


Easyfundraising for the Parish of Farleigh

If you shop online, please read on and see how you can participate in this great fundraising scheme, without it costing you a penny more. By registering with the website below you can link your regular online spending to a specific cause. In this case we have registered separately St Martins, St Leonards, St Andrews and All Saints as 'causes'.(All the funds raised will go into the single Parish Account for the Parish of Farleigh.) Each store will donate a certain percentage of your spending to your selected charity, it does not cost you personally anything extra. There are over 7000 participating stores including most supermarkets and main suppliers. Here is the process:

- 1. Go to the website: https://www.easyfundraising.org.uk (There is a short video showing how to proceed.)
- 2. Set up an account, by entering basic details, when prompted, name, address, email address. Search for the cause, i.e. the individual church, which then links to your spending.
- 3. Then use the search function in the site to get to the shopping site you want to use and shop as normal

IN THE FIELDS By Seumas Foster Mid Winter has a Charm of its own

Situated where we are, on a latitude of 51 degrees north and a longitude of 1 degree west, we get quite a variation in daylength during a year, and we are just about to go through the time of the shortest days. The farming cycle is affected because vegetation, needing more light energy to grow, has stopped growing. Leaves have mostly fallen from trees and hedges, and plants are only just ticking over. Soils are resting, maybe frozen but more likely to be wet and muddy.

Livestock are sheltering, some brought into sheds and barns for the winter, some outside but being given extra feed and generally supported through the winter. Sheep will be gestating next years 'crop' of lambs.

There are exceptions to every rule so there will be some plants and animals that can take advantage of the seasonal change, they have adapted so they can occupy and utilise this niche.

However mostly this period is a struggle for survival as food gets harder to find, so that must be where we give the most effective help, such as providing some shelter and supplementary feeding,

The crops in our area look well established now, but as the winter weather has closed in any intentions for late sowing may have to be scrapped and alternative plans made. There have been some pictures of other farms in the country trying to harvest potatoes and sugar beet from waterlogged, muddy fields, tractors sinking up to the axles, and deep ruts full of muddy water. Thank goodness we don't have to cope with those conditions, we can really feel for those who have had much worse conditions than us. It must be soul destroying to have fields under water after a crop has been sown, emerged, and started to grow. Natural flood plains have always flooded in winter and were farmed for the conditions that the natural drainage could cope with, usually grass for grazing, or summer haymaking. The basic principle of flood management is this; 'If you leave the plug in a basin, the water won't drain away '. The October rainfall here was substantial at 177mm, but only 3 years ago we had 236mm in October. November looks likely to be another wet month. We have already had 4 consecutive months with totals over 104 mm, so the rainfall is building up.

Christmas, the big celebration of the winter, is coming just after the shortest day when we can hopefully all look forward to a week or more of 'R&R', and of course carol singing!

Some people say they don't like January because it feels like a long, dull month, but it's the beginning of a New Year. There will be some bright days with clear skies to look forward to.

I would like to wish you all on behalf of 'In the Fields' a Very Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year and may your Wellington Boots never leak!!

Benefice Recipes

Hello all, the year seems to have flown by and here we are again at the Christmas issue.

Summer clothes are hidden away, and winter woollies are in full swing. Not a single idea for children's Christmas presents in my head, it was so much easier when they were tiny tots and Tractor Ted was top of the list. I was reminded by my mum of when they were about 8 and 5 and I had bought a tin of Ouality Street which I put in the porch ready for

Christmas. I never thought to sneak a treat for myself, but they did! When I eventually opened that tin up it was about half full. The boys had unwrapped the Sellotape from around the lid, helped themselves to the choccies and sellotaped it back up each time they dipped into it! Cheeky boys.

Well, something for the festive season.

Blue Cheese Date and Walnut sausage rolls Preheat oven 200c /180c fan/gas 6 Makes 24 (if making bigger ones adjust your cooking time) 50g Walnut halves 500g Puff pastry chilled 350/400g Sausage meat or 6 sausages with skins removed 150g Stilton rind removed and crumbled or any blue cheese you may have.

You will need—100g pitted dates coarsely chopped, 2 tbsp chopped parsley 1 medium egg lightly beaten

Method

Preheat oven. Spread the walnuts on a baking tray and toast for 6 minutes. Remove leave to cool and then coarsely chop.

Roll out the pastry to roughly 40cm x 26cm rectangle then cut in half long ways to make two long strips.

Put the Sausage meat, walnuts, Stilton, dates, and parsley in a bowl and mix till well combined. Divide the mixture in half and shape each half into two long sausage shapes the length of your pastry (flour your hands if it's too sticky or roll in cling film). Lay each sausage down the centre of each piece of pastry, brush the long edges with a little beaten egg then roll up with the join underneath to hold everything in. Brush all over with the beaten eggs.

Cut each into 12 individual sausage rolls (I like to do a couple of scissor snips on the top of each) Space apart on a lined baking sheet and bake for 15-20 minutes until puffed and golden brown.

Lovely with a winter salad or a good dollop of chutney.

So, children are fed and watered, fire lit, cup of tea in hand, and a slice of cake beside me, the dog by my side doing his staring thing at the cake and then at me and then the cake again. I'm trying not to think of presents I haven't bought yet and I'm looking for a lovely old movie to watch, something with Cary Grant would be just perfect.



