Monifieth Parish Church of Scotland Trustees' Report Year ended 31 December 2019

The trustees present their annual report and financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 December 2019. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out on pages 10 and 11 of the accounts and comply with the General Assembly Regulations for Congregational Finance, the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005, the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended) and Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland published on 16 July 2014.

Objectives and Activities

The Church of Scotland is Trinitarian in doctrine, Reformed in tradition and Presbyterian in polity. It exists to glorify God and to work for the advancement of Christ's Kingdom throughout the world. As a national Church, it acknowledges a distinctive call and duty to bring the ordinances of religion to the people in every parish of Scotland through a territorial ministry. It co-operates with other Churches in various ecumenical bodies in Scotland and beyond.

Achievements and Performance

2019 was a historic year for the congregation of Monifieth Parish Church as we opened our new multi-million pound building in the centre of the town's High Street. This is the culmination of many years of hard work, as well as the generosity of countless individuals and groups, and it was incredibly exciting to see it come to fruition on Sunday 8th September 2019. The Moderator of the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland, the Right Reverend Colin Sinclair, participated in our Service of Dedication, at which more than 300 people attended. Since that service, and with the dedication of many volunteers, we have been open almost every day. This has allowed a wide range of people to admire the award-winning architecture but, more importantly, for us to continue to build relationships with all facets of our community and parish.

Alongside this dramatic event, we have continued our core mission of worshipping God, offering pastoral care to those in need, and sharing the love of God (in word and action) with all those connected to the parish of Monifieth and beyond. Alongside our minister, the Reverend Fiona Reynolds, the congregation employs two part-time members of staff to support the work of the congregation: the Reverend David B Jamieson and Mr Scott Reynolds. They continue to work alongside the congregation's Pastoral Care Team to provide care to those who are ill, bereaved or living in care homes.

The main diet of worship continues to be held on a Sunday morning at 11am. We have seen an increase in attendance on a Sunday morning, particularly from those who found our previous premises difficult to access. Furthermore, we have worked with our affiliated Boys' Brigade Company (1st Monifieth) to offer a minibus service to and from our Sunday services. We now celebrate the Sacrament of Holy Communion on the last Sunday of every month, and so hold monthly evening Communion services on the same day. This is in addition to the evening services offered during Advent and Lent. Additionally, our weekly podcast of the service continues to be accessed from around the world, and we have had more than 1000 listens since we started in October 2018. The informal service, Friday Faith Space, which we started in 2018 came to a natural conclusion as we moved into our new premises. Instead, there is a quiet room available whenever the building is open, with materials available for reflection and prayer. It is hoped that this will grow in popularity, whilst we continue to explore alternative times for worship.

Our Faith and Worship Team, consisting of volunteer elders, continue to contribute to services or lead worship when the minister is unavailable. These services remain popular with the congregation, providing a different style and topic-focus from the regular diet. A different team of volunteers support and enable the leading of monthly worship in each of two large care homes in our parish: Tigh-na-Muirn and South Grange. Throughout the year, relationships have developed with these care homes, and they now bring some residents to other church activities in the week. Our spiritual provision for the younger generation has changed throughout 2019 as we seek to discern how best to nurture faith in all age-groups. Towards the end of the year, we stopped the Sunday Club and Youth Club, provided a space for younger ones to stay within the Sanctuary, and invited all ages to worship together. This is still a matter for discernment but we are delighted to welcome new and returning youngsters to the full-range of services, whenever they come.

Many of our activities have continued throughout the week and at seasonal periods. Our Guild worked hard this year to raise both funds and awareness of the national Guild's project partners, as well as growing links with our Boys' Brigade Company (the Boys' Brigade is one of the aforementioned project partners). This has been balanced alongside times of worship, fellowship and fun. The 'Songs and Memories' group goes from strength-to-strength, providing the various benefits of group singing in a relaxed environment (usually to more than 100 people) most weeks.

