A day of prayer for healing Sunday 18 October

St Edmundsbury Cathedral

Along with all English cathedrals, we will mark a special day of prayer for healing. There will be a particular focus at the Cathedral 11.00am Eucharist, when Bishop Martin will preach. During the service, prayers will be offered for the healing of the nation as the pandemic continues to impact on all our lives. The service will also include prayers for those oppressed by modern slavery, as 18 October also marks Anti-Slavery Day.

A special candle will be lit at each service in the Cathedral to remember all those working in the provision of healthcare and for all those affected by COVID-19. A prayer has been released by the Association of English Cathedrals as the whole nation faces renewed restrictions in the fight against the spread of coronavirus and in order to help save lives

and protect the NHS.

The Very Revd Joe Hawes, Dean of St Edmundsbury, comments: "Prayer is a vital part of our ministry. This Sunday is the Feast of St Luke, the patron saint of medicine and healing, so we pray especially for those who continue to support us all through their tireless work for the NHS and through social care provision."

Anti-Slavery Day Sunday 18 October 2020



This Sunday is Anti-Slavery Day and provides an important opportunity for us to remember the many victims of modern slavery and join in the fight against it. The Church of England's Clewer Initiative encourages us that everyone has a role to play in taking action against modern slavery and has some useful resources available.

People become victims of modern slavery when they are forced to do something against their will in order to gain money, food or shelter. They become trapped in situations where they continue to be exploited and are often powerless to escape. They may be homeless people, or migrants whose documents have been taken away. They may be children who have

become involved in drug running.

The Clewer Initiative suggests some practical things you can do to join the fight against modern slavery:

- 1. **Become a champion** start talking to family, friends and colleagues about modern slavery and take the lead in raising awareness of national campaigns like Anti Slavery Day.
- 2. **Start a poster campaign** download some Clewer posters to display.
- 3. Start a book club read Louise Hulland's recently published book 'Stolen Lives'.
- 4. **Download an App** with the Safe Car Wash or Farm Work Welfare app always at
- hand you will be able to report any suspicious signs if you see them.

 5. **Discover your slavery footprint** use this as an innovative tool from slaveryfootprint.org which will help you understand more about your slavery footprint.
- 6. **Spread the word.** use the hashtag #weseeyou.

Cancel the Debt Campaign - Christian Aid



Christian Aid is running a campaign to help to cancel the debt of the world's poorest countries in this time of crisis. The coronavirus pandemic has left people who were already struggling without a way to feed their families and survive this crisis.

Over the coming days the World Bank, the IMP and the G20 Finance Ministers are meeting and Christian Aid is campaigning to encourage them to drop the debts owed by the least developed countries. Debt re-payments are taking away resources that are vital for coping with the health, social and economic crises resulting from the pandemic.

A Church Near You - ACNY

ACNY is a major signpost to your church. The website hits are massive so it is an amazing opportunity for you to reach out to people in their community and welcome them to the church.



On the tourist trail You can also use ACNY to help you encourage tourist visitors to return to your churches in a safe way. We encourage you to post on ACNY as much information as you can as well as posting on social media, so it is easy for people to

- understand the hours you are open,
- what sort of measures they will be expected to take to stay safe.
- what facilities such as toilets, accessible changing places, cafés etc. are open.

The Church of England has also signed up to the 'Visit Britain Good to Go' standard for the tourism industry. If you sign up you can demonstrate that you are adhering to the respective Government and public health guidance, have carried out a COVID-19 risk assessment and checked you have the required processes in place. If you welcome a lot of tourist visitors we recommend completing the simple online questionnaire, selecting 'Church of England' as your industry body, and getting the accredited mark, meaning you can use the Good to Go logo on social media, your website and in other marketing. This is a free service being used across the UK by organisations both big and small.

Resources hub You can use the site to download editable videos, music, photographs and more. You can even turn your entry into your own website. There are new resources to generate personalised videos to encourage giving.

At the moment 23% of our Diocesan churches have unread messages on their accounts and 35% have not been logged into lately. This is such a missed opportunity. If you are the vicar who leads a church you have automatically been given a log-in to your churches on ACNY. You can administrate ACNY automatically so long as:

- You have listed an email address on your Crockford's entry
- You have not requested to have your Crockford entry contact details restricted
- The email address you've used for your ACNY account matches the email address on your Crockford's entry.

As administrator you can approve or decline requests from other people to edit that church, and can remove existing editors from that church. Click here to visit an ACNY help page to get started.

Lead theft

Lead theft from church roofs has returned to the diocese with Preston St Mary losing part of its south aisle roof in recent days. A roof alarm sensor was damaged in the theft but others may have detected the thieves, sounded and prevented further damage. The police have visited the scene and evidence left behind by the thieves retrieved.

Please be vigilant and if you see a crime taking place ring 999. On no account approach the thieves. If you notice a lead theft after the event then report it to the police via 101 or preferably the website https://www.suffolk.police.uk/contact-us/report-something/report-crime. Mention your church is a heritage building as this increases the importance of the crime and lengthens the sentence should someone be convicted of the offence.
