Dear Abbey and Dirleton friends,

It seems to be a time of anniversaries just now, and not all are happy ones. It's a year since the invasion of Ukraine, three years since the covid pandemic lockdown, 20 years since the war in Iraq and 30 years since an IRA bombing. The world has never been the same since any of these things happened. Ireland still seeks that elusive harmony, Iraq is a very troubled part of the world, covid is still around us, and war continues in Ukraine.

After Jesus entered Jerusalem for the last time on 'Palm Sunday', he warned of troubles to come: 'wars and rumours of wars', persecution, families betraying each other, false messiahs; and that would just be the start! His words have never been more true.

But Jesus also spoke words of hope and reassurance. He promised the gift of the Holy Spirit to help us, and said that 'whoever stands firm to the end will be saved'. In our world of turmoil and uncertainty, we hold on to those words in faith. As Easter approaches, we also remember that the cross, the empty tomb and his resurrection are the proof of that. Easter is a season of hope. It invites us to look forward in faith. I hope this Easter is a time of hope for you, when you will know the presence of the risen Lord, and the strength of the Holy Spirit.

Easter Sunday 9th April: 8am open-air service near the anchor behind Abbey Church, followed by breakfast in the church hall.


Pastoral Care


King Charles 111 Coronation Teas

Dirleton Kirk Session

We lost our Church Beadle, Nicol McNicoll. Nicol was a faithful servant to Dirleton Kirk for many years, and a familiar face around the village. For so many years he would attend faithfully at Sunday worship to perform his duties. The prohibition on public activity which came with the Covid pandemic brought a suspension of regular, formal worship, and, suffering from declining health, Nicol did not resume his duties when that prohibition was lifted.

Nicol was a boy at Dirleton Primary School when I started there as a four year old pupil. In those days he was distinguished by his greater physical strength, which allowed him, at playtime, to lift other children off the ground; to send the 'Witch's Hat'- the huge, heavy, terrifying old roundabout at the swing park, built out of heavy steel and wood- spinning furiously and crashing from side to side, to shrieks of delight from the cargo of children clutching on for dear life. Or to send us whizzing down the chute at such speed that we would fly off the end and land in a heap. But that strength was never seen to hurt or to intimidate: Nicol's was ever a gentle spirit. When he left school he went on to work for many years at Fenton Barns, travelling there and back daily from Dirleton. He drew

great comfort from being a member of the village community, from being known around the place- serving in the Kirk, sitting in his place in the public bar of the Castle Inn, walking the green enjoying the exercise and the weather. We all mourn him and offer our prayers and good wishes to the McNicoll family.



The Kirk Session met on Wednesday 14th February, and among other matters heard an explanation of the rate of progress in the application for funds to assist in carrying out renovation works on the fabric of the church, and about the split pipe which led to the water emerging from below the ground outside the church hall, which at some point may make it desirable to replace, rather than repair, the pipework to the church and hall. The Treasurer reported that, as we emerge from the pandemic restrictions, our income from hall lets and from weddings held in the Kirk is increasing.

We have for many years been able to enjoy visiting the Kirk at any time, because the door at the Archerfield Aisle was on an automatic lock. This is something which is appreciated greatly, and remarked upon, by our many visitors. This access has been interrupted recently as the lock has been malfunctioning: the company which installed the alarm is attempting to source a necessary replacement part- so bear with us.


As well as being a time when some people decide to “give up” something for the 40 days of Lent, this season of the Christian calendar is also a time for reflection and in writing this, I am reminded that it is now three years since we experienced the first Covid lockdown and the serious impact which that had on the lives of so many and on the work of the church.

At our Kirk Session meeting in February, we reviewed the Abbey Church Vision Statement for the decade of the 2020s. Despite the lockdowns, we have seen encouraging progress in several aspects of the life and witness of the congregation and have achieved some of the goals set out in the original paper in 2019. The updated Vision Statement is contained in the Annual Report and Accounts for the year ended 31 December 2022 which was approved by the Kirk Session on 12 March 2023 and presented to the congregation at the Annual Congregational Meeting on 26 March 2023. I encourage all members and adherents to read through that report (which is available on the church website).

One of the encouraging signs we have seen in church recently has been the attendance of a number of babies (some of whom get their first experience of

worship within the first few weeks of life), toddlers and older children. The Kirk Session has already agreed that one of our priorities should be to re-establish the Sunday morning creche and a review is also being undertaken of the way in which we manage our work with young people and families generally. In the meantime, the monthly Muddy Church events have recommenced, under the leadership of individuals from Abbey Church, St Andrew Blackadder, and St Baldred's.

