From the Rector

Extended Ministerial Development Leave (EMDL) - Thank you for your prayers for

Liz and myself during my sabbatical. I wanted to mark the start and finish, so I went up to the top of Crook Peak, prayed and gave it to God. I chose to go to Argentina for a number of reasons: Our Argentinian friend, Pastor Claudio has great contacts with key people from the revival there, and we had a previous sabbatical visit to Argentina in 2006.

Argentina is the eighth largest country in the world. It is the second largest in South America and the largest Spanish speaking country. It was a key time to



visit as Presidential elections were being held. During our visit there was 40% inflation and 40% devaluation. Crime and corruption were under the surface. There were four key areas for us: Missions; Churches; Preaching; People.

Missions - we took part in three crusades, travelling 700 miles across the country to Merlo for the first of our missions. The second and third were in Buenos Aires region, at San Fernando and at the All Boys Stadium. It was brilliant to see thousands of people give their lives to Christ and a privilege to be part of the mission team, praying for people as they came for prayer.

Churches - we visited a number of churches, including Centro Cristiano Nueva Vida - 30,000 members, and Rey de Reyes - 15,000 members. 'Hot seating' is used as there are multiple services throughout the week.

Preaching in Spanish – I was able to preach (with an interpreter!) at a miracles service in Centro Cristiano Nueva Vida, Buenos Aires and at a small church in Escobar. Both were a great experience.

People – all who we met were very friendly, welcoming and hospitable. The people are so generous. I can't possibly tell you any more in this small space, but do take a look at my blog at: http://plarcombe2015.wordpress.com

I am very grateful to those who enable me to take this sabbatical - Revd Anne Farmer who was in overall charge, as well as the clergy team, Churchwardens and lay officers. Also a big thank you for your prayers, and your practical and financial support. Thank you.

Drainage works - The New Year saw the completion of the first phase of drainage works at Wick, to remove soil from the outer church walls and fill it with soakaways to deal with damp in the church. The soakaways look much like beer crates which are inserted into the trench and topped with a layer of turf. Work will continue round the bell tower and the back (north side) of the church in the coming months. The work has been undertaken by Williams and Burroughs Heritage Repair with great sensitivity avoiding the disturbance of any graves and memorial plots.

The Bells - In January we had our Annual Service of Thanksgiving along the theme of 'Celebration.' Our Bible reading was the celebration of a Wedding at Cana, when Jesus turned water into wine. We focused on how church bells, so often chosen by couples to be rung at their weddings, are a great sound of celebration and also a signal that a service of worship is about to take place. How amazing it was then, that on this Sunday, a couple staying in a neighbouring guest house, came to our service because they had heard the bells ringing. John Parsons, the ringing captain at Wick, gave a great explanation of 'bells at Wick.' We give grateful thanks for him and all our loyal bell ringers.

Sanctuary Mornings - If you want quiet come to our Sanctuary Morning on Saturday 6 February where the church is warm and welcoming. We had one person last month who dropped off to sleep in the peace of the church. Drop in any time between 10am and 12.30pm refreshments are provided.

Holy Communions - Once a quarter we have a said Holy Communion which takes place in the choir stalls. This month it will be on Sunday February 21st at 11.20am after our Morning Praise service. This is much appreciated by those for whom 10am is too early and for others who enjoy the silent setting.

In many ways we are starting our parish youth ministry from scratch. I know that we all recognize the importance of reaching out to young people and supporting them in their walk with God. As a parish, we'll be persistent and determined as we work towards an exciting, dynamic and effective ministry both **to** young people – and **from** young people to us, as the recipients of their ministry. Mark has **only fifteen hours a week** in this role so he will be focusing his time and energy very carefully for maximum impact.

Prayer Ministry

Last month we began to establish a prayer ministry team at St Mark's. Dave & Lin Fortune have kindly opened their home on the first and third Thursday evenings of each month for a time of healing prayer. After Easter we will provide some training for Sharon Thrupp and Gill Walcot, who will then join myself, Dave & Lin on the team. After that, we hope to be able to offer times of individual prayer during most Sunday services.

Children & Holy Communion

The parish continued its collective journey towards the admission of children to communion as we held two introductory open sessions for all. We shared some food, learnt about the history of communion and children in the church, and then had some fun times thinking about some of the aspects of this special moment in a church service. The next step will be some teaching sessions during children's ministry on Sunday, followed by a rehearsal and then the First Communion service at the Parish All Age service at Pentecost - Sunday 15th May.

St Martin's Fellowship 1969 - 2016

St. Martin's Women's Fellowship was created in 1969 after the Mother's Union closed. In the early days there were 69 members meeting at the Church Hall (now the Drs Surgery, Hill Road East, Health Centre Car Park) and then at Lawrence Road Community Centre. Down the years there were a number of locally well-known Chair Persons. The first was Mrs Curtis – the Vicar's wife and some names familiar to members of today's congregation – Mary Butcher, Vera Hinton, May Hoskins and Olwen Brodhurst, with Iris Elsbury being the last Chairwoman.

With numbers decreasing, it was decided in 2013 to introduce gentlemen to the Fellowship with meetings now held in St Martin's Church. The Fellowship motto has always remained "**Our fellowship is with Christ and with One Another.**" The final meeting will be the AGM on the 9 February with tea and cakes and an official winding down of business. However, for those who wish to continue meeting together on a more informal basis, Iris Elsbury has very kindly agreed to offer an 'open house' once a month in her home for those who would appreciate the fellowship and company. *With thanks to Paul Elliott for this potted history.*
