In April Christians will be thinking about the profound nature of God who served in acts of service and sacrifice, the deep disappointment of the first Christians on Good Friday leading to great joy on Easter Sunday.



Walking with Wildlife, Robert Bryant

In the clear cold twilight of early dawn, a song-thrush starts to call. Just a few notes at first to warm up: a gentle wake-up to rouse the sleepy-heads before the breakfast concert begins. For two hours or so he sings his favourite phrases over and again, as if to announce winter's passing and its show-time for spring. Look around, he seems to say, note the rooks busy with their sticks, nesting high in the beech trees; view the sombre winter hedges now wash-day white with blackthorn blossom; spot those huge brown hares lolloping around the fields, and smile as the lambs play in their nursery pastures.

The song thrush is one of many, each well-spaced across their downland estates, bounded only by song. Even a tawny owl is moved to hoot from deep within its ivy-clad oaken retreat on the far side of the field. A great spotted woodpecker begins to drum, adding some percussion as it beats out its territorial call from the high branch of a storm-battered ash.

Heading up to Micheldever Woods on St. Valentine's Day after a night of rain, I find the muddy hollows, ruts and furrows on the woodland floor are now ankle-splash pools and puddles. Visiting a well-ridged ride where the flooded ruts form a shadowy wetland, all mirror smooth, I chance upon one bobbled with clumps of frogspawn. Common frogs hike up here year after year to breed. In previous years I've also found smooth newts nearby. As the snowdrops fade and the daffodils begin to bloom, the floral theme of St. David's Day is picked up by the pale yellow of primroses on sunny banks, the golden gleam of lesser celandines sprawling in damp shady verges, and perhaps the sunlit flash of a yellowhammer hedgehopping across the lanes

At Abbotstone Down, the winter work parties have cleared a swathe of hazel from the southern slopes of the reserve to reveal the full extent of the grassy hummocks of the yellow meadow ant – an extraordinary metropolis of mounds and domes.



On the Farm - Julian Gibbons

Two events recently have put worries about costs and sourcing of inputs, commodity prices and the weather in prospective.

At the NFU Annual Conference in February we had an address by the President of the World Farmers' Organisation, Theo De Jager. Theo farms on the boundaries of the Kruger National Park where he grows Macadamia nuts, Avocados and Mangoes. He originally farmed in Zimbabwe, but lost his farm to the land confiscation by the Mugabe regime. Here we rightly get concerned about hare and deer coursing. Theo and his neighbouring farmers in their valley have to employ security patrols to ensure the safety of their staff, themselves and their property from mob attacks.

I have attended over 14 conferences, but I have rarely seen a speaker captivate the audience of over 1200 quite like he managed. He eloquently put the case for farming and how we need to improve our management of soils. He advocated for productive agriculture to protect the wild areas of the planet and he strongly argued against the support of well-meaning NGO's who encourage subsistence farming in sub-Saharan Africa, because it meant keeping communities in poverty. He stated all farmers need to make a profit to be able to better themselves, to educate their families and to invest in their businesses. He also spoke passionately about policy and farmers need to be driven by science and that we as farmers must accept that might mean change.

His whole speech can be found on the NFU YouTube channel.

Obviously the second event is the Russian invasion of Ukraine and the knock on effects for the whole food chain and beyond. Suddenly the price and availability of wheat has hit the main news pages and TV news headlines. This is a shock to the grain trade not seen since the Russian grain grab of the early 1970's. I spoke to an Irish friend the other day who farms arable crops and conventional and organic chicken supplying a major processor in Northern Ireland. The province is a large importer of grains and they do buy organic wheat and sunflowers from Ukraine out of Black sea ports. He said that a 50000t vessel was sunk and that no more is being shipped, so it will be near impossible to source the organic grain they need. That will all need to come from somewhere else. The big impact will be for North Africa, they source the biggest proportion of their grains from Black Sea ports. We currently cannot get a price for Diesel when we order, delivery will take 7 days and suppliers are reluctant to give a price on order that might have risen strongly by delivery date.

