This month's Pastoral Letter is from Jeanette Wilson, Candidate for the Ministry, who has been serving her 10-week placement with us this summer.

To my church family in Dirleton and Abbey,

Doesn't time fly! I can't believe that I only have a few weeks left with you all. What appeared at the start as a significant amount of time has passed by quickly. I have thoroughly enjoyed my time getting to know you all and being involved in ministry, in all its forms. I want to thank each of you for your welcome, hospitality and above all your prayers as I have been here. It has been an enriching time for me and hopefully for you while I have been among you. One of the practises that is encouraged while training, is the art of reflection. Spending time looking back, whether minutes, hours, days or longer and evaluating what has been good and learning lessons from what hasn't gone so well. This is not a practise that comes easily to me, but I have come to realise its usefulness in my progress. There will be much to reflect upon and take with me into my future ministry. We are in a period of change in the Church of Scotland and some of these changes are difficult and not what we would have chosen for ourselves. At this point it is easy to look back and linger on how things were, like Haggai 2:3, declaring that 'it is not like it used to be.' 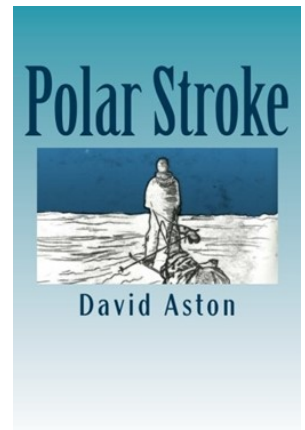
Hot drinks will be available from 1:45 and all women are warmly invited to join our relaxed study group so that we can learn together.

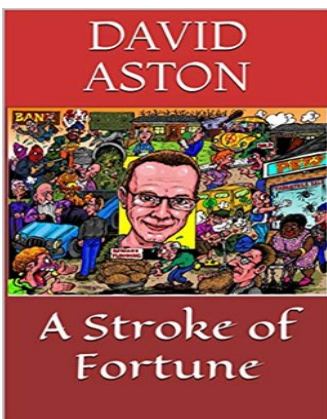
I wanna be a paperback writer' (*The Beatles*)

Did you know there are some very gifted authors in our congregation? Following on from last month's book reviews, this month we feature David Aston's two books, both based on personal experience.

It was so good to celebrate Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth's Platinum Jubilee with tea and cakes in the sanctuary on the afternoon of Thursday 2 June 2022. In advance of the day, those behind the initiative had really no idea how many people to expect. Invitations had been issued to everyone attending the Dirleton and Abbey services the previous Sunday and there was one poster outside the church. It is reckoned that more than 200 people (from all over the world) joined us at this event and there was a real "buzz" in the church throughout the afternoon. The windows had been decorated with lovely floral displays and with photos of the Queen. This might have been the first time that such an event had been held in the church (as opposed to one of our halls), but it worked well, and our sincere thanks go to the small band of willing bakers and helpers who made this event such a success.

The summer months also bring visitors to the town, and we rejoice when some of them decide to join us for Sunday worship. One Florida-based family worshipped with us on four consecutive Sundays in June/July, and we pray that they have returned home with a positive view of their experience with us. We are also opening the church for visitors as often as possible during the week and it is encouraging to review the Visitors' Book.

On one single day recently, there were entries from people whose home is in Mexico City, Catalonia, Belgium, North Lanarkshire, and Musselburgh. One entry in the Comments column simply says "Peace, perfect peace". So many church doors remain closed, other than for a couple of hours on a Sunday, and we trust that those who drop-in, will indeed find Abbey Church a source of peace in what is otherwise a busy High Street and a busy and troubled world.



This summer is proving to be a busy time for Abbey Church. The Summer Holiday Club activities, led by Hazel Gray, with the involvement of other churches in the area, will take place week commencing 25 July. Another initiative, led by Hazel, will see meals being served to families in the church hall on Thursday evenings for 5 weeks commencing 21 July. Then from 4-7 August, the sanctuary and both halls will see what promises to be an amazing Cherished Clothes exhibition organised by a small team under the leadership of Yolanda Strachan, Convenor of our World Church Committee. We look forward to the success of all these events.

During David Graham's ministry at Dirleton and Abbey we have been fortunate to have had a number of candidates, preparing for ministry, spending a placement with us. Members have been particularly pleased to

welcome Jeanette Wilson (from Eyemouth) for a 10-week placement this summer. Jeanette has involved herself in many aspects of our congregational life and worship and we extend our prayerful good wishes to her as she returns to her studies in the next stage of her preparation. In these times when the Church of Scotland is struggling to meet the needs of its congregations with enough ministers, it is encouraging to see someone who is (relatively) young, setting out on their journey in ministry and we pray that more people like Jeanette will come forward in the coming years.

The Abbey Kirk Session was saddened to learn of the death of one of our dear Elders, Sarah Kerr, after a period of illness. Sarah was well-liked and respected by all those who came into contact with her, and we will miss her very much. Our thoughts and prayers go to her husband, Alasdair, their sons, Stewart and Euan and the rest of the family (including baby Archie, who brought so much pleasure to Sarah in her last few months).

The Abbey Kirk Session meets again on 15 August 2022 and a report from that meeting will appear in the next Newsletter.

Situations Vacant – Abbey Church

Like so many churches, Abbey Church relies on a large band of willing volunteers to support the work which we do with our congregation and our community. From time to time, vacancies arise, often when people who have been carrying out a role for some time decide to "retire" or to focus their time on other activities. We are currently looking for people to fill the following vacant posts:

SAFEGUARDING COORDINATOR

It is essential that our procedures for working with young people and vulnerable adults are kept up to date. This includes maintaining our Safeguarding Congregational Register and arranging appropriate training for our staff and volunteers (the training is delivered by others).

If you are interested in this area of work, or possibly have experience of it in another organisation or congregation, would you consider becoming our Safeguarding Coordinator? Training would be provided, together with a handover from our current Coordinator, Caitriana Spencer. RESOURCES COMMITTEE MEMBERS

The Resources Committee is responsible for overseeing the Abbey Church finances and ensuring that our buildings, including the Manse, are kept in good order.

General

Receipts exceeded payments by £4,986. This is much better than budget. The budget was set to allow for the employment of a youth worker and many other expenses.

Income

The congregation has been very generous and income from Standing Orders remain much higher than in previous years. (Note - If you are a tax payer and wish the Abbey to recover the tax paid by yourself please would you ask for a gift-aid form by phoning the office or ask Phil for one. Alternatively, both the gift-aid and the standing order form are available from the Abbey Church website).

Premises income reflects the increased use of our halls. We are very grateful, Liz Harrison's estate paid Abbey a further sum of £17,831. In 2020 we received a first amount of £20,000.

Expenditure

The savings on premises costs reflect the reduction in maintenance during lock-down periods. There is a backlog of maintenance which should be tackled later in 2022.
