

Remembrance

On Sunday the 20th of September 2020, Westminster Abbey marked the 80th anniversary of the Battle of Britain with a Service of Thanksgiving and Rededication. The one hundred and twelve-day fight for control of Britain's skies, between July and October 1940, was the first decisive battle in history fought entirely in the air. It proved to be a dramatic turning point in the 2nd World War.


The service included an Act of Remembrance during which the Battle of Britain Roll of Honour was borne through the Abbey, escorted by serving Royal Air Force pilots and aircrew, and placed beside the High Altar. The roll contains the names of 1,497 pilots and aircrew killed or wounded during the Battle.

The Address was given by the Venerable (Air Vice-Marshal) John Ellis, Chaplain-in-Chief of the Royal Air Force, who spoke of the dedication and sacrifice of the Battle of Britain generation. He concluded his address by saying:

> Today our gratitude, our thanksgiving focusses on those who fought 80 years ago. Those who still inspire the Royal Air Force of today, a force which continues to protect our nation with sacrificial service. We are not here, however, to passively honour their efforts but to commit ourselves to serve with determination and courage for all that is right and true.

Earlier in his address, the Chaplain-in-Chief, reflecting on the present circumstances we find ourselves in, said this:

> Like so many things in our lives over the past months, today's thanksgiving and rededication is different. A difference that is determined by our fight against an invisible enemy, COVID-19. And once again we have a front line, one that has seen a great cost borne by the National Health Service and its support staff as well as countless key workers. Once again there have been sacrifices made, often quiet, often humble and unnoticed by many.



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
The common themes throughout the Chaplain-in-Chief's address were:

courage; sacrifice; and service.

Without these qualities we are less-than human and certainly less-than Christian.

The example of Christ challenges us all to act in the interest of others rather than of ourselves. And so, we each must ask ourselves - to what degree is my life built around the principle of selfishness rather than that of selflessness? As new coronavirus restrictions are applied, how do I respond selflessly and how might I respond to the selfishness of others?

The occasions for Remembrance during this month of November will provide us with times of gratitude for what was achieved in the darkest moments of war.

But on my next promotion it all went horribly wrong, things came crashing down with a loud thump.

On this night we had as usual a full house, two rooms of jazz funk and soul, everything was pumping and the crowd was having a fantastic night.

A small light had gone out and for a long time I had no intention of putting it back on. It was well over a year before I had any interest in promoting again. It did come back and in the next issue I will tell you how.



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Monthly Recipe

Fleetwoods Butchers

Chicken pasta bake

Preparation time - 30 mins, cooking time - 45 mins, serves 4/6

Ingredients

- 4 tbsp olive oil
- 1 onion chopped
- 2 garlic cloves crushed
- ¹/₄ tsp chilli flakes
- 2 x cans chopped tomatoes
- 1 tbsp caster sugar
- 6 tbsp mascarpone
- 4 skinless chicken breasts cut into strips
- 300g penne pasta
- 70g grated cheddar cheese
- 50g grated mozzarella cheese
- Small bunch parsley finely chopped

Method

- 1. Heat 2 tbsp of the oil in a pan over a medium heat and fry the onion gently for 10-12 mins. Add the garlic and chilli flakes and cook for 1 min. Tip in the tomatoes and sugar and season to taste. Simmer uncovered for 20 mins or until thickened, then stir through the mascarpone.
- 2. Heat 1 tbsp of oil in a non-stick frying pan. Season the chicken and fry for 5-7 mins or until the chicken is cooked through.

3. Heat the oven to 220C/200C fan/gas 7. Cook the penne following pack instructions. Drain and toss with the remaining oil. Tip the pasta into a medium sized ovenproof dish. Stir in the chicken and pour over the sauce. Top with the cheddar, mozzarella and parsley. Bake for 20 mins or until golden brown and bubbling.

Gorleston have continued to strengthen their squad with two marquee signings.

They shocked the local football scene with the signing of Chris Henderson from Kings Lynn. Hendo was a Gorleston player at just 16 years old before he went up through the leagues and he has spent the last few seasons in the National League with Lynn.

