

LOCAL BEEKEEPERS URGE THE PUBLIC TO JOIN FIGHT AGAINST DESTRUCTIVE INVASIVE SPECIES

- Beekeepers across Hampshire are calling on the public to help spot and report Asian Hornet sightings as we head towards spring.
- The destructive insect poses the greatest threat to our native honeybees in a generation.
- Experts warns there could be catastrophic consequences for the UK's wider ecology if the insects are allowed to become established here.
- Asian Hornets can become aggressive when defending nests, posing a risk to public health.
- More nests were discovered in 2023 than in the previous six years combined.
- The cost to the economy in France, where Asian Hornets have become established, is estimated to be in excess of £26 million ever vear.

Local members of the British Beekeepers' Association (BBKA) are calling on the public to be vigilant and look out for Asian Hornets and nests as we head into the warmer months.

Asian Hornets are an incredibly destructive invasive species that specialise in preying on honeybee hives - one Asian Hornet alone can kill 30-60 honeybees per day. First discovered in the UK in 2016, the insect has travelled to our shores from northern Europe, where there are now over half a million nests annually in France alone.

By 2022, just 16 Asian Hornet nests had been discovered in this country. But in 2023, this increased dramatically to 72 nests in 56 different locations, with Kent and the Southeast most predominantly affected. But there have been sightings in many other locations, including as far north as Scotland, and a credible sighting already reported in January this year, sparking fears the non-native insect may become established in the UK.

Experts are keen to point out that this is not just a problem for beekeepers but poses a significant risk to public health. Asian Hornets are aggressively defensive of their nests, which are often built in hedgerows and brambles, meaning disturbances by unsuspecting individuals could have dangerous consequences.

An Asian Hornet can be identified by its very distinct markings - they're a similar size to a European Hornet, which is two or three times the size of a common wasp and **are black with distinct yellow lower leg.**

The public are being urged to stay vigilant and encouraged to report any suspected sightings on the *Asian Hornet Watch app*, which is available to download on iOS and Android.

Expert teams from the National Bee Unit, part of Defra, will then be deployed to track hornets back to their nests, which are then destroyed.

Reporting a possible sighting of an Asian Hornet is quick, free, and easy and has the potential to make a huge difference in the fight against this invasive species.

Betty Rapley 10/09/1930 - 28/02/2024

Betty was born in December 1930 in Bournemouth, an only child; her father was a Taxi driver.

Fast forward to 1944, when Bournemouth started receiving Evacuees, one of them was Peggy Prosser and a lifelong friendship began. Betty, Peggy and another friend Mari, all attended Bournemouth Grammar School for girls. At 16 Betty left school to enrol on a secretarial course at Bournemouth College for 2 years. She successfully completed the course, and her first office job was at a Builder's Merchant.

During their teenage years, the girls all attended an 'All Girls Youth Club' and this is where Betty developed her love for Amateur Dramatics. She trained with a 'Lamda' group and achieved a Gold Star certificate. In the confines of the youth club, the girls organised a dance and invited the boys from the 'All Boys Youth Club'. Betty met Eddie and in April 1955 they were married. Eddie's job as a Salesman for a building firm took them to Honiton in Devon for 4 years, with Betty working as a secretary in a Lace making company. They then returned to Portsmouth and eventually decided to follow Eddie's sisters to America. Betty continued with office work and Eddie in Insurance. After 4 years they returned to the UK and Eddie took advantage of the Government Grants to enrol on a teacher's training course. A year later Betty also enrolled to become a teacher. Betty taught shorthand and typing initially at 'The Shrubbery Girl's School' and then at the newly opened 'Cranbourne comprehensive school', where she remained until retirement.

In the mid 60's they bought 24 Southlea. They became involved with village life and Eddie became Parish Clerk ably assisted by his personal secretary Betty. They were keen to have acting opportunities, and this saw the birth of 'The Cliddesden Players'. Through their great energy and drive they were responsible in obtaining grants and organising fund raising which eventually saw the building of Cliddesden Millennium Village Hall. Betty was always on the look out to coerce people into helping with projects to do with the village hall, as she regularly walked their Poodle Minty.