Has to be a Christmas theme – so 5 facts about Holly.

There are more than 200 different cultivated varieties of native holly.

Druids, Celts and Romans brought evergreens into their homes during winter,

believing the plant's ability to keep its leaves was magical and assured the return of spring.

In Christianity, holly was adopted as a symbol of Christ's crown of thorns, the crimson berries a symbol of his blood and the evergreen a metaphor for life and death.

Most hollies are either male or female and need the opposite sex nearby to produce fruit. There are many varieties of both in the holly wood in Dr Wilfrid Fox's arboretum at Winkworth in Surrey, but two confused specimens stand out.



When naming the festive sounding silver queen and golden king, with their creamy-white and yellow-tipped leaves, the plant breeders muddled the sexes. The queen is a male holly, and the king is female.

The wood of the holly has been used by furniture makers for centuries. It is a dense and finely textured wood and was popular in decorative marquetry and inlay work, and as a white wood it can be easily stained.

As well as its variety of uses in furniture the logs burn hot and long, so it's a perfect fuel for the fire in cold weather.

Over the centuries holly has also played a major part in garden design. So bring in the holly, enjoy its rich green, vibrant red, and have a wonderful Christmas!



4. County Council renews commitment to Hampshire's Armed Forces

5. Useful links for power cuts and flooding

In the aftermath of Storm Ciaran, Scottish and Southern Electricity Networks have provided some useful links in the event of future power cuts.

Any loss of supply or damage to the electricity network can report by dialling 105. You can also obtain details of power cuts and restoration times on SSEN's Power Track Website. Their website also contains advice and information on how to deal with a power cut and there is also a webchat service.

You can read advice online about how to prepare for flooding and check The Environment Agency web pages for updates relating to flood alerts for the area. For assistance in the event of flooding call 0345 988 1188 or text 0345 602 6340.

6. Household Support Fund

Support from this fund has been provided to Hampshire households on 825,000 occasions since its launch two years ago. The £14.2m fund will run until March next year and has included support for community pantries and the provision of food vouchers. Details can be found at www.connect4communities.org

Oak Class visit Winchester Science Centre

Oak Class went to visit the Winchester Science Centre to complement our learning in Science about Space.



We first went to the amazing planetarium, which projected lights onto the ceiling. It showed us that our galaxy is part of many within the universe. We saw the whole Solar System and loads of moons. We learnt that Saturn and Jupiter are both gas giants, and Neptune and Uranus are both ice giants. We also learnt that there are over 2 billion galaxies in our universe. As we looked up into the night sky, we had a glance at all of our constellations. We saw ones like the big dipper and the great bear. Looking at all the stars and planets, you started to notice that space is bigger than you think. It felt like you were floating in space as if we had a space suit on. Many of the planets, such as Neptune (the god of the sea), are named after Roman gods and goddesses. We thought that it was spectacular to see our Solar System in a matter of minutes. As we made our way back to Earth, we headed outside into the

rest of the Science centre.

Downstairs, there was a space suit that you could go inside for pictures. We went in to the small big room, which was really fun. On our way around, we saw wobbly mirrors that made you tall and small. There was also a game where you would roll balls around, but they would slowly lose momentum and fall through the middle: this represented a black hole sucking in stars.

There was a balloon which was in a chamber, and you could change the air pressure. This meant that you could get rid of all the air in the balloon.

Further along, there was a little Mars rover that you could control through a keypad, and it was put on a Mars-like terrain. There was a globe that could be switched to different planets, and you could search the surface for any cool spots or storms on that planet. There was also a pumpable rocket where you pumped air inside to launch it in the air. This demonstrated how fuel amounts matter.

HCC budget reductions

I mentioned in my last report the steps that the county council are considering ensuring it can balance its budget going forward in the face of central government underfunding of local government. A final decision is to be made by the full county council at its meeting on 9 November. I will let you know next month about the deci-

sions taken and further public consultations.

_2.Update to Hampshire Minerals and Waste Plan latest

Over the next two months, an update of the Hampshire Minerals and Waste Plan is set to be considered by each of the five authorities that contribute to the plan (Hampshire County Council, New Forest National Park Authority, Portsmouth City Council, Southampton City Council and South Downs National Park Authority) to determine whether each authority agrees that further consultation can take place prior to the Plan being submitted to the Government's Planning Inspectorate for examination. HCC's decision will be made on 12 December. Once approved by all authorities, an eight-week consultation will be launched in January 2024. The responses to the consultation are then submitted together with the Plan to the Planning Inspectorate for scrutiny. The local policies contained within the Plan guide the decisions that each of the five minerals and waste planning authorities make when determining planning applications for minerals extraction or waste infrastructure and operations.

3.Consultation on proposed changes to school and post-16 transport

Proposed changes to Hampshire County Council's School and Post-16 Transport Policies are the subject of two public consultations which run until Wednesday 6 December.

The proposals have been put forward to provide more flexible transport arrangements that better respond to children's needs, demand and external market pressures, while bringing services in line with the latest statutory guidance from the DfE. The proposals are not part of a savings programme, and do not include any proposed changes to the eligibility criteria for School and Post-16 Transport.


