inviting local congregations to give some thought to the care and wellbeing of the clergy who serve you... It is up to you what action you take as a result of these conversations. We encourage you to undertake this as part of a conversation with your local clergy, while respecting the boundaries that they may wish to put on the exercise. Don't be afraid to show your support and concern, but do so sensitively. We hope you have a useful conversation about how best to care for those who serve your congregation and neighbourhood.

With the Standing Committee's approval we have pencilled in the PCC meeting on the 21st September to discuss these matters.

Living in Love & Faith

The Church of England is keenly aware that issues of gender and sexuality are intrinsic to people's experience; their sense of identity; their lives and the loving relationships that shape and sustain them. We also know that the life and mission of our Church – and of the worldwide Anglican Communion – are affected by the deep, and sometimes painful, disagreements among us which have been debated and discussed on many occasions over the years.



These divisions have come into sharper focus because of society's changing perspectives and practices, especially in relation to lesbian, gay, transgender, bisexual and intersex people.

The Church wants to understand what it means to follow Christ in love and faith given the questions about human identity and the variety of patterns of relationship emerging in our society, including marriage, civil partnership, cohabitation, celibacy and friendship.

We hope that people in worshipping communities across the country will get involved and use the resources to learn together. That is why there is a range of resources in a variety of formats. The hope is for people in Church of England churches across the country to use the LLF resources to study and pray together. The resources are designed to encourage and enable engagement and learning in a variety of settings. This church-wide learning together, listening to one another, and listening to God is part of discerning a way forward for the Church of England in relation to matters of identity, sexuality, relationships and marriage. The purpose of the resources is to enable the Church of England churches across the country to participate in a

process of learning and praying together as part of discerning a way forward in relation to matters of identity, sexuality, relationships and marriage.

We shall be running the 5-week LLF course through our regular Doorway Group that meets each Thursday at 7.30 p.m. It is our hope and



expectation that we shall be able to meet in person at our room on Town Lane and the course will run from the 16th September – 14th October inclusively

A Standing Order is easy to set up, you can use the form above. Simply fill it in and hand it in to your local bank. This is a Standing Order so you determine how much you give, and you alone can alter it.