They both became active members of St Leonard's church and Betty participated in the 'Hand Bells group' and the church choir and was also on the cleaning rosta!

Betty and Eddie, with Peggy and Gordon holidayed annually in Spain, where they purchased a time share on a Golf course near Benidorm. They both loved sport and supported Bournemouth Football club for every home game as members. Betty loved tennis and was an avid follower of Wimbledon and regularly attended, she was a huge fan of Djokovic.

Betty was an active member of the 'Cliddesden Ladies' group' and always insisted on bringing 'cheese and grapes ' to the food evenings as cooking was not her greatest love! She was also a founder member of the Cliddesden 'Friday Night' club, participating in Table Tennis, where she could beat everyone!

My family have known Betty since we moved into the village 42 years ago. 35 years ago we invited Betty & Eddie to join us for Christmas and for 23 years they were both very much welcome guests to join our celebrations. They both were important guests at our children's weddings 10 years ago.



Very many thanks to you all.





Beech class enjoyed a story based on each lesson. They had a Maths story about fractions, for science it was a story about flowers and plants, and they listened to a David Attenborough story describing a place in English. They also made bookmarks describing how to look after a plant.

Grayling: The Lady of the Stream

If I asked you to name a chalk stream fish, which one would you choose? For many, the brown trout or Atlantic salmon will come to mind – the most famous fishy mascots of these rare freshwater habitats. But today we're looking at another amazing member of the salmonid family: the European grayling. Or, to use its wonderfully romantic nickname, the 'Lady of the Stream'.

The grayling belongs to the genus *Thymallus* – so named because its members exude a faint scent of thyme. Although widespread across Europe and native to England, this fish was not originally found in the Test and Itchen. Records suggest that it was introduced to these rivers in the early 19th and 20th centuries respectively, possibly by moving fish from the Hampshire Avon.

Ironically, grayling would later be routinely culled in many southern chalk streams, due to fears of them out-competing brown trout. This practice declined as studies showed key differences in the diet, growth, habitat, and spawning behaviour of the two species. Today, grayling are particularly popular with anglers, as they can be pursued in the winter when brown trout are prohibited.

The grayling can be recognised by its glittering pewter scales and red-fringed dorsal fin. This ruby colour is much brighter in the males, especially during the breeding season. From March to May each year, they attempt to woo females with a vibrating dance. Fertilised eggs are nestled in the gravelly stream bed and – if all goes well – two to four weeks later, the water is filled with baby grayling!

After hatching, juveniles stick to the slower-flowing stream margins until they get large enough to swim further out. As they grow, their diet expands to include worms, insect larvae, and small crustaceans like freshwater shrimp. Grayling can gain twice the weight that trout and salmon manage in their first year but end up a little smaller – the largest adults weigh around two kilograms.

Grayling need cool, clean, oxygen-rich water, in addition to areas of silt-free gravel for spawning. If their homes aren't healthy, then sadly they can struggle to thrive. To learn how the Watercress and Winterbournes scheme is helping grayling, brown trout, and other chalk stream species, visit hiwwt.org.uk/ winterbournes. Taking the Dog for a Walk

Come on Dog lets go for a walk and see what's about at the moment. Its not actually raining now for a change, though it might later, so this may not be too much of a chore. I've got my coat and your lead so let's get going.

There is s bit of strength in the sun now, you can feel it when the cloud clears through. The roadside verges are greening up fast now. The crops in the fields are growing at last, but the fields without crops look a bit sad, no crops yet and no chance of getting on and sowing anything until they dry out a lot more.

Here are some celandines, a bright yellow patch opening when the sun shines on them. They seem to do better on wet land that catches the sun. There are some early dandelions too and that one has a bee on it so don't get your nose too close.

The hedges do still have a bit of white blackthorn flower, its getting a bit late now. The flowers only come on second year wood so a if the hedge trimming is too tight in the autumn and winter there will be no flowers the next year.

