

Message from the Ministry Team

The first Sunday of 2026 found me leading a service in which I ordained and/or inducted people into Eldership. I always find these services a huge privilege and in some ways quite emotional services too. As an act of the wider Church we recognise God's call on individuals to serve God and the Church in the ministry of Eldership. During that service we read "The Statement Concerning the Nature, Faith and Order of the URC." As followers of Christ, we are called to be people who make a difference in the world. Whilst this statement is read when we Ordain and/or Induct Elders and Ministers of the URC, I think it serves as a reminder to us all of the call that God places on each of us when we commit to following Him. When we acknowledge the gift and answer the call.

As we journey on into a New Year, and it is hard to believe that as I write this article, we are already halfway through January, I hope and pray we do so trusting in God, known to us as Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. I pray that each of us would not only recognise that continued call to faith and trust in Jesus, but also that call to serve Christ and His Church in whatever way He desires.

May we, through prayer, reading the scriptures and serving together as brothers and sisters in Christ, know the presence of God this day and every day. To God's praise and glory.

I invite you to join me in a prayer:

Gracious God, as we journey through 2026, may we be a listening people, a faithful people, a trusting people. May we follow where you are calling us. May we know your hand leading us, guiding us, and upholding us. May we know our life of faith is a gift of the Holy Spirit.

Trinitarian Prayer Cards

At our Steering Group meeting on 19 November, we were introduced to this Trinitarian prayer crafted by Tom Wright. Building on the Eastern Orthodox Jesus Prayer, retained at its centre, Wright broadens its scope to express a fuller Trinitarian theology. Respecting the Orthodox tradition yet uneasy with addressing Jesus alone, he offers a prayer that embraces Father, Son, and Holy Spirit.

The prayer reflects three movements of divine action. The Father seeks to establish his kingdom among us — a hope we share for our churches. Yet humanity is a conflicted species and unable to bring about God's purposes. But we appeal to Christ's mercy, trusting in him to make us new. Finally, the Holy Spirit brings Christ to us in person, and empowers us to fulfil the Father's will, renewing our churches, communities, and ourselves.

In the New Year, the Steering Group will distribute three prayer bookmarks inspired by this text, offering customary and creative ways to pray. We encourage you to share each prayer card weekly throughout January.

Father almighty, maker of heaven and earth:
Set up your kingdom in our midst.
Lord Jesus Christ, Son of the living God:
Have mercy on me, a sinner.
Holy Spirit, breath of the living God:
Renew me and all the world.
Amen.



A Trinitarian Prayer
(No 1 in a series of 3.)

Winnie the Pooh and Lent 2026

Remember the Winnie the Pooh stories? And Kanga's insistence on Baby Roo's taking his Strengthening Medicine? It's 'really quite a nice taste when you get used to it', she explained, although I'm not convinced Baby Roo always agreed.

It can be helpful to think of Lent as a sort of medicine; an opportunity to strengthen us in the things that are good, rein in other facets of our personality, and reset the compass to the true North of following Jesus. A Spring-clean of the soul, if you like.

Baby Roo (and Piglet on the one occasion he was subject to it) found Strengthening Medicine not to their liking, and we may groan inwardly at the thought of 'giving up something for Lent'. Think of what lies behind this 'giving up'. It's so that we may be strengthened, our character refined, our prejudices examined, our junk thrown overboard, and we may come to Passontide and Easter more fit to walk the way of the Cross, and rise in new life with Jesus at His Resurrection.

Nor is Lent just a case of giving up chocolate. One year I gave up Facebook for Lent, having spent far too much time scrolling through it each day. It freed me to do other, more constructive things. And instead of giving up, why not take up something you've been meaning to do but never got round to; something life-affirming, something good for God.

Lent begins on Ash Wednesday, which this year falls on 18th February. Many Christians go public with their intention to keep a good Lent by being

'ashed'- the sign of the Cross made on the forehead in a mixture of ash and holy oil at a special service that day. The ash is usually the burnt remains of the palm crosses from last year. Having been ashed, the intention of the 40 days of Lent is to maintain a steady course closer to God, symbolised by the giving up of something - like chocolate - which has a hold on us. We walk with Jesus on the way to the Cross, mindful of the 'riches of God's kindness, forbearance and patience' as St Paul has it, and mindful too of Jesus' choice of the Cross as a way for us to enter those riches more fully.

And to face the immensity of that sacrifice, and the immensity of God's riches made available to us in Jesus, we need all the Strengthening Medicine we can get!





His face would light up as he enthusiastically recalled such times with Irene and many of his family.

This long life of fitness was evident when latterly, he would always want to get up and dance to the music at our dementia friendly cafe at church, and it was always with a beaming smile - in fact, I cannot recall a time when I met him without a smile on his face.

Church in the World Project 2025




On behalf of Church in the World thank you all so much for your generosity.
