Annual Pet Service



Our annual service of the Blessing of the Pets takes place on Sunday the 11th September. We include this service within our celebration of harvest, which began with the keeping of Lammas Day and ends with our Harvest festival at the start of October.

This is a slightly shorter service than normal, even for an All-Age Service, and within it the pets are brought to the front to receive a blessing. Please be aware that the majority of the pets brought are dogs which can make the church a stressful environment for some cats and other animals of a nervous disposition.

The Rector Writes

Dear Friends,

Whilst looking around Grassington Parish Church (I think) there was, on the wall an ancient memorial plaque to a lady which read something like, 'Sacred to the Memory of *Agnes Little*, died 22nd March 1487, buried 27 March 1488'. When I first read it I thought something dreadful had happened to her, that perhaps she was been lost in a cave or down a well for a year. It was only later that I realised that in Western Europe new year was celebrated not on the 1st January but on the 25th March, the Feast of the Annunciation. This is why (after later tinkering) the tax year still ends on the 3rd April. It seems so normal for us that the 1st of January is the start of the year, but there isn't any real reason for it.

To me, September always has something of a new year feel to it, and not just because I am married to a teacher. This doesn't make sense in terms of the life of the Church, in the liturgical calendar we are drifting slowly though 'Ordinary Time', still a long way of from the explosion of activity in November.

But, whilst that might be true of the normal Liturgical year, it doesn't reflect what is happening 'on the ground'. Following the slow months after Easter, from September onwards we find ourselves undertaking a continuous journey from the thanksgiving of our Pet Service, the Festivals of Harvest, St. Wilfrid and All Saints, through the sombre commemorations of All Souls' Day and Remembrance Sunday through to the crowning celebration of Christ the King and, with the start of the official Church year, the anticipation and excitement of Advent.

As you are no doubt aware, the PCC are holding an Away Day on the 10th September to consider our steps as we move on from Covid, and what we shall be discussing is about how we can bring more people along on this journey with us. The last couple of years have been reminiscent of being on a route march, constantly plodding on, trying to adapt to ever changing conditions, planning for things that might either not happen or be radically changed.

I dearly hope that as we move into the autumn of this year it truly can be a fresh, new, start. That we might travel on in hope rather than in fear, with excitement rather than trepidation, and with our energies renewed. Let us make this September, as we look forward to all that lies ahead, truly be a happy new year for us at St. Wilfrid's and for the whole of our community of Mobberley.

Covid & Beyond



Has Covid come to an end? Will it ever end? How do we move forward in a post-Covid world? What have we learned over the last 2½ years? When I first came to St. Wilfrid's the church here was in the midst of some quite drastic change, one of which was a change to both our service patterns and to our liturgy. One of the things I was tasked with was to develop a pattern of services that would refresh and re-energise our worship. It wasn't easy but over 12 or so months we created a new pattern of worship that has remained largely unchanged and is still the pattern we follow today. The question is, particularly in the light of what has taken place over the last couple of years, should we?

Our congregation and membership is very different from what it was 15 years ago, society is very different from what it was 15 years ago, and our church resources both for good and ill are very different. Does our current pattern, style and even place of worship still meet the needs of our regular congregations? Does our pattern and style of services speak to, and meet the needs of, those who attend only irregularly? Also, how do we speak to, and meet the needs of, the vast majority of people in Mobberley who never come to church or perhaps do so only at Christmas? These are questions that, if we take them seriously, involve very complex issues such as what is the purpose of the Church, what is the purpose of worship, what role does worship play in Christian mission and outreach?



To help us explore these topics the PCC will be undertaking an Away Day to the Diocesan Retreat House at Foxhill, Frodsham on **Saturday the 10th September** to pray, think and talk through the above questions and, I suspect, many more also. We do not know the answers to these questions and there is no ulterior motive, agenda or predetermined goal other than to ensure our worship is an acceptable offering to God, feeds those who attend and, hopefully, appeals more to those who don't but to whom we are called to both serve and witness. Everyday Faith



Everyday Faith is an initiative across the Church of England to enable the whole people of God to live out the Good News of Jesus confidently in all of life, Sunday to Saturday.

'That's where it's all at. Being a Christian isn't about going to church on a Sunday. It's about being there in the real world, being consistent'

Faith informs our thinking and our actions as we discern how God might be using us in his work. Faith is an ongoing encounter with God. Faith is our everyday existence with the God who holds all things together.

Everyday Faith is a series of reflections, prayers and real life stories, such as the ones highlighted, to help all Christians in their own vocation and ministry find and follow God in everyday life.
