

Message from the Student Minister



I have now been with the partnership for a year, and I spoke in my last piece about many of the things I have been able to share with you. Over the summer I have been the Minster-in Residence at Keld in Swaledale for a week and then completed 6 weeks Summer Pastorate with Dundee and Greenmount Churches.

This picture is the view from the back of Keld Chapel and was the view I enjoyed whilst leading worship and prayers from the Upper Room above the resource centre. Keld is described as a thin place... a place where it feels God comes close, a place of peace and tranquillity, where it is easy to just be and feel and see God in the landscape, the sounds, the creatures, the elements. This seemed particularly vivid when thunder and lightning filled this scene as we shared prayers during our Sunday Service and then listened to 'I the Lord of Sea and Sky.' God comes close and meets us where we are, wherever we are, if we give time to be with him. Although I was officially there as Minister-in-Residence it was good to have this time with some of our family, away from the bustle of city and town; it was good to be reminded that we all need space to just be with God. Even if we are at home or unable to travel it is good to dedicate some of each day to this time, building our relationship with the one who loves us. And it

can take effort to step away from the busyness of TV and radio, household tasks, work, family, lives that can seem quiet can still be full of countless pulls on our attention. But this effort is essential if we are to continue to grow not only individually but also as church communities.

During my time with Dundee and Greenmount, this was repeatedly where we ended up in our reflections on Renewed Beginnings and 'Holy Habits' by Andrew Roberts; this need for our lives to be rooted in our relationship with God - evoking the image of the vine in John 15. thoroughly busy doing God's work, but if we have not carefully and prayerfully based our service in our relationship with God, seeking his direction and guidance, we can be busy for the sake of business. Jesus is clear - we alone can do nothing. Renewed Beginnings has helped us together discern how best we can serve God in our communities, using the abilities we have and the skills we have been given. Although we would love to wave a magic wand and have exactly the right kind of people available, with the right kind of skills before our churches can do the right kind of service in our communities – reflecting through Renewed Beginnings we were reminded that Jesus tells us not to worry about tomorrow, but to get on with today (Matthew 6). We are all called to be his hands and feet, his voice, and his ears alongside one another in our communities, empowered by the Holy Spirit and nurtured by God who loves each of us exactly as we are.

So, another year begins. I ask for your prayers as I go forward through the selection process to discern where my future ministry will be. I offer my prayers of gratitude for this placement with your partnership, where I have met so many kind and generous and patient people - I have been blessed by the guidance I have been given. I look forward to these next steps, meeting more of the partnership and the opportunities of sharing with you God's work in this place.

Persecution of Christians set to rise in Afghanistan



As the Taliban tighten their grip on Afghanistan, 'Release International' has warned that attacks on Christians are likely to rise across the region.

One church leader in Afghanistan said Christians were living in great fear. Some who worked for the

government now face reprisals, and any identified as Christians could be killed. Christians risk betrayal, even from their own family members.

A Christian contact of one Release International partner describes the situation as 'dire.' Says 'Micah': "Our brothers and sisters in Christ are telling us how afraid they are. In the areas that the Taliban now control girls are not allowed to go to school and women are not allowed to leave their homes without a male companion."

The church in Afghanistan already faced sharp persecution, even before the Taliban advance. That church is invisible and must operate underground in this land where Muslims who change their faith are breaking the law and considered to have betrayed their communities.

To be exposed as a Christian is to risk being charged with apostasy, which is punishable by death or imprisonment. There have also been honour killings of Christians by their families.

One of the communities worst affected by the Taliban is the Shia Hazara minority, which has been especially responsive to the Christian message.

In May 2021, the Taliban bombed the Sayed Ul-Shuhada High School in Kabul, killing at least 85, mainly schoolgirls. The previous year the Taliban staged a shooting at a maternity clinic, killing women, children, and babies.

It was the Pakistan Taliban who shot 15-year-old Malala Yousafzai for going to school and telling the world about it in a blog.

Thousands of Afghans, including Christians, are now seeking refuge in neighbouring Pakistan. But the Taliban are growing in influence there, too. Before the Afghan president fled, he accused Pakistan of permitting thousands of jihadi fighters to cross its border to support the Taliban.