The Butlers then sprang another surprise with the signing of Christy Finch from Stowmarket. Finch had scored 83 goals in 112 games for Gorleston before leaving six seasons ago and playing a couple of leagues higher.

y through the second. Joe Corby (left) pulled a goal back and only the goalpost denied George Yusuff a last minute equaliser.

Unbeaten Norwich Utd then came to Emerald Park and Gorleston absolutely dominated the first

half, going into the break one nil up thanks to a Connor Ingram goal. It all went wrong in the second half though and United won the match 4-1.

It was another 4-1 defeat in their next match, away at Mildenhall, despite Chris Henderson (below) putting the Greens ahead in the fourth minute.



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Gorleston Reserves lost away at Heacham before beating Kirkley & Pakefield 4-1 thanks to a Declan Allan hat trick and one from Elliott Hannant.



Next was a 1-1 draw at Easton, with Jason Thompson the scorer. Then came a resounding 10-2 victory over Thetford Rovers. This time Joe Corby scored a hat trick, Declan Allan, Jason Thompson and Jake Ward hit two each and David Shade scored the other.

Wesley Solomon has now been appointed as the Reserve Team Manager.

The Under 18s beat Norwich Utd 2-0 to move top of their league, but haven't played a league game since due to wet weather. However, they did play a game in the FA Youth Cup away at Saffron Walden but, sadly, lost.

The A Team have played three, lost three since the season started. The Womens team narrowly lost 1-2 to to Thorpe in their first game with Ellie Hills scoring. They were then beaten by league leaders Bungay.

November sees the first team play four fixtures at Emerald Park. Thetford, who seem to be the Greens bogey side recently, Newmarket and Haverhill Rovers all visit, as do one of the title favourites, Stowmarket Town.

The men were angry because the king had treated them badly and they didn't like it.

The story is remembered each 5th November when 'Guys' are burned in a celebration known as "Bonfire Night".

Gorleston Then & Now

The Cliff Hotel was an imposing building overlooking the beach and harbour, which opened in 1898. On Boxing Day 1915 the hotel was completely destroyed by fire, which had rapidly spread through the building by a strong south-westerly gale. The fire is believed to have started in one of the bedrooms, not by the events of the First World War. In 1977, a Second World War pill box (a concrete defence structure) was demolished on the site of the former hotel and a number of flats were built called Grenfell Court. Dr. Wilfred Grenfell, a prominent doctor helping sailors and a medical missionary to Newfoundland, was a frequent guest at the Cliff Hotel. The present Cliff Hotel building is based on the annexe of the older building which survived the fire.

All those of us who live anywhere
near it, know without doubt that

The great preacher Billy Graham was once asked on television: "Do you believe that you will go to heaven?" Most certainly" he replied. "Isn't that rather arrogant?" said the interviewer. "I know I'm going to heaven" replied Billy Graham, "not because of anything I have done but solely because of what Jesus Christ has done for me."


Such a dialogue presupposes two things: that there is a life after this one, known as heaven; and that the only way we are able to get there is by placing our faith in what Jesus did by dying on the cross, and not in ourselves. Are these true? What does the Bible actually say?

There are many passages in the New Testament which speak clearly of a life beyond the grave. The longest and fullest teaching is found in the writings of St Paul, especially in the 15th chapter of his First Letter to the Corinthians. He first argues that the proof of our own resurrection from the dead is Jesus' own resurrection from the dead. Because Jesus was raised, so shall all who belong to him also be raised. The chapter ends with a description of the glory, splendour and power of our resurrection bodies when we shall be clothed in immortality.

Perhaps the best known descriptions of heaven are found in the final two chapters of the last book of the Bible, "Revelation." The words of chapter 21 verses 1-6 are often read at Funeral Services: "I saw a new heaven and a new earth, for the first heaven and the first earth had passed away ... I saw the Holy City, the new Jerusalem, coming down out of heaven from God, prepared as a bride beautifully dressed for her husband. And I heard a loud voice from the throne saying, "Now the dwelling of God is among people, and he will dwell with them. They will be his people, and God himself will be with them and be their God. He will wipe every tear from their eyes. There will be no more death or mourning or crying or pain, for the old order of things has passed away."

