Bishop's Letter



The Contemporary English translation of the Bible translates Proverbs 4:6 as:

‘Know where you are headed, and you will stay on solid ground’

That is good advice for everyone, not least for us as God's people here in Bath and Wells as we seek to live and tell the story of Jesus. As followers of Jesus we are called to listen to his words, follow in his steps and allow his Holy Spirit to transform our lives. You may be aware that there has been a lot of thinking going on about how we might shape our future as a diocese and become more missional and intentional in our use of all that God has given to us and entrusted to us. That thinking, listening, praying, dreaming and talking has led the Diocesan Synod to adopt three priorities that need to shape our diocesan life. The first is to place mission and evangelism at the heart of everything we do. The second is to realign our ministry resources so that they are more clearly focussed towards mission. And the third is to identify, develop and use the gifts which have been given to each of us so that we can more faithfully serve one another and the communities where we live and work.

I believe this is the start of an exciting new chapter for Bath and Wells and one that we all have a part in writing. The vision that I believe God is laying before us is that - in response to God's immense love for us, we seek to be God's people living and telling the story of Jesus. There will need to be much more listening and talking together for this to become a reality and I look forward to those conversations and the journey ahead of us. As we pray and seek faithfully to listen to the voice of the Holy Spirit we can be confident that the Lord will sustain and strengthen us on our journey with him.

There are also opportunities to pray at our weekly communions (see inside front page). Praying together is powerful and what is so encouraging, is this is not just an opportunity to pray for the right person, but also to lift up Worle and Wick St Lawrence and everything that goes on in our parish to God; for example back in June we prayed for family life in Worle, for our schools, for our neighbours and for those in need.

Over the summer members of each of our four churches will be getting together to produce our Parish Profile. This describes our parish setting to any prospective candidates. There will be something about the area of Worle and Wick St Lawrence, our location, the businesses, shops, stores, schools and leisure facilities etc. We will be describing the ministry of each of the churches, the many services of baptisms, weddings and funerals taken in the parish and anything that gives candidates a feel for the area and encourage them to apply. Please remember this in your prayers.

We're not the only ones praying for the future. Bishop Peter of Bath and Wells has been sharing the way forward for our Diocese of which you might have read on our opening page. At heart is the following vision: *'In response to God's immense love for us, we seek to be God's people, living and telling the story of Jesus.'* A church in America was challenged to tell their own stories of how Jesus had changed their lives, but had to do it in less than one hundred words. Here is one of them:

"I used to be uncertain of myself, I didn't know what I wanted, I was easily led and ended up doing things that didn't satisfy simply to please other people. I was scattered and unfocused and made some silly decisions. Then I met Jesus Christ in a powerful way. I realised that God had a plan for my life, I suddenly felt a new strength and found I wanted to please God and not others. I now face life calmly, optimistically, prayerfully and hardly recognise the indecisive lost person I once was."

St Lawrence Church, Wick St Lawrence



We had a beautiful day for our annual **Jazz Picnic** at Cedar Farm at the beginning of July. For three hours we picnicked to the sound of gentle jazz in Clare and Nick Torday's beautiful garden, generously offered for the afternoon. It's great to see the children running around, dancing to the music and for us all to enjoy the sun, strawberries and this year be overlooked by three llamas in the adjacent field!

Also in July we were very sad to say farewell to Stella Cox who died at Weston Hospice. Stella lived in the village for many years and was an active member of the church serving as Church Warden, Verger, Sacristan and Church Secretary. More latterly she was a welcomer at our Sanctuary Mornings. She will be greatly missed and our love and prayers go to her family.

I caught up with one of the farmers at Wick, who was busy '**turning hay**' at the time, to find out what happens on the farm in August and was told it would be a busy time of catching up. With all the wet weather hay making has been very delayed. Turning hay is a three day process, to get as much of it exposed to the sun as possible. If hay is bailed whilst damp it can combust and start a fire. The wetter version of hay, haylage, is what we see bagged up in black polystyrene in the fields, but because it's fully covered, combustion doesn't happen. During August the stock is turned out into the fields day and night whilst the sheds are cleared out and left empty until late autumn, when the weather gets colder.

