## Parish Profile

The black and white picture to the right is a map of the Parish of Worle reaching from Weston Village and Locking Castle in the south, St Georges to the East and the Severn Estuary to the North, with St Martin's, St Mark's and Mead Vale churches in the middle and Wick to the north. Population wise Worle Parish is the largest parish in the Diocese of Bath and Wells with around 40,000 people living within its boundaries.

This little map will make up a small part of the Parish Profile, compiled to give information to applicants for our Team Rector vacancy, including write ups of the four churches, pictures of the parish, and descriptions of the lovely area in which we live. Thanks to the hard work of a small dedicated team the profile is in good shape and will be taken to the WPCC meeting at the end of September for discussion and approval.

1.15 onwards - Treasure Hunt / games

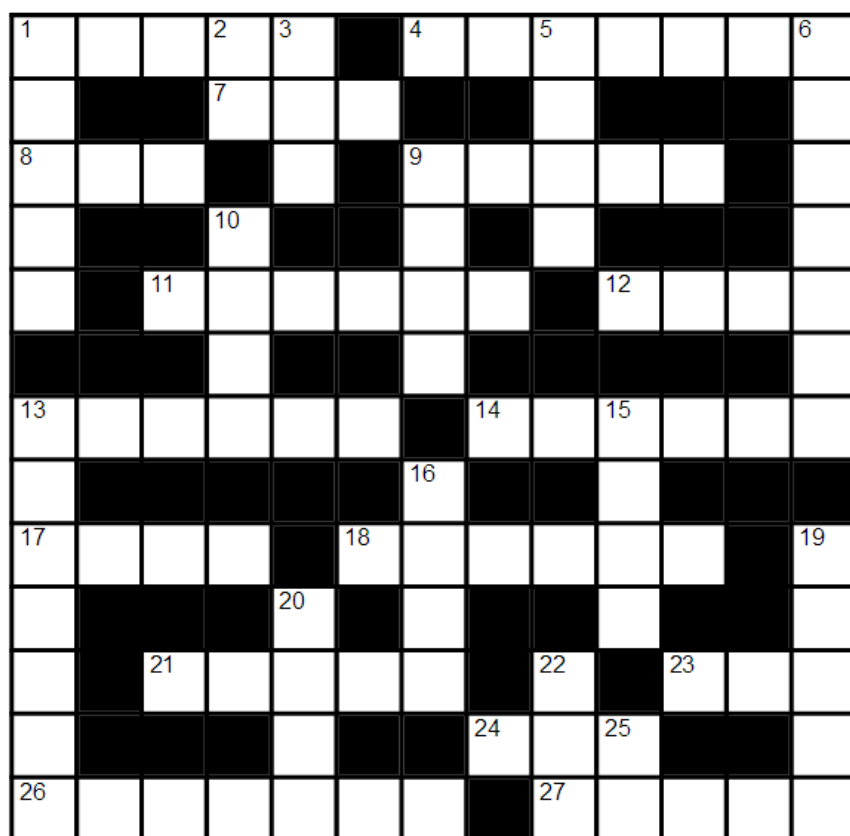
2pm Teddy Parachute Jump from the church tower + ice creams / lollies (usually lasts a good 45 minutes...)

### **Walls and Repairs**

At the east end, the church wall is crumbling and in disrepair. We are grateful for an extremely generous donation towards the repair of the wall for which we have received approval by the diocese. Although not very visible from the road, it will make a difference to have this part of the wall rebuilt to avoid any land slippage and damage into the neighbouring field.

Many of you have experienced the composting toilet in the former boiler house at the back of Wick Church with the instruction that gentleman must sit down for the toilet to function correctly! This convenience has finally come to the end of its natural life and we are seeking to install a flushing toilet. Although Wick St Lawrence is not on mains drainage there is a set up called a Trench Arch system collecting waste which is naturally disposed of by worms and soak away in an enclosed area underground. We look forward to this event very much!

## The Old Vicarage: Then and Now



Take a stroll along the north side of Worle High Street and you will spot a building with a surprising history. Now occupied by *Nigel Groves Funeral Directors* and *Berry, Redman, Gordon and Penney, solicitors*, it is a long, shallow building with an oddly shaped roof line at the Weston end and is surrounded by concrete and car parking spaces. The attractive dormer windows have disappeared: even the bay window and the veranda are long gone. Now take a look at the photograph taken in 1907. The roof line is identical, but there is a pathway framing the house and climbing plants adorning it.

