

Message from the Student Minister



When I visit different Churches in the partnership I often get asked where I am up to in my training for Ministry, 'how long have you got left Ed?' 'What's the next step for you?'

For the record, I have one year left of my training at Luther King House and my placement with the Bury, Rochdale and North Manchester missional partnership, so you haven't got rid of me just yet! My next step has been writing my ministry profile which contains all sorts of things about me from GCSEs at Aldridge School in the West Midlands to working at JTF in Walsall. Bit of a blast from the past in writing various CVs!

That was the easy bit, the hard bit was being asked to provide a 'detailed comment on your theological outlook... vision for the Church... leadership style & priorities in ministry', amongst many other things within 4 A4 pages if possible. This was one of the hardest things I have ever had to write and for a variety of reasons, trying to give a detailed picture of Ed Lyne and my outlook as a minister within 4 pages was excruciating.

The theology bit was difficult as I'm not a Christian who subscribes to a particular theology as such, I like to take bits of different theologies and combine them. Considering for example how important it is to help people in poverty but also considering why they are in poverty. Is it because of their gender, or ethnicity or what area they are living in? Here combined is some Liberation, Feminist & Social theology, yikes!

The vision for the Church was also a challenge; do I see the Church as something that needs to be turned upside down in order to be relevant, or

to try and revive the spirit of the past that made the Church a real pillar of the community? In all honesty it's a bit of both.

That is when it dawned on me that the people who are going to be reading this profile don't know me from Adam. 'What is this Ed Lyne' like? What theological views will he be bringing to our Pastorate? What vision for the future does he see for us?'

For many of us this is where the guilt sets in believing that people have an expectation for us to have everything worked out. That we have our precise views on what theologies we believe in and know for certain our vision for the Churches we love and cherish. The only advice I can give for these situations is to make sure that someone is there for you. I've had three close friends read my profile and not only offer feedback but also reassurances, that they too have come across these same challenges to define their theology and visions for the Church. So, make sure you have your friends around you.

I also don't honestly think that anyone has their theology, Church vision or anything in life fully figured out; if they have then they are not doing what God wants. They may be content to remain static and unmoving, unable to grow. There is nothing wrong with knowing things about theology, life and Church vision but don't let these aspects consume you.

I also advise you to believe in yourself, if you encounter questions such as these that fill your mind with despair... then take some time out if you can. Go for a walk, have a cup of tea, get away from the PC or paper for a while and come back to it later.

But the most important source of comfort of course is God, who helps us to answer these impossible questions and encourages us to find an answer, even if we don't think we are good enough.

So, for all of us on these impossible journeys, I am with you, let us move forward as friends and followers of Jesus in solidarity together. Amen.


Pop in for Prayer

Abiding in Jesus




This is the time of year for many churches to hold their Harvest Festival services. No doubt, there will be displays of food, some bought with others grown in gardens and allotments. While gardeners can have pleasure growing fruit and vegetables it can be hard work tending to them and dealing with pests.

Jesus knew about the care given to vines. In John 15:1-8 Jesus compared Himself to a vine and referred to God as the gardener. These verses are both challenging and reassuring. In this parable, God is responsible for pruning the vine. He sees what parts are useful and what parts are useless. The unproductive parts are cut away, so that growth is encouraged. Jesus is telling us that God will prune our lives, not to harm us, but to encourage our spiritual growth.

God's pruning cuts away wrong attitudes and wasteful behaviour, all of which serve no useful purpose in our lives. This pruning is required so that we become more fruitful. And the fruit God wants is love, joy, patience etc. (see Galatians 5:22-23) These holy qualities are intended to influence the world to change it from the bad to all that is good.

To encourage its growth, a vine has to be regularly cut back. The effect looks drastic, but essential. When God cuts away the dead wood in our lives He does it because He knows how our lives can grow. The pruning knives are in the hands of our Father God who only desires the best for us. This pruning process can be painful, but Jesus says that it is vital if the Holy Spirit is to flow through us to produce the fruit that God wants.

Also in this parable, Jesus said He was the vine, and we are the branches.



We have no existence apart from Jesus. We can do nothing for God on our own and must be joined to Jesus. In the same way a vine utilises the life-giving sap to flow into the branches, so we need the Holy Spirit to flow His life into us. It is only by remaining in Jesus can

He give us the inner resources for an effective fruit-producing life.

Jesus said 'Abide in Me' (John 15:4 King James Version). Abiding speaks of sustenance, being upheld and supported, enduring and withstanding. So, if we are to reap a harvest of holiness, may we be prepared for God's pruning, and continue to abide in Jesus, our Lord and Saviour.

Developing World Project 2025



Recommendation to Elder's and Church Meeting



The Church in the World Group has decided to recommend Great Minds Bright Futures as the Church's Project for 2025. The organisation provides services for children in Malawi.

We hope that you will feel as we do that the monies given and raised by this Church can be used to help children and young people and families in Malawi to reach their potential and live life well.

"Creating a loving, safe space with activities and opportunities for vulnerable Malawian children to learn, play, thrive and be the best

versions of themselves!"

The UK based charity provides services in the Central Region of Malawi.

Malawi is a country of great need with a GDP (Gross Domestic Product) of around 500 dollars per capita, one of the lowest in the African Continent. There are no naturally occurring resources. Being a poor country means that Malawi is ill-equipped to deal with other problems like the displacement of thousands through flooding caused by Climate Change, leading to other threats like Cholera.

The language spoken in this region is Chichewa



Background to organisation: Great Minds Bright Futures

The organisation was set up by a local businessman, Dave Armstrong. There are no UK costs as these are absorbed by Dave's business with all monies raised in the UK utilised in Malawi.

Great Minds Bright Futures works with children who are orphans due to parental death caused by HIV/AIDS, malaria and general ill health caused by poverty. Improving health inequalities and education is key in the charity's work.

Dave is very engaged with the local community and uses local businesses and volunteers to carry out building work and provide support services.

Currently, they fund three centres in Dowa, the central region of Malawi, approximately 50km north of the capital Lilongwe. The main centre is Chunzu, then Funsani and our third is at Dzaleka Refugee Camp. In the last few months, the charity has been offered some buildings at the camp and are in the process of sorting costs for the renovation to make them suitable for the children.

Description of project/how money raised will be used:

To provide the following:

Mosquito nets for 300 orphaned children, cost £20.00 each Total Cost £6,000.

After discussion with Dave and reviewing a variety of needs with Dave the group felt this would be a good tangible achievable challenge for our church family.

Is there a local UK contact that will be able to support us and provide feedback?

Dave Armstrong lives locally and will provide ongoing support and information during our giving period. The group always feels this makes a huge difference to our engagement.

Is the Organisation a Registered Charity?

The charity is registered in the UK and has a turnover of around £200,000 annually. Charity number 1206579. The charity is well established, and Dave has been raising money for children in Malawi for many years prior to setting up this charity.

Have we contributed to a project in this country previously?

The Church has previously supported a project in Malawi in 1999 and 2021.

Appeal to Bamford Chapel and Norden URC Congregation:

Sue Travis, Group Convener, was inspired by Dave Armstrong when she met him earlier this year. The group have subsequently liaised and met with Dave to hear about his voluntary work in Malawi and outcomes achieved for orphaned children. Dave is inspirational and we feel will be able to engage well with the whole congregation and church groups of all ages. He is willing to speak at our launch service in September and provide regular updates in our giving period. He is also keen to create virtual links for any of our young people's groups so they can meet the children of Malawi being supported.


