



Dear Friends

Looking at the growing pile of pallets and materials dropped off on the village bonfire for firework night I hope combustion won't be a problem after the rainy weather.

Our annual bonfires and fireworks bear out the words of the old ditty, "Gunpowder treason and plot, shall n'er be forgot" and on reflection we could rewrite that doggerel in current terms about explosives, attack and stratagem.

A quick read on Wikki shows there are at least thirty-seven types of bombs all of which go off with a bigger bang than a barrel of gunpowder, to devastating effect. On the internet we're able to see battlefield explosions in the war between Ukraine and Russia, and we also see the devastating effects of explosions in Israel and Gaza, and we mourn the tragic loss of life and human suffering that conflict brings.

Meanwhile MI5 have warned that China is plotting to spy on western countries with intent to steal sensitive research and security information and that this is already takes place on an unprecedented scale.

Of course, this is very troubling and we might wonder why we "haven't learned our lesson" from past conflicts and why can't we "live in peace with all".

The Bible is clear about wars, fighting and resulting tragedy coming about because of human sin and that we do fail to love our neighbour as ourselves.

At the end of November in church we prepare for the season of Advent in which we remember that when Jesus came one of his titles is "Prince of Peace". When the peace that comes after turmoil, whether it's after visiting grandchildren have left, or after a serious conflict is resolved, it is always welcome. Jesus came so that we might have peace with God and flowing from that we can learn how to find peace with one another.

In contrast to the gunpowder plotters God brings about change, not with violence, but through the loving gift of himself in Jesus, he brings us forgiveness of sin and the gift of his own peace to us. Every blessing, David

Dear All

I am writing as we approach the mid-point in Hampshire County Council's ten-week public consultation on proposals to transform the Local Authority's nursing and specialist care provision.

If you have not had an opportunity to provide your views yet, please do consider doing so by following this link to our dedicated web page where you will find further information and the response form.

The consultation closes on 12 November. I would also ask once again for your support in **sharing the consultation** within your local communities to encourage feedback from as many people as possible.

The proposals

To recap, a number of suggested changes have been put forward to the existing older adults service portfolio as part of a planned £173 million capital investment over the next five to six years. If pursued, this would enable us to transform and expand the future of nursing and specialist care accommodation directly provided by the Local Authority for the county's growing older population.

The proposals recommend concentrating on the delivery of specialist nursing care, complex dementia care and short-term support – to either prevent a hospital admission or support a hospital discharge. This would not only meet the needs of a growing number of older people in Hampshire in the longer term but would be care that could be provided more cost effectively by the Local Authority in-house.

Transforming in this way would involve the closure of some of the Authority's existing older care homes and a move away from the provision of long term residential care.

Next steps

No formal decisions will be taken in relation to any changes to the County Council's existing residential and nursing care homes before February 2024. Members of a Working Group established from the Health and Adult Social Care Scrutiny Committee (HASC), continue to oversee, and are actively engaged in the consultation process, advising on the approach and process.

To date a series of in-person engagement events have been held or have been organised for each of the homes potentially affected, ensuring all those directly connected have, or will have the opportunity to talk to members of our senior management team, care staff and independent advocates to discuss any individual concerns and or issues.

Our Registered Managers and their teams for the homes affected by the formal public consultation, will continue to make themselves available over the coming weeks to answer any questions, concerns and provide any additional information that residents, next of kin or their representatives may require.

The Knopper Galls

If you see a weird acorn, it will most likely be a Knopper Gall. This is a strange growth caused by a parasitic wasp which lays its egg in a developing acorn on an oak tree, and the growing larvae secretes chemicals which cause the disrupted growth. The wasp is not uncommon, the gall is however a very interesting and curious find for anyone who comes across one.

P.S. I think we may get very colourful autumn leaves this year, and the conkers are excellent!!



IN THE FIELDS By Seumas Foster

Early Autumn Warmth.

September left a memory of being a wet month, but the total rainfall I measured was actually 104mm, which turned out to be 1 mm less than last year. What was memorable was the 49mm that fell during the afternoon and evening on the 20th.

October has started with a really warm spell of weather, the good old jet stream wiggling about bringing air from north Africa. This has kept the rain away from us, (the North of England and Scotland have suffered badly), so for us the soils are dry and autumn sowing activity has been intense. Germination has been rapid, so crops are establishing well. This season looks favourable for Milling quality wheats as the market is likely to pay a good premium next harvest, which could boost the margin and profitability.

The maize harvest went well. This year has seen very good yields because of the sunshine in the summer and rain at the right time. The crop is destined for the local anaerobic digester and will be clamped, ie. stored, on farm until it is needed.

Oil seed rape early drillings suffered very badly from Cabbage Stem Flea Beetle damage, particularly in the warmth of August Bank Holiday and most fields had to be redrilled in September. The second crop is doing much better.

Cover Crop Progress

The cover crops, volunteer cereals and grasses have also grown quickly, putting on leaf and root so the fields have quickly turned green.

Game Birds

Early autumn is the time when young pheasants start to be seen in numbers on the lanes, but where are they this year? The answer is that some farms and estates no longer do much shooting so there are far fewer birds reared and released into the care of keepers. Where there is a shoot there are still good numbers of young birds. The knock-on effect could be that the large raptors, eg buzzards and kites, might have a tough time with fewer casualties and roadkill to eat. The food chain is a balance, a dynamic equilibrium that will shift to adapt to changing conditions.

