#### **Dear Friends**

We moved to Preston Candover on April 1<sup>st</sup>, 2011, and find it hard to think that was 13 years ago, time goes by so quickly.

Time is a funny thing, just try explaining what it is! "What then is time? If no one asks me, I know what it is. If I wish to explain it to him who asks, I do not know." (St Augustine) Whatever it is, it passes very quickly and somehow gets faster each year!

There is a time for everything, planting and reaping, building up or tearing down, says the Old Testament book Ecclesiastes in the list of 'seasons'. My time serving as Rector of our churches in the benefice will end on March 3<sup>rd</sup> and I shall be taking up a new role in the Parish of the Resurrection, Alton.

Jesus made the invitation personal, "...those whom the Father has given me will come to me, and I will never reject them...this is the will of God, that I should not lose even one of all those he has given me, but that I should raise them up at the last day. For it is my Father's will that all who see his Son and believe in him should have eternal life" John 6:37ff.

My God bless to you today and always and keep you in the knowledge of his love and promises in Jesus Christ.

#### The new Bishop of Winchester, Rt Rev Philip Mounstephen

The Rt Rev Philip Mounstephen was announced as the new bishop in July 2023, and officially started in January. His service of welcome was held at Winchester Cathedral on Saturday, January 13. Bishop Philip will serve as the 98th Bishop of Winchester Diocese, which covers 255 parishes across most of Hampshire, parts of Dorset, the Isle of Wight and the Channel Islands.

Philip was educated at Southampton University and Magdalen College, Oxford, before training for ministry at Wycliffe Hall, Oxford. He served his title at St James', Gerrards Cross and St James', Fulmer, in the Diocese of Oxford, and was ordained priest in 1989.

In 1992, Philip was appointed Vicar of St James', West Streatham, in the Diocese of Southwark. Between 1998 and 2006, Philip worked for the Church Pastoral Aid Society during which time he held several roles. From 2007, he served as Chaplain of St Michael's, Paris, in the Diocese of Gibraltar in Europe and, in 2012, he was appointed Chief Executive of the Church Mission Society.

In 2019, Philip took up his current role as Bishop of Truro. He is married to Ruth, a former strategic planner, and they have one adult daughter.

Bishop Philip will be visiting our Benefice on February 11<sup>th</sup> and will be preaching and meeting people at Preston Candover at the 10.00am service and Cliddesden at the 11.15am service.



Preparation for a busy spring is coming to an end, fertiliser plans have been finalised, machinery has been serviced and the farm team have enjoyed a well-deserved rest before another busy period begins.

Spring beans are the first crop on our list to drill, followed by spring barley and maize in late spring. The sheep will be leaving the farm in February and returning with their lambs in April. Grain continues to be sold and moved off farm destined for the mill and maltsters. After a successful agricultural society dinner, I was delighted to depart with a couple of awards for our 2023 crops, an extra bit of encouragement to 'do better' for the season to come!



#### IN THE FIELDS By Seumas Foster

#### Summary of rainfall in 2023.

The total for 2023 was 1284mm, at least 300mm above the recent annual average. There were 9 months with totals over 100mm, the last 6 months were all over 100mm. December had 18 days when rain fell. January 2024 has started wet but as a high-pressure system settles, we might get some respite!

<u>Farleigh Estate - Introducing Cian Flavin</u>, who is the farm manager at Farleigh Estate, having now completed his first year at the farm. He has written a note to introduce himself and give us some information about the Estate now.

Hello and Happy New Year to you all. My name is Cian Flavin, farm manager at Farleigh Wallop Estate. I joined the estate in February 2023. With Chris Allen retiring after 41 years of farming the land, the Wallop family decided to take the farming business back in hand. I am originally from Tipperary, Ireland. and moved to the UK in 2014 to begin my studies at Harper Adams University. After completing my degree. I joined a farming company, Velcourt Ltd. During my time at Velcourt I had the opportunity to farm in Cambridgeshire, Northumberland, and Gloucestershire before moving to Hampshire. I have experienced an array of farming practices, meeting many knowledgeable farmers on my travels.

So how has my first year been at Farleigh Wallop Estate... an exciting challenge! I am very fortunate for the support of everyone on and off the estate in the last year. My goal every year is to farm profitably, safely, and environmentally, three core fundamentals to any successful farming business. UK agriculture is a dynamic industry and we as custodians of the land need to farm sustainably for the next generation.

What positive changes have been made to date? Carbon and climate change is at the forefront of every industry. One of our goals on the farm is to reduce our carbon use. In 2023 I increased the volume of digestate used on the land from the anaerobic digester at Farleigh, decreasing the artificial fertiliser usage. Digestate is an organic fertiliser boosting our soil and crop health. Livestock have been re-introduced to the farm. During the summer months we had a herd of cattle grazing the grassland and throughout the winter, sheep are grazing the cover crops before being planted with spring barley. The farm has joined a new environmental scheme, the sustainable farming incentive (SFI). In the spring a variety of wildflowers, winter bird food and herbal leys will be established throughout the estate. These areas are to promote habitats for a number of wildlife species.