As we return to something like pre-pandemic normality, it was good to see the first of our monthly services in care homes in our parish in February and March being so well-supported by members. The reaction of the residents in The Abbey Home and Fidra House (who include several members of the congregation) demonstrated how important these short times of worship are to them. We look forward to continuing to hold these services and the services in Astley House will recommence on Easter Sunday.



Following the very generous response to the East Lothian Foodbank Jingle Bags appeal before Christmas, we decided to provide further support prior to Easter and once again, many donations of food (including Easter Eggs) have been received.

Looking ahead, plans are well advanced for the Quiz Night in aid of Christian Aid ((something which before 2020 was an annual event) which will take place in the Abbey Hall on Friday 14 April 2023. Arrangements are also in hand for teas and coffees on Monday 8 May 2023 to mark the Coronation of King Charles III. A similar event to mark Her Late Majesty's 70 years on the throne took place in June 2022 and it was felt appropriate to do something similar on this special occasion. There will be no charge for attendance but donations to support the work of Christian Aid and the East Lothian Foodbank will be welcomed.

Other than being advised that the Mission Review Panel has now been asked to consider our request that the decisions of the Presbytery of Lothian affecting the future ministry in our parish should be reviewed, we have no further information on this issue. The Panel has been given up to three months in which to consider the matter.

I wish you all every blessing for the remaining period of Lent, for Holy Week and for the Easter weekend when we will have the opportunity to celebrate Christ's resurrection from the cross for our sakes.

The next meeting of the Kirk Session will take place on 27 March 2023.

Connections Getting Stronger

Did you know that Abbey Church has played a crucial role in the development of a unique local charity called North Berwick Coastal Community Connections? Launched in April 2019 by the North Berwick Coastal Health and Well Being Association, with initial Area Partnership funding, our task was always to tackle loneliness and social isolation in the area.

That summer we started the legendary Scone Cafe gatherings, thanks to Dorothy Kirkpatrick's brilliant idea, her incredible scones and Abbey Church's generous free let of the small hall from that time onwards. Our work is to connect anyone (18+) into community activities they'd like to take part in. Referrals come from health professionals, friends, family, anyone in the community - including church members.



In 2020 we swiftly reworked our services in response to Covid, retrained and introduced 1:1 Befriending and Buddy Walking, which continue to help those who've lost social or physical confidence and need support before they are ready to access group situations again. For nearly two years I was sole member of staff, but

then we gained Lottery, North Berwick Trust and other funding. Now there are five part time staff and over 40 highly-valued volunteers, including several Abbey Church members who contribute greatly. We have worked with over 150 clients, reintroduced the legendary Scone Café from last year, plus group walks, our Community Connections newsletter, the Compassionate Neighbours project (working with those facing end of life) and the new Stronger Connections mental well-being awareness project partnership.

Everyone is welcome to the Scone Café in the Small Hall on Wednesday afternoons (2-3.30) - Dorothy's scones are still the star attraction. We're dog friendly, free but donations welcome, friendly and relaxed. We might play the odd game, have a visiting speaker or music at times and are open to your ideas. Drop by and join us, or bring a neighbour you think might enjoy it.

Our greatest need is for Buddy Walkers to help folk on our waiting list, following a short training course to set you



up. The next available Walk Leader training is on Thursday 27th April, 9.30am-1pm on Zoom (more details on request) Soon we will also be offering our core in-house NBCCC volunteer training again.

This is a charity to be proud of, and Abbey Church's support to us is a tremendous example of practical Christianity in action. We can't thank you all enough.

WALT - Women Are Learning Together

At our March meeting we investigated the life of Dorcas in the book of Acts chapter 9. She is only mentioned in a few verses and yet we found that this special lady had so much to teach us. She was the only individual woman in the Bible to be referred to as a disciple. We discussed what it means to be a 'disciple' of Jesus and looked at the references in the scriptures about 'good works'. Dorcas used her gift of sewing to help widows and poor folk in her community and as she met with these people she provided not only for their physical needs but their spiritual needs as she shared her faith too. She was highly respected and when she died, her friends sent for Peter, who through the power of Jesus, brought her back to life.

To this day, Dorcas is remembered all over the world as there are many Dorcas Societies providing help to vulnerable and impoverished people. If you Google 'Dorcas Societies' you can find out more information. Everyone of us has been given gifts, skills, talents by God and no matter how insignificant we may think they are, we should use them and give thanks to God for them.