If you would like a trip to the country join us for **St Lawrence Day Cream Teas** on Sunday 14th August 2.30 – 5pm in the Village Hall. £3.50 for a generous sized scone, cream, jam and a cup of tea and coffee.

St Lawrence's feast day is on August 10th, the day of Lawrence's death in Rome in 258. Lawrence was a third-century archdeacon who distributed alms to the poor and was keeper of the church treasures entrusted to him by the Pope at a time when Christianity was outlawed. Six deacons were beheaded and Lawrence, knowing he would be next, dispersed the material wealth of the church before the Roman authorities could lay their hands on it. Lawrence was commanded to appear for his execution, and to bring along the treasures. When he arrived he was accompanied by a multitude of Rome's crippled, blind, sick, and poor and said that these were the true treasures of the Church! Tradition holds that Lawrence was burned or "grilled" to death on a grid iron, stating something along the lines of, "turn me over ... I'm done on this side" half way through. Lawrence is the patron saint of cooks, librarians and deacons among many others.

What shall we do this summer?

August, a holiday month, no school and time to relax, but what do you do if your child says, “**I’m bored?**” Dr. Vanessa Lapointe is a Canadian author, parenting expert, and registered psychologist who has been supporting families and children for more than fifteen years.

In her article, ‘**Why You Should Do Nothing When Your Child Says, “I’m Bored,”**’ she writes, “What if the next time your child says, ‘I’m bored,’ you just smiled at them and said, “I love bored.” Not only might that be incredibly freeing for you, but it also is actually really good for your child’s development. Why? Children need to sit in their own boredom for the world to become quiet enough that they can hear themselves. It is only when we are surrounded by nothing that something comes alive on the inside.

The constant stimulation of today’s reality makes arriving at that place of stillness really challenging for a lot of kids. Screens are everywhere and become a mind-numbing outlet.....And busy has become the new “cool” – almost like there is an unspoken message to all of us that you have worth if you are busy. Children need to sit in the nothingness of boredom in order to arrive at an understanding of who they are. Summer Biscuits

A simple tried and tested biscuit recipe from the Amyes family.

100g/3½oz unsalted butter, softened at room temperature
100g/3½oz caster sugar
1 medium free-range egg, lightly beaten
275g/10oz plain flour
1 tsp vanilla extract



Preheat the oven to 190C/375F/Gas 5. Line a baking tray with greaseproof paper. Cream the butter and sugar together in a bowl until combined.

Beat in the egg and vanilla extract, a little at a time, until well combined. Stir in the flour until the mixture comes together as a dough.

Roll the dough out on a lightly floured work surface to a thickness of 1cm/½in.

Using biscuit cutters, cut biscuits out of the dough and carefully place onto the baking tray. Bake the biscuits for 8-10 minutes, or until pale golden-brown. Set aside to harden for 5 minutes, then cool on a wire rack. Eat!!!!

Reverend Robin Vincent shares some memories.....

Robin and Liz Vincent will shortly be leaving Worle to live in a flat in Locking Deanery Housing Association near Clarence Park. For many years they have worshipped God at St Martin's Church, but from 1964 – 1970 and 1990 – 1994 Robin was the Vicar of Wick St Lawrence and Hewish and has kindly allowed us to share some of his memories. He writes....

We arrived at Hewish Vicarage in September 1964 exactly 100 years after it and St Anne's church was built. The prospectus of the Vicarage said, "East wing not in use," a wing which contained its own staircase, rose coloured wall paper, an iron kitchen range and a massive billiard table. The bicycle of Rev E.J.R. Lutley, Vicar from 1923 -1953 was still in the garage! The main house landing provided room for a bed and in the hall below we played musical chairs at the Sunday school party.

