Jack Buchanan 3 August 1927 – 4th November 2018

Jack was a real and true Gentleman. He was a very private and real family man. He was kind and always more concerned about everyone else rather than himself. Jack was born on the 3rd August 1927 in Windsor, Ontario and grew up with younger sister Jean. The family returned to Scotland when Jack was 7, and his sister was 2. On returning to Glasgow, the family settled in Nithsdale Road. Jack settled into primary school and then to Albert Road Academy and it won't surprise anyone to know that his forte was Maths, being strong with numbers. He was also a faithful member of the local Scout group. Jack left school at 16 and joined AG McBain Accountants, and trained as an audit clerk. He was made Office Manager in Clydebank for a number of years before returning to the head office. Jack was head hunted on a few occasions but his loyalty to the company never wavered. AG McBain eventually became part of Grant Thornton. Jack remained with them until he retired.

As a young man he joined Roger McEwan's dancing class which was very popular with young adults in Glasgow. He learned all the basic dances like the waltz and the foxtrot and although he was a good dancer, didn't particularly enjoy dancing. It was here that he met a group from Kings Park Church, who invited him to come and join the Youth Fellowship. At the Youth Fellowship he met a young lady, Charlotte Murphy. The group went around together, attending the evening service and afterwards they would walk up to Carmunnock, to a little cosy tea room. Jack was the treasurer of the Youth Fellowship of course but he also worked behind the scenes in many a Kings Park Show led by David Davidson.

Jack and Charlotte came together naturally but it did take Jack a while to pluck up the courage to ask Charlotte out. They enjoyed playing badminton on a Monday evening and Saturday afternoon and then they would head out to the pictures on a Saturday evening. Jack and Charlotte were married on 31st August 1961 by the Reverend Robert Paterson here in Kings Park Church, enjoying 57 very happy years of married life together. They lived in Stanmore Road in Mount Florida, and their son John, a very precious baby was born in 1964, of whom they were very proud. Holidays were special times in the Buchanan house, it was a priority to get away for two weeks every year travelling to North Berwick, Stonehaven, Torquay and the Lake District. Jack and Charlotte moved in 1974 when they bought their house on Kings Park Avenue. Jack became a faithful part of Kings Park congregation and joined the Congregational Board. He was 28 when he was ordained as an Elder serving for 62 years. Jack became involved in various Church organizations auditing their books when necessary but never wanted to be the church Treasurer. Jack was also the Freewill Offering Convenor for 25 years and on retiring became a member of the Gardening Squad.

Jack was a very committed Elder and visited his district regularly and always took an interest in the progress of the families. When it came to Elder's duties, Jack could be a formidable number one, always setting the standard and expecting the same high standards from his team. Ties, of course, were mandatory, as was punctuality. Jack treated his team with respect and each of them were more than grateful to have learned from him and to have served with him. He was a member of the badminton club, and also much later joined Mount Florida bowling club. When he retired he also joined the indoor bowlers in KP church. He enjoyed bowling enormously – especially when he won.

Jack and Charlotte travelled to Canada, visiting his sister Jill and her husband Stan in Toronto, and then Charlotte's sister Jean and her husband Rev Cyril Cook and their family in Ottawa. Jack always enjoyed the annual holidays - once to Austria, but really preferred to holiday in England or Scotland. When John married Julie. Jack welcomed her into the family as one of their own. John emigrated to California, America in 2006 due to his job but Jack became a doting grandfather when Hollie his granddaughter was born. Jack was fortunate in enjoying good health for the majority of his life, though in the last 3 years his health deteriorated. However he and the family very much appreciated the wonderful support of the church. Although private and quiet many of us knew and respected Jack with his life touching each of our lives in a special way.

KIRK SESSION REPORT

The following report covers two meetings of the Kirk Session. Apart from the routine business, including Halls Allocation, forthcoming events and correspondence specifically of interest to Elders, the following topics were discussed:

Data Protection - The Church is undertaking a review of all data protection conditions in line with Church of Scotland Policy.

Worship - At the Tuesday Prayer Group only 8 people pray for the 500 in the Congregation. Please pick up a list and pray in your own time.

Registrar - Following a review of the Roll, 16 members were removed and 34 transferred to a Supplementary Roll. The revised numbers are: Live Roll 487, Supplementary 34. Total 521.

Prayer - Results of the recent survey are elsewhere in the magazine.

Eldership - A "Review of Eldership" meeting discussed a vision for the future concerning the preference of Elders to participate in Leadership/ Vision/Pastoral Care/Forms of Worship/Administration/Mission and Outreach and Christian Education. Concentration of the mind in these areas could help improve structure and responsibilities in the Church.

Community Social Group - This has been reported a success in helping folk who spend a lot of time on their own.

