From the Bishop....

So much to celebrate

Pride is something we all need to be careful about. It is regarded as one of the 'seven deadly sins' and it is



often said that 'Pride comes before a fall'. John Ruskin captured that thought when he said that 'Pride is at the bottom of all great mistakes'. And that is probably true. Misplaced pride, over-exaggerated pride, egotistical pride probably does lie behind the great tragedies of human history. Wars are often fought because pride is involved somewhere. And as we know to our own cost, pride can seriously affect and undermine the relationships we have with friends and family.

But pride may not always be bad. Writers and philosophers have at times tried to distinguish between 'good pride' and 'bad pride'. And whilst it may not be possible to differentiate completely between them, I think we have a sense of what 'good pride' looks like. And 11 May is a day to celebrate 'good pride', for that is Somerset Day. It was chosen, because on 11 May 878AD King Alfred the Great roused the people of Somerset to fight and subsequently defeat the invading Viking army. And whilst people argue about whether or not he can be regarded as the first true King of England, he is the only English monarch to be accorded the title "the Great".

I think I am right in saying that Somerset was the third largest county in England although the original county boundary now includes other local authorities. Somerset Day however celebrates all that is good about the wonderful county of Somerset. It seeks to give Somerset more identity and is an occasion for all of us who live here to give thanks for the beauty and diversity which we sometimes take for granted. It is too easy to drive through villages and towns, through the stunning landscapes which come alive in different seasons and to fail to thank God for the gifts of his creation all around us.

On Somerset Day let's make an effort to pray for our local communities and those who serve us in every walk of life. There is so much to celebrate, so much to thank God for and so much to be proud of.

A NOTE FROM THE RECTOR

Have you noticed that we are bombarded with information daily? Through the letter box, in our email in box, images and messages on electronic bill boards, repeated advertisements interrupting our favourite TV show, to name but a few. The news we hear and see is selected for us. We have to work out if it's true, if it's fake, or if it's relevant. How is it possible to know what is fake and what is true?

We could dismiss everything we hear and see, but what that would lead to cynicism and frankly would probably give us a very negative world view. Jesus talks a lot about truth. Jesus when standing trial with Pilate was asked those famous words—"What is truth?" It's very doubtful that Pilate was expecting an answer and he certainly didn't get one. It was rhetorical. Had Pilate been around in Jesus' ministry, he would have heard Jesus speak of himself as 'being' truth.

If we could have a 'one on one' with Jesus I wonder what we would ask him, what we would want to know? For many of us it would be a 'why' question, or maybe a 'when' or 'how' question.

In many ways it would be great if we could have all of life's questions answered at the press of a button or a verbal request from siri or cortana. I think God wants us to be inquisitive and search for answers. Jesus said in the sermon on the mount "Seek and you will find." The Old Testament book of Jeremiah God says "You will seek me and find me when you seek me with all your heart." Maybe there's something in the 'looking' which brings us close to God?

They work with local partners and communities to fight injustice, respond to humanitarian emergencies, campaign for change, and help people claim the services and rights they are entitled to.


Christian Aid tackle the root causes of poverty so that women, men and children the world over are strengthened against future knocks. If disasters happen, they get people the help they want straight away.
