## The Sermon

**Rev Howard Wright: Responding Hopefully**

**Read: Ephesians 1:3-23. Matthew 12:15-21.**

This week, in Responding to God's Love, we respond hopefully.

The human condition is hopeless. There are two certainties, death and taxes. While we are living longer, many of us struggle with health issues, and as we live longer, we lose so many friends along the way. Additionally, we are living in a financial crises and many nationally lack hope, but how much more, in the two thirds of the world where people are daily hungry or lack adequate shelter. And most hopeless of all we are caught in sin, and therefore in shame and guilt.

Yet, we hope. We cannot help it; it's also part of the human condition. We therefore dream of, and long for better. We hope for better weather, better health, a better job, marriage, even a better eternity – with the folk-religious view of our loved ones smiling down on us.

We glimpse something of these hoped-for better futures in creation with a stunning view, in the sound of a child laughing, the taste of delicious food, or that the smile of a loved one. Fyodor Dostoevsky wrote, *'To live without hope is to cease to live'*.

Hope inspires us, but hope disappointed can destroy us. It is a common saying of sports fans, *'It's the hope that kills'*. With the possibility you might win comes the crushing disappointment when you unexpectedly lose. Hopelessness is a terrible place. Many hope for better, but for many it's an illusion. The better weather, health, relationships, and better eternity, never arrive.

Cardinal Raniero Cantalamessa writing about faith, hope and love, says: *'They are like three sisters. Two of them are grown and the other is a small child. They go forward together hand in hand with the child hope in the middle. Looking at them it would seem that the bigger ones are pulling the child, but it is the other way around; it is the little girl who is pulling the two*

*bigger ones. It is hope that pulls faith and love. Without hope everything would stop.'*

We are all invited into a living hope! Read 1 Peter 1:3-9. We have hope in Jesus' salvation from sin, and freedom from fear of punishment, from guilt and shame. Hope in Jesus' resurrection, a certain fact of history. Hope of restoration and transformation – from death to life. Hope of a glorious future, read Titus 2:13.

Bishop Leslie Newbiggin wrote, *'The horizon for the Christian is "He shall come again" and "we look for the coming of the Lord." It can be tomorrow or any time, but that's the horizon. That horizon is for me fundamental, and that's what makes it possible to be hopeful and therefore to find life meaningful.'*

Nicky Gumbel said: *The origin of hope is 'the God of hope'. The reason for hope is Jesus. The source of hope in you is the Holy Spirit. This hope is not wishful thinking. It is rooted in what God has done for us and is doing in us. This hope is the driving force for our day-to-day living.*

We can live confidently in hope, read 2 Corinthians 4:16-18. We can face down the 'troubles' of this life with confidence in the God who fixes all. We have the promise of God, read Hebrews 6:19. And hopeful people, live with joy, and are able to live grace-full and generous lives in response to God's love.

We can grow hope. Firstly, by looking up – look to God. Read Hebrews 12:1-3. Secondly by living for God, seeking holiness and getting ready for his return, read 1 John 3:2-3. And thirdly by joining in with God. Christians, as a default, are an optimistic people. We have a hope and it's the hope of the world – to be shared with the world. Read 1 Peter 3:15.

And now, *'May the God of hope fill you with all joy and peace as you trust in him, so that you may overflow with hope by the power of the Holy Spirit.'*

### **Romans 15:13**

**Prayers:** *Rejoice in the Lord always. I will say it again: rejoice! Let your gentleness be evident to all. The Lord is near. Do not be anxious about anything, but in every situation, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God.* (Philippians 4:4-6)

- Pray for justice, mercy, peace, and hope.
- Pray for individuals, neighbours, and for family & friends.
- Pray for the Church.



**Collect: Third Sunday Before Lent (Septuagesima).** Almighty God, who alone can bring order to the unruly wills and passions of sinful humanity: give your people grace so to love what you command and to desire what you promise, that, among the many changes of this world, our hearts may surely there be fixed where true joys are to be found; through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. **Amen.**

**The Lord's Prayer:** *Almighty God, in Christ you make all things new: transform the poverty of our nature by the riches of your grace, and in the renewal of our lives make known your heavenly glory; through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever.
