From the Bishop....



I'm a patron of Somerset Sight, one of the perks that comes with the job! My elderly mum has macular degeneration and so I was very interested to hear more about this valuable work. Jackie (CEO) and Bella (Chair of Trustees) came to tell me more. They have over 250 volunteers who work across the whole of Somerset supporting those with visual impairment. 160 of these visit people in their homes to offer such vital help as reading people's mail aloud.

I know how important that is to my mum. Living on her own, her letters are a lifeline, a contact with the outside world. She's blessed with plenty of visitors, partly because she will talk to anyone and is confident enough to go out and about to discover new things even though she occasionally trips over and breaks something! But can you imagine how confining losing your sight can be? How your world could become smaller as you lose your confidence? How lonely you might become?

Loneliness and isolation are the experience of many people, not just those who are the seniors of our communities or those with disabilities to overcome. I know that many of you have a real gift for noticing that and doing something about it. Many of our communities rely on people like you to give time and attention to those who are feeling disassociated from the world around them, a little lost.

Visiting, volunteering with organisations such as Somerset Sight, are important gifts of service to our communities, a wonderful way of 'living the story' of God's love. If you are doing so, then thank you for that simple but profound act of love. And if not, then why not consider giving an hour a week to someone who might discover God's love through you?

St Lawrence Church, Wick St Lawrence



As autumn kicks in, leaves drop and the clocks go back, there is always the quiet of the church to seek sanctuary and peace. Sanctuary morning in October is on Saturday 7 with ideas for dealing with anxiety and troubles and taking each day as it comes. Drop in any time between 10am and 12.30pm, hot drinks and cake provided.

Work continues at church to improve the fabric of the building. The picture shows drainage works that have been taking place on the north side of Wick church for



the past two months and are near completion. Ditches have been dug around the perimeter of the building with drainage pipes Inserted leading to a large soakaway in the middle of the graveyard, (behind the earth pile.) This work is to drain moisture away from the walls which inside are constantly damp and flaky.

The work has been very skilfully managed. Looking at the area now you can hardly tell there has been any upheaval. This will dramatically affect the atmosphere inside the church and will eventually enable successful much needed interior decoration.

We said farewell at Wick to Vicar Anne with a ploughman's lunch and local cider in Ebdon Bow barn for members of the church and community. There was a presentation of gifts including a John Featherstone original cartoon and some gardening equipment to help tame the rather large garden at the new vicarage. This was a lovely occasion which followed a special service in the morning including the baptism of triplets, Reuben, Edward and George Reeves, grandsons of regular church members Mike and Beryl. The boys, also known as REG, first letter of each name, are identical natural triplets and we enjoyed them being blessed and welcomed into God's church.

Then and Now: Worle's Church Hall





By the middle of the 20th century Worle had enjoyed the Church of St. Martin for some 900 years, but it still had no Church Hall. In 1927 a movement emerged in the village to provide the parish with this much needed venue. Rev. Frederick May took on the role of Chairman of an organising committee made up of over 100 people. Contributions from private individuals purchased a site adjoining the Church lands for £75 for the new building. Next time you are out for a stroll take a turn up Hill Road [or down, if you start from the top]. Until the 1930s this area was mainly orchards. The photograph, top left, probably taken about 1930, looks down Hill road and shows the trees in abundance on the right. You can also spot a turning on the left had side which later became Hill Road East. This will take you to the site of the planned Church Hall.

The people of Worle still needed to raise the money for the building work, and organised all kinds of fund raising activities, the most fruitful of which was an annual Fete and Flower Show. The first event in 1927 raised £160, which was banked for the building fund. By 4 August 1934, when the 7th annual show took place, the hall was built and very nearly paid for. Worle Church Hall became the place where the village met for dances, meetings, wedding breakfasts, beetle drives, film shows and Christmas parties. There was a stage, wings, a committee room and kitchen.

On the 9th September, 1939 the hall was requisitioned for 'war activities' and normal social life had to find small corners elsewhere. By 1945, when the Church Hall re-opened for normal service, the first priority was to raise money to welcome the servicemen home and that accomplished, huge parties were held on VE Day. This was the golden age of the Church Hall, and it lasted through the 50s, 60s and early 70s. The Mothers' Union picture, above right, is from 1955. Sadly, in the late 1970s, the Church had to sell the building to fund works within the church and it became Worle Village Surgery. It is now vacant again and advertised to rent for £30,000 a year. The people of Worle still very much regret it's passing.

The Future of the Old Deanery in Wells



The Diocese of Bath and Wells is seeking to move its offices from The Old Deanery on Cathedral Green in Wells to a new-build site elsewhere in the city.

The recommendation to relocate over 50 members of staff and all operations was agreed at a meeting of Bishop's Council (the Bishop of Bath and Wells' advisory body and Standing Committee of Diocesan Synod) on 20 June and shared at the latest session of Diocesan Synod on 12 July.

The decision in principle follows investigations by a small working group consisting of representatives from each diocesan function plus user groups. Members looked into whether it would be preferable to stay and invest in the Old Deanery buildings for the next 10 to 20 years or to move and locate elsewhere within two years. Poor access for disabled visitors; lack of environmentally-friendly credentials; limited number and size of meeting rooms and high repair, maintenance and running costs of The Old Deanery buildings were all cited as major reasons for recommending a new-build option.

Nick May, Diocesan Secretary, chaired the working group and is ultimately responsible for the office buildings and facilities. Nick says, "The Old Deanery is a wonderful building, in a beautiful location with a rich history. I along with many of my colleagues feel a huge fondness for it. However, It is becoming increasingly clear that an 800 year-old, Grade 1 listed building, originally built as a home for the Dean of Wells does not function effectively as a modern, welcoming, office and meeting space. Nor will it meet the day-to-day needs of the people who work here into the future.

We calculate that to bring The Old Deanery up to the standard required would cost £3m, plus months of disruption. The cost of moving to a purpose-built development is estimated at £3.25m. We strongly feel that relocation is a more responsible and sustainable use of diocesan funds and will help us better serve our 500 parishes."

The decision to relocate is currently a decision in principle. More detailed work will now be undertaken by a new working group in terms of locating and negotiating a site and planning the move. Based on a progress report due later this year, Bishop's Council will then either confirm the decision to proceed or revisit its recommendation.