The first Bluebells are early this year, although it's been wet it has not been cold, some white stitchwort with its spiky leaves is coming too. The woodland edges are the best places to see them at the moment.

Look Dog, here are some cowslips and primroses on the little bank outside this house, I suppose they will have been planted, but the show is good. On the other side of the road where the grass has been cut daisies are open. At the back where the grass hasn't been cut and the Council haven't yet sent in the destruction squad the first cow parsley is showing. Just wait until May when they will be a fabulous show. By then the bright red grenadier beetles will be found on the flowers, along with flies, bees, small pollen beetles and more.

Keep up Dog you are giving that bank a good sniff, your nose must has found something the rest of us know nothing about. I would have thought the wild garlic smell smothered everything else, or maybe it's the dogs mercury that you want to check out.

Down the road here the banks are steeper, and it's a bit darker because of the trees growing n the top of the bank. Mind the potholes Dog, they have got a lot bigger this winter. I can see some fern fronds; I think its harts tongue beginning to unroll as they emerge. The grasses are growing where the sun can get through, but best of all are the wild strawberry flowers. Remember where they are Dog, we might find some tiny strawberries here in the summer.

That will be something to look forward to.

This funding magic stems from Hampshire's £7.2 million slice of the DfT's Bus Service Improvement Plan Plus treasure. It's our ticket to not just saving existing routes from cuts but also adding more frequent services across the board.

From the 14 April by Bluestar:

- The Bluestar 1 between Winchester and Southampton will run every 15 minutes on weekdays and Saturdays (current frequency is: every 20 minutes).
- Bluestar 2 linking Southampton, Eastleigh and Fair Oak will run every 15 minutes during the day on Saturdays (current frequency is every 20 minutes) to match the current weekday frequency on this busy route. The Bluestar 2 will also get evening service improvements on Mondays to Saturdays from the same date.
- On the Bluestar 1 between Winchester and Southampton there will be additional evening weekday services and new late-night services in each direction on Friday and Saturday evenings. Additional evening services will operate on the Bluestar 4 between Romsey and Southampton. Bluestar are also set introduce an earlier outbound journey on the Bluestar 4 from Southampton to Romsey on weekdays.
- From May onwards by Stagecoach:
- In Farnborough, buses will run more frequently to and from the Prospect Estate throughout the daytime, and earlier in the morning and later in the evening on Sundays. Extra evening buses will also run to Pinewood Park and Hawley Lane.
- Buses between Newbury, Kingsclere and Basingstoke will run later into the evening and on Sundays for the first time, as well as more frequently at weekday peak times. These changes are in partnership with West Berkshire Council.
- Service 66 between Romsey and Winchester will improve to every 30 minutes, Monday to Saturday daytime.
- In Andover, more buses will run to and from East Anton throughout the week, with extra trips during the day as well as into the evening and on Sundays. Service 76 between Andover, Whitchurch and Basingstoke will improve to every 30 minutes, Monday to Saturday daytime.
- · In partnership with Surrey County Council, service 65 between Alton, Farnham and Guildford will move to a new hourly timetable, running seven days a week.

Hampshire County Council is set to review proposals this week aimed at reducing office accommodation across the county. This move is all about consolidating staff into fewer buildings and saving those precious pennies on running costs.

What's the plan? The strategy will roll out over the coming years, focusing on adapting to changing work patterns and making sure the council's facilities are up to snuff. With many staff working remotely or directly in the community (think local services like social care for our vulnerable neighbours), it's clear that the way we work is evolving.

This isn't just about cutting costs. It's about ensuring access to public services remains robust for everyone in Hampshire. From libraries to register offices, no public service closures are on the table—just smarter use of the space we have.

This is all about staying efficient, effective, and, most importantly, close to the community's heart. While some staff might see changes in their work locations, the goal is to keep everything running smoothly without a hitch to services or the public.

