Linda smiled when she saw what one of our grandchildren had written in a card; 'happy berfday' was written several times in a lengthy message. I think Linda was glad that the message hadn't been vetted by an adult.

How does God react when, despite our best efforts, we don't get things quite right? I believe he looks at our hearts more than our achievements. I wonder whether he doesn't take us quite as seriously as, perhaps, we sometimes do ourselves.



In the Bible, we read a surprising warning from Jesus, 'Unless you change and become like little children, you will never enter the kingdom of heaven'. Jesus wants his followers to be childlike. Maybe that means keeping things simple. It probably means that we should speak plainly. It definitely means that we should trust God the way a child usually trusts a parent.

Jesus was pointing out the truth that a child is completely dependent on adults for safety, sustenance, and knowledge. The faith God looks for in us is humble, teachable and trusting — like a child. In this way, we are meant to have childlike faith.

The world sometimes misunderstands the idea of childlike faith, thinking that Christians are childlike because they believe in myths and fairytales. But this is not the Bible's meaning when it compares us to children. Instead, childlike faith is a metaphor for trust, dependence and love, and an encouragement to ask for what we need.

So, if you have that annual celebration of your birth coming soon could I just wish you a very 'happy berfday'!
