

Message from the Manse "Following Jesus"

Discipleship is a theme that has been occupying my mind a lot recently. As I have prepared for the Church weekend and also the continued thoughts, prayers and discussions which are ongoing to do with Missional Partnerships, this means that discipleship is never far from the forefront of my mind.



In many ways discipleship should always be at the forefront of all our minds as Christians. From the very first call of the disciples to be followers (literally 'learners' or 'apprentices') of Jesus I

am sure discipleship was always at the forefront of their minds. Jesus called them to follow him so that they could be "fishers of people". If discipleship wasn't at the forefront of their minds, then one might ask for what reason were they fishing for people if not to be fellow followers of Jesus?

I think certain parts of the church (certainly in this country) need to recapture discipleship. For many churchgoers today they feel that people will simply come to church without invitation. Whilst I do not deny that God can work in people's lives and draw them to church I feel strongly that God has chosen to work in and through His Church; the Church being the people of God not a building.

One of the aspects of my sabbatical in 2016 that I appreciated was visiting churches and speaking to church leaders who were working hard to be disciples in the places God has called them to be. Churches/Christians working to make the name of Jesus known. Churches/Christians working hard to share the faith they professed.

As I said on the Sunday of the Church Weekend we should not....

1) Underestimate the power of *our* story. The story of what Jesus has done and is doing in our lives as individuals and as a church.

2) Underestimate the power of the Holy Spirit. In other words the Holy Spirit can take our words and actions and draw people to God in a powerful way.

As we approach summer time, traditionally a quieter time in the life of the church – when groups break for a few weeks, may we not rest from listening to God and what He wants of us. May we not rest from being disciples of Jesus, learning more of him and seeking His will and purpose for our lives.

On behalf of Ruth, myself and the children may you all have a good summer. For those going away I hope you have a relaxed and enjoyable time; taking a rest before returning to the busyness of life.

Thank You

I would like to say a big thank you to everyone at Bamford Chapel and Norden URC for the good wishes received before and after the recent elections. Thanks also for the lovely flowers which I received from church the other week.



Whilst I was campaigning in the area prior to the election, I was surprised and disheartened by the number of people who didn't understand the local election system, so I thought it may be useful to explain it here.

In Rochdale there are twenty wards, each one having three councillors, who are elected on a four year rolling timetable, with one year having no elections. So having been elected this year, I will be due to stand next in 2022. Councillor Patricia Sullivan will be up for election next year and then Councillor Jane Howard in 2020. 2021 will have no local elections. The split in Rochdale is Labour 46 seats, Conservative 10 seats, Liberal Democrats 3 seats and Independent 1 seat.

The turnout in Bamford this year was around 42% and this was one of the highest in the Borough. Some wards had a turnout in the 20% range.

It is a sobering thought that so many people either do not care or do not understand how privileged we are to live in a democracy and what a precious thing their vote is.

This weekend, hundreds of women have marched in London, Belfast, Edinburgh and Cardiff to celebrate the centenary of the Representation of the People Act, when some women and some men were given the right to vote at last. If you saw the film "Suffragette" which was shown on television over the



Christmas period you will know how many women suffered for the cause. The colours of the Suffragette movement, green, white and violet stood for "Give Women Votes". The Pankhurst Museum in Manchester is a very worthwhile place to visit and gives an understanding about how hard fought the campaign was.

We all become discouraged and disenchanted with politics at times, but we should remember the women and men who fought for universal suffrage one hundred years ago and make use of this privilege which was fought for so fiercely.

HOLIDAY FELLOWSHIP



Background T.A. Leonard was the minister of a Congregational Church in Colne. The idea of walking holidays started in 1891 when he formed a rambling club as an alternative holiday during Wakes Weeks for the hardworking mill folk. Quoting from Leonard's

book about the history of HF: "In those days we were content with very primitive arrangements so long as they gave us the joy and freedom of the open fells." All we needed was food, beds and good fellowship." Well his ethos remains at the heart of HF but the facilities have definitely improved!!! To continue with some history: the first formal meeting of the group took place at Rivington Hall in 1894. In 1896 the first property was acquired in Whitby then other centres opened at Portinscale and on the Clyde near Helensburgh. In 1897 a small company was formed called CHA – the Co-operative Holiday Association. By the end of the century CHA had six centres and in 1913 Holiday Fellowship was launched with the emphasis on adventurous holidays.