February, the last month of winter and a prosperous spring ahead!

#### LATEST CAGE NEWS – 10<sup>th</sup> December 2023

The CAGE Steering Group has been monitoring local plans since the Public Enquiry when Newland's, (the developer) plans for warehouses on Oakdown Farm, Dummer, were rejected by the Inspector. As you may know, there are now two Planning Applications in the pipeline - both will have a significant impact on the local area. One is a revised warehouse scheme on Oakdown Farm, and the other is a new Basingstoke Hospital north of Junction 7 of the M3.



Here are the timings for both applications:

Basingstoke Hospital: consultation started, possible PA submission March 2024.

Oakdown Farm warehouses: consultation started, possible PA submission **December 2023.** 

When Planning Applications are made, each one is considered on its own merit. Other future potential Planning Applications in the area which might impact on a current application, will not be taken into account.

The Local Plan Update is in process now. This plan will set out how Basingstoke and the district, should develop over the next 15 years. We'll be keeping you informed about this as it is significant when it comes to planning in the SW of Basingstoke.

### Benefice Recipes

Hello all, so Christmas and New Year brought the horrid cough to the house. Hot honey and lemon was served on a regular basis unfortunately the Covonia dry cough mixture only lasted for one spoonful. My son clearly thought I was trying to poison him; I did try some and I agreed it was revolting.



Anyway, it didn't stop the mountain of food eaten, namely chocolate. Bob the dog had a fabulous time, over excited about ripping open presents. His squeaky pheasant has lost his squeak, and his treats are being rationed much to his disgust. A week of overindulgence with Wallace and Gromit, Worlds Strongest Man and World Darts Championship. Child number one is now back to college and Nocturnal child number two is back to school, routine reigns again.

The recipe for February is rather simple but tasty.

#### Salmon and Spinach Gratin

Serves 6

Preheat oven 160c/140c fan/gas 3

You will need:

1.2 kg Spinach, 15 g butter, 6 Salmon fillets (can be the lightly smoked ones and preferably skin off)

300ml Double Cream.

#### Method

Put the spinach in a really big saucepan (or two pans) and add a few table-spoons of water. Set on a medium heat and cook till wilted, just keep turning it. Tip into a colander to drain. When cool squeeze all the water out really well.

Chop the spinach. Melt the butter in a pan and gently toss the spinach in it. Season with salt and pepper (you could use a grating of nutmeg as well). Heat the oven. Lay the spinach in a dish and then arrange the salmon fillets on top.

Heat the double cream in a small pan then pour it all over the salmon and spinach. Bake for 35 minutes until the top is golden and the cream is bubbling.

Serve with a lovely crusty bread.





#### **Hello From Claire**

Happy New Year!

Belated, but never too late to send a good message.

I was listening to Scarborough Fair by Simon & Garfunkel the other day, and the refrain gave me an idea.

'Parsley, Sage, Rosemary & Thyme' Herbs. Tasty, fragrant, healthy, decorative, good for the bees – what's not to love.

So this year I thought we could look at a different herb each month...starting with the Scarborough Fair 4.

Parsley – flat leaf or curly – *Petroselinum crispum* 

Parsley is a hardy bi-ennial, but usually treated as an annual.

Sow the seed where they are to grow in spring, soaking the seeds overnight to hasten germination. Sunny position with moist soil. Thin to around 20cm/8 inches apart.

Use flat leaf for flavour in cooking, curly for decoration.

The leaves and stalks are good for flavour in all savoury dishes, in sauces and as a garnish.

Medicinally an infusion of the leaves and stalks is rich in vitamin C, can ease rheumatic pain and relieves piles. Chewing the leaves will freshen breath.

#### Something to try: Potato Cakes with Parsley

12oz freshly mashed potato

Fresh ground black pepper

chopped parsley

4oz flour

2oz butter

2 tablespoons

Gradually work the flour into the hot mashed potato, add salt and pepper to taste.

Cut softened butter into small pieces and stir in, with the parsley. Beat until smooth.

Roll out on a floured board, using plenty of flour, until about 1/4" thick. Cut into rounds and cook on a lightly greased hot griddle until golden brown on each side.

Great with bacon and eggs for a yummy breakfast.

The Hampshire and Isle of Wight Fire & Rescue Service has published its mid-year update on their annual performance. This provides useful (and positive) insights as to the activities of the service and is well worth a look. #### 4. Hampshire Minerals and Waste Plan consultation

#### 5. Climate change and nature recovery

The Council has published its Climate Change Annual Progress Report which highlights the progress of council backed community initiatives and its own efforts to tackle climate change. One example is the Solar Together scheme - over the past two years, 2,100 households have purchased competitively priced solar panels, resulting in the installation of 7,400kw of rooftop solar power, which has the capacity to save an estimated 46,000 tonnes of carbon emissions.

