Message from the Manse

Andrew Roberts in his book "Holy Habits" says this:

"Prayer is one of the major themes of both Luke's Gospel and Acts. It is no surprise to see Luke presenting prayer as one of the hallmarks of the first Christian communities. In the immediate aftermath of the Pentecost events the focus is on spontaneous, unstructured prayer in either native or unlearned languages (or tongues). (4) The disciples are on fire. The praying is spontaneous, passionate, energetic and noisy. Prayer is celebratory, visionary, confident and expectant. Such times of prayer are a gift to be treasured." (a)

"Holy Habits" is one of the URC's recommended books for the discussions happening nationally under the "Walking the Way: Living the life of Jesus today" initiative and the Synod initiative of "Missional Discipleship." Both of these initiatives are inviting and encouraging us to think about our faith journey and how we can be mission orientated in the lives we lead as individual believers and together as the church.



I hope you will agree with me that prayer is a fundamental part of us being the mission-minded Christians that God calls us to be. Being mission-minded is nothing new. From the very birth of the Church in Acts 2 we read of believers coming together to share resources, worship and pray together.

Following on from my "message from the manse" in the October edition of the church magazine I want to continue the same theme

for the November magazine too. The November magazine will be available the day before the first of our five "Vision prayer gatherings" when I hope many of the church family will attend. These meetings will be opportunities for us to take time together to discern the mind of Christ.

A fundamental part of the structure of the URC is the meeting together at various councils of the church to listen for the voice of God and to

discern the mind of Christ. When we call ministers, we do so in one of those councils which is the Church Meeting. The URC doesn't allow proxy voting or postal votes because we believe it is in meeting together, prayerfully, that the church meeting discerns God's will. I believe strongly that that principle should be adopted for many aspects of the church's life. And so my hope is that what is shared at those prayer gatherings, as we listen for God's voice, will direct our next steps in mission. But for that to happen we need to come together to take time in God's presence and to seek God's voice. I know for some such meetings are difficult and for some of us we will feel out of our comfort zone. I hope the focus of these meetings will be listening as opposed to speaking. It has been said by many people that prayer is conversation with God. Conversation, as we know, is speaking and listening. I don't know about you but I find the 'listening' part of prayer the more difficult of the two!

As Andrew Roberts in "Holy Habits" says "Prayer is celebratory, visionary, confident and expectant." (page 152) We will gather in faith to celebrate God's goodness, seeking His vision so may we come with confidence and expectancy that God will speak to us as we meet in His presence.

Something Happened 7th November 1989

East Germany

1989 was the year the Berlin Wall came Down and 10 East European nations were released from communist rule. Historians will cite many reasons for this change. However one factor is often overlooked; a prayer meeting in Leipzig.



For 40 years the church in East Germany had been seeking to be good citizens while praying for better things. They had cared for the poor and met every Monday to pray and worship. Since 1982 Pastor Christian Fuehrer had been gathering a few dozen people in his church to pray. Seven years later, four churches were holding prayer meetings and the numbers began to grow, attracting ordinary citizens. After the meetings candlelit peace marches through the city took place.

The media in the West picked it up and the communist authorities debated how they could stamp it out. The Secret Police issued death threats and roughed up some of the marches. But the crowds kept coming. Eventually as many as 50,000 came.

On 9th October 1989 police & army units moved into Leipzig. People feared a massacre. But the march went ahead. 70,000 people marched. The following Monday 120,000 marched and a week later, 500,000 were on the streets. By November one million people marched in East Berlin!!

Then something amazing happened; people started crossing to West Berlin and the police stood by without a shot being fired. The Berlin Wall and all it symbolised had crumbled.

International Day of Peace Flag Raising Ceremony



On Friday 21st September, a group of people assembled outside Rochdale Town Hall to mark the International Day of Peace by raising the flag.

The ceremony was also to commemorate the work of the late John Farrington, latterly known as Katsoulieri, who instigated the Peace Parade in 2006-2009/10 along with Steve Cooke, who spoke movingly after the flag raising, as did the Mayor. Remarkably, on a day when the rain was exceptionally heavy, the flag raising was carried out during a dry spell.

I didn't know John Farrington personally, but I believe he was a local man whose son, Gabriel attended St Michael's School. Following on from the ceremony, in the afternoon there was a Peace march, starting at the Blue Mosque, Durham Street, and finishing at St Chad's Parish Church. It is hoped that this will become an annual event.

As is usually the case, there were very few people attending the morning's event; perhaps it had not been publicised enough. Let's hope that next year more people will attend.




Yummy Honey





At her wish, she came to look at apartments in Rochdale and found one that really pleased her, and she decided that the time had come to move.

She has been touched by the friendship of all at Bamford Chapel and Norden URC, and not least by being able to join the Luncheon Club. Glenda and Walter are much relieved that Joyce now lives close by and can join them regularly in our church lives.

Psalm 139 - God knows you better than you know yourself

Yuri Gagarin, the first man in space in 1961, reportedly said 'I looked and looked but I didn't see God.' Psalm 139 sees things from a very different perspective, in which God can be found everywhere in the universe.

God is all Knowing: 'You have searched me, Lord, and you know me.' (v1). God knows my thoughts, habits, moods, words and choices, including the things done in secret. He knows me better than I know myself, and yet still loves me, despite my faults and failings! 'Such knowledge is too wonderful for me.' (6).

God is all present: 'Where can I go from your Spirit? Where can I flee from your presence?' (v7). In whatever circumstances we face, God is present with us, especially in the dark and difficult times. If we know the path to God, we can find it in the dark!

God is all powerful: 'For you created my inmost being; you knit me together in my mother's womb. I praise you because I am fearfully and wonderfully made; your works are wonderful, I know that full well.' (v13,14). Both the vastness of the universe and the wonder of the growing embryo in the womb speak of the power of the creator God. We can trust Him because He knows our beginning and end and everything in-between: 'all the days ordained for me were written in your book before one of them came to be.' (16).

How do we respond to what this psalm says? Are we prepared to constantly expose our inner life to God and consistently yield our whole life to Him? 'Search me, God, and know my heart; test me and know my anxious thoughts. See if there is any offensive way in me, and lead me in the way everlasting.' (v23/4).




Any persons planning to dash through the snow in a one horse open sleigh, riding over the fields and laughing all the way are advised that a Risk Assessment will be required addressing the safety of an open sleigh for members of the public.

This assessment must also consider whether it is appropriate to use only one horse for such a venture, particularly where there are multiple passengers.

Please note that permission must also be obtained in writing from landowners before their fields may be entered.

To avoid offending those not participating in celebrations, we would request that laughter is moderate only and not loud enough to be considered a noise nuisance.
