#### **Dear Friends**

Is it possible to succeed and still have failed?

The Archbishop's Lent book this year is 'Failure' by Bishop Emma Ineson, a thoughtful and happily light-hearted book in the right places! Failure, she says, is part of human experience which should be embraced, reflected on and become a rich lesson in our learning.

Some failures are alright, for instance Thomas Edison inventor of the lightbulb said (purportedly) "I have not failed 10 000 times, I have successfully found 10 000 ways that will not work". Those failures were experimental, we really don't know what will happen so we try something out, though this approach might not be so sensible in a hospital or nuclear power station.

Human failure might be a lapse or slip, some inadvertent and innocent. Others are mistakes of poor judgement in deciding to ignore the sound advice of people who knew what they were talking about or seeking to achieve a goal at any cost! Often with dire consequences.

Desmond Tuto said, "The pressure to succeed has a lot to do with why people overstep the line. It is a peculiar weakness of Western culture where we have made a fetish of success. We give kudos to people who have succeeded if they succeeded. The worst thing that can happen in this cultural environment is to fail".

Success at any cost, is that right, do the means justify the end? St Paul reminds us that deeds done without love are worthless. I may have excellent qualities and competencies, great ability, and power, yet without love I will have failed. When love is just a value on the headed notepaper, it counts for nothing where there is aggression, deceit, domination, and untruths, all in the pursuit of outward excellence.

The sadness is that in denying our own failings we fail to face reality; we can pretend to others for a while, but we know what the case in our own lives is really! The bible is so encouraging when it tells us that yes, in denying our failings we deceive ourselves, but its whole story line faces the failure of human beings and shows God's work to bring us his forgiveness, his grace for change and commitment to stay with us. But it must begin with honesty, the admission things are not 100% ok, we've messed up.

As Easter approaches, we reflect on the life and death of Jesus, someone who was so successful in his life and yet was crucified, was that success or failure?

Jesus could have carried on doing his teaching and miracle work but in dying on the cross he achieved his greatest most successful action. On the cross in his death Jesus took on human failings, our sin and received in himself the penalty for human sin. Through his own death and resurrection Jesus has made peace for us with God and overcome death.

St Paul explains that the cross looked like failure to many but to those who are being saved' and receive God's grace it is his power and success. Every blessing David

#### Benefice Recipes

Well, we're on our third month already. A little hope in our hearts for the warmer days to come. The welcome thought of that first coffee and cake sat in the garden again. The hope that our fruit trees are bountiful with blossom and that the pigeons don't eat it all. They particularly like the plum blossom. I can see a pigeon and caramelised plum dish coming on!



The recipe this month is Carrot Fritters with Spiced Yogurt Dressing.

#### **Ingredients for the Fritters**

50g Plain Flour, 1 and a half tsps ground cumin,

1 and half tsps ground coriander

1 small bunch fresh coriander plus a few leaves reserved

1 Garlic clove crushed, 1 tbsp olive oil, 3 medium free range eggs, beaten

3 Carrots grated, excess water squeezed out,

2 small onions sliced, 150g Feta, crumbled

#### **Ingredients for spiced yoghurt**

1 tbsp olive oil, Half tsp ground coriander, Half tsp ground cumin, 1 and half tsp ground turmeric Half tsp paprika, 200g Greek yogurt

#### Method

In a mixing bowl combine the flour, cumin ground and fresh coriander, garlic, olive oil, eggs, carrots, onions and half the feta.

season with salt and pepper then stir well to coat the vegetables in the egg mixture. Using your hands shape 8 to 10 patties from the mixture and fry gently in a generous glue of olive oil. Do in two or three batches, for four to five minutes on each side until golden brown and the veg is tender.

Meanwhile heat a little oil for the spiced yogurt in a small pan over a low / medium heat. Add the ground spices and cook for a few minutes until fragrant. Remove from the heat and leave to cool then stir into the yogurt and season. Serve the fritters warm with the spiced yogurt and scattered with the remaining fresh coriander and feta.

The spiced yogurt dressing would suit chicken or lamb just as well.



#### IN THE FIELDS By Seumas Foster

#### **Spring and Germination**

In this part of the world March is the best time to sow spring barley and other spring cereals. Even if the fields could have been sown in February there would still be a good chance of more winter to come. The precious seeds, so carefully laid out at the perfect depth in a lovely seedbed, slowly push out a tender plumule and radicle (shoot and root) to have them frozen by an icy blast, or be flooded out until rot sets in. March is the best time as the risk of prolonged bad weather has passed, there is more light and warmth to get seeds growing quickly and keep them growing. The soil is coming alive again as it warms and nutrients are becoming available for the seedlings.

Seed is dried for storage and so the first process after planting is for the seed to absorb moisture and rehydrate the plant tissue, which in turn adjusts the osmotic pressure of cell contents and mobilises enzymes

The first visible growth is the radicle, ie.root, first seen a week or so after planting. The seed will have 'whiskers' ie. rootlets growing down into the soil. Soon after the roots, the shoot, ie. plumule, initially encased in a pale, protective sheath called a coleoptile, can be seen growing upwards from the seed to the soil surface. When it gets above the surface the coleoptile will split and the first true green leaf pushes out.