Separately, the Council is launching a survey asking residents where they would like to see improvements for nature recovery, their views on nature priorities and what action they may be taking locally to help nature in their area. Gathering this information is an important first step in the development of a Local Nature Recovery Strategy which aims to ensure Hampshire's natural environment is protected for today's and future generations. That strategy is intended to create a blueprint for the recovery of nature in Hampshire – outlining what we can do, where the opportunities for doing it are, and considering how it can be delivered alongside wider positive environmental outcomes for people and nature, such as reduced flood risk. It will provide organisations with a framework for developing nature recovery projects and help prioritise funding and investment in Hampshire's nature's recovery. #### 6.Roads

A final report for your perusal, this time the County Council's Highways Service Annual Review for 2022/23 which offers useful insights into the Highways team's activity over what has been an exceptionally busy and challenging period. You can access the review via the link. You will notice the continuing intensive focus on fixing potholes and other road defects following confirmation of the 3-year Stronger Roads Today campaign in July. This has enabled the deployment of significantly more repair teams and specialist equipment with the primary aim of making our roads better, fixing defects more quickly, and addressing the widespread deterioration from last winter's wet and freezing weather. . Household DIY waste charges ended

From 1 January 2024, residents using Hampshire County Council Household Waste Recycling Centres (HWRCs) will no longer be charged for disposing of their DIY waste - in line with the Government policy changes.

Up to two 50-litre rubble bags, or one bulky item such as a sink or toilet pedestal, will be accepted for free, at a maximum frequency of four visits over four weeks. Anything more than this amount will be chargeable at current rates, as permitted by national legislation, to cover specialist disposal costs. DIY waste can be accepted at all HWRCs in Hampshire except New Alresford due to its restricted size. Customers must also be able to lift, carry and empty out their DIY waste.

The Council estimates that the removal of the charges could impose an additional cost to Hampshire council taxpayers of up to £2 million every year. This is because recycling or disposal of DIY waste, such as soil, rubble, asbestos and gypsum board, requires specialist processing and the fees we currently charge help to cover these expenses. This will need to be taken into account as part of the Council's savings proposals to help meet a £132 million budget shortfall faced by the local authority from April 2025. This will include a review of Hampshire's HWRCs.

#### 2. Schools

Parents with children due to start school or move to a junior school in September 2024 are reminded that they have until **Monday 15 January 2024** to submit their primary school applications. Parents will have the best chance of being offered a place at one of their preferred schools by applying on time and naming three preferences on their applications.

A recent survey across secondary schools and colleges in Hampshire shows a large increase in the percentage of young people both experimenting with, and using vapes. The survey shows that experimentation with vapes increases from 4% in year 7 to 53% in year 13. Similarly, vape use increases from 7% in year 10, to 18% in year 13. The Council is therefore continuing its clampdown on shops selling vapes illegally to underage buyers. Test purchase operations took place in December 2023, with visits to 17 different premises with teenage volunteers helping officers by going into the businesses to attempt to buy a vape, also known as an e-cigarette. Since September 2023, Trading Standards has prevented the sale of over £200,000 of illegal vapes and e-cigarettes by removing them from shops across Hampshire.

#### Chalk stream poetry competition and literature festival

Hampshire's chalk streams are some of its most precious wild places. These globally rare habitats are home to iconic species like the otter, water vole, brown trout, and kingfisher. With their serene beauty and vibrant wildlife, it's no surprise that chalk streams have inspired authors like Jane Austen, Thomas Hardy, Richard Adams (*Watership Down*), and Charles Kingsley (*The Water Babies*).

This year, there are several exciting new ways to discover our chalk streams. The Watercress and Winterbournes Landscape Partnership Scheme is teaming up with Hampshire Library Service to continue a literary tradition that spans centuries. We'll be sharing our favourite river-focused books and celebrating creativity through a poetry competition and literature festival.

The poetry competition, which is free to enter, asks 7-18 year olds to write a short poem inspired by the wonderful world of chalk streams. Winners will receive National Book Tokens worth up to £75, and have their poems published in a special commemorative booklet. Entrants must live within the scheme area, which includes the Candover Valley, and submit their entry by midnight on 31<sup>st</sup> July 2024.

Both children and adults can also enjoy a watery literature festival this summer. Participants can expect to hear talks by prominent nature writers like Amy-Jane Beer and Tom Moorhouse, and to explore their own creativity with chalk stream-themed writing workshops. The events will be held this June in Andover, Whitchurch,

Overton, and Alresford.
