Deanery service of Light - 'Candlemas' Sunday 29th January 4pm at St James the Great, Winscombe.



Come and gather with other churches in the deanery for this lovely celebration. The festival is called Candlemas because this was the day that all the Church's candles for the year were blessed. On Candlemas night, many people placed lighted candles in their windows at home. In pre-Christian times, it was the ancient festival of light which marked the midpoint of winter, half way between the winter solstice (shortest day) and the spring equinox. People believed that Candlemas predicted the weather for the rest of the winter, this rhyme may be familiar to some of you:

*If Candlemas Day be fair and bright
Winter will have another fight.
If Candlemas Day brings cloud and rain,
Winter won't come again.*

This day is also The Feast of the Presentation of Christ in the Temple, celebrated on the 2nd of February and in churches on the closest Sunday to that date. This day commemorates both the ritual purification of Mary, 40 days after the birth of her son Jesus and the ritual presentation of the baby Jesus to God in the Temple at Jerusalem. The Gospel of Luke says that Jesus was met by Anna and Simeon. Simeon held the baby Jesus and called him a Light to the World.

Start the year in silence

Is that possible? Put aside some time on Saturday 7th January and enjoy the peace and quiet of God's church at the Sanctuary Morning at Wick St Lawrence. Drop into the church any time between 10am and 12.30pm, refreshments available, and reflect on the new year. 'Commit to the Lord whatever you do, and he will establish your plans.' Proverbs 16:3. This is also an opportunity to pray for the parish as we continue to pray in a new Team Rector and for the needs of our churches and communities.

What is a Wassail?

Wassail comes from the Anglo-Saxon word 'was hael' meaning good health, literally 'be whole.' In January we will be 'wassailing' at Icelton Farm in Wick St Lawrence, celebrating God's creation as we pray for good crops on the apple trees in the orchard and would love you to join us. There are two wassail traditions; one involves carol singing at peoples doors and wishing the inhabitants good health in the hope of receiving a hot spiced drink from the wassail cup! The second is apple wassailing particularly strong in apple and hard fruit growing areas especially Herefordshire, Gloucestershire, Worcestershire, and Somerset. We will be combining both singing and blessing with a great spirit of fun. Our **Wassail in Wick** takes place on **Saturday 21 January at 5pm tickets £6/£4 children**. Then and Now: New Inn to Woodspring



This building, situated on the corner of Worle High Street and Station Road, has played an important part in the life of the village since the very early 19th century. We do not have an exact date when the New Inn was built, but Lesley Brown, one of our members who wrote 'Worle's Pubs' uncovered some interesting facts. An auction sale of land was held *'at the House of Joseph Leman known by the sign of the New Inn situate in the Parish of Worle on Monday the 8th Day of July, 1811*. The land auctioned was in Weston-super-Mare and resulted in the development of the fashionable seaside resort.

The New Inn was sold in 1814 with *'a Ball Court, Bowling Alley, Garden, Orchard, Offices, Stables and Coach-house adjoining. The House, Offices, Stables and Coach-house were all lately new built and occupied by Joseph Leman.'* The new facilities were probably built in 1815, when an antique bronze stirrup was said to have been found on the site.

The building occupied a large, prominent site and was originally a coaching inn. Its facilities were extensive for the time, and the New Inn was chosen for many important functions, both social and official, including a Public Enquiry into the sanitary condition of Worle in 1901. Weston Harriers regularly held their Hunt Breakfasts at the Inn. More than 20 landlords are listed as having been proud overseers of the pub.

In the late 20th century the pub was renamed The Woodspring and is now run by Paul and Frank Sprackman with less emphasis on coaching and more on the Carvery!

North Worle Forum

North Worle Forum is a monthly gathering open to any residents in North Worle to meet with local councillors and police to discuss issues in the area. The Forum started up following the closure of the Local Action Team at the end of 2013. Several residents approached Councillor Marcia Pepperall about replacing the LAT and keep the monthly meetings going. The first meeting was held in February 2014.

Priory School has always been the venue as it is accessible and has the advantage of plenty of parking space. Towards the end of the Local Action Team, meetings were held in one of the portakabins at the side of the school, but when the Forum was started the group was very pleased to be able to hire the Conference Room at Priory. As it is a community event, Priory kindly allows a discounted rental.

Meetings are held on the second Tuesday of each month and all residents are welcome. Meetings start at 7pm and aim to finish by 8. There is a report from Martin Eyre, the Area Officer from the Council, and usually police are in attendance with a report on local crime issues. Any local issues can be raised and discussed at meetings.

As an example, concerns were raised at the forum about pedestrian safety on Wansborough Road. North Somerset Highway Officers made surveys finding that during the day a large number of adults and children - commuters, shoppers and schoolchildren - need to cross Wansborough Road. There have been several near misses, especially during the morning and evening rush hours. At three separate points along the road alterations are to be made which will be in the form of extra bollards on widened islands and a short projected pavement near the shop. The council is also carrying out work on pavements and footpaths to cut back hedgerows and brambles etc. On another road, Walford Avenue, bollards are to be placed to stop parking on the grass by the sports ground. Access will then be improved for wheelchair and mobility scooter users.

The forum reconvenes on **Tuesday 14th February at 7pm.**

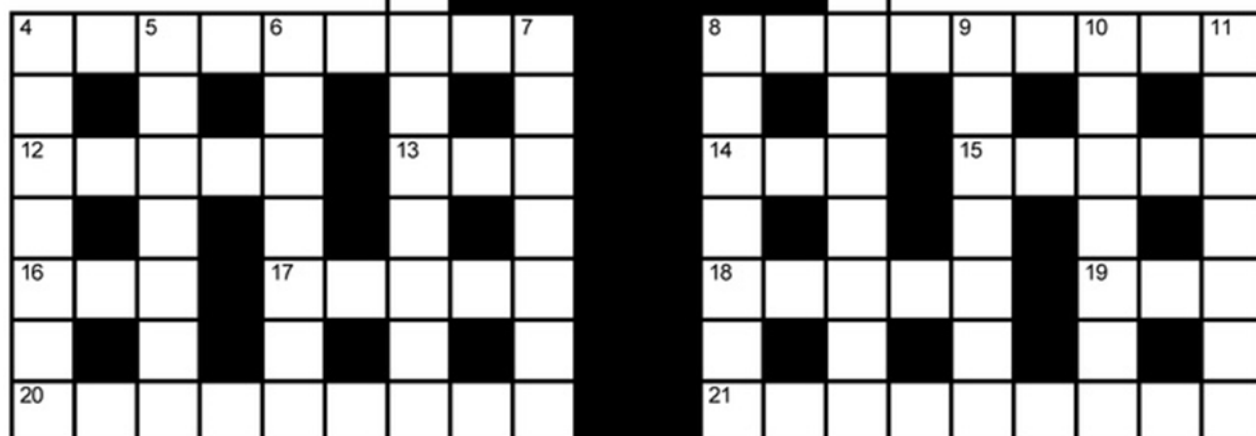

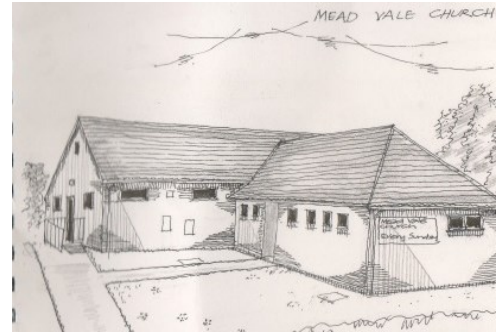
