
MARY THOMAS (1942 – 2024): A LIFE OF ART, LOVE AND LAUGHTER

(We are enormously grateful to Alistair and Dominic Thomas for the historical content in this tribute.)

That St Leonard's Church was packed to capacity on 1st May for the funeral of our

very dear friend and neighbour, Mary Thomas, who has died at the age of 82 after a short illness, was a testament to just how greatly she is respected, loved and sadly missed by her loving family and by all her friends in Cliddesden and the wider community, whose lives she touched with her warmth and generosity of spirit. The mention of "Mary Thomas" to those who live here needs no explanation everybody knew the nice lady who lived in Pensdell Cottage, which, to borrow a phrase

from her beloved Cornwall, is the "first and



Born in Cornwall in 1942, Mary was a lifelong, staunch Cornishwoman, spending the happiest days of her childhood in the scenic village of St Agnes, on Cornwall's north coast, with her family including older sister Jennifer (Jenny). The safe environment of the village gave Mary a life-long sense of community, independence and curiosity.

Mary married Godfrey Thomas, a Cornishman, in 1966. They lived in various places, Newcastle, Holland, and Woolhampton and eventually arrived in Cliddesden where they became the stalwarts of Cliddesden village life that we all know so well, highly regarded by all and making many friends. Their sons, Alistair and Dominic, grew up here attending the local schools.

Trained as an art teacher, Mary spent the first half of her career teaching children but moved onto adult education in 1983. Always keen to learn new things, she took a degree course at Winchester School of Art in 1992, developing her love of art by exploring more abstract work and gaining a deeper understanding and appreciation of the subject, but equally importantly making new friends. After graduation in 1996 the course friends would continue to meet regularly and put on exhibitions as the "Remarks" art group.

In 1996 the council cut back on adult education. so the entrepreneurial Mary started art tuition herself, first in nearby villages and latterly in Cliddesden Millennium Village Hall (having portrayed the Old Village Hall – see picture), where she established her long-running Art Class, the many students from which displayed their artworks annually at Mary's Art Exhibition.



Art remained a career and passion that would stay with her the rest of her days, attending residential art courses at West Dean with her sister, Jenny, and teaching right up until the day she was taken ill.



The run-down garden at Pensdell Cottage was the perfect project for Mary to exercise her love of gardening and, after over 40 years of work, it's now a sight to behold. Indeed, flowers from the garden were used by Pat Doel in the funeral arrangements (see picture).

Sadly, in 2009, Mary's beloved Godfrey died, far too young, but despite the massive loss of her best friend and life partner, her independence and resilience shone through.

With the support of friends and family, Mary continued to thrive in the village alone. She involved herself in many activities such as Church walks, the Cleresden Land project, the village Coffee Mornings (where she set up the second-hand book stall), becoming a trustee of Cliddesden Community Conservation Group (aka "3CG", established by her good friend Alison Mosson) and joining the fledgling village choir and handbells team that we formed. Reading, gardening, family history, jigsaws, frequent travelling with her sons and her friend/bridesmaid, Jill Mitchell (they also became regular barmaids at village plays), enjoying the company of the Tuesday lunch group and, of course, teaching her many art classes completed an astonishingly active lifestyle.

Her loss to the community is immense and, while time will heal, many villagers, friends and, of course, family are at a loss to know how to move forward without her ubiquitous input to the life of Cliddesden. The art class is thriving, as Mary would have wanted, changing its tuition to a mutual student gathering in her memory.

One of the art class members, Jane Brooker, posted this message on the art class Facebook page shortly after Mary passed away, and this is part of it:

"I am thinking of Mary's classes and how she broadened my horizons so many times. She loved all artists and movements. She gently taught us in her classes to explore and pushed us out of our comfort zones to something new. I think I will always hear her voice when painting and drawing"

But the happy memories remain, despite there being a Mary-shaped hole in this community that nobody will ever be able to fill.

God Bless you, Mary Thomas – your legacy of laughter and fun lives on! Alistair, Dominic, Jenny and the wider family would like to express their thanks to Mary's friends for the wonderful attendance at her funeral (conducted very ably by Rev Ian Thacker), the considerable number of messages of support received and the collective donations totalling over £1,000, which have been divided equally between St Leonard's Church and Cliddesden Millennium Village Hall, which was Mary's declared wish.

We know that the retention of HWRCs and School Crossing Patrols, maintenance of vital community transport routes and the continued provision of homelessness grants to the end of their planned contract term are important to both the public and our partners.

While we will of course consider all the detailed proposals included in the SP25 package, we will also consider what other options may be available so that, should we be minded, we can choose different solutions and timescales at the point of our decision making in the autumn.