South Transept - The Session gave its approval for the illustration of the Church's history over 90 years. If you are interested in participating or supplying material contact Wilson Paterson.

CONGREGATIONAL BOARD REPORT

The Financial Report can be found elsewhere in this issue.

Property - The main consideration was the repair to the roof. Various draft tenders were discussed along with insurance guarantees and the possibility of material increases. It was agreed to move the next stage of repair and the grant application process. More immediate roof repairs (water at vestibule to new halls) are being dealt with. All quotes have been submitted to the Presbytery Property Committee and we must apply to the Church of Scotland General Trustees for permission to carry out the works as it exceeds £50k. Alan Pratt was thanked for all his work and dedication in connection with the roof repairs programme. We will continue to appeal for support through our Roof Appeal Fund. Routine repairs continue apace. The transfer of the photocopier from the Session House to the St Ninian Room is still in progress. Raymond Jenkins thanked everyone who contributed towards the cost of the new defibrillator which is attached to the outside wall and available to the community. The importance and urgency of having a property convenor was reiterated.

Gift Aid - This report was received showing a higher than normal figure due to two large donations on which a claim could be made.

Social and Fundraising - The Annual Children's DVD afternoon will take place on Saturday 8th December. The Star Appeal and Gifts for Jesus will also continue this year.

Meetings - Attestation of Accounts - Wednesday 13th March 2019 and the AGM - During the 11am Service, Sunday 17th March 2019.

LIVING WITH THE BIBLE

<u>Faith</u> Previously in "Places of the Bible", Faith was considered as being a major influence in the lives of the rulers and military leaders of their Kingdoms in addition to true believers (e.g. Samson) and the followers of Jesus. Here, faith is considered from the viewpoint of what folk feel inside - their beliefs and their doubts. Yes, the Bible is concerned with these aspects even if the Bible, as a whole, could be read as a "Book of Faith".

So, what is Faith? Hebrews 11 defines this "to have faith is to be sure of the things we hope for; to be certain of the things we cannot see". Chapter 11 gives many examples of faith mainly noting major figures from the Old Testament but also gives rise to some of the doubts that are relevant today. The Creation (verse 3), the work of God? The Existence of God (verse 6), pleasing God? Fortunate events that happen and are unexplainable? Telling Noah about the flood (verse 7), warnings? To go into the unknown in life - concerns (Moses - verse 27)? Hebrews 12 (verse 21), there are many witnesses to faith (number of Church members).

1 Timothy 6 - Keep safe that which has been entrusted to your care. Avoid the profane talk and foolish arguments of what people call "knowledge". For some claim to profess it and as a result have lost the way of faith. If you can't see it - don't believe it, if it can't be proved it doesn't exist (as in Science). 2 Corinthians 4. Living by Faith, we speak because we believe (verse 13), what can be seen lasts only for a time, but those unseen lasts forever (verse 13). 1 Corinthians 15 (verses 1-11), Hold firmly to your belief (unless it suits you to disbelieve), believe in the resurrections, by God's Grace I am what I am. Romans 4 (verse 7), Forgiveness of Sins - if you truly believe. Acts 19 (verses 1-7) Belief in the Holy Spirit - faith in the ability to hear (Luke 7). Revelation 22, The Second coming (v.20) - last words in the Bible (v.12-13) I am the first and the last, the beginning and the end, I am coming soon. I will bring my rewards to give to each according to what he has done. Hebrews 13 (verses 7-8), Remember your leaders and who taught God's message to you. Remember how they lived and died and copy their faith. Jesus Christ is the same today, tomorrow and forever.

There are two "wolves" inside each person here - faith and doubt - how we approach each one depends on how much we feed them.

THE ROOF FUND (2018) - UPDATE

On Wednesday 24 October 2018, the Congregational Board approved the acceptance of a quote of £71,504 incl VAT from Graham Roofing (Scotland) for the replacement and upgrading of our original hall roofs.

The figure above was also included in an application, by the church, to Viridor (Scottish Landfill Communities Fund) for partial funding of the project, and, having been advised on 31 October of our success in Stage 1 of the application process, we are now preparing the stage 2 paperwork, to be submitted by 31 January 2019. Unfortunately, Viridor will not grant funds retrospectively, so works cannot commence until after the steering group meets and subsequently grants its awards in March 2019.

Graham Roofing have assured us that in the intervening period, there will be no cost increase passed on to the church, so we are in a position, for the next three to four months, whereby we will have to put up with the buckets and pails in the large hall etc with patience and grace! As far as the actual roof fund is concerned, having been launched at the September communion, we have now raised in the region of £26,000.

Thank you to all who have contributed up until now, whether it's been £5, £50, £500 or £5,000, or somewhere in between. Your generosity is humbling and clearly underlines your love of God and your commitment to His church here in King's Park.
