Dear Friends

Tate and Lyles's green Golden Syrup tins still display an outline drawing of a lion's carcass with buzzing honey bees, below which are the words "out of the strong came forth sweetness". This was the basis of a riddle Samson set his soon to be in-laws with high stakes for the losers and, as they couldn't solve it, leant on future wife Delilah to find the answer for them! (Judges Ch 14)

Samson's story is told in the book of Judges which tells of the people's hunt for a suitable leader who would unite and lead them in battle against their enemies and be the final arbiter in disputes as the 'go to' person who would have the final say in important civil matters. Judges tells of the hunt up and down the country over a period of two hundred years searching for a suitable successor after the demise of each judge. Those appointed to the role were variously successful in their roles, some better than others but all having a flaw or points of weakness that in time let them down.

Samson was the last of the judges before Israel's monarchy was established but the question was the still same, who would be suitable to lead the nation?

The popular choice was a man called Saul but his flaws led to serious problems for himself and the nation. King David became the next king and described as "a man after God's own heart" as someone whose character, virtues and reverence for God made him trustworthy in the kingly role. Our Bibles include poems (Psalms) that King David wrote for worship but he was flawed, sinful, and is also known for his adultery with Bathsheba.

We might think we are more sophisticated than those ancient peoples with our structures for good governance, codes of conduct etc. (They did have the Ten Commandments and more besides.) But what if those in charge of due process, directors, managers or governors should fail in their role of oversight, how then is justice found for the mistreated and bullied, the whistle-blower and the organisation itself?

Dr Amy Orr-Ewing writing in The Times on sixth of June, told of her experience with victims of abuse and referenced a relatively recent area of research called 'Institutional Betrayal' which explores the failure of

responsible persons in an organisation to properly apply due process on behalf of employees who have made a complaint or brought a formal grievance. (If you are Google savvy the article is online as are links to IB researcher Professor Freyd). When victims are let down by those who should apply justice, they are twice let down.

And so, as the next Prime Minister takes office, let us heed St Paul's teaching to pray for those in authority. In the Book of Common Prayer we pray that our ministers and leaders are "endued with righteousness" and "that we may be quietly and godly governed...and that all who are put in authority under her (the Queen) may truly and indifferently minister justice, punishing wrong doing and maintaining "true religion and virtue". May we be so blessed.



Summary

A cool and dry couple of days gave way to a week of unsettled weather and some much needed rain. There then followed over a week of dry and predominantly sunny weather with increasing daytime temperatures and the warmest day at 84°F on the 17th. There was rain in the next two days and a moderate to fresh breeze on the 18th. Fine, sunny weather around the summer solstice was followed by an unsettled period with rain, and it was breezy at times. There were showers with thunder on the last day of the month. Night time temperatures were on average the lowest recorded in June for over two decades which resulted overall, in below average temperatures. There was just below two thirds of the normal rainfall for June and for the year to date, with less than the average rainfall on all but one month this year.

Walking with Wildlife, Robert Bryant

Heading up to Micheldever Woods for a ramble on a baking hot afternoon, we walk among the cool shady beech trees. Here and there the sun lights up a patch of the woodland floor. A speckled wood butterfly basks in the warm glow, wings open. He flies up to challenge another passing male in a fluttery tussle, both spiralling upwards into the beam of light.

Emerging into the sunlit clearing, an Iron Age hilltop enclosure, we pass a tumble of bramble in blossom, swishing with tall grasses and rippling with butterflies. Ringlets, cocoa brown, drift among the grass stems; small skippers, moth-sized splashes of gold whizz about. Meadow browns and marbled whites wander the grass-heads and tangles of crown vetch, blooming pink and purple. A comma, orange-brown, poses on the bramble bank; while a brimstone, bright yellow, roams overhead.

We stroll along the main avenue in sunlight and shadows scanning the woodland edges. Spikes of foxglove thimbles, pinky-purple, cluster in clearings. A red admiral sunning itself on the path takes off in surprise. Magnificent silver-washed fritillaries, marmalade orange, lounge on the high bramble banks. One lifts off to pursue a female, looping around her as she races away along the shady ride.

There's another large orange fritillary in these woods, the dark green, with silver spots on its green underwing. We watch a female busily absorbed in laying eggs low down on tree trunks.


Turning left into the old jubilee ride, we meet an exotic visitor with bright red wings: a day-flying moth - the scarlet tiger.

Winding our way back through a shady ash and conifer plantation, we chance upon a large black butterfly with white wing bars - a white admiral - dabbling in a muddy puddle before taking off to glide through the trees. Alas we miss the most elusive of these woodland residents. Returning to the main avenue on a scorching morning later in the week however, I pause to view three comma butterflies probing on the path, when a purple emperor swoops down, looping around me, its wings flashing purple-blue in the bright sunshine.

Cllr Jackie Porter County Corner - March 2022

I have received several complaints right across the division about cancelled bus services which leave residents stranded, and so I have raised this with Stagecoach and HCC.

It seems that they will only announce cancellations on Twitter, which is completely unsatisfactory.

The County Council has recorded their disappointment that that they were not successful in receiving any Bus Back Better funding. The original BBB fund was announced as £3bn, then cut back to just £1.4bn, resulting in only 31 of 79 bids being successful. Add to this, the pressure on commercial services at present: Covid, shortage of passengers and shortage of drivers are playing their part in this. This puts considerable pressure on the County's transport discretionary funding which includes a taxi run-bus services, CANGO, community bus grants and support for smaller link buses such as the 95 and the 240.

However, good news: HCC received a flood aid grant of over £0.74m, which included Phase 1 of the Outer Winchester scheme. HCC claimed an additional sum of £0.243 m for phase 2 of this scheme in Feb 22, which will be spent in this financial year.

