# St Mark's School

St Mark's is a large primary school with capacity for 436 children and we only have a few spaces still available! St Mark's chose to become part of the Bath and Wells Multi Academy Trust in September 2016. As a result of this, we work in close partnership with a number of other schools within the Trust, particularly schools within the North Somerset Hub. St Mark's School benefits from excellent facilities – outside we have three large playgrounds; outstanding outdoor provision for our youngest children; a beautiful peace garden and a large playing field with a friendship path around its perimeter. We have achieved the School Games Gold Award and the Space Education Quality Mark as well as being the only school to have achieved the Gold Young Carers' Award.

Our Christian ethos and values are central to the life at St Mark's School ensuring that everyone feels cared for and valued. Our core Christian values are hope, honesty, friendship, forgiveness and perseverance. Our values are at the core of everything we do. At St Mark's we celebrate the uniqueness of each child. Each week we reward the achievements of children within the school by presenting certificates and weekly star pupil trophies. Each term we award Reach For The Stars trophies where we celebrate with the children and their families, recognising the progress they have made and also recognising their engagement and motivation for learning. We also award a Paddington Bear to one child in the whole school community in memory of one of our gorgeous teachers who died of cancer. This is presented to a child who emulates the values that Mrs MacAulay held of being so positive and putting the needs of others first. We have a team of dedicated staff who are fully committed to providing the best quality education for each and every child within a safe and caring environment. We have high aspirations for all children whilst on their learning journey with us laying firm foundations for their future lives.

We have recently had an Ofsted inspection which recognised the good quality of education in the school, "Pupils are diligent in their work and proud of their school. They work particularly well together and share ideas respectively". As summed up by two of our pupils recently, "St Mark's is a family of friends" and "St Marks is like a show where everybody has a part to play".

## St Martin's Organ since 1660s

Many visitors and school children ask about the history of the organ here at St Martins, and we hope the readers of the magazine will enjoy this short history.

Before the 1860s there 'was no organ in St Martin's Church. Music for the services was provided by village instrumentalists of questionable ability from a minstrels' gallery which was pulled down in the 1870 restoration.

The minstrels' gallery must have been erected in the late 18<sup>th</sup> century because in the Vestry Meeting minutes book for 9 May. 1788. is the following entry: "At a vestry meeting held at our church this day resolved that two acres of church land belonging to this parish be sold by public auction. The money arising from this sale (£39) be applied to the purpose of erecting a gallery in our church." (signed John Price (curate) and 15 other signatures)

And it was from this gallery that instrumentalists played the music of the services until sometime in the 1860s when the church had its first organ.

The organ, originally built in Frankfurt am Main. Germany, in 1662, was for many years used in a Unitarian Chapel in Blackburn before it was brought to Worle.

There is no record of the precise date when the organ came to St Martin's but it was probably in the early 1860s when it was installed in the minstrels' gallery with its back to the bell towel.

Following the 1870 restoration, with the gallery no longer in existence, the organ was temporarily located in the new vestry area. But it was in an extremely poor condition - badly out of tune and the action constantly failing.

With the church newly restored the vicar and churchwardens decided it was time to repair the organ, and on 11 July, 1876, W.O. Vowles, organ manufacturer in St James's Square, Bristol, submitted the following estimate: "To remove organ in your church.

turn it round to face the chancel, repair the pipes, re-leather the pallets of the great organ sound board, voice and tune the pipes, regulate the action work, leaving the instrument in good working order will be £35.

"To add a new set of pedals concave and radiating 2.5 octaves (30 notes), and to make all new action work, coupler and extra pipes to complete the compass - £16.


"And to add new stops on the great organ viz Dulciana £15, and Flute £10. Making a total of £76."

Work was put in hand and the organ was repositioned to the site where it stands today.

In 1957 Percy Daniel, organ builder of Clevedon, rebuilt the organ and added a new console for £1.515 plus an extra £11.75 for the glass-door console covers.

Apart from pipework, the only original part of the 1662 organ that remains is the front casing. During a weekend in 1971, when the church was being decorated, Daniels temporarily removed the pipes in order that the front casing could be painted in the colours as we see it today.

Many of us enjoy hearing the organ played by our organist, Richard Lennox, at our services. We are sure that he will be happy to discuss any finer points regarding the organ that you may have.



## **Mead Vale Church**

Mead Vale Church had it's last morning service on Sunday 2 June and will be having a Service of Thanksgiving on Sunday 7 July at 6pm at the



Church, which meets in the Mead Vale Community Centre to celebrate the life of the Church and God's faithfulness to us through the years.

At our last Parish Wide Church meeting (The WPCC) Rev Emma Amyes, the current Vicar of Mead Vale Church said the following:-

I have been Vicar of Mead Vale Church for the last 9 years the Church has been at Mead Vale for 40 years and when I came here, closing the Church was not something that I set out to do and it wasn't something that God laid on my heart for us at that time. Closing a church goes against the grain. But of course we are not closing a Church at Mead Vale, as in a church building because there is no church building we meet in a community centre which will continue to be a community centre. Mead Vale Church has always been about the people and the people of Mead Vale Church that God called me to be Vicar of are amazing Christian people and I have learnt so much from being their Vicar and a part of their family which is really how it has been, they have welcome and accepted me and my family with open arms and whilst I have come to teach them about God, they have taught us as a family so much about God's love and I personally want to say how thankful I am for each and every member of Mead Vale Church.

I think we have always had some real challenges that other church families perhaps have not had, not being able to do weddings, or funerals has meant that we have not had people coming into the building naturally and then wanting to come back at other special times in their lives. We have good links with Mead Vale School but when RS comes up in the lessons, they want to visit an actual Church and not a community centre. But we have been able to do baptisms and these have been wonderful opportunities to invite people into our Church family and they have nearly all commented, about the welcome, the presence of God which they somehow thought you would only get in a building! But actually they found in the people of Mead Vale Church.

Over the last 5 years we have been doing an outreach in the community at special times in the year, for Christmas, Easter, Father's Day, Mother's Day, and Harvest where we have been outside the church handing out gifts and connecting with people and whilst they have been blessed and encouraged, and we have had some special conversations, people have not joined us on a Sunday. And this has been hard for us.

And this is what makes it very hard to "close" and I have to say that the current leadership team.

The only one I have known, could not have worked harder and have been a wonderful example of commitment to serving God and they can be very proud of themselves and the way in which they have responded to God making this clear to us. And I personally want to thank them for their hard work and loyal commitment to serving God at Mead Vale Church.

But God has made it clear that we need to close and we have been encouraged by many passages in the Bible that have affirmed that. Ecclesiastes 3 has been a real encouragement to us just over the last week "there is a time for everything".

I have been reminded over the last week that we are Easter People and we trust and believe that whilst we feel like it is Good Friday today and we are struggling because something very special is over, because we believe and trust in Jesus who we know died but then rose again 3 days later. We know that something good will come from this for each and every member of Mead Vale Church and that is my prayer for them that they will know God has gone before them and chosen them for such a time as this, as it says in Esther and that He has good plans in store for them, plans to prosper them and not to harm them! Jeremiah 29 v 11.

Thank you to everyone who has supported Mead Vale Church throughout the years and you are welcome to join us on the 7

July at 6pm at Mead Vale Community Centre to celebrate with us.