Hello From Claire

I am sincerely hopeful that we have reached this point in the year without any fall of the dreaded white stuff! Personally speaking, my least favourite weather is snow – and so far, so good!

It does mean, however, that many of the benefits that a good cold snap would give us are lost.

Ticks are already rife, slugs and snails will be thriving, and the grass and weeds haven't really stopped growing at all.

As I write this there are 2 weeks until the end of April.....who knows, I many yet be disappointed!

This month we are having a look at herb #4 – Thyme

Thyme – Thymus Vulgaris – family: Labiatae

An essential herb for a good bouquet garni, Thyme has a long and distinguished history. Associated with strength and happiness, in the Middle Ages a high-ranked lady would embroider sprigs of rosemary on the clothes of knights going off to the crusades.

Favouring a dry, sunny spot with well-drained soil thyme can be raised from seed where it is to flower, although a quicker reward would come from dividing and old plant or taking cuttings in spring. A spreading, evergreen perennial its small mauve flowers are popular with bees and insects.

The leaves go well in all savoury dishes, especially veal, chicken, and game, and in tomato-based sauces.

Medicinally, thyme derives its use from the compound 'Thymol' which is a powerful antiseptic.

Use an infusion of the leaves as an antiseptic rinse for cuts, and drink for headaches, coughs, catarrh and asthma.

For clearing spots and pimples use oil of thyme.

Lemon thyme (Thymus x citriodorus) is one of only 3 of the over 50 different forms of thyme to be grown for culinary use. It has a milder flavour than garden thyme. In Parsley and Thyme stuffing it can be used to replace the grated lemon peel. Use in in fruit salads, jellies and baked custards.

Sprigs tied in a muslin cloth and added to the bath give off a lovely scent, and dried leaves can be used in pot pourri and herb cushions.



This recipe serves 10. It's American that's all I'm saying!

You will need:

The Salad ingredients

227g spaghetti broken in half, cooked and then rinsed well with cold water. 100g shredded red cabbage, 128g coarsely grated carrots 6 to 8 spring onions thinly sliced, 73g roasted peanuts 2 tbsp sesame seeds, 1 handful of coriander leaves chopped 1 handful basil leaves thinly sliced,

The Dressing ingredients 64g rice vinegar, 30g vegetable oil 32g or a heaped tablespoon of smoothie peanut butter 1 clove of garlic minced, Half a tofu cayenne pepper Salt and pepper to taste

Method

To make the dressing put all ingredients into a bowl and use a stick blender to mix up. Thin with more oil or vinegar to toast if necessary.

Put the Salad ingredients into a large bowl and toss with the dressing. Refrigerate until ready to serve.

You can make this salad a bit more substantial by adding strips of chicken, steak or salmon. Or go gluten free with courgette spaghettied. Add more vegetables like edamame beans, broccoli, bok choi, mangetout or French beans. **Enjoy Tracey**

Do you keep chickens or other captive birds? Important Information

From the 1st October 2024 everyone who keeps poultry and other captive birds must by law register on the National Poultry register. Previously

keepers of more than 50 had to be register, but in an effort to combat Avian influenza and other avian diseases this requirement has been extended to all poultry keepers.

Bird keepers will need to provide information, including their contact details, site where the birds are kept and details of the birds (species, number and what they are kept for).

This will cover all kept birds including chickens, ducks, geese, guinea fowl, pheasants, but also pigeons, budgies, parrots and birds of prey.

to get advice. The tool will ask you questions and use your answers to give you advice on how to check whether something is a scam and what to do if you've been scammed.

- · It seems too good to be true for example, a holiday that's much cheaper than you'd expect,
- Someone you don't know contacts you unexpectedly,
- You suspect you're not dealing with a real company for example, if there's no postal address,
- · You've been asked to transfer money quickly,
- You've been asked to pay in an unusual way for example, by iTunes, vouchers or through a transfer service like MoneyGram or Western Union,
- You've been asked to give away personal information like passwords or PINs.
- You haven't had written confirmation of what's been agreed.