We also established the 'Community Play Date' during 2019. This is a 2 hour slot every Wednesday, regardless of school holidays, for pre-school children and their parents, grandparents, carers. It is a very informal atmosphere, which enables families to drop-in as they are able and to socialise with others at similar stages of life. This has grown in popularity and it is exciting to see families building relationships with one another and members of our congregation. There is a growing demand for places in our High-5 Club, which is a youth group for those on the Autistic Spectrum Disorder aged 11+, and we are actively working with parents to support them, too. Our indoor-bowls and badminton groups also provide physical recreation for members and non-members alike. Other groups within the community continue to use our facilities in the Gerard Hall or have sought accommodation in the new premises: Ladies' Group, Tae Kwon Do, dance classes, Alcoholics Anonymous, Monifieth Befrienders, Monifieth Athletic Football Club, Dundee Young Embroiderers, and Angus Council.

Fundraising activities continued apace during 2019. Our annual 'Bake and Book Emporium' was held Monday-Saturday again this summer for 6 weeks in the Gerard Hall, with more stock being sold than the previous year. In addition to raising funds, this became a time of deepening fellowship for members of the congregation and the making of new friends (and re-acquainting old) with non-church attenders, as well as diverting goods from landfill. Other fundraising activities also incorporated social activities, such as bingo nights and concerts, whilst our Christmas Fayre was a huge success as one of the first such activities in our new location.

Our minister provided chaplaincy support to the three schools in the parish: Seaview Primary, Grange Primary and Monifieth High. This support is tailored to each school, at their request, but has provided discussion, education and support to pupils and staff alike. Upon request, some groups have also used our buildings for services and learning opportunities. The schools and the church also worked together to provide a 'Uniform Pop-Up Shop' in the town for the first time. This allowed uniforms to be diverted from land-fill and supported families in need. The minister is also chaplain to our associated Girls' and Boys' Brigades. The Girls' Brigade group remains small but vibrant, whilst our Boys' Brigade Company are becoming more involved with wider church activities alongside maintaining very high standards in the world of piping.

Links with neighbouring congregations continue to grow. Throughout the year, we shared various times of worship and reflection with the other two congregations in Monifieth: Holy Trinity Scottish Episcopal Church and St Bride's Roman Catholic Church. 2019's joint efforts include: the World Day of Prayer; Lent Bible study; Holy Week services; Pentecost Safari Service; Act of Remembrance at War Memorial; and annual 'Carols by Candlelight' service. We also shared a Summer Holiday Club with neighbouring Church of Scotland congregation (Barnhill: St Margaret's) and, towards the end of the year, started to develop closer links with our closest congregation in Angus: Monikie and Newbigging & Murroes and Tealing. Members of the congregation also provide support to a number of other charities, locally and worldwide, faith-based and secular. As a congregation we provided material and financial support to the following organisations: Angus Foodbank (Trussell Trust), Dundee Women's Aid, Monifieth Befrienders, Dundee and Surrounding Areas Starter Packs, Poppy Scotland, Christian Aid, Mission to Seafarers, Crossreach, World Mission Council (stamp collection), Tealing Primary School, Blythswood Care and Lochgelly Brass Band. We also held a retiring collection for one of our young worshippers who is going to Uganda in the summer of 2020 with Monifieth High School and Signpost International, and we continue to hold him and his compatriots in our prayers.

Financial Review

The principal sources of income we rely on are offerings at our services, monthly standing orders, gift aid tax

repayments and fundraising events.

The Statement of Financial Activity (SOFA) shows a net surplus for the year of £138196 after other recognised gains on the sale of investments of £48445. We received donations towards the Building Project of £91250 and also a legacy of £3000 during the year. Members' offerings showed an increase of £2866 over the year with our fundraising efforts producing an increase of £2314. Overall our incoming resources fell by £46262 to a level of £246520. Expenditure has shown a modest increase of £2482 to a total for the year of £156769.

Our new building was completed in August 2019 with the first service taking place on Sunday September 8th 2019. The total of donations received towards the Building Project Fund, £695055 has been transferred to the General Fund. All of these donations went towards the construction cost of the new Church. There is a small

balance of retention which will be payable in October 2020.

