Message from the Manse

As many of you will know the North Western Synod of the United Reformed Church (of which we as a church are a part) in response to the decline in Stipendiary Minister numbers is establishing Missional Partnerships. This will mean in the next couple of years my time will reduce here at Bamford Chapel and Norden URC. With this in mind the Elders are giving prayerful consideration to the forming of some small groups to oversee the ministry and mission work of the church. You will all remember the time of the "Core Groups" in recent years set up in response to us exploring our vision and mission as a church. The Elders decided to disband those with a view to the Elders taking a lead on the overall vision of the church. The Elders taking a lead is right and proper. The development of the overall vision of the church requires all of us to be committed and involved. Small groups that are focused on certain aspects of the Church's life will help us move the vision forward. Or at least that is the theory. The success of this will depend on the willingness of people to get involved and assist in the groups that will be set up. Please join the Elders in praying for God to show us the next steps of where we should be going and what we should be doing and the areas of ministry that we need to prioritise.

The reality, however hard, is that Stipendiary Ministry is reducing and however the denomination responds to that means we have to become less dependent on Stipendiary ministry and focus much more on the gifts of the whole people of God! We only have to read 1 Corinthians 12:12-31 and Romans 12:3-8 to hear about the church (the people of God) being assured of different gifts. God gives the gifts and expects us to use them. Some of us need encouragement in using our gifts as we sometimes think that others are better than us at certain

things. If we are to believe Paul the author of 1 Corinthians and Romans (and I hope we do!) then we need to be people discerning the gifts we have and how we can best use them for the glory of God and the advancement of His Kingdom here on earth.

I will be honest I sometimes look at the URC (nationally) and fear for its future. But I also look and think what great potential there is too. However with that potential comes the pain of change and the awesome potential of growing in Jesus. I believe we are entering a period of time where change is essential and we need to be people praying that God will show us the way we need to go so that we can see the growth of God's church here in this place.

I hope and pray you will join with me and others on this exciting,

challenging and life changing journey that is following Jesus.

Outside there is a courtyard café, where we had lunch and were able to sit in the sunshine. There are several short walks within the grounds, one alongside the Leeds Liverpool Canal, and of course there was a shop, where some of us sampled, and maybe bought bottles of mead and ginger wine.

All in all it was a good day out, the weather was very kind and there were no holdups on the motorway in either direction.


becoming more confident as the days progressed.

Missional Partnerships - update



We are at the stage in the Synod where some "opportunities for ministry" (in old language "vacancies") have been declared across the whole Synod. Three thus far have been created with the possibility of more to follow. As part of this process Steering Groups will soon be formed in each of the partnerships. That means that each church in our partnership (of 13 churches) are being asked to nominate one serving Elder to serve on the Steering Group of the partnership. The Elder's name is to be taken to the church meeting in each church for ratification. The Synod have asked that the same elder attend as many of the initial meetings as possible. Clearly this might not be possible because of holidays and other commitments. Our Elders are proposing that perhaps two or three names of serving Elders (elders eligible to stand for another term at the upcoming election) be taken to our church meeting in September. The hope is that each of these 2 or 3 elders will, between them, attend the meetings on our behalf. The hope is that one Elder will attend as many meetings as possible so that we get the clearest picture of discussions taking place.

I realise that there are still many questions being asked and answers being sought by Elders and members in each church and partnership. My view is that we need to step out in faith. Often it is in stepping out in faith that God reveals the next steps to us. When Jesus called the first disciples from their boats they had no clue what "fishing for men" meant. They responded to Jesus' invitation and journeyed with him. It was in that journeying that Jesus taught them and revealed more of God's plan and purpose to them.

- *Have I got questions? Yes I have.
- *Have I got all the answers? No I certainly don't.
- *Do I have the faith that Jesus will show us the way? Yes I do. The next meeting of the group of reps is on Friday 14th September. We are asked by the Area Pastoral Committee and Synod to take the name of the Elder to that meeting. This meeting is before our next Church meeting so we will have to send the name of the elder to that meeting and then ratify the name of that and the other one or two elders retrospectively at our church meeting in September.

I ask again that you join me in praying for the process we are embarking upon as a Synod. That God will make clear the way we are going so that Churches can be equipped to be the beacons of mission that God is calling them to be.

# REMEMBRANCE 100 YEARS | 100 DAYS | 2 MINUTES remembrance100.co.uk

On 4 August 1918 King George V called a National Day of Prayer. One hundred days later the war ended.

Remembrance 100 launched on 4 August 2018 with 100 Days of Peace and Hope – prayers, Bible readings, reflections and peacemaking activities – which are available to download free.

The free downloads of 100 Days of Peace and Hope include the '6 Rs of Resources conciliation' written by the Archbishop of Canterbury. If you haven't started yet there's still time to download the resources or ask Richard for a printed copy.

Contributors to the 100 Days of Peace and Hope include members and staff from the Church of England, the Methodist

Church, the United Reformed Church, the Armed Forces Christian Union, Bible Society, the Evangelical Alliance, the HOPE leadership team, Sports Chaplaincy UK, Christian Vision for Men, the World Prayer Centre, the Anglican Communion Office, the Peace Alliance and other chaplaincies and Christian ministries.



#### Garden of Remembrance



I am sure that many people are aware of the work that has been carried out to tidy the Garden of Remembrance. This area is sacred to the memory of the many people whose ashes are buried there and as such it is intended that this area be kept clean and tidy. I would ask that anyone who places flowers or plants in memory of loved ones, be aware that they need to be kept watered (especially in times of drought) and looked after. However, dead flowers and dying plants do not give a good impression of the care and love that lie behind the sentiments. I know that this is not always possible as some families do not live nearby.

Help is at hand. Each Monday the Garden of Remembrance will be checked and any dead flowers will be removed. Where plants have been left and are showing signs of dying, they will be removed to an area at the side of the seat, between the wall and the laurel bush, to be given chance to recover. A label will be placed in the pot to show from which stone it was removed from. If it recovers, it will be replaced in its original position.

We are doing our best to ensure the Garden of Remembrance will be a tranquil and welcome sight for those who visit. Please help us in this endeavour.

Do not be so stupid to think that


The world can be looked at another way
