Message from the Minister

Many of you will be aware that we are going to be officially welcoming Cath Atkinson a student at Northern Theological College. She will carry out her major placement with us as part of her 3rd and 4th year of training for Stipendiary Ministry. Some of you met Cath on Sunday 30th July when she was introduced to the congregation and I asked her a few questions.

Cath will be with us for 8 hours per week in her 3rd year and about 10 hours per week in her 4th year. This may vary depending on her workload and essay deadlines at college. It may be that some weeks she comes for less time and is here for longer on other weeks.

Cath will not be able to do everything straight away! I know groups will be keen to invite her to be involved. Cath and I (with support from the College) will discuss what she hopes to achieve and what she wants/needs experience in doing. I know Cath is keen to visit all the groups in church but this could take some time. Preparation for worship is included in her hours with us. So it may be that if she is taking a full service then most of her 8 or 10 hours could be taken up with planning.

As I said to the Elders and to the Church I see this as a two-way process. We will be able to offer her a vast array of experience from which Cath will learn. We in turn will learn from her as well. I know I am looking forward to what I will learn from her experience and her training thus far. I see this as beneficial to both the church and to Cath.

Cath and I have yet to meet to discuss some goals up to Christmas. I will have Supervisors' days at the College where I, and other supervisors from other placement churches, will learn what is expected of us.

I am looking forward to the new journey God will take us on and I hope that we and Cath find this a beneficial time and a time of growth and learning as we seek to continue to seek God's mission and live out our faith as brothers and sisters in Christ.

On the 12th October it is our Annual Dinner at Rochdale Rugby Club. Please order your tickets as soon as possible and choose your menu.



Chapel Project 2017 Devi Prasad School Pokharathok, Nepal

On Sunday 10 September we launched the 2017 Chapel Project. We are raising money to pay for a Science Lab in the Devi Prasad School, in a poor village in Nepal. Depending on the exchange rate we need to raise about £6,000. At the

service Maureen and Michael Hawksworth told us about the school and about life in Pokharatok Village. Children have to pay for education in Nepal but Maureen and Michael raise money to provide scholarships for the children who cannot afford it which is a high proportion of the children in the village. Maureen raises money by selling jewellery that a group of women make and also bags and blankets. During the service the congregation were asked to write any questions on post-it notes.

The service was followed by a lunch with lasagne, baked potatoes, fillings and salads followed by fruit. Maureen and Michael answered a couple of the question and there will be more answers to the questions in the next magazine. The lunch raised £160 which gave a good start to the project. 500th Anniversary of the Reformation




October 31st marks the 500th anniversary of Martin Luther nailing his 95 Theses to the Wittenberg church door in 1517, signalling the start of the Protestant Reformation. He was protesting against the practice of indulgences, where the good deeds of the saints could be purchased to reduce time spent in

purgatory, before arriving in heaven. For Luther, this cheapened grace, repentance and forgiveness: 'You can't buy God's friendship!'

Luther rediscovered the truths of God's grace: 'For in the gospel the righteousness of God is revealed — a righteousness that is by faith from first to last, just as it is written: 'The righteous will live by faith'.' (Romans 1:17). He recognised that righteousness (being right with God) and forgiveness is not earned by good works, but faith. The undeserved love of God and his acceptance is a matter of trust. This challenge to the church of Luther's day remains so today! At the Diet (Council) of Worms, he refused to recant his views: 'Here I stand; I can do no other!'

Luther stood for the free forgiveness of the gospel, by which God accepts us because of the death of Jesus on our behalf to deal with our sin. Is this what we believe? Only trusting Jesus can make us right with God. **We**



will continue to get things wrong, but God never gives up on us!

World Challenge Uganda 2017

As some of you may be aware, I spent almost three weeks of my summer in Uganda on a World Challenge expedition, which had taken two years to plan, and nearly as long to fundraise for the trip. I would firstly like to extend not only my own thank you, but those of the Kyengeza Muslim School, where we spent most of our time whilst in Uganda; to everyone who donated either money or time along the way to make this all possible.

Upon arriving at the Kyengeza Muslim School, we found ourselves sat in a dusty, dark and desolate classroom with only a blackboard for inspiration. Suddenly, the room burst into life with the sound of music; choral voices, handmade drums and dancing feet created a spectacle which I hadn't even imagined before boarding the plane to Entebbe, Uganda. The enthusiasm shown by the young children, aged between four and sixteen, didn't relinquish throughout the whole week. Whether they were cleaning the classrooms or participating in PE, the same smiles were present across the faces of the students at all times.



During our time at the school we were tasked with plastering the bare brick classroom walls. This involved: pumping and carrying water from the village water pump (a task which I found surprisingly relaxing); mixing the sand and cement to make the plaster, with no electric cement mixer in sight; and applying the plaster to the walls. Once completed, this will give the

young people the opportunity to learn and progress in a dust free environment, leading to more time being spent on teaching and learning as opposed to cleaning, which was formerly needed both before and after morning and the afternoon sessions. Just imagine what it must feel like to have to sweep the floors and dust the tables before you can commence your day at school. Now imagine having two hundred children happy to do this, as they knew that school commenced once they had finished.
