Hello from the Manse!

So, after all the excitement of the last couple of weeks, with Bonfire night (cancelled), Remembrance Sunday (spent at home, standing in our doorways at 11 O'clock), US elections (Interesting!), start of a Circuit Breaker Lockdown, we are in a much slower week this week. You'll be forgiven if you took it easy this week, I think most of you have your eyes turned towards Christmas. Getting yourself prepared for the mammoth annual card writing, the hunt for Christmas decorations and prepare yourselves for 'release' in two weeks' time to buy that prefect present for someone.

If we were in church this week it would be the last Sunday of the liturgical year, the Sunday before Advent and actually when we turn our attention to thinking of when Jesus will come again. It's the time to prepare to celebrate the first Christmas in that lowly stable in Bethlehem, to end the year, we remember the promise of Ascension Day that Christ will return. The gift yet to come, promise to each of us. A gift for now Christ came and a gift to come His return.

It is more blessed, we are told, to give than to receive. We can interpret that in two ways. Most of all, of course, it is an encouragement to generosity, reminding us of the joy that comes through giving to others, but if we turn that around, there is another truth beneath the surface, for it can actually be surprisingly hard to receive. When someone presents us with an unexpected gift, or perhaps helps us out financially, we can feel embarrassed and indebted. "You shouldn't have done that!" We say or "I can't possibly accept". We want to do something in return. Some of us go further, actually feeling angry, refusing to accept what they see as charity. Most of us have an innate feeling that we need to earn something rather than have it given. Such a way of thinking actually spills over into our relationship with God. Although we talk of being justified by faith, deep down we feel that we must do something to show we deserve it and to win His approval. That, though, is to forget the key message of the gospel; God's love is not earned but is freely given through Christ. We do not have to prove our worth, pay God back, He asks us simply to receive. It's in that spirit we must remember that Christ in all His grace will come again and ask us to receive His grace completely.

So, at this time of expectation and giving, let us all remember the one true sacrifice that is the truest gift to us all. Jesus Christ, our Lord and Saviour gave His life that we might live in Him and Him in us.

My prayer this week is that as preparations begin, we can show charity and thanks to those in need as if they were Jesus himself presenting himself for your love and help.

wasn't the king that the Jewish people at the time were expecting him to be. He is our King. He is the Light of the World and we are called to share with others who he is, the Light of the World and the King of Kings.

Our reading talks about helping those in need. By helping those in need we are sharing the love and good news of Jesus with other people. By doing this we are enabling others to come to know him for themselves. In the midst of the pandemic it can be difficult to know how we can help others at the moment. Verse 40 of our reading says this "And the king will answer them, "Truly I tell you, just as you did it to one of the least of these who are members of my family, you did it to me." Perhaps at the moment we can help others by donating food, or clothes or just simply phoning someone up for a chat. All these ways of helping others enable us to do what he asked us to do and to share the love and good news of Jesus which is needed more than ever at the moment.

There are people out there on our streets who have missed out on the opportunity of finding the King of Kings, of finding out for themselves what the real meaning of Christmas is. To them Christmas is just another holiday. They have never known what it is all about, they have never known the difference that this tiny baby will have on their lives if they only take the opportunity to look for him. We know the difference that he has made and it's up to us to give people that opportunity to find him for themselves. Let us take the opportunity to share with others who this King of Kings is and what difference he can make in their lives.

me clothing, I was sick and you took care of me, I was in prison and you visited me." 37Then the righteous will answer him, "Lord, when was it that we saw you hungry and gave you food, or thirsty and gave you something to drink? 38And when was it that we saw you a stranger and welcomed you, or naked and gave you clothing? 39And when was it that we saw you sick or in prison and visited you?" 40And the king will answer them, "Truly I tell you, just as you did it to one of the least of these who are members of my family, you did it to me." 41Then he will say to those at his left hand, "You that are accursed, depart from me into the eternal fire prepared for the devil and his angels; 42for I was hungry and you gave me no food, I was thirsty and you gave me nothing to drink, 43I was a stranger and you did not welcome me, naked and you did not give me clothing, sick and in prison and you did not visit me." 44Then they also will answer, "Lord, when was it that we saw you hungry or thirsty or a stranger or naked or sick or in prison, and did not take care of you?" 45Then he will answer them, "Truly I tell you, just as you did not do it to one of the least of these, you did not do it to me." 46And these will go away into eternal punishment, but the righteous into eternal life. '
