



When one thinks about our own situation- there are many, many advantages we enjoy. How do we let our advantages and privilege shape us? Or shape our response to, or even our thoughts of others?

I listened recently to a very thought-provoking "Thought for Day" programme- whilst driving home from a local hospital! I highly recommend the 2 minute listen to Bishop David Walker, Bishop of Manchester, available online or on apps. https://www.bbc.co.uk/sounds/play/p0c9y15y

I share a few of his ideas; He begins with the statement that privilege is neutral, just a statement of fact. What we do with our privilege is the crucial response.

In the Bible the people of Israel- were special to God but wrapped up within this privileged status was the calling and responsibility to be a blessing to others. This could be a pattern for us to follow? Do we use our advantages to be a voice for the voiceless or do we shout down others? Do we use our influence to better others, work for justice and provide mercy or graciousness to people in their weaknesses?

Bishop Walker suggests that advantage and privilege can lead to entitlement – if we don't manage it well- and interestingly links

this 'evil twin' to many failings in our leaders in the UK and in the world that has led to war. Entitlement shapes our responsecan lead us to put others down-lead to oppression, intimidation, discrimination and marginalization- even terrorism.

Those who are the greatest among you should take the lowest rank, and the leader should be like a servant. Who is more

important, the one who sits at the table or the one who serves? The one who sits at the table, of course. But not here! For I am among you as one who serves."

His example was to be a servant King, one who came to serve. What an

Walking with Wildlife, Robert Bryant

In the early dawn we awoke to the sound of a cuckoo calling from the trees nearby. Once part of the familiar sounds of summer, cuckoo populations have tended to fade away in recent years.

The folklore rhyme, 'in May he calls all day', was certainly true though on a recent visit to Fritham Plain in the New Forest. Here, two cuckoos were calling constantly from the far woods that bound this plateau of forest heath. In bright sunshine, we strode through dry heather speckled blue with milkwort. At Green Pond, a herd of ponies stood head to rump, flicking flies with their long tails.

From the plain, we looped down Freeworms Hill, passing groves of holly holms, frilly white with blossom and murmuring with bees. A holly blue butterfly whizzed through on an urgent quest. Looking up we noted the red oaks, newly flushed with leaves of a startling yellow.

At the valley bottom besides the brook, there's an ancient oak, kettle shaped, and full of character. Meandering on through the trees, we chanced upon a storm-wrecked beech, stout of girth and bulging with bracket fungi. As wobbly as a stack of pancakes, these spectacular sulphur-yellow polypores are known as 'chicken of the woods'.

Crossing the wooden footbridge at Rakes Brakes Bottom, we watched a dragonfly, a blue chaser, broad-bodied and milky blue, with a row of yellow markings on each side. It cruised around the wetlands in a manner described in Dan Powell's splendid guide to dragonflies as 'chunky, crashing, noisy ... not subtle'. Heading onwards up to a pony pool on the hillside, we met more of these blue chasers, as well as damselflies: both the large red and the common blue.

Walking back with the still distant echo of cuckoo calls, and the pebble tap of sunlit stonechats, we heard a song trill from the woodland edge: 'tree, tree, tree, once more I come to thee'. Now we glimpsed a small black and white bird, moving through the treetops. It was a pied flycatcher or flicker, a scarce summer visitor.



Our reception team will listen to your symptoms, assess if you are suitable from a list of criteria and then refer you to a community pharmacy, where you can go along for a face to face consultation with the Pharmacist.

Some of the things that form part of the scheme are:

- Bites and stings
- Colds
- Congestion
- Ear and eye problems
- Gastric and Bowel issues including indigestion and constipation
- Hayfever
- Pain or swelling
- Skin problems such as eczema, warts, verruca's and athlete's foot.
- Mouth and throat problems

Once the Pharmacist has assessed you, they will recommend a suitable treatment. Should the Pharmacist not be able to help you or your ailment needs to be escalated or referred to an alternative service, the pharmacist can then arrange this.

Children and Young Persons Social Prescribers (Under 25's)

Social prescribing involves working with our social prescribers to think about what things are most important to you and helping you to connect to community organisations that align with what matters.

Usually, people have around 1-6 sessions where they would think about what they would like to become involved in and what steps they need to take to get there.

You can self-refer to this service or may be referred by one of the practice team. This support might be useful for you if:

- You feel ready to get involved in new things but don't know how/ lack confidence
- You are willing to try something new and are quite self-motivated
- You don't want specific mental health input but feel being more active or connected to the community would help your wellbeing.

Dispensary service

Over the summer months (From now until September) it is likely to take longer for prescriptions to be handled by our dispensary due to staffing levels.

Therefore please ensure that you place your medication requests in plenty of good time. Please also remember that when attending the surgery, even if just to collect a prescription that you are required to wear a face mask unless you have a medical exemption. Thank you.