Through its international network of missions, 'Release International' is active in some 25 countries around the world, supporting pastors, Christian prisoners and their families.


If you have spare Tuesday mornings, please consider prayerfully whether you could help. Although hard work it is fun and there are lots of laughs.



Parish Pump - High Days & Holy Days

11th October - James the Deacon



James the Deacon is the saint for any lay person who has stepped in to lead their church when the clergy are far away.

In fact, an historian has called James the Deacon 'the one heroic figure' in the Roman mission to Northumbria. No wonder – in a time of political chaos, with the king murdered and even the bishop fleeing for safety, James the Deacon stood firm.

It had begun when Pope Gregory the Great sent Paulinus, Bishop of York, to take Roman Christianity

to Northumbria. James the Deacon, almost certainly an Italian, was among those who went with Paulinus.

The mission began well, and Edwin the king of Northumbria was converted. Roman Christianity in Northumbria took root and began to grow. But then in 633 Edwin fell in battle with Penda, the ruthless pagan king of Mercia. A pagan backlash began. The queen and her son fled for Kent, with the bishop Paulinus going south with them.

All that was left of Roman Christianity in Northumbria was James, now a solitary deacon.

But James was made of stern stuff, and despite the danger from Penda, James stayed on at a village near Catterick, often risking his life as he cared for the Christians, and continued to preach the gospel.

His success was discovered when the Northumbrian mission returned five to ten years later, and found an active Christian community still in Northumbria. James had been a faithful servant.

After Penda died, and Christian rule was re-established in Northumbria, James turned to teaching music, especially Gregorian Chant, to the fledgling churches in the region. Bede praised him for his honour and integrity. James was present at the Synod of Whitby in 664, which met to discuss the differences between the Celtic Northumbrian Church of the North, and the Roman Church of the South.

When James died sometime after 671, he was deeply mourned by the ordinary Christians of Northumbria, both Celtic and Roman. He had never deserted them.



The Friend at Midnight



This month we are looking at the Parable of the Friend at Midnight (Luke 11:5-8). It is found in a passage where Jesus is teaching His disciples to pray.

Pray Shamelessly:

The parable concerns a man coming to his friend at midnight and asking 'Friend, lend me three loaves, for a friend of mine has arrived on a journey, and I have nothing to set before him' (5-6). Despite the hour, the rules of hospitality would mean this was not an unreasonable request.

But the friend refuses to help because everyone in his house is asleep. Jesus adds, 'though he will not get up and give him anything because he is his friend, yet because of the man's boldness he will rise and give him whatever he needs'. Jesus uses this parable to encourage us to come in shameless boldness to our heavenly Father with our needs. In contrast to the parable, God is not slow in responding to us. It's not God who is reluctant to answer, but we to ask. Do we pray with shameless boldness?

Pray Persistently:

Such confidence is the basis for persistent prayer: 'Ask, and it will be given to you; seek, and you will find; knock, and it will be opened to you.' All three verbs indicate a continual habit: 'Keep on asking... seeking...

knocking'. We will not be content simply to ask once and then move on. Jesus tells us to bring our prayers to God persistently. Do we give up too easily in prayer?

Pray Expectantly:

'For everyone who asks receives, and the one who seeks finds, and to the one who knocks it will be opened.' Do we pray expectantly, believing that God delights in answering your prayers? Why not begin this adventure of prayer today!

RULES OF BAMFORD CONGREGATIONAL CHOIR: Sanctioned at a full meeting of members on Tuesday June 26th 1923

- 1. That every member pledges himself or herself to attend every practice and every service as far as they possibly can
- 2. That each member occupy the seat in the chancel allotted to them.
- 3. That every member taking part in a service must meet in the school cloakroom a few minutes before the time for commencement so as to walk in the Chancel together and in order.
- 4. Members who come to service or practice systematically late will subject themselves to dismissal from the choir.
- 5. Any grievance that may present itself must be laid before the choirmaster and the same will receive immediate attention.
- 6. Should any member know of friends likely to become useful members, please report to the choirmaster but no person will be admitted without his consent.
- 7. Practices will be held every TUESDAY EVENING from 7.45 to 9.00 o'clock unless otherwise stated
- 8. That members being absent assisting other choirs, such absence to be acknowledged, providing a service, practice or meeting is not being held here at the same time, at which their presence and assistance is required.