Not in My Garden

Hedgehogs were being talked about the other evening, some in the gathering reporting regular sightings recently. I have not seen a hedgehog for a long

Benefice Recipes

How did we get to November so soon, as I write this the weatherman says an unusually warm spell coming for the beginning of October. Hoping for that last oomph of warmth, then some chilly days to kickstart some bulbs in the garden and sweeten the parsnips up the allotment. Our sprouts this year are looking fab, and we have enormous Jerusalem artichoke plants so hopefully some good tubers un-

derneath them too. The garden tidy up and put to bed begins again. Maybe the chill could help out with those big chunky spiders coming in as well and camping out under the bed, then taking a quick scamper across the pillows when the lights go out! Even the dog won't tackle them!

So, the recipe this month is a lovely Parkin.

Ingredients

200g Unsalted Butter, 100g Soft dark brown sugar

100g Black Treacle, 150g Golden Syrup

110g Medium sized Oatmeal (or roughly blitzed porridge oats) 180g Self Raising Flour

3/4 tsp Baking Powder, 3 teaspoons Ground Ginger

2 Large Eggs lightly beaten, 2 Tablespoons milk

Method

Pre heat the oven to 170c/150 fan

Grease and line an 8inch /20cm square loose bottom tin with baking parchment.

Put the butter, black treacle, golden syrup and brown sugar in a pan over a low heat, and gently simmer till butter has melted.

Take off the heat and leave to cool.

Place all the dry ingredients Oatmeal, flour, baking powder and ginger into a bowl and gently mix.

Pour the cooled treacle mixture over the dry ingredients and mix till well combined. It is quite a runny batter.

Add the milk and mix well then gradually add the eggs and mix till well combined.

Pour the mix into the tin and bake for 35/45 minutes or until cooked. Testing the centre with a skewer till it comes out clean. Leave in the tin to cool. Parkin improves with age by keeping tightly wrapped in an airtight container. A nice slab with your hot chocolate watching the fireworks or with a cup of tea after a day putting the garden to bed.



4. Increased payments to local residents hosting Ukrainian families

This takes the monthly payment to £700, which is above the Government's current guidance for local authorities.

5. Funding to save the UK's rarest orchids

Hampshire County Council has secured £98,000 funding from Natural England to help rare helleborine orchids to thrive. The conservation project aims to create protected habitats for the endangered plants at sites in East Hampshire.

The number of police front counters will increase from 13 to 23, with new front counters in Cowes, Portsmouth Central, Park Gate, Petersfield,

Totton, Ryde, Yateley, Eastleigh, Cosham and Gosport.

2. Transforming in-house nursing and specialist care

A ten week public consultation is now underway on proposals that would see £173 million invested over the next five to six years to transform and expand the future of nursing and specialist accommodation directly provided by HCC for the county's growing older population. The proposals recommend concentrating on the delivery of specialist nursing care, complex dementia care and short-term support – to either prevent a hospital admission or support a hospital discharge, so ensuring care could be provided more cost effectively. The proposals include:

- Building new nursing homes in Havant, Winchester and the New Forest
- Modernising and expanding care at existing homes in
- ♦ Basingstoke, Aldershot and Emsworth.
- Withdrawing over time from the direct provision of residential care, with the closure of a number of the council's older homes.

Juliet Henderson Hampshire County Councillor Report October 2023

1. HCC financial planning this autumn

The financial challenges facing the County Council, and local government nationally, are well documented. Each year, it costs more to deliver public

services, but the money received from

central Government and council tax increases is not enough to meet the extra costs, which results in a deficit. High inflation and growing demand for local services means that in the two years up to the 2025/26 financial year, the budget shortfall is expected to rise considerably to £132m, one of the biggest deficits the County Council has ever faced.

Proposals this autumn set out options for how Hampshire County Council could close this budget gap and come on top of over £0.6bn of spending

reductions already delivered since the start of national austerity. Hampshire is in a better financial position than most other county councils, and while the Authority's finances are stable until 2025/26, future stability relies on central Government fundamentally changing the way that local government services are funded, or reducing what councils are legally required to deliver.

In the absence of any immediate Government action in this regard, Hampshire County Council must plan on the basis of closing the budget gap itself, applying a combination of tactics to help balance the books, including changing and reducing services and delivering only those services which the council must legally provide.

A final decision is to be made by the full county council in November. After this, some proposals may then be subject to furthermore detailed public

Year 6 – TeenTech Our Year 6 children went to TeenTech at the Hampshire Court Hotel. More than 300 students aged 10-16 were there from 25 different schools. The event gave the children an opportunity to talk to professionals from companies linked to Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths (STEM) as well as a chance to design their

own technology for the future.

professional video recording equipment, try coding robots, explore the effects of artificial intelligence and even use virtual reality headsets.

There were many challenges, such as building a gearbox and working as a team to construct a frame. All the pupils had a fantastic time and returned to school with an even more optimistic attitude towards STEM.

Dummer Village Hall

At the Annual General Meeting in November 1973 in the Dummer Reading Rooms (a wooden building on the same site as the present village hall) two Trustees were appointed, Mr Suckling of Southwood and Mr Earnshaw of Chapel Close. A new committee was formed, and that Committee took the decision to apply for grants and to build a new village hall on the site. The various clubs and committees moved to other venues for 10 months. The Reading Rooms were pulled down in January 1974 and the new brick-built hall with a kitchen was opened in September 1974. A team of ladies made curtains for each window and in 1975 Lyn made tablecloths for the trestle tables and these cloths are still in use today. In the late 1980's, early 1990's two new wings were added to give a larger entrance, a small meeting room (now storage) and a disabled toilet.

Over the years the kitchen has been upgraded, a new floor laid, new central heating and many other tweaks and enhancements. And maintenance is always ongoing.

Thank you to all who have supported Dummer Village Hall over the past 49 years.

The Annual General Meeting will take place on Thursday 9th November 2023 at 7:30 .m. in (the new) Dummer Village Hall.