Risk Management

The principal risk to the Charity as identified by the Kirk Session is a reduction in the level of giving by the Congregation. However since the opening of the new Church , attendance on a Sunday have shown a steady increase and a consequent rise in offerings. Members are also encouraged to regularly review their giving.

Reserves Policy

The charity trustees have considered the reserves required and have taken into account their current and future liabilities. It is the Trustees' policy to hold reserves of approximately 3 months expenditure including designated funds. At the year end the Church held unrestricted funds of £38288 which represented just under this 3 months figure. It is the intention of the trustees to increase this level of reserve going forward to ensure sufficient working capital for the Church's activities in the future.

Structure, Governance and Management

The congregation is a registered charity, number SC008965 and is administered in accordance with the terms of the Deed of Constitution (Unitary Form) and is subject to the Acts and Regulations of the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland. Members of the Kirk Session are the charity trustees. The Kirk Session members are the elders of the church and are chosen from those members of the church who are considered to have the appropriate gifts and skills. The minister, who is a member of the Kirk Session, is elected by the congregation and inducted by Presbytery. The Kirk Session is moderated by the minister and meets six times a year or more frequently as required to discharge it's responsibility for the spiritual and temporal affairs within the Church. Certain responsibilities are delegated to the other principal office bearers or the Committees of the Kirk Session as appropriate.

Accounting Policies

The principal accounting policies, which have been applied consistently in the current and preceding year in dealing with items which are considered material to the accounts, are set out below.

Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standards applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS102) issued on 16 July 2014 and the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS102), the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005 and the Charities accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended)

Fund accounting

Funds are classified as either restricted funds or unrestricted funds, defined as follows.

Restricted funds are funds subject to specific requirements as to their use which may be declared by the donor or with their authority or created through legal processes, but still within the wider objects of the charity.

Endowment funds are funds which have been given on the condition that the original capital sum is not reduced, but the income there from is used for the purpose defined in accordance with the objects of the charity.

Unrestricted funds are expendable at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of the objects of the charity. If parts of the unrestricted funds are earmarked at the discretion of the trustees for a particular purpose, they are designated as a separate fund. This designation has an administrative purpose only and does not legally restrict the trustees' discretion to apply the fund.

Incoming resources

Income is recognised when the charity has entitlement to the funds, any performance conditions attached to the item(s) of income have been met, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Donated services and facilities

Donated professional services and donated facilities are recognised as income when the charity has control over the item, any conditions associated with the donated item have been met, the receipt of economic benefit from the use by the charity of the item is probable and that economic benefit can be measured reliably. In accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS102) the general volunteer time of congregation members is not recognised.

On receipt, donated professional services and donated facilities are recognised on the basis of the value of the gift to the charity which is the amount the charity would have been willing to pay to obtain services or facilities of equivalent economic benefit on the open market; a corresponding amount is then recognised as expenditure in the period of receipt.

Interest receivable

Interest on funds held on deposit is included when receivable and the amount can be measured reliably by the charity; this is normally upon notification of the interest paid or payable by the Bank.

Fixed Assets

The charity has the right to occupy and use for its charitable objects certain tangible fixed assets, including the Church, halls and manse, vested in the Church of Scotland General Trustees. No consideration is payable for the use of these assets. Expenditure incurred on the repair and maintenance of these assets is charged as resources expended in the Statement of Financial Activities in the period in which the liability arises.

All tangible fixed assets costing in excess of £1,000 having a value to the charity greater than one year, other than those acquired for specific purposes, are capitalised. Depreciation is provided on a straight-line basis to write off the cost or initial value, less residual value, of tangible fixed assets over their estimated useful lives:

Fixed asset investments are stated at market value at the balance sheet date. Unrealised gains and losses represent the difference between the market value at the beginning and end of the financial year or, if purchased in the year, the difference between cost and market value at the end of the year. Realised gains and losses represent the difference between the proceeds on disposal and the market value at the start of the year or cost if purchased in the year.

Taxation

Monifieth Parish Church is recognised as a charity for the purposes of applicable taxation legislation and is therefore not subject to taxation on its charitable activities. The charity is not registered for VAT and resources expended therefore include irrecoverable input VAT.