Remembering Neil Lennox Edmond



"The family of Neil Lennox Edmond wish to thank everyone for their prayers and their cards and kind words that comforted them through this distressing time of Neil's short illness"

Neil was born in Linlithgow on 17th April 1929. He was a compassionate and empathic man who touched many lives. He was also a loving and supporting husband, father, grandfather, and a gentleman.

Neil grew up in Dufftown, was educated at the local village school and his love of music began with piano lessons. He completed his education at Aberdeen University studying medicine, where he was an enthusiastic hockey player, playing for the university team. Neil graduated in 1953 and met Marigold when he was a surgical house officer and was invited to take tea in the sisters' office.

Following their marriage in December 1954 Neil started two years national service as a medical officer in the RAF in Norfolk, during which time their daughter Susan was born. Neil and Marigold returned to Aberdeen where Neil started training as an anaesthetist, then moved to work in Edinburgh as an anaesthetic registrar. Life was very different for doctors in those days. It meant being on call and available every day and night. By this time Trish had arrived and a career change was needed.

Neil moved to Rochdale in 1960 as partner to Dr W T Gordon at Wellfield Surgery, where in 1963 they built the first purpose-built surgery in Rochdale. Marigold supported Neil on his many on-call days and nights in general practice, answering the phone and taking messages... long before the days of mobile phones and pagers.

Neil was an active member of the medical community, serving as chairman of the Rochdale division of the BMA and sitting on the Local Medical Committee. He also served on the Family Practitioner Committee, and its successors, as well as the Area Health Authority. Neil was well loved and respected by his patients and colleagues, even years after his retirement.

Over the years Neil and Marigold were members of the Scottish Society, Music Society, Antiques Society, and played bridge until recent times. Neil was also a keen rally driver at the Knowldale Car Club and driving remained a passion throughout his life. In the early 70s the family learnt to sail at Hollingworth Lake Sailing Club, enjoying many sailing holidays at Loch Earn in Scotland.

Neil was a founder member and Past President of Rochdale East Rotary, which he continued to attend until covid restrictions prevented meeting in person. He enjoyed the camaraderie of the meetings and the organisation itself, attending trips and Rotary conferences. He also arranged a number of charity music events at Bamford Chapel on behalf of Rotary.

Despite Neil's busy life he always made time for Susan and Trish, whether with homework or sledging in the snow. Education for all was very important to Neil, and Susan and Trish were encouraged to achieve their potential and have a career.

Neil enjoyed the garden, nature and especially the garden birds. Following his retirement he enjoyed playing more golf, winning the BMA trophy many times. He started playing the piano again, having weekly lessons and playing for his personal enjoyment and that of his family. Family meals were really enjoyed. Christmas Eve at the Waggon was always a fun occasion.

Both Neil and Marigold played a supportive role in the life of their grandson Matt and spent many hours with him in his formative years. Neil and Matt were very close and often played golf together; it was Matt who was with him on the 12th hole when Neil had his one and only hole in one.

Life became more restricted with age, but despite the limitations, his warm personality remained. Neil and Marigold were devoted to each other through their nearly 67 years of marriage. Neil was Marigold's rock.

Neil had one great-grandson, Ethan and fortunately, following covid easing, Neil and Marigold were able to meet him in July.... happy memories. His family will be forever grateful that Neil and Marigold were together in their own home, until Neil's last short illness. This was enabled in a large part by the dedication and kindness shown by the ladies at Home-Instead, who often went above the call of duty – Neil and Marigold couldn't have done it without you. Marigold, Susan and Trish are proud of the far-reaching positive influences Neil had on others. They are also so thankful that this loving man, who gave so much, was part of their lives for so long.

Knowing we would be there, Dan had also volunteered to play the solo bugle calls for the old and new guards. It was perfect! Also 70 years ago, on 30th Oct 1951 that Dartmoor National Park was established.


Also 70 years ago, on 31st Oct 1951, that zebra crossings were introduced in the UK. The first one was in Slough, Berks.
