Dear friends. I have decided to try to explain my preaching style before we meet, to let you get to know me a bit better. I came across this comment by Larissa Lee the other day, and, in my opinion, it sums up my preaching style perfectly.



My preaching style has certainly shifted over the last 30 or so years, but I have always been a 'seeker'. I like to try to make sense of things, but the one thing I have embraced more and more over the last couple of decades 'has been the mystery of God. It is comfortable to seek for answers and to find them. It is much less comfortable to live with a lack of knowledge, a lack of certainty. This, however,

is the reality for us if we are serious about seeking after God. We cannot comprehend the will, the actions or the fullness of the nature of God, so we live in a necessary state of uncertainty.

This is where faith is the bridge. The author of the letter to the Hebrews writes: "Now faith is confidence in what we hope for and assurance about what we do not see." Faith, then, is what enables us not just to live with uncertainty, but to embrace mystery.

The quote from Larissa Lee involves so much more than living with mystery. It involves a willingness to constantly deconstruct things around us. This is not for the purpose of breaking things down, but it is a bit like working with LEGO®. When one finishes with a LEGO® construction, the pieces are not thrown away but are taken apart, ready to be used to make something new. In the Church, we should be comfortable with doing the same with the building blocks of our structures and our faith. This shouldn't mean that we live in a state of chaos, but rather that we are sufficiently introspective and self-critical to consistently weigh up the merits of what we do, and how we do it. Are we achieving our aims by doing what we do? Are we reaching people in a meaningful manner? If the answer to these questions is in doubt, then we should have the faith and fortitude to allow change to take place.

I firmly believe, as the hymn-writer Fred Pratt Green puts it, that The Church of Christ in every age beset by change but Spirit led, must claim and test its heritage and keep on rising from the dead. (Singing the Faith 415)

It is to these things that I bend my preaching. Both the constant challenge to discern the work and presence of a God who is shrouded in mystery, and the challenge of being part of an organisation that is formed and defined by both death and resurrection. Sadly, the organisation is often much harder to work with than the individuals, as it furiously resists the call to die and be reborn.

Lastly, there is so much love and joy to be found in our faith. It is not a misery-inducing, misery-loving faith, but is rooted in love, the expanse of which we will likely never fully comprehend. The call of Jesus is for us to love one another. My preaching is focused on challenging myself and others to do just that, and to create an environment where we can welcome others into this understanding of a loving God.

I am truly looking forward to talking about God, not 'at' you, but with all of you.

Fairtrade fortnight 2024 will run from 9th September -22nd September







It's 30 years since Fairtrade products were first introduced to our supermarkets. Since then, they have pioneered a more equitable way of doing trade and becoming the world's most recognizable and trusted ethical label.

Fairtrade is about better prices, safe working conditions, local sustainability and fair terms of trade for farmers and workers.

Fairtrade works with farming co-operatives, businesses, and government to make trade fairer in 75 countries worldwide.

Together with Fairtrade the farmers and workers' vision are a world where trade is based on fairness so that producers earn secure and sustainable livelihoods. Fairtrade seeks social, economic and environmental standards for the company and the farmers involved in the supply chain.

As one woman says on one of their posters "It means we can support our families, our farming, and pay school fees for our children."

At Joy's kitchen we use Fairtrade products where possible and will be sharing information about Fairtrade with our customers during Fairtrade Fornight this year. There are 4800 Fairtrade products in the UK to choose from!

On Sunday 21 July, I was very happy to attend the second Annual General Meeting of Joy's Kitchen, on behalf of the Church Council. Here's my report from that meeting.

Joy's Kitchen has now been operating successfully in the Atrium for over two years. We heard about various highlights from the last year and also about what the coming year has in store. Special menus have been offered for different times of year, such as Harvest, Christmas and Lent, together with the usual menu of healthy home cooking. Our Eco Church committee has also planted some herbs outside in large planters for use in the café in the coming months.

There is an active committee in place who, along with a good number of volunteers (more always needed!) ensure that things run smoothly. Amongst those volunteers are four young people from Mencap - Rhiana, Rachel, James and Ben. The committee presented each of them with a small gift as a thank you for all their help over the last year. The young people also wrote about their experience of volunteering and these reviews were on display in the Atrium during the meeting, as shown in the photo below, alongside some reviews by church members who volunteer.

The cafe has been able to make donations to two charities, "Smalls for All" and "Young Roots Croydon", as well as a contribution to Church for heating and lighting costs.

Planning for the autumn is now underway and I am pleased to report that, following recent interviews, a paid manager will be in place to lead the team in the future. Organising and running a community café takes a great deal of time and work. This is really appreciated and it will help the café to continue to move forwards successfully.

CHURCH CONFABULATION

How many times do we pass a building and think that we really ought to take some interest in it? Armed with curiosity and a fascination for the history of churches, I did just that.



In 1891 the first Roman Catholic Church in Beckenham, the Church of the Transfiguration and St. Benedict, was built in Overbury Avenue, the foundation stone being laid by Bishop Butt in October of that year (since demolished). In 1926 the church bought a hut in Village Way (formerly erected as a United Services Club by the YMCA in WW1) and this was used as a Roman Catholic Church for many years, but in July 1937, with the

congregation still growing, the foundation stone was laid by Bishop Amigo for St. Edmund's Church, 46 years after the Catholic mission was begun in Beckenham and this is the only Roman Catholic Church in Beckenham. In August 1952 St. Edmund's became a Grade II listed building and so has a relatively short heritage history.

The church, built from brown Dutch bricks and laid in English bond, is facing west and its' façade's central section contains the nine-light west windows above three doorways. The panels above the entrance doors show the papal arms, St. Edmund (with his arms of three suns) and the arms of Bishop Amigo. The central feature is a carving of the Virgin and Child by Jacob Epstein. In 1948/49 stained glass windows by John B. Trinick (born 1890) were added to the church. A new parish hall was erected in 2000, opposite the church, to replace the former building. A visit to St. Edmund's is well recommended; a particular vibrancy is drawn here from a community of faith, as well as the diverse and multicultural individuals it embraces.

It is good to meet and interact with other Christians in our locality this way and I hope we can continue our contribution.