The **1840** tithe map provides the first evidence I have found for this building. Its plot is numbered 507 and is described as 'Vicarage house, garden and premises'. At that time it was the home of Rev Nathaniel Wodehouse, who became Vicar of Worle in 1829. The house stood in 5 acres of glebe land and whilst it may have looked attractive, it had nothing in the way of modern facilities, but the Wodehouses lived there happily and only left in 1871 following Nathaniel's death. Rev. Charles Doherty moved in for a few years and then in **1875** Rev. William Rose took up residence for over 20 years before moving to the parish of Hutton nearby. A succession of incumbents followed: Rev. Chas Kent [1896], then Rev. Alfred Cecil Harman [1902] and Rev. Frederick Bentley in 1907. In all this time very little was done to modernise the living quarters. Cecil Harman's son, Lancelot, wrote a book about his father entitled 'Cheers, Sir', in which he says of the Vicarage at Worle:

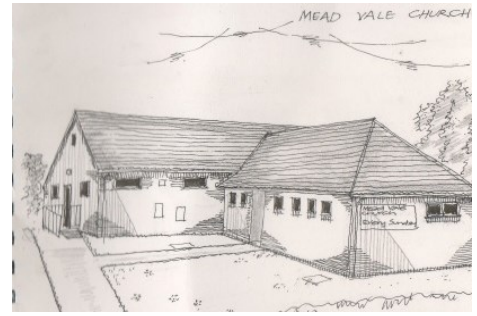
*"The vicarage apparently didn't boast a bathroom or indoor lavatory, the only available being at the bottom of the garden....."*

In **1910** Rev George Bode and his family moved into the house and remained there, caring for his flock until after World War One, when the Vicarage was sold in 3 lots. Lot 1: The Residence, Lot 2: Freehold Accommodation Land, Lot 3:

Accommodation garden land. The auction was held on 13<sup>th</sup> February, 1919, when it was bought by Mr. Jones of Fairfield House. The coach house, cowshed and tennis courts all disappeared over time and in 1934 the building was converted into 3 dwellings, known as 1, 2 and 3 Kirklands.

## **Ring out the Bells!**

For a number of years National Heritage has organised “Open Days” to enable the Public to gain access to various interesting properties that, in normal circumstances, are not open to the public. This year, for the first time, they decided to enlist the help of Central Council of Church Bellringers to open up the heritage that is hidden inside the Bell Towers and to demonstrate the tradition of “English Style” bell ringing.

To promote the cause the “Challenge 500 Heritage Open Day” was launched with local publicity and National TV and Radio. It was hoped that at least 500 churches would be opened. Hence “Challenge 500.” St. Martin’s Church bellringers decided to participate and registered to take part. It was planned to open the tower on Thursday 8<sup>th</sup> September between 7.45pm and 9pm. Although it is our normal practice night we thought it would give our visitors the opportunity to watch the ringers in action and see some teaching. For safety reasons there were no visitors to the bell chamber on the Thursday evening.

On Friday 9<sup>th</sup> September the tower was open from 3pm until 7pm, hoping this would give a greater opportunity for visitors to visit the Bell Chamber. We planned for visitors to chime the bells, if they wished, and give some of the more adventurous people the opportunity to have some brief instruction in the first steps of learning to ring. We welcomed any interested people to come again and have a “taster lesson.”

There were opportunities for people to chat to the ringers. We also provided Teas, Coffees, cakes biscuits.

## **In the Parish: Worle Village Primary School**



Work at Worle village primary and the surrounding area doesn't cease during the summer holidays. There have been two major projects improving the school this September, road calming measures and preparation for major repairs to the roof.

Due to the age and historic value of the main building and the complexity of the roof patterns North Somerset has agreed to fund this very expensive project. It has taken a major feat of engineering, constructing a scaffold to support the work and maintain a safe environment for the school community to work both inside and outside the school. The roof will be scaffolded over a period of two months and then the roofing repairs will begin. It will take at least 20 weeks to replace the roof working in small sections. It is a repair rather than a relay, so the patterns that give the school it's character will remain. There is scaffolding in the inside as well for health and safety reasons and there are restrictions on hall space and a classroom has had to relocate into the library. Luckily it will not severely impact the community use of the hall and Sunday school, brownies and karate can continue although in reduced space.

The road calming is to ensure safe crossing for children and the roundabout will hopefully slow the traffic to again increase safety for the school the church and the whole community. To compensate for the reduced parking, North Somerset has promised to reduce the double yellow lines on hill road.