Over the past twenty years my friend and I have been on HF walking holidays visiting a variety of centres in this country. We usually go on short breaks once or twice a year and we have also done one of the coastal path walks — a week of walking! The holidays follow a similar pattern — arrival and welcome followed by afternoon tea {there is a big emphasis on food on these holidays}. On the first evening we meet the leaders and after dinner there is usually a selection of quizzes;



just to get to know the guests. The leaders describe the walks in the evening meeting before dinner. There are three walks, varying in length and amount of ascent. We have done some of the harder walks but now tend to go for the medium or easier [not easy] ones. We are out all day so carry a packed lunch [all included, with lots of choice; I often include a packet of crisps as a treat!]. We invariably finish the walk in a small town or village where there are teashops,

before returning to the house for a shower then dinner. After dinner and having selected our walk for the next day we then choose lunch items and the menu for the following night's dinner [food is very important at HF houses!!].

All the houses used to belong to mill owners or the landed gentry so they have interesting histories. HF has refurbished them to a very high standard. We have been to centres at Alnmouth, Whitby, Malham, Coniston, Derwentwater, Brecon Beacons, Beddgelert, Dolgellau, Bourton on the Water, Selworthy, Church Stretton and Dovedale many of them more than once. The houses at Malham, Church Stretton and Brecon have swimming pools and most of the houses have other activities on offer - table tennis, putting, croquet, etc. After dinner there is a variety of evening entertainment. Sometimes we have had a speaker on, for instance, local history, beekeeping or birds but after a day's walking, a glass of wine and a very good dinner, it is often a struggle to stay awake. We particularly enjoy the country dancing evenings and as we both learnt country dancing at school we consider ourselves to be fairly proficient. There is often a shortage of men so we take turns to be the man in a set dance which really confuses people. Inevitably there will be guests who have not had the benefit of learning the dances at school so we get helpless with laughter trying to show them what to do!!



????? There is also the HF quiz one evening which is in all the houses simultaneously. The winners' results are submitted from each house. Although we have won the house guiz on several occasions [I now have a collection of HF mugs], we have yet to be in the overall winning team.

This is just a little about the Classic Walking Holidays. HF also offer worldwide travel and other activity holidays with some walking, bridge, singing, photography, birdwatching, yoga, country dancing, art, sightseeing and many more. Check out the website!!

To summarise: these holidays are all about fun, friendship and fellowship.

We are Given Gifts for a Good Reason

The Bible mentions Bezalel and Oholiab, who lived in Moses' time. Bezalel's specialty was working with metals; cutting and setting jewels and carving wood. Oholiab was an engraver, a designer and a weaver. Together, these two men had great skill, understanding and creativity, and made the Tabernacle the beautiful dwelling that it was.

Many years later, King Solomon commissioned Huram, a native of Tyre, to make objects for the Temple out of gold, silver, bronze, iron, stone and wood. He also made coloured cloths and linen. Without Huram's expertise, the magnificence of the Temple in Jerusalem would not have been realised or remembered!



Such people should encourage us as we seek to discover God's plan for our lives. We, too, are called to be faithful in serving God through using whatever particular gifts He has given us. Faithful obedience is what matters, not whether or not we end up in a position of responsibility, or in a quiet backwater. 'Success' for a Christian is not fame, but a deeper walk, and more fruitful walk, with God.

In fact, the majority of Christians are called to serve God without fame or recognition. Our aim should be to simply love God and to express this in the service of others, with whatever skill or gift we have been given.

A Plastic Revolution



The recent Blue Planet II series exposed just how much plastic waste is an issue in our seas. The Prime Minister has called plastic waste 'one of the great environmental scourges of our time.' The best estimates suggest 10 million tonnes of plastic ends up in our oceans, contaminating and killing sea life. How should we view this issue from a Christian perspective?