If agreed, the proposed changes to services would not commence until April 2025, so there is time for full democratic scrutiny to be undertaken this autumn. The County Council's excellent officer team have been diligent in preparing detailed proposals for the Select Committees to scrutinize and for Cabinet to then consider in due course.

These will only be proposals, while they will be recommended by our officers as part of the package of measures to meet the budget gap faced by the County Council we must, and will, fully take into account their profound impact and the huge public response to the consultation on the proposals that ended on 31st March.

Benefice Recipes

Hello all,

We had a holiday a month or so ago with my sister and her family in France, hoping for some sun. All seven of us in a people carrier, the kids on their phones in the back, me and Amelia in the middle shouting "stay on the right" at random moments at either Bruce or Adam who were doing the driving, "keep your eyes on the road" as we crossed rivers, climbed hills, and swept along tiny lanes edged with ditches and vineyards surrounding tiny hamlets. Many many supermarkets were visited, with the



kids dumping all sorts in the trolley knowing we were to busy trying to read labels, no nuts for me no gluten for my niece. We returned to Eymet with its beautiful market square, lovely food stalls, the fountain in the middle with bunting and the painting of the lovers on the wall. What did the children say when we parked up "Oh this is where we saw the dead Capybara in the river!" Days for them eating whatever and whenever they wanted and our evenings spent playing Dutch scrabble (that was the version in the Gite) were accompanied by many stinky, runny, creeping off the plate cheeses, utterly delicious.

Today I'm debating the fire being lit but a hot water bottle will have to suffice. The recipe this issue is for your Air fryer but can be done on the hob if you didn't succumb to the Air fryer fad.

Spring Onion, Air fryer Beignets with Herb mayo, and Sriracha

Ingredients

75 g butter, 225 ml water, 1 tspn sugar, 110 g plain flour 3 eggs, 3 spring onions chopped fine, Olive oil for brushing For the herb mayonnaise, 125 ml mayonnaise A handful of chopped mixed fresh herbs (Basil, parsley, mint ,or dill) 1 clove of garlic, Juice of half a lemon, Sriracha to serve

Method

Preheat the Air fryer to 200c and set your timer for 15 minutes. If you don't have an Air fryer, deep fry the beignets in an inch of vegetable oil until golden brown.

Heat the butter and water in a pan. Once simmering and foaming, take off the heat and dump in all the flour in one hit. Beat furiously until it comes together and leaves the side of the pan to create a dough.

Add the eggs a bit at a time and beat again until smooth, the mixture should just plop off the spoon and not be runny. Then mix in the chopped Spring Onion and season. Use two tablespoons to shape the mixture into balls and place straight onto a tray that goes in your Air fryer.

Brush each one gently with olive oil and fry for about 15 minutes until golden, puffed up and airy like little pillows. To make the herby Mayonnaise, simply mix all the ingredients together. Serve the beignets with the mayonnaise, extra spring onions and sriracha.

I think I would add a bit of Parmesan to this or grate some over the warm beignets before serving.

Our theme this year was France and we enjoyed red, white and rose wines from all over the country.



Hello From Claire

Double Whammy edition!

8 weeks of glorious sunshine, weed-free flower beds, slug-free lettuce, and self-cutting grass!

Oops, sorry, my unicorn took me too close to a cloud and I bumped my head. Maybe, one day......

A well-known plant this month, one which might earn itself a name as a 'flower in the wrong place' as it grows wild with great success, self-seeds, and puts down a root system to rival the mighty oak.



Comfrey: Botanical name: Symphytum Officinale: Family: Boraginaceae

Common names – Knitbone, Boneset, (Greek derivative 'Symphis' meaning 'to grow together, of bones, and 'Phytum' plant)

It might be that my slug-free garden dream could become a reality – slugs love comfrey!

Not the whole plant, just the cut leaves. Place a pile

of cut leaves overnight wherever you have a slug problem, and in the morning, it will be full of slugs – remove and dispose of. Repeat as necessary. This plant could just be the lazy gardener's friend – grows in all soil types, self-seeds readily, first-class composting plant, slug catcher, bee attractor. On the downside – it's nigh on impossible to remove once established, it will spread everywhere, and once fully grown spreads outwards so takes up a lot of room.

Oh, and it's been banned or restricted in several countries as the roots and fresh, young leaves contain Pyrrolizidine Alkaloids which can cause severe liver damage or even death.


However, fresh leaves cut and laid on cuts, bruises, and open wounds will promote healing. And, of course, to aid in the healing of broken bones. Interestingly, my herb book was published in 1980, and the research/studies banning comfrey date to around 2010.

So I'm not going to give you the recipe for comfrey leaves in cheese sauce, or suggest chopped leaves in salad, or even recommend the decoction of root and leave to ease coughs.