Be tick aware!

Watch out there are ticks about! It's the perfect conditions for these mini beasts. Here's a helpful reminder of some simple 'tick tips' if you're out walking.

These tiny insects, which can transmit bacteria such as Lyme disease, can be found throughout the year but are most active between spring and autumn. They are typically found in woodland, grassland, moorland or heathland but are also found in urban parks and gardens. When out walking, remember to keep to footpaths, avoiding long grass 'Tick tips' for walkers include:

Wear appropriate clothing (a long-sleeve shirt and trousers tucked into your socks); solute an insect repellent;

Wear light coloured fabrics that may help you spot a tick on your clothes;

Inspect your skin for ticks, particularly at the end of the day, including your head, neck and skin folds (armpits, groin and waistband)

ECheck your children's head and neck areas, including their scalp (skin on top of their head)

Check that pets do not bring ticks into your home in their fur.

If you do get bitten by a tick, removing it quickly and correctly can help to reduce any potential risk. The only safe way to remove a tick is to use a pair of fine-tipped tweezers, or an easy-to-use device which can be purchased from pharmacies or vets. Then:

Grasp the tick as close to the skin as possible. Pull upwards slowly and firmly, as mouthparts left in the skin can cause a local infection

Once removed, apply antiseptic to the bite area and keep an eye on it for several weeks for any changes

Contact your GP if you begin to feel unwell or develop a circular red skin rash, often described as a bull's-eye rash, and remember to tell them that you were bitten by a tick. 

The majority of my constituents living in this community are fortunate enough to already be on the **property ladder** but this is not the reality everywhere and is why we've recently set out plans to turn Generation Rent into Generation Buy, supporting more people to achieve their dream of home ownership.

Our plan is built on strong foundations as last year there were over 400,000 first time buyers - a 20 year high - but we must go further.

The challenge facing first-time buyers today is far greater than anything we have seen before. It was only 20 years ago – in 2002 – that a home cost on average four and a half times average incomes. Today that multiple has risen to nine times average incomes and we all know our part of the world often exceeds even that. Reforms in the Levelling Up and Regeneration Bill – now beginning its passage through Parliament - should support home ownership over decades to come. Yet as we all know, it is not enough just to build more homes, something we are already doing in the Winchester District.

Action is now needed to unlock home ownership for more of our constituents which is why we have announced a review into the mortgage market along with measures to support people to save for a deposit, no matter their financial situation. The review, which will report back by Autumn, will set out a blueprint for how to widen the availability of low-cost, low-deposit mortgages that many of us relied on in the past to buy our first home.

There is also a generation of renters locked out of home ownership because of where they currently live. Close to 2 million council homes have been bought by families using their Right to Buy. We made long-standing commitments to deliver the same rights to the 2.5 million households living in homes belonging to housing associations, but they remain trapped. They cannot buy, they don't have the security of ownership, and they cannot treat their home as an asset, or make the improvements they want.

So we are righting that wrong. Over the coming months, this Government will work with the Housing Association sector to bring forward a new Right to Buy scheme. It will work for tenants, giving millions more the chance to own their home by 2024. There will be one-for-one replacement of each social housing property sold to learn the lessons of the past. Much is lost in the noise of Westminster 'politics' but this is really important and has my support.

Finally, in other news completely, I am working with my colleague Pauline Latham MP and 'whispering' Bob Harris on a new health charity; the **Aortic Dissection Trust**. It's a complex heart condition which took Pauline's son suddenly at just 44 years of age and we are determined to raise awareness of the often fatal condition when undiagnosed. 
Cllr Jackie Porter County Corner - March 2022

I've been campaigning for better broadband in my County division for about ten years now.

As government services started to transfer online by 2005, getting any functioning broadband at all was the first problem.



Despite the promises, each improvement in internet speed proudly announced by Government only reaches around 95% of our homes; this leaves 1 in 20 homes lagging far behind. If you live in an area with fast speeds, the 'rolling circle' on your TV will be a distant memory, but to many of us, this still happens!

The Community Fibre Partnership (CFP) scheme was designed to enable communities to sort out their own service direct with providers registered by the Dept of Culture Media and Sport, the DCMS. This is not ideal, because if services are to be truly universal, it should be exactly that- available to everyone. From the start I have argued that we wouldn't want to live in a home where water just dripped slowly out of the taps, so why would we want to live in an area of poor internet connectivity?

In June, at my request, HCC Scrutiny took a second look at the extremely slow roll out of the Government-led CFP scheme. The Government's Broadband Delivery UK, BDUK refused the invitation to come along. In the face of increasing uncertainty that the last 5% of homes will benefit from the commercial rollout, I have urged the County to extend their budget for these schemes for another year, which could help get these schemes become a reality in our rural communities. 