Next month we will look at other passages in the Bible and hopefully answer more of those questions about the life to come and how we can be sure that we will go there.







All those of us who live anywhere near it, know without doubt that Gorleston Beach is lovely, a delight, just what a beach should be. Beautiful sand, especially at the Pier end, safe bathing in clean water with a gentle slope and vigilant life-guards, lovely walks along the shoreline out to Hopton, great for kids, tasty chips and cheap

ice-cream. What more could you want?

I was sitting one morning, going through my regular breakfast routine of cereal and two cups of tea whilst reading the paper, when an interesting article caught my eye. Apparently, our beach was placed in the Top Ten of British beaches in the Trip Advisor "Travellers' Choice Awards". It was rated the fourth best in all England, behind only Bournemouth, Woolacombe in Devon and Filey in Yorkshire but ahead of Perranporth in Cornwall! Praise indeed.

It looks as if our beach's fame has spread beyond locals and other Norfolk folk who come to enjoy the Clifftop Festival at the end of July. It must have spread far wider to get the rating that it has. It can't just be the "Yesterday" effect either as the survey predated the summer screening of Danny Boyle's feel-good movie.

Mind you Danny Boyle was definitely a fan. Those of us who joined the record crowd call on the beach when the shooting was being done will no doubt recall his gushing comments about the helicopter camera shots that he was seeing. The helicopter was coming in from the Lowestoft end and he described the pictures as showing the long empty beach with a tiny black dot at the far end. As the helicopter came along the beach, he said that the black dot morphed into a crowd of 6000 people. A really good indication of just how much sand there is!

Another nice thing about our beach is its cleanliness. One of my sons was staying with his young family and my daughter-in-law had rashly promised to take a shell home for her little niece. Now shells are few and far between on the main stretch of the shoreline, although there are a few to be found as you get nearer to Hopton. They were all making a bee-line for the wonderful Pirate Boat as usual, so the duty of shell hunting fell to me. So I diligently scoured the shoreline all the way from the carpark end, all the way to the Ravine. Not a single shell to be found, but on the way I thought that I might as well collect litter. In all that distance, on a bright summer's day, I only managed to find two small pieces of litter. What a treat, let's keep it that way! We should be in the Nation's top ten beaches

Hair We Are

If it was not so serious it would be fun!!! Running a business in the current climate is probably one of the most challenging things that I have been involved with and ever done in a management career spanning over 30 years.

We are not running one business any more we are running multiple businesses all at the same time.

As well as running a hairdressing salon in very challenging times we are also running another business to make sure that we are adhering to all the necessary rules and regulations that Covid-19 has brought us.

We used to have the girls trained up to WOW the client when they walked into the salon, cared and looked after them to the best of their ability, with all the comforts enjoyed from visiting the hairdressers. Greeting the client, taking their coat, booking them in, sitting them down in the waiting area, offering them refreshments from the Fusion Menu, giving the client a good consultation to discuss what they were requiring, taking them to the spa to wash their hair and give them a nice Indian Head massage, back into the salon for the service, gowning them up, offering more refreshment, finishing the service, taking the client to reception , taking the bill, getting the client's coat, holding the door and waving goodbye.

Now let's take that again in today's current climate, Client

comes into the salon greeted by our incredible reception team, they have to take the client's temperature and record it on the system for track and trace, Get the client to scan the NHS Covid-19 app, again for track and trace, Issue

the client with their PPE equipment in a disposable bag, that is Mask, disposable Gown and disposable towel, being careful to social distance all the time, sit the

client down in the reception waiting area. The client can then take their own coat off and put into their bag that is now empty after removing their disposable equipment. Reception then has to let the stylist know their client has arrived. Stylist has to be all Piped up with Disposable apron, Mask, Visor and gloves then talk to client in the consultation area from a social distance 2m. Take client to Spa area adhering to the one way system round the salon and making sure that there is space available (We have five washbasins but only use three to enable social distancing





to take place). Wash client's hair and take client to a station to have their service, that could mean one of the chairs on the shop floor or if client requests it one of the 4 isolating rooms we have available where the only persons in the room are the stylist and Client. Once the service is





finished, the client is led to reception whilst again obeying the one way system around the salon. All disposable equipment is taken off and put in a waste bin with a lid and disposed of in a safe way, taking the bill is done in a very strange way with reception sitting down behind a partition, with visors on so there is no possible contact with the

client, card is preferred method of payment and contactless is used wherever possible. Client is then ready to leave the salon.