When God created the universe, He saw 'everything He had made, and indeed, it was very good.' (Genesis 1:31). He calls us to share in His care of creation: 'Rule over the fish in the sea and the birds of the air and over every living thing that moves on the ground.' (Genesis 1:28). Our rule over living creatures is not an excuse to exploit them in a selfish way. As those who made in the image of God, we are entrusted to care for them with responsibility and trustworthiness.

Why do the sea creatures being killed by plastic matter? Because of human rebellion against God (see Genesis 3), our relationship with God and His creation was damaged. No longer do we live with living creatures in harmony and interdependence. Yet after the flood, when Noah rescued the animals in the ark, they are included in God's everlasting promise to protect the earth: 'I now establish my covenant with you and with your descendants after you, and with every living creature that was with you.' (Genesis 9:9,10).

What is our response to be? Where is God calling us, as His people in this time and place, to make a stand in protecting His creation? Time for a plastic revolution?

Bamford Chapel Grounds



There is a lot going on in an endeavour to stay on top of the grounds, especially at this time of the year. I would like to say thanks to the following; the few of the Monday gang who are thin on the ground these days, but nevertheless they continue to keep things tidy in front of the manse. They were joined this

We will request them to help in the Garden of Remembrance under Linda's guidance. Additional edgings for the centre section and crushed slate have been purchased, which I might add that Linda has purchased in memory of her husband Malcolm. We thank her for that gesture.

Thanks at this time also go to PNS Landscapes, who for some time now appear, work on the lawns and graveyard and then off they go to carry on their paid work elsewhere in the area. The graveyard looks so much better for their efforts and it is such a lift for us.

Derek, our tenant at the cottage, at our request spoke to his gardener lady and she has recently cut the area to the left of the steps to the car park and also the banking on the other side of the car

park. The slopes made it impossible for us to continue to maintain and so the Finance Committee agreed that we should employ some help.

I continue to cut the grassed area at the rear of Chapel and also to the right side of the car park using our tractor mower, and strim the surrounds with our wheeled strimmer. We have recently had to have a couple of wear and tear repairs carried out to the tractor; but it's up



and running once again and thanks to Bradshaws for their prompt response when we call upon them. During the times it is out of action the grass keeps on growing and it is my priority now to make the grass look presentable for the Garden Party. So here's my appeal; I will be around up to the Garden Party, but shortly after I will be on holiday, so can anyone help by agreeing to give it a cut during the week 16th to 20th July. This is important at this time of the year. If you feel you might be able to help, please speak to me as soon as possible.

Burning Calories as you Garden

The average British gardener burns 51,428 calories a year in their garden, and mowing the lawn is one of the highest ways of using energy - about 600 calories a month.

Mowing the grass takes 5.7 calories per metre. Weeding takes 4.5 calories, as does potting plants. Digging burns 5 calories per metre, while raking uses only 3.8 calories a metre.

Gardening has long been known to be extremely good for you - giving you a chance to be outside, time to think, and beneficial exercise - all at the same time.

Why not think about burning calories to the Church Grounds!!

70 years of the National Health Service



The National Health Service began operating 70 years ago, on 5th July 1948, when Sylvia Beckingham, 13, was admitted to hospital in Manchester to be treated for a liver condition.

It was the climax of a hugely ambitious plan by Labour Health Secretary Aneurin Bevan to bring good health care free to all at the point of delivery. The health service would be available to everyone and financed entirely from taxation, which meant that people paid into it according to their means.

It was based on a report by William Beveridge in 1942. The problem with it remains the huge increase in costs resulting from, among other things, advances in medical science, drugs and machinery. As Andy McSmith wrote in *The Independent* ten years ago: "It seems no amount of money will satisfy the infinite demand for better NHS care."

Within a few years prescription charges were introduced, as well as a charge for dental treatment. The current prescription charge is £8.80 per item, and dental charges are huge.

Saving the NHS seems to be a national preoccupation in the 21st century. The Christian Medical Fellowship is campaigning to emphasise the vital and radical need for Christians within it.