The gas price has blown any possibility of recovery in the fertiliser market, price or supply. We are planning on the possibility of not being able to source all we would need next year, so are planning this year's applications accordingly. The planned reductions will result in a lower yield potential, but that ultimately will be driven by the weather.

We were due to have some fallow ground, but with commodity prices as they are for new crop we cannot justify it. So we will probably plant spring sown oilseed rape.



Swarraton and Northington WI

At our March meeting we welcomed Sarah Delves, a V&A expert lecturer who brought along a wonderful collection of an-INSPIRING WOMEN tique and vintage compacts. Sarah reminded us of the three main historic purposes for makeup; to attract, to hide and for

war. Cleopatra's dark eye make up was made from coal and used to protect her eyes from the sun, a sort of ancient alternative to sunglasses. In the seventeenth century it was the fashion to place celestial fabric patches on the face to hide blemishes. In earlier times crushed beetles, charcoal, lead based foundations and even dung was used as makeup. It was normal for the nobility to apply their makeup in full public view to impress and put on a show.

However, all that changed in Victorian times. Queen Victoria frowned upon makeup considering it only to be worn by loose women and strumpets. It all

changed again from 1901 and gained momentum during the First World War once women had started to earn their own money.

The early 20th century powder compacts were tiny but during the 20's and 30's they became bigger and with more style and creativity. Foil decorations and real butterfly wings were used for decoration. World War 2 compacts were often decorated with a regimental badge and popularly given as gifts to sweethearts. Sarah showed us examples crafted to look like envelopes, cameras, belts, parcels, suitcases and even a grand piano. All were very compact and skilful-

engineered and the 1950's was the fun decade for powder compacts.

Paper, card papier-mâché, silver & gold was all used in the manufacture but from the 1960's plastic took over.

Stratton was one of the leading companies right up until the 1990's. We all agreed that a return to those refillable beautiful compacts would be a great idea in our eco-friendlier approach today.



No sooner had Covid moved off the front pages, as we transition from pandemic to endemic, the world was plunged into another crisis with President Putin's war against **Ukraine**.

We simply do not know what changed world this event will lead us to but I suspect it will be far-reaching and shape our lives in one way or another for many years to come. Like all of you, I feel a sense of helplessness too but as an MP I can vote to impose the toughest suite of sanctions in our history against Russian and I have done so. More will come and not just from the state as companies and individuals vote with their feet.

I can also speak up about the humanitarian crisis and Britain's role in that; which I have done no matter how hard it was for Ministers to hear. There is always more we can do, and there are many things we are doing which Government Ministers simply cannot shout about on the ten o'clock news, but I often reminded our Western alliance is a team effort with many countries doing their bit. You can stay updated on what I say in the House on this, and the various ways you can help, at stevebrine.com/news

Since my last column for the *West Dever News*, I have presented to Parliament a Bill on a subject very close to my heart – **breast cancer**.


Its purpose is to increase uptake of NHS Breast Screening Programme appointments, especially in groups currently less likely to take up the offer, and to extend eligibility to people at an increased risk of breast cancer because of their family history. My hope is to influence the debate, and the ongoing Health & Care Bill, because we potentially have a looming crisis in this area as a result of Covid and the need to drive up early detection. Tackling **addiction** (both drug and alcohol) is a real passion of mine and something I have returned to time again; both in Government and from the backbenches. I recently visited two organisations that help in this field; the AA, who hold groups in Winchester every day of the week, and a really interesting new organisation called *Help Me Stop*.

The AA invited the Mayor, The Dean and myself to mark their 70th birthday recently and we were reminded this is an organisation that is truly a beacon of light and continues to do so much to help us battle one of the major addictions which blights so many lives. Fiinally, the work of our **armed forces** are never far away in a place like Winchester (and wider Hampshire of course) but I cannot tell you how much I am learning through my time as a member of the current Armed Forces Parliamentary Scheme. In short, we visit army facilities all over the country to help us better understand their work, their challenges and inform debate in Parliament.