Working to these restrictions have proved difficult and challenging for all, with not only the stylists making sure they are all PPE'd up and remembering to follow all the rules all of the time but also for all of those others running businesses in the high St not only hairdressing salons, as I am sure every small business has its own challenges. Social distancing for some has meant restricted number of clients and customers coming in thus bringing down the business turnover, whilst still having to cover the same bills as normal.

The cost of PPE, has now started to come down in price, Thank goodness!! But it has been very expensive, with the cost of gloves, masks, visors, gowns being extortionate and driven by demand at the very start after lockdown when we re-opened on July 4th.

Wages went up for staff whilst we were in Lockdown, as they do yearly and thank god for the furlough system whilst we were closed, yet I am very proud to say that in 20 years of Tanya and myself running Fusion we have never ever put our prices up. We have a salon that provides services for all types of clients, from those that do not want to pay more than £20 for a cut and finish, up to those that want the most experienced of stylists and can pay up to £75 for a cut and finish. The only thing we have added to our services is a

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charge of $\pounds 3.60$ to help cover some of the PPE charges and equipment we have had to buy to adhere to the government requirements. Even that $\pounds 3.60$ we are charged with VAT so we actually only get $\pounds 3$.

Hospitality/restaurants have been challenged with similar restrictions including restricted opening hours.

So running a business in the current climate is very challenging but when you are in business it is just another hurdle to get over, keeping staff motivated is difficult with all the precautions and rules. Balancing the books is a challenge, as I have explained with all the ongoing costs. VAT is a huge burden with every service the government gets 20% so a middle of the road £40 service we get £32 with £8 being tax.

As I have said because we train our own from school and through the apprenticeship programme, there is always someone qualifying and coming through on the ladder to start at £20. These newly qualified stylists have been through a stringent 2 year apprenticeship programme and have passed an End Point Assessment, so they are really well qualified when they come on the shop floor, and the £20 start price is for them to start their careers and help them to build a column.

As they get more professional and build their columns they get promoted and go up to £25, and that is how we price tier right through with stylists till we get to where a stylist works smart rather than hard, our top stylists on £75 a cut and finish only need to do 2 clients a day where a lower stylist would need to do nearly 8 clients to earn the same money. So the higher the price the more experienced stylist you get and that is not just in cutting and colouring hair because they can all do that from the day of qualifying as

a stylist, but you get more time with them and longer to sit back and relax and enjoy being pampered.

We understand peoples worries of coming out of their homes into a salon environment but we are completely happy Fusion is as safe a place as there is under the current climate, our staff and clients health is taken very seriously, every member of staff has taken a Covid-19 VTCT course and qualified with a certificate, we have a private entrance for clients that don't want to come in the main door on the High St, we have private rooms where there would be only the stylist and the client themselves and also if necessary provide a pickup service, we are doing everything we can to help there not to be a second lockdown.

Small businesses will find it a challenging time if there was to be another lockdown, it will already take many months to get over the first lockdown and get back to where we were this time last year.

So yes, managing a business these days takes a lot of blood sweat and tears, and I probably speak for most of the small businesses in our area and all over the UK. Not all will

survive, not all will want to survive with all the stress and worry of it, but one thing's for sure there isn't one business out there that won't have given it a good go!!

Good luck to every business out there everywhere but most of all stay safe and look after yourselves and your family.