One of our favourite family walks was across the railway line to the Signaller's. At that time the blue Pullman train still came into Weston. One of our young sons called it the 'Pullover man.' Later on we were able to watch the arrival of thousands of tons of 'fly-ash' for the building of the M5, discharging at the specially built terminal near the Wick turn railway bridge. Parts of the emerging motorway provided other places for walk and play.

From the dining room of Hewish Vicarage, we could see the tower of Wick St Lawrence Church. According to the weather, it appeared light or dark, clear or grey; sometimes it could hardly be seen at all; but we could imagine the parishioners of Wick, living under the influence and shadow of that Temple of the Living God, whatever the weather.

My first wedding celebration at Wick was in 1965 between the Church Warden, Henry Parsons with Mary Parsons. Henry and Mary who were cousins married late on in life. I shared the service with the previous Vicar, the Reverend Frank Sherwood, who had retired to Clevedon. It was said that every signature in the wedding register that day was a Parsons.

One of the features of Wick St Lawrence calendar, was a series of Festival Weeks for church funds. These occasions showed the long standing devotion of Jack Crease, a Reader at Wick Church and after his death a generous benefactor to the Church. A window in honour of Mr Crease is in place at the east of the Church, above the altar. In 1965 the Garden Fete was at Wick House and was opened by Bernard Fishwick, the BBC's West of England broadcaster and news reader. The next festival week was in 1969 at the Cedars (where the Jazz Picnic now takes place). At the Knightstone Theatre, that summer, was Sandy Powell, the comedian. I managed to see him and ask if he would open our fete. Not only did he do so, but also invited me and Mr Crease to see his show and visit him in his dressing room. At the fete he played skittles, told his jokes and gave us his catch phrase, 'Can you hear me mother?' Neither he nor Bernard Fishwick charged anything for their generosity amongst us.

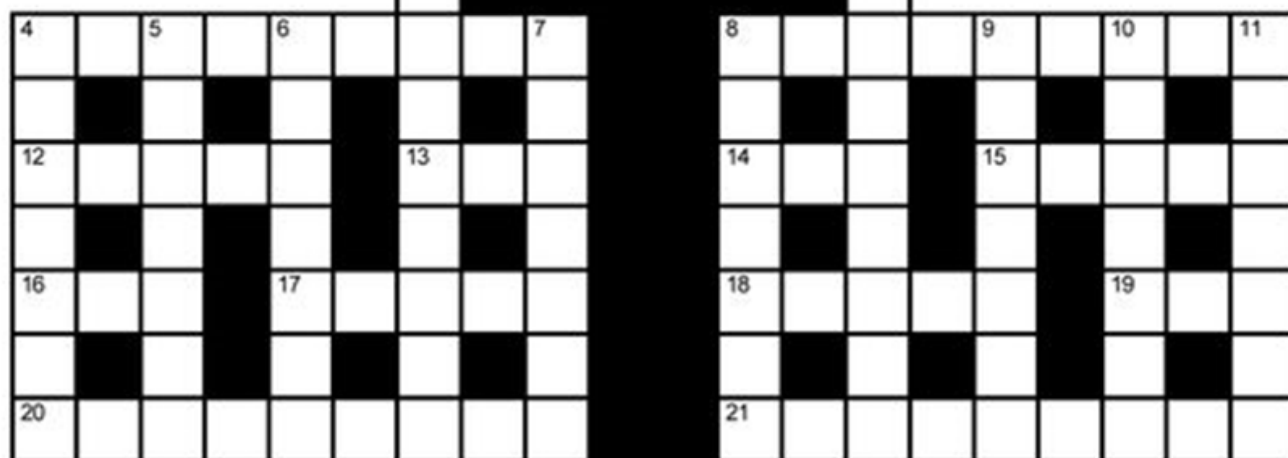