#### **Different Seeds have Different Ways of Germination**

What I have described is the process of germination for grasses, ie. monocotyledonous plants, usually called monocots. Dicotyledonous plants are those that have seeds in 2 parts, eg. beans, peas, linseed, and they germinate in a slightly different way, but that's another chapter. Either way the seeds produce roots and shoots and hopefully grows into the plant you want.

Most soils, particularly clay soils, have reserves which can be used. Nitrogen, however, is needed each year, so more care is being taken to get the most out of bought in material and make more efficient use of it.

Fixed costs like labour, and rent are not falling either, but the value of farm sales remains variable. Grain, meat, milk, etc., are commodities and farm prices fluctuate with world price.

Farms are looking at the planned spring sowings and may change plans to reduce risks.

#### **Post Brexit Farm Support**

At the same time as coping with the volatility of costs and incomes, Brexit changes to the E.U. Basic Payment Scheme (BPS) have been taking place. The UK government has given equivalent support with the condition that they will be phased out over a period of five years, and this period is nearly over. The impact has been different for different farms, fair to say the effect on all farms is significant. The Government promised that there would be a scheme to replace 'BPS' based on 'Public money for public good', in effect encouragement to farm more efficiently, and in ways that benefits the countryside, with cleaner air and water, healthier soils, less pollution and so on. The details of this scheme have been very slow to emerge, so planning on farm to prepare and adopt the schemes has been very difficult. Farmers meanwhile have bills to pay and so have another justified reason to hold off investment, development, and progress. There is light at the end of the tunnel, but it may be the train for some.



Sports events and workshops are the theme for this edition and what an exciting month it has been.





Carl Webb from SATRO visited the school to run STEM Coding workshops with Beech and Chestnut classes.

The children followed instructions on iPads to build a model using Lego Technics. Once the model was complete the children used coding instructions on the iPads to make the models move. Beech Class made windmills and racing cars. Chestnut Class built earthquake simulators and made buildings that had to withstand a simulated earthquake. The workshops allowed the children to explore simple algorithms and use sequence, selection and repetition in programs.

Year 1 and 2 had an exciting day going back in time to 1666. They were immersed in Cheap Street in London as urchins. They had to go to the different workshops and work very hard to ensure they might get a crust of bread to eat.

- 1. Scriveners- they made ink and wrote using a quill.

- 5. Soap makers the children had to grind the soap flakes and herbs to make a soap.
- 6. Apothecary the children were very good at acting out a variety of illnesses and even death! They then took it in turns to collect the correct herbs and make a remedy for the sick. The barber surgeon was also visiting ready to cut hair, pull out any teeth and even remove limbs!
- 7. Cordbiners the leather works luckily the children didn't need to mix the animal skin with urine and faeces. Instead they used hammers and denting tools to mark their initials and designs on a leather bookmark.

#### **Biosecurity For Our Chalk Streams**

With their serene beauty and intriguing wildlife, it's no surprise that our chalk streams draw people to them. But when visitors leave, they may not be alone: diseases and invasive species could be hitching a ride to their next destination. For streams that are under pressure, or home to vulnerable species, this stealthy spread can spell disaster.

Take the white-clawed crayfish, for example. This amazing animal thrives in chalk streams, where it uses the mineral-rich water to strengthen its shell. Yet it is now endangered, due largely to a water mould called 'crayfish plague'. The mould's carrier – the invasive signal crayfish – is mostly immune to its effects. For native crayfish, infection is usually fatal. Unfortunately, crustaceans aren't the only ones in trouble. Many chalk stream fish are susceptible to parasites like the fish louse, water moulds like Saprolegnia, and diseases like koi herpes virus or carp edema virus. Infection can lead to serious illness, and even death, in iconic species like the common carp, the brown trout, and the Atlantic salmon.

On the floral front, invasive non-native plants like monkeyflower, parrot's feather, and floating pennywort can flourish from just a sliver of root or stem. These fast-growing species can quickly dominate a chalk stream, depriving its wildlife of sunlight and oxygen. Once established, they are very difficult to permanently remove.

Luckily, there are easy ways to enjoy our precious streams while doing your bit for biosecurity. Whether you're a paddler, an angler, or a river keeper, you have a crucial role to play in their protection. Spores, eggs, and plant fragments can survive for weeks in damp conditions, so we recommend the 'Check, Clean, Dry' method:

CHECK your clothing and equipment after leaving the water. Remove any mud, aquatic animals, and plant material while on site.

- CLEAN your clothing and equipment as soon as you can, ideally with hot water. Make sure you get into all the nooks and crannies.
- DRY your clothing and equipment for as long as possible before using it again, especially if you will be visiting a different location.