Working with businesses to tackle coronavirus

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

Stereoscopic View of the old Look-Out on Gorleston Pier

This 1890s stereoscopic view of the old Look-Out Gorleston Pier was on published by Fortescue Mann of Elgin Avenue, London W and was number 37 in his "Stereoscopic Views of Yarmouth & Neighbourhood" series. This was a collection of 60 stereoviews that sold for sixpence each in a number of retail shops in the Great Yarmouth and Gorleston areas. On the back of the card all 60 views in the series are listed and prospective purchasers were informed that they "Can be obtained of all principal Fancy Dealers and Stationers in Yarmouth and Gorleston." Mann also published some other views of Great Yarmouth in his much larger "Modern" Series that included views taken in many other British towns and cities as well as Great Yarmouth.

John Fortescue Mann was born at Swineshead in Huntingdonshire in 1849,



and was the son of John and Elizabeth Mann, his mother's maiden name was Fortescue. When John married Margaret Mary Grace Eggleton at Paddington on the 23rd December 1874 he was already trading as a "Tobacconist" from 48 Elgin Road Paddington.

By 1880 he was offering a picture framing service and by 1885 he had diversified further and become a stationer trading from both 48 and 50 Elgin Road. (Elgin Road became Elgin Avenue in the 1890s.) Mann began publishing stereoscopic slides by British photographers from around 1890 with his "Views of all parts of the World, London and Environs, Windsor Castle, Life at the Seaside, &c." He was also importing stereoviews of and from the United States of America, Europe, Egypt and the Holy Land by other photographers. In 1892 Fortescue Mann advertised "The Improved American Hand Stereoscope" a low cost 3D viewer for stereoscopic slides that sold for three shillings. It was the availability of these viewers that revived the interest in collecting stereoviews in Britain during the 1890s. Stereoscopic views had been taken and sold at Great Yarmouth in the 1860s and had become a collecting craze in that decade. However their popularity waned in the

1870s but was revived in the 1890s with the availability of low cost American style hand viewers.

It is by no means certain that John Fortescue Mann was the photographer that took the stereoviews of Great Yarmouth and Gorleston but he did have ten Stereoscopic Transparencies exhibited in the prestigious Forty-First Annual Exhibition of the Royal Photographic Society held at the Gallery of the Royal Society of Painters in Water Colours in Pall Mall East from September to November 1896. One of these was of "Yarmouth Life-Boat" and another was of "Fritton Lake, Norfolk." So it seems reasonable to assume that he took the Yarmouth series of stereoviews when he was visiting the area.

John Fortescue Mann died in the Middlesex Hospital on the 3rd November 1897 age 48. His family kept the business going and a picture framing business was still trading as Fortescue Mann in the 1940s according to the Post Office London Trade Directory of 1940.

World Mental Health Day 2020

On Friday 9th October we marked World Mental Health Day (Saturday 10th October) at the Academies. We believe that it is particularly important to highlight the importance of maintaining good mental health in developing minds, especially in the current climate!

We invited children in both academies to attend school wearing anything yellow in recognition of this. During the day we took time to focus on the theme of mental health; discussing



issues, coping s t r a t e g i e s, resilience, and helpful ways to share our problems.

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Whilst so much has changed in our lives over the past few months, it is still likely that fireworks will continue to plague the lives of many pets. With this in mind we have put together some tips to keep your pets safe and well at this time of year.



Firstly, try to make sure all pets are inside well before darkness falls. Lock the cat flap and take dogs on a good walk during the day to tire them out. Also – if you have any outdoor pets (such as pet rabbits or guinea pigs), make sure you cover their cages with a thick blanket to muffle the noise, and provide lots of bedding.

Making a den is an excellent idea for dogs. Any small space

will do – cover it over, put their bed inside, add a few treats and encourage them to rest in it. Also, putting the TV on and closing the curtains will disguise the sounds and will help make things seem as "normal" as possible.



Many stressed pets will benefit from calming supplements, or anti-anxiety pheromones (Adaptil for dogs and Feliway for cats). These both provide gentle, but effective, ways to help them relax. These should be started at least 48 hours before fireworks are due to start.