In recent months we've been to Helicopter Command (at RAF Odiham), Sandhurst, Army Medical Services and the Specialist Weapons School near Westbury where we saw our potent anti-tank weapons systems. It was a timely visit as they very soon after were in active use by our Ukrainian friends. We often say the British Army are the best of the best. We're not wrong. EMPLOYMENT LAW TIPS FOR START-UP BUSINESSES

Starting a new business is an exciting time, but if you are planning to take on an employee, there are various laws, rules and regulations of which you should be aware.

Before recruiting it is important to make sure your business premises are safe and fit for purpose and that you are adequately insured for public liability and also for employer's liability.

An employment contract exists as soon as an applicant accepts your offer of employment even if the contract is only verbal.

It is a must to have a written employment contract at the start of employment to ensure that both you and the employee are clear about what you expect of each other.

There are legal obligations placed on all employers including notice periods, the right to be paid the minimum or living wage, rights in respect of holiday pay and sick pay, breaks, pension provision and rights to time off. Checking the employee's right to work in the UK before the employee starts work is also a strict legal obligation.

The rights to time off include such statutory rights as flexible working, parental leave, dependant leave, maternity, paternity, adoptive and shared parental leave. As an employer you must familiarise yourself with

these matters which protect the rights of the employee as well as your obligations in respect of pay during these absences.

You will also need to consider policies and procedures that you will wish to rely on later such as grievance, capability and disciplinary procedures.

If hiring self-employed people initially you also need to be aware that if they are not employees but are workers, then they will still have certain rights including an obligation for you to pay them holiday pay and in some cases sick pay. Even workers hired through an agency acquire the right to be treated in some respects the same as employees after 12 weeks in the business.

Employment law is complex and is constantly changing, with many potentially expensive pitfalls for the unsuspecting. It is imperative that you seek the advice of an Employment law specialist, such as Gill Brown, Jacqueline Kendal or Anna Burdett at a very early stage so that you do things correctly from the outset.

I was pleased and humbled to be a part of the 'Stand With Ukraine Vigil' arranged with City of Sanctuary, Southampton and Winchester Visitors Group (who support refugees

We notified the public through social media and despite the terribly wet weather, between 300-400 people attended to stand with the Ukrainian people. The storms of late February brought home the fragility of our services. This month, I am looking especially at the services that we need for our education, homes and businesses to function

Emergency planning: I met with HCC regarding their emergency planning when trees come down, blocking roads. It was an unprecedented event, but I'd really like to see HCC man the phones at the weekend instead of having to make a call to 101 when we know there is a weather event on the way. The best way to report a fallen tree remains online (plus picture if you can) or email roads@hants.gov.uk. In the light of the effects of the storms, will you be amending/updating your personal emergency plan? I had a chance to speak to some of the tree surgeons and electricians. They deserve our thanks, working in such dreadful conditions.

Electricity: many of you endured power cuts in the recent Dudley, Eunice and Franklin storms. Some residents are trying to beat electrical dependency by installing Solar Panels and Back Up batteries, **using an HCC sponsored scheme last year.** With just 25 home projects completed, and 271 cancelled out of over 1500 requests, it is clear that the supply chain isn't as resilient as hoped. Many people have paid significant deposits. I have raised this with the Leader, Cllr Mans, so if you know someone who committed to this scheme, please ask them to contact me. Thank you.

The Community Fibre Partnership Organisers and I were disappointed that the Gigabit broadband meeting with BDUK and Openreach was postponed until April: another delay to our hopes for a faster service. I'll report more in May

Residents needing help with fuel food or heating should contact their children's school, WCC (01962 840222) or Citizens Advice (0808 2787861) for assistance. Grants can be given to families or any adult over 60.

The County Council is cutting the street light levels again by 65%. This time, it is all through the evening, not just late at night. But they can set higher light levels

according to area, so if you think this will affect your safety, please let me know, and we'll make a plea for your journey to home or work to be better lit.

HCC argue that the junction has been safer since then. I disagree that this is a typical year- the traffic has been so much quieter. I have seen the CCTV footage of two recent accidents: it is distressing to watch, and a pattern is emerging. I have asked for consideration of stop signs as a temporary measure until Junction 9 is complete, but I believe we need to show strength of opinion to National Highways, as they finalise their road scheme for junction 9, right up to the Cart & Horses.