HCC also received £9.4m in developer contributions in 21/22, mainly used to provide road improvements and school places, including special school places which are still under considerable pressure as well over 13,000 young people now have an Education Health and Care Plan in Hampshire alone. I continue to work with local families on these plans but please contact me if you feel that you need assistance.

HCC has also received £0.8m to develop a business case for a 'Mini-Holland' for Winchester: the bid focus is to improve walking and cycling to and from the city centre, and potentially introduce some Low Traffic Neighbourhoods (LTN's) in the city too. All of this will be subject to public consultation, so please watch for more detail to come.

Kings Barton roads: I know that many Parishes are affected by decisions made by Cala and HCC about the final road system at Kings Barton. A new County Executive (Cabinet) has just been formed, and so I am afraid the pressure to get this right for all residents both in Kings Barton and across the north of Winchester has started anew with correspondence and a conversation with the new Exec Member, Cllr Heron. He has agreed to meet me to see the roads (as they are now) this month too.



Managing weed in our chalk streams

While the immense value of our local chalk streams is widely accepted, how best to preserve them is the subject of great debate. It is true that many have been modified, and therefore cannot be entirely left alone, but intensive management may actually do more harm than good. A lighter touch, carefully used, can make them welcoming for both people and wildlife.

Take aquatic weed, for example. Excess nutrients coupled with a lack of tree shade can result in rampant growth that chokes the channels. The water level rises while the flow speed drops, leading to sediment accumulation and sometimes a boom in water parsnip, bur-reed, or mare's tail. Yet knowing when to get the cutter out can be tricky, even for experienced river keepers.

If too much weed is cut, the health of the channel and margins can be seriously impacted. The Holy Grail is leaving enough aquatic plants to provide wildlife habitat, but enough gaps to encourage vigorous flow. This helps to manage water levels and keep the gravelly bed clear of fine sediment, which is essential for the breeding of trout and the invertebrates on which they feed.

Submerged plants should also be allowed to break the surface, otherwise the breeding of threatened river flies like the blue winged olive will be drastically impaired. These species are a crucial part of chalk stream ecosystems, providing food for bats, birds, and fish. If we learn to live with a slightly 'shaggier' look to the streams, our restraint will eventually pay dividends.

Protect your dog and our rivers this summer

Our dogs love to cool off in hot weather, but did you know that a dip in the river could cause real trouble for its wildlife? Many pet flea treatments are water soluble, and highly toxic to invertebrates like freshwater shrimp and may fly larvae. As a food source for many other species, these invertebrates are central to the health of their ecosystems.

So, how can you help to prevent this? Firstly, explore non-toxic treatment options – fipronil and imidacloprid are ingredients to avoid. Secondly, leave

several days between the application and your dog's next dip: swimming too soon can make the treatment less effective, so this way your pet and our wonderful wildlife will both be better protected.

A new POS system for the store

The most far-reaching change to the operation of the store since it opened in June 2019 is currently under way. A totally new point-of-sale (POS) system is currently being installed. It incorporates new tills, scanners and card readers which will streamline back-office functions including ordering and monitoring stock levels. This in turn, will improve product availability as well as pricing and accuracy of shelf-edge labels. It represents a major investment and has not been undertaken lightly, but has been necessitated by the store generating a level of turnover far in excess of our pre-opening business plan predictions. On the Farm in August - Julian Gibbons

The hot dry weather has rushed crops to harvest. I went away on holiday for the first 2 weeks of July confidently telling people that we wouldn't have anything to cut until we were back and that we rarely start before the 25th July. I arrive home to forecast record temperatures and warm malting barley in the grainstore.

I also had text messages on my phone from Becky, our area manager, from United Oilseeds warning us about harvesting oilseed rape when it is too dry. Although for storage it has to be below 9% moisture, below 6% can result in deductions and in some cases rejection. It will also incur deductions if it is too hot. This will explain to you if like me you were lying in bed early one morning and hearing the hum of a combine harvester. In an ideal world you are harvesting dry grain on warm, but not hot days! To try to cool the hot grain we install what look like chimneys into the grain. On top of these are placed grain fans that draw air through the grain to cool it. To make it more efficient we have a controller on the fans that measures the temperature of the grain and that of the air. It will then turn the fans on when the air temperature is 5c less than the grain temperature. This is so much more effective than doing it manually especially when you forget to turn the fans off.

We should be cutting wheat before the end of July that rarely happens for us at Bradley and Wield.

Grain prices have moved in a quite spectacular way in the last 12 months since we planned this year's harvest. Last August the futures price for November 2022 was £173. By mid-February it was £205. Three months later it reached £352/tonne, but it has fallen steadily since then to £252/tonne as I write this. Markets used to move £20/tonne in the season once.

This makes planning cropping for next year quite a fluid. Fortunately we now know what our fertiliser cost are for next year. We have bought some Urea for the first time for many years and we have saved lots from last year. We have more muck to use this year having agreed muck for straw deals and I have 3 lorry loads of Fibrophos and phosphate fertiliser booked. Both of these are a by-product of biomass power stations that burn poultry litter.

We have fields clear for soil sampling, but at the first attempt the sampler had to return to her base because her mechanical auger broke trying to get in to the dry hard soil.

As always we do apologise if your journey is delayed, whilst you are stuck behind a trailer full of grain. We do try to pull in if possible and safe to do.

Please also think which is easier to reverse, a car where you can see out the back or a tractor and grain trailer. Trailer drivers can generally reverse very well, because we make sure they practice a lot. Car reversing also becomes easier if you practice!

We are continuing to thoroughly enjoy our very sociable programme of evening garden visits. In June we visited a four-acre garden near East Tisted where we were given guided tours by the owner and head gardener around the grounds including the arboretum, arched rose walk, David