Noise desensitisation programmes are available free on the Dogs Trust website and these can be effective if started well in advance.

Local vicar awarded the British Empire Medal in recognition of COVID-19 community work

The Revd Matthew Price, Vicar of St Mary Magdalene Church in Gorleston has been awarded a British Empire Medal (BEM) in the Queen's Birthday 2020 Honours List.

In June, The Queen agreed to defer publication of the list to provide an opportunity to recognise some of those involved in the response to the COVID-19 pandemic. Matthew has been nominated for his "contribution to the Coronavirus response, and as an exemplar of the wide range and exceptional community and front-line service given across the country in recent months."

Matthew said: "I feel very honoured and completely blown away. As the pandemic unfolded, we simply tried to live out Jesus' command to love our neighbour which is at the heart of both the Christian faith and my calling as a parish Vicar. I never expected any sort of recognition, but it is lovely that our efforts have been recognised. I'm also really aware that our community response was a massive team effort, both from members of St Mary Magdalene, other local churches, and the wider community, so I see the award as recognising everyone who contributed to that



effort."

Working in partnership with other local organisations, Matthew and his small team co-ordinated a group of over

> 100 local volunteers delivering, driving, collecting, phoning, praying, donating, doorknocking, cooking, cleaning, organising, packing and doing desk work such as databases and references.

Matthew continues: "From mid-March to the end of July, we delivered 1,793 food parcels, serving 1,150 different people (including 370 children). We also delivered cards offering support (via a freephone helpline) to every household in the Parish. This was followed up by a programme of doorto-door welfare checks as the lockdown restrictions began to ease (with the support of the local Police and Borough Council)."

The award will be presented locally by the Lord-Lieutenant and the Revd Price has been told that he will also receive an



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invitation to a Royal Garden Party in due course.

The Bishop of Norwich, The Rt Revd Graham Usher, said, "I am truly delighted that The Revd Matthew Price's contribution to the life of the community of Gorleston has been recognised by HM The Queen with the award of the British Empire Medal. Whilst his modesty as a parish priest will not want any appreciation, Matthew has been a bearer of the light of Jesus Christ during the pandemic and gone the extra mile to care for vulnerable people. Together with the people of Gorleston, I send him my warmest congratulations."

Arriving at St Mary Mags (as it's affectionately dubbed) as Curate-in-Charge in January 2018, then Instituted and Inducted as Vicar in October 2019, Matthew could not have foreseen what would be looming in his local community. He explains what he loves most about his parish:

"The Magdalen estate which makes up the vast majority of the parish often feels like the forgotten part of Gorleston; we are the sixth most deprived parish in the diocese. But the people who live here are genuine and full of life. I love the fact that there is very little pretence; folk wear their hearts on their sleeves and there remains a real sense of community. As a church community, we are seeking to foster and build that. I love the fact that as I walk to the local parade of the shops, I bump into people I know and that the church building sits at the very heart of the estate."

Matthew thinks it's important for the work they have all been doing in the area to get this kind of recognition. "During the pandemic, we saw communities really come together and look out for one another. What we were doing was an expression of that. But it can be hard work. Serving the most vulnerable in society is challenging, draining and can often be overlooked. Recognition such as this is therefore appreciated and motivates us to continue offering the fullness of life that Jesus promised he would bring when he was on earth."

He insists it was a massive team effort. "I would particularly like to thank my wife Anna, who is a massive support and also played a significant role in co-ordinating St Mary Magdalene's community response. Also, Anna Heydon who is a development worker for Imagine Norfolk Together (a joint venture between the Church Urban Fund and the Diocese of Norwich) and who was an invaluable support. The three of us managed the team of over 100 volunteers."

The news of the award came as a complete surprise. "I came home from a meeting to an answerphone message from someone at the Cabinet Office - I listened to the message three times because I couldn't believe that someone from the Cabinet Office would be calling me! When I returned the call, they explained they were following up an email they had sent me the previous week to which they hadn't received a reply. I had never received the email, so they re-sent it and it was a letter telling me that Prime Minister had asked them to inform me that he was recommending me for the honour."



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
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
