

Dear Friends,

At our mid-week service recently I was speaking about the two recent referenda that have been held, one over Scottish Independence and the other over Brexit. There were strong opinions, and at times some degree of anger, displayed on both sides of each debate and, interestingly, each side thought that not only were they right but theirs was the only sensible and logical argument. What then transpired, in both cases, was an almost equally divided electorate, 55%-45% in Scotland, 52%-48% for Brexit.

This indicated then that there was no clear and obvious answer to these questions and whether you were in the majority or the minority, you were only just so! Those things that seem so reasonable, so obvious and so right are only so to us and we cannot assume that other people hold the same opinions, and we need to be careful in believing that they are wrong not to.

One of the aspects of faith that is usually ignored is doubt. Doubt is not the opposite of faith, rather it is our faith that causes us to doubt, that causes us to question, causes us to explore and grow and learn. When Jesus called his disciples together he could have locked them up in a castle, in a little holy Huddle where they were never confronted by the vagaries of the world, but he didn't. That wasn't how the gospel message was going to be spread. Instead he sent them out into the world, he sent them out to struggle and to question and to face things they had never encountered or seen before.

They didn't always get things right and Jesus had to chastise them on the number of occasions, but it was through their encounters, and through their tellings off that they learnt and grew in knowledge and in faith. This reminds us of the need for humility, for recognising that we do not have all the answers, all the insight, all the knowledge, all the truth. Sometimes we allow ourselves to be blinded by arrogance or prejudice.

I came across a wonderful quote by the theoretical physicist Richard Feynman which sum it up nicely, "most of your actions are based on incomplete knowledge and you really don't know what it is all about, or what the purpose of the world is, or know a great deal of other things. It is possible to live and not know." That is why God calls us to walk with him, for he alone knows all things and possesses the full truth.
